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



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APPENDIX A.

BY-LAWS.

BY-LAW NO. 584.

Whereas it is necessary and expedient to pass a By-law to enable the Municipal Council of the municipality of the Village of Fort Erie to convey the whole or certain parts of a street known as Leopold street to Her Majesty the Queen ;

Therefore be it enacted, and it is hereby enacted, by the corporation of the County of Welland, that the Municipal Council of the Village of Fort Erie, in the said County of Welland, be empowered to close up and convey to Her Majesty the Queen the whole or any portion of a street known as Leopold street, and to receive in lieu thereof and use for the purposes of public travel, a road known as part of the track of the Buffalo, Brantford & Lake Huron Railway.

Adopted and passed in council this 11th day of December, 1891.

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APPENDIX B.

REPORTS.**ADJUSTMENT OF ACCOUNTS WITH HIGH SCHOOLS.**

To the Warden and Council of the County of Welland, in Council Assembled :

Your Special Committee in the matter of the adjustment of accounts with the various High Schools beg leave to report as follows :

That only the Welland High School appears to be entitled to any additional sum of money beyond the equivalent of the annual grant from the Provincial Legislature.

That they have carefully examined the claim presented by the Town of Welland, and find that the said High School will be entitled to receive the sum of \$718.23 in addition to a sum equal to the Government grant for the current year.

We annex a statement in full of the manner in which we arrive at the above conclusion.

Supplementary Report of a Majority of the Special Committee re Adjustment of Accounts with High Schools.

The majority of your Committee finds that this award to Welland High School operates oppressively upon the High School Districts of Thorold and Stamford, inasmuch as these small districts are already taxed to support local high schools, and consequently do not furnish pupils to the High School at Welland.

We would therefore recommend that the county shall at least continue the 25 per cent. additional grant which these schools have received from 1886 up to this time.

Since June, admission has been secured into the Idiot Asylum at Orillia for three of the worst cases, viz. : Daniel Sider, Wm. D. Swayze and John Ford, but before Sider could be sent he was removed by his friends, who refused to permit him to return.

The expense of removing them was necessarily considerable, but the County will now be relieved from the burden of maintaining them probably during the rest of their natural lives.

The boy Arthur Jackson proved unmanageable, and was committed to the reformatory at Penetanguishene.

A number of gates, coffins, etc., have been built by the Inmate McIndoe, the only expense to the County being the lumber, trimmings and other material.

The ditch along the North side of farm has been deepened, a larger culvert at the road leading to the House, a three-inch drain laid in the swale through the field in N. E corner which was then filled up, all the labor being performed by the Inmates.

We regret to say that an information was laid against the Keeper for not reporting the deaths of Inmates to the Inspector of Anatomy, and that he was fined. Since then he has been instructed to report said deaths, and the bodies have been claimed by friends, and have either been buried on the premises or in grave-yards elsewhere.

One cow (fresh milch) has been purchased at a cost of \$38.

Arrangements have been made to send the boy Garner to the

Welland public school, the distance being too great for him to attend in the section in which the House is situated.

The insurance on the barn has been renewed, the rate reduced, and a saving of seven dollars and fifty cents effected on a three years policy.

A new lease of Telephone has been taken, and the rent reduced from forty to twenty-five dollars.

The increase in extra medical attendance is due to the committal of Ford to the St. Catharines hospital after having absconded from the Home, and to the examination of persons for admission to the Asylum.

The dry goods account includes an item of \$96 purchased so long ago as Nov., 1890, but for which the account was not rendered (by instruction) until March, 1891. A certain small amount of hired labor, such as for berry-picking, reaping, threshing, picking peas, is included in the farm maintenance and incidental expense accounts.

We beg leave to direct the attention of the Council to the fact that the Legislative grant of \$4000 has been received; and we desire to remark upon the unsatisfactory condition of the hospital building and the insufficiency of barn accommodation, and to express our opinion that a portion of the aforesaid grant ought to be expended in remodelling these defects, and that this should be done as soon as possible.

We desire to express our satisfaction with the manner in which the Keeper and Matron have performed their duties during our term of office.

And, in accordance with the instruction of your honorable body, we beg leave to add that your committee is of the opinion that proposals should be asked from the Town of Welland looking toward the introduction of Town water on the Industrial Home premises.

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SPECIAL REPORT OF STANDING COMMITTEE OF HOUSE OF INDUSTRY.

*To the Warden and Councillors of the County of Welland in Council
Assembled :—*

GENTLEMEN :—Your Committee were instructed by resolution of this Council, passed the 30th day of January last, as follows :

“ Moved by Mr. Morris, seconded by Mr. Brown,

“ That whereas by the Inspector's report the cost per capita for maintenance for the year of each inmate, exclusive of Keeper's family, hired help and Interest account, for Waterloo Home is \$1.12 ; of York \$1.15 ; Brant \$1 ; Wellington \$1.16 ; Elgin \$1.13 ; Lincoln \$1.56 ; Middlesex \$1.02 ; Norfolk 76 cents per week ; and the Welland Home \$2.06, being an average \$1.02 per week per capita more than the above named Institutions ;

“ Be it therefore resolved that it be an instruction to the Home Committee to investigate, and if possible to arrive at some conclusion why the cost of keeping the inmates at the Welland Home is so much greater than in the above named Institutions.”

Mr. Morris kindly placed at the disposal of your committee the documents upon which the preamble of the following resolution was based, but we regret to say that the information which they contain is not as full and definite as we would wish.

According to the Auditors' report, the total expenditure for all purposes on the Welland House of Industry for 1890 appears to have been \$6733.36, excluding the payment of debenture and interest thereon. The Clerk's report states that the capital account was increased during the year by \$1529.27. Accepting that estimate as correct, the sum expended for current expenses of the Institution would be \$5204.09. It is doubtful, however, whether such expenses as those for extension of chimneys, house-drain, sidewalk, medicines, sundries, etc., should properly be regarded as an increase of capital.

The number of weeks' board is stated at 2609, everybody included. The cost per capita would therefore be a fraction less than

\$2 per head, making no charge whatever for interest or discount on house furnishings, bedding, implements, etc., but taking no account of increase in stock on hand at the end of the year.

We have endeavored to institute a comparison by arranging the expenditure under as nearly as possible the same heads as in some other counties ; for that comparison we have selected the counties of Elgin, Lincoln and Wellington. It will be seen that any exact comparison can scarcely be made:

Committee time does not appear to have been charged against any of the above Institutions except that of Wellington, and then only a part, being the expenses of a Committee of Enquiry ; nor is printing and advertising charged except in Wellington. In Elgin, however, on the other hand, \$117.25 was paid for conveyance of Inmates.

The accounts of John Wilkerson and J. C. Page, deducted as Cash received in the last Inspector's report, have not yet been paid, but were simply charged against them in the books.

In conclusion, we beg to remark that the principal excess of expenditure in this county as compared with others appears to be under the heads of labor, groceries, mill feed, ice, water and manure.

Your Committee, appointed to endeavor to arrive at an agreement with the Town of Niagara Falls for a renewal of the Award expiring on July 1st last, beg leave to report that on June 15th they met a committee of the Town and arrived at an agreement for a

renewal of the Award for a further term of five years from July 1st last. The new Agreement differs from the Award in some minor particulars. Such alterations as have been made your Committee consider to the advantage of the County. A copy of the agreement is attached to this report.

Memorandum of Agreement made and entered into this 15th day of July, One Thousand Eight Hundred and Ninety-one, between the Municipal Corporation of the Town of Niagara Falls (hereinafter called the Town), of the First Part, and the Municipal Corporation of the County of Welland (hereinafter called the County), of the Second Part :

Whereas the Award made between the parties hereto, fixing the amount which the Town should pay to the County for the expenses of the Administration of Justice, Use of Jail, etc., under the provisions of the Municipal Act, expired on the 1st of July, inst., and it is necessary that this agreement should be entered into for the purpose of fixing the amount to be paid for a further period of years,

Witnesseth that it is mutually agreed between the parties hereto as follows :

1. The Town shall pay to the County as compensation for the use of the Court House and Goal and appurtenances, and other property real and personal used in connection therewith, including the Jailor's and Turnkey's residences, the yearly sum of \$264.15, to be computed from the first day of July instant, and to continue for five years from that date, and to be paid yearly as hereinafter provided.

2. The Town shall pay to the County for the use of the Registry Office, and all real and personal property used in connection therewith, the yearly sum of Thirty-four dollars and thirteen cents, to be computed from the first day of July instant, and to continue for five years from that date, and to be paid yearly as herinafter provided.

3. The Town shall pay annually to the County, in the proportion of One dollar by the Town to Nine dollars by the County, for the following expenses connected with the Administration of Justice, viz.: All sums payable to the Sheriff, Clerk of the Peace, and County Crown Attorney; all sums payable for printing and Advertising, Constables, Constables attending court, Crier, Board of Audit, five-sixths of Auditors' Salaries and five-sixths of Treasurer's Salary Light and Fuel for Court House, Cleaning Court House, repairing and furnishing Court House, repairs of Registry Office and repairs of Gaol: the sums to be payable as follows, that is to say: The first payment, being the amount found to be due from the 1st July, 1891, to 1st January, 1892, to be paid on the 1st of July, 1892, and all subsequent payments to be made yearly on the 1st of July in each year, each of such subsequent payments to be of the amount found to be due on the preceding 31st December, save and except that the final payments provided by the terms of this agreement, being the payment for the last half year, is to be made on the 30th July following the termination of this agreement.

The sum so to be paid by the said Town shall be its said proportion of said expenses after deducting from the gross amount thereof all sums received by the County from the Government, or from any other source whatever, towards the payment of reimbursement to the County of said expenses, or any part thereof. This is to continue for five years from the first day of July instant.

4. The town shall pay annually to the County, in the proportions of One dollar by the Town to Nine dollars by the County, for all necessary and proper expenses in keeping and taking care of all persons committed to the Common Gaol of the County of Welland, and others duly confined therein, and for the salaries of Gaoler, Turnkey, Matron, Gaol Surgeon, Caretaker and Messenger, and of

any Assistants required in the disciplinary management of the Gaol, for Fuel, Light, Water, Cleaning and Cleaning Appliances not Fixtures, Prison Dietaries, Medicines and Extras known as Hospital Dietaries ordered by the surgeon, current renewal of Bedding, Clothing and Shoes, and any other expenses not herein particularly enumerated in the ordinary management of the Gaol (having first deducted the sum to be paid by the Government for the maintenance of persons on indictable offences), the same to be payable from the 1st July instant, as hereinbefore provided in each year. The sum so to be paid by the said Town shall be the said proportion of said expenses after deducting from the gross amount thereof all sums received by the County from the Government, or from any other source whatever toward the payment or reimbursement to the County of said expenses or any part thereof. This is to continue for five years from the first day of July instant.

5. The Town shall pay to the County, in the proportion of One dollar by the Town to Nine dollars by the County, from the first day of July instant, and during five years thereafter, for the expenses of Juries, including the Selecting, Summoning, mileage and payment thereof (first deducting all sums that may be received on account thereof) in the manner and at the times hereinbefore provided. This is to continue for five years from the first day of July instant.

6. The Town shall pay to the County, in the proportion of One dollar by the Town to Nine dollars by the County, all other necessary expenses in the Administration of Justice, and in respect to which no specific award is otherwise herein made. This arrangement to commence on the first day of July instant, and to continue for five years, and to be payable in the manner mentioned in the preceding paragraphs.

7. The Town shall pay no portion of the Criminal Witness fees of the County, and shall make no claim on the County for any hereafter to be paid by the Town.

8. The Town shall pay to the County, annually, in the proportion of One dollar by the Town to Nine by the County, the expenses necessarily and legally incurred for Books, Furniture, Light, Fuel,

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Care of Building and Appurtenances and otherwise howsoever in the ordinary management of the said Registry Office, and for which no provision is by law or otherwise made, such payment to be computed from the first day of July instant, and to be made on the dates and in the manner hereinbefore mentioned, the town to receive a share of Surplus Fees from Registry Office (if any) in the proportion above indicated.

9. The Town shall pay to the County, in proportion of One dollar by the Town to Nine dollars by the County, for the Insurance against loss by fire upon the Court House, Gaol and Registry Office of the said County, and the Chattel property thereunto belonging. And in case of loss by fire in respect of the said buildings and property, the said parties shall share the insurance money received in consequence thereof in the proportion hereinbefore indicated.

10. The Town shall pay to the County, for the use of the Industrial Home and all real and personal property used in connection therewith for the care of all the insane destitute of the Town, the yearly sum of three hundred dollars, and in addition thereto the sum of two dollars per week for each destitute person who is not insane who may be sent to the said Home by the Town, during such period as such destitute person may remain at the Home.

11. The Town shall pay annually to the County, in the proportion of One dollar by the Town to Nine dollars by the County, two-thirds of the Interest Account on current indebtedness of the County.

12. This Agreement shall be and continue in force for the period of five years from the first day of July instant.

As witness the Corporate Seal of the said parties hereto, evidenced by the signatures of their Mayor and Warden respectively and of their respective Clerks, this fourth day of July, One Thousand Eight Hundred and Ninety-one.

To the House of Commons of the Dominion of Canada—Assembled :

The Petition of the Municipal Council of the Corporation of the County of Elgin

Humbly Sheweth : That according to present Government regulations the class of cattle known as stockers do not exceed one thousand pounds in weight ; five of them are allowed the space on ship-board set apart for four fat cattle. If this regulation was observed there would be no cause for complaint, but cattle weighing fourteen hundred pounds and over are often marked as stockers, and occupy the same space, and overcrowding is the result.

The difference to the shipper in freight is only ten per cent, and this is more than lost to him on account of the injured and bruised condition in which the cattle arrive in the Old Country.

The ship-owners are the only persons benefitted by the doubling up system. If it is made an imperative regulation that every animal have a full space of two feet eight inches in width by eight feet in length, it will put a stop to the cruel practice of shipping heavy

cattle as stockers, prevent over-crowding, and place the cattle trade generally in a more healthy condition.

Your Petitioners therefore pray that your Honorable Body will pass such regulation that all cattle exported from the Dominion will be allowed the full space of two feet eight inches by eight feet, whether classed as stockers or otherwise.

And Your Petitioners as in duty bound will ever pray.

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
