Miss Etter entered upon her duties on the first of March last, and since that time has fully justified the high recommendation given by Dr. Sinclair. She is capable, energetic, and interested in her work. We have been more than satisfied with the results at the Asylum, and consider the Municipality fortunate in securing such a matron, and hope that she will long continue in her present position. We have also expended the sum of \$537.78, in repairs and equipments.

Of this sum, \$197.98 was expended in renewing the roof which was leaking badly. We have substituted a number of iron bed steads in place of wooden ones. Made other additions to the furniture. Placed two ventilations on the roof. Procuped a fire extinguisher, and, by an alteration in the plumbing, now have hot and cold water on both first and second flats. We have also both first and second nats. We have also made a thorough renovation of the interior by painting and plastering.

We have now an institution which will compare favorably with any of the kind in the province, and which has the confidence of the authorities at Halfay.

The foregoing changes were rendered necessary from the fact that our Asylum is kept up by receiving the incurable and harmless insane from Mt. Hope. 
