PRINCE BISMARCK HONORED

POPULAR RECOGNITION OF HIS 75TH BIRTHDAY.

Conferences on the Army Bill—A Commemorative May Be Arranged—Newspapers and the Public Express their Appreciation of His Services.

BERLIN, April 1.—To-day is the 75th anniversary of the birth of Prince Bismarck, and a number of the Berlin newspapers take advantage of the occasion to publish congratulatory articles. ROLLED INTO FRASER RIVER.

A C.P.R. WORK TRAIN TAKES A TUMBLE.

The Engineer and Brakeman Were Thrown Beneath the Engines and Wrecked—The Fireman Escaped With a Few Bruises—The Dead Men Were Unearthed—Search for the Bodies.

WINNIPEG, April 2.—A special work train, consisting of engine, caboose and several flat cars, jumped the track at Seabird Bluff, and rolled into the Fraser River, carrying with it Stephen Whyte, the engineer, Arthur Herrington, fireman, and George Pushe, brakeman.

Whyte and Pushe were thrown beneath the engine and were drowned. Herrington escaped with a few slight bruises. Assistance was at once sent from Vancouver and the track cleared in a few hours.

The company are now searching for the bodies of the engineer and brakeman. Whyte is from Winnipeg and is a brother-in-law of Judge Kilham. Pushe, the brakeman, is a native of Antigonish, N.S. Both men were unmarried.

FIELD DAY ON THE PLAINS OF YORK.

Veterans of 1865 Celebrate the Calling Out of the Toronto Corps for Active Service in the Northwest.

The eighth anniversary of the departure of the Toronto contingent of the troops that did service in the last Northwest campaign was celebrated on Good Friday by a number of the veterans of that year. A party numbering 23, all told, 18 of whom were members of the Canadian force that routed the rebel Riel and made the fire remaining members of the party being invited, left Tomdorn to have a good time or a day's outing in regular prairie camp life on the plains of East York Township.

The outfit comprised the members of the Royal Grenadiers, Queen's Own, Winnipeg Field Artillery, York Rangers, Northwest Mounted Police and "A" Battery, R.C.A. A column was made up of two transport wagons, a buckboard and a store wagon, together with a mounted party of seven. The march was sounded at 8 a.m. sharp, when the column pulled out of Tomdorn en route for the prairie. The force consisted of three scouts and an interpreter, mounted the main body and the remaining members of the party.
