ON THE LEVEL,

Since the proposed highway thru Mount Pleasant Cemetery has had a new lease of life, and the city works committee is taking the thing in earnest, a short review of the history of this street of North Toronto's dreams might not be unwelcome to those who will have to breast the terrors of the legislature and the cemetery trust towards getting the road put thru.

We will pass over the long germ stage, way back in the last century, when the cemetery road was hot stuff for every really progressive council

when the cemetery road was hot stuff for every really progressive council candidate, and a budding ratepayers' issociation sicked them on, and begin with the year 1909, when the peren-nial agitation culminated in an appeal to the legislature.

nial agitation culminated in an appeal to the legislature.

In that year an act was passed, giving the Township of York power to put the road thru. Not that the Township of York cared much, but had listened to the importunities of North Foronto, and realized the necessity for such a highway. Time passed with its usual swiftness, however, practically nothing was done, and as the act may held good for a year, an extension of time was secured from the legislature in 1910, and a report was submitted to an official arbitrator.

At this juncture the cemetery trust suggested that an agreement be drawn up between the Township of York, Lown of North Toronto and the cemetery trust. This was done, terms were fixed, and the Town of North Toronto passed a bylaw for the amount required. The bylaw was carried by the electors and the agreement was accordingly endorsed by the town and the township.

The cemetery trust then claimed that legislation would be necessary to confirm the agreement on the ground that the town's bylaw was invalid as the town did not have the legal right to spend that amount of money on an improvement outside the boundaries of the municipality.

The Town of North Toronto had not only passed the bylaw but had actually signed a cheque for \$15,000, and sent it to the trust, which was the cash payment to be made under the agreement.

That cheque was never cashed. An-

That cheque was never cashed. Annexation took place, and North Toronto became a part of the city, with the result that the city had then the right to put thru the road as arranged by North Toronto, which meant the construction of a bridge over the Belt Line Railway, and the payment of \$15,000 to the trust for land dameges and the construction of bridges between the east and west sections of the cemetery over the new highway.

The city board of works has risen above trusts, towns and townships. They have decided that the road must go thru on the level. That necessitates new legislation. More power to the board of works, and who dare deny that a road on the level is necessary that a road on the level is necessary thru Mount Pleasant Cemetery? Cer-tainly not the legislature.

There is one well, from which thirty people drink; six closets within the immediate vicinity, with poultry running around.





Some Hints on Carving

XPERIENCE is the best teacher a would-be carver can possibly have but a few hints may be given that will be of practical assistance to the amateur called upon to perform before friends, if said amateur can only call the following hints to mind when they are needed: Most carving knives are too large for the ordinary fowl or roast served on the average table, so if you are investing in a carving set do not choose the largest knife thinking it will help you thru a disagreeable duty

A thin, short blade, well pointed, can be handled to much better advan-the fork should be two-pronged, for game and meat, and have a finger guard.

For fish, a special knife and five-pronged fork is made, and there is also a third piece, called a fish-slide, in the set. The fish-slide, fork and knife are all of silver or nickel, as steel is never used about fish. Articles to be carved should be placed upon dishes sufficiently large to admit them being turned about; the joint or whatever should be near





SOAPING THE PITCHER'S BOX



Chief among the deals is the disposal of Joe Tinker, recently deposed as Cincin-Brooklyn for \$25,000. If he agrees to play with the team that purchased him he will receive \$10,000 of the sum, the rest

The other sensational shake-ups in the 1914 personnel of the senior major league are as follows:
Charley Herzog, third baseman, and Roger C. Hartley, catcher, New York, to Cincinnati in exchange for "Bob" Bescher, outfielder.
Edward Konetchy, first baseman; H. H. Mowrey, third baseman, and "Bob" Harmon, pitcher, of St. Louis to Pittsburg in exchange for John Miller, first baseman; J. O. Wilson, outfielder: Arthur Butler, infielder; Albert Dolan, third baseman, and J. H. Robinson, pitcher.
The trades were the outcome of the negotiations carried on by National League Club owners during the league annual meeting, concluded last night. They are of such importance that the magnates' session of 1913, already made memorable by the election of Gov. John K. Tener of Pennsylvania as president, will go down in history as one of the most notable the league has ever held.
The sale of Tinker, whose services have been eagerly sought by at least three major league clubs, disposes of an eleventh-hour rumor that August Herrmann, president of the Cincinnati Club, had changed his mind about letting the famous shortstop go, and had decided to retain him as manager for another year. The acquisition of Herzog, who was a 1912 world series hero, means, in all probability, that the Giants' substitute third-baseman of last season will be selected to manage the Reds next season. This was not announced definitely, but in baseball circles here tonight it was said that there was no doubt about it. Herzog and Herrmann were in frequent conferences during the league meeting, and

Whether Tinker will consent to play in Brooklyn is not known, but President Charles H. Ebbets believes that the \$10,000 consideration offered to the shortstop will alter his announced determination note to play anywhere except in Chicago or Pittsburg. The \$25,000 offer for Tinker, if consummated, will be the largest outright cash amount ever paid for a baseball player. It is also the first recorded instance in which a player has shared so largely in a baseball deal.

The conditional agreement that brings Tinker to Brooklyn was signed by Herrmann and Ebbets and witnessed by Barney Dreyfuss and George Kerr.

#### SEVEN TRADE DISPUTES RECORD FOR NOVEMBER

Number of Working Days Lost, However, Showd an Increase.

OTTAWA, Dec. 12 -- (Can. Press.)-According to a bulletin issued by the department of labor, there were only seven trade disputes in Canada during November, 1913, a favorable showing comparison with October, when there were nine in existence, and also with November, 1912, in which month twenty-five were recorded. There was, however, an increase in the number of working days lost, over the previous month, the figures being 89,-000 for November, 1913, and 70,700 during October.

It is worthy of note that of the 89. 00 working days lost during November, 67,500 were lost as a result of two

disputes in British Columbia, coal miners on Vancouver Island and railroad construction workers on the Pa-cific Great Eastern Railway. Three disputes were definitely settled during November, leaving four in existence at the end of the month as compared with eleven at the end of November, 1912.
