The Misses Browns (daughters of the late Senator George Brown) stand well in the third year. Of girls, five presented themselves in the third year, one in the second, five in the first. The rejected men were : 1 in the fourth year, 3 in the third year, 1 in the fourth vear, 3 in the third year, 25 in the second, 7 in the first. Failure to get honors in mental and moral science in the second year was the "insurmountable" for the majority of the unfortunate 25. 



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
