ROME, June 11.—Ever since Italy declared war against Austria, and in a sense war also against ally, Germany, Turkey, the ill-starred partner of the kill-or-conquer policy of Potsdam, has realized the hopelessness of her position, and dismay has seized the governing party of Young Turkey in Constantinople. They feel that the hour of retribution is at hand, and that they will be asked to pay to the Allies the price of their ill-considered intervention on the side of Germany.
From authentic information which comes into my possession today I am able to state that the present government of Turkey has had enough of the German alliance. It is tired of the war and ardently desires peace. It has been driven to entertain the possibility of a separate peace, because

BIG DEFEATS INFLECTED ON GERMANS IN GALICIA
Teuton Advance from West and South Smashed in Succession of Engagements by Brilliant Tactics of Russian General Ivanoff—Austrians Driven Across Dniester.

PETROGRAD, June 11.—Russian infantry with surprising ease has inflicted a succession of great defeats on the Germans in Eastern Galicia. The main attack of the enemy was conducted at Mocoletka with heavy guns on the railway, but it was spent before the Germans reached the barbed wire entanglements in front of the position. They retreated in the utmost disorder leaving thousands of dead.
Simultaneously the Russian army started an enveloping movement against Linsingen's army, which had crossed the Dniester. Russian infantry with magnificent dash attacked the Germans who had a quantity of 3-inch guns and drove them from the woods. They annihilated a division and captured besides 261 officers, 3,300 men, 17 field guns, and 49 machine guns. The fighting lasted two days.
The Germans are now entirely southward of the Dniester. Evidently they intended to develop in enormous force here. They were headed by the Prussian guards and advanced rapidly towards Halicz from where they proposed to conduct the main attack on Lemberg. All their movements, however, were easily frustrated. The Russians are in close contact with the enemy. There are signs that the Germans are developing great activity north of the Pilica River in Poland toward the Niemen with heavy artillery and a chemical laboratory in the hopes of driving the main Russian strength from soft Alpine bases. Success has been achieved solely with the bullet and bayonet. Scarcely a shell has been fired in the last fortnight. This strategy is regarded as a triumphant vindication of General Ivanoff.

ONE MOTORIST KILLED ANOTHER FATALLY HURT
John Steele and Brother, Both of Mount Forest, Were Victims.
LISTOWEL, June 11.—John Steele, manager of the Mount Forest Carriage Co., Mount Forest, was killed and his brother Harry, president of the firm, fatally injured, it is believed, in an automobile accident near here late this afternoon. A block of wood in the road, which was not noticed, threw the car in which the men were riding into the ditch, where the machine turned turtle. John Steele was almost instantly killed and his brother is here with a broken collarbone and severe internal injuries. The men were returning to Mount Forest from London.

MILLIONS OF LETTERS SENT TO PRISONERS
Swiss Postal Service Kept Busy Handling Mail.
BERNE, Switzerland (via Paris), June 11.—In the month of May the Swiss postal service transported 2,048,175 letters and postcards and 255,629 small packages from France to French prisoners of war in Germany. For German prisoners in France, 2,544,715 letters and postcards and 65,255 packages were carried from Germany.

TORONTO WORLD WAR PICTURES TO BE SHOWN AT MASSEY HALL
Operations and Manoeuvres of British, French, Belgian and Italian Troops Will Be Depicted in Vivid Detail.
Arrangements completed yesterday will bring to Massey Hall next week The Toronto World War Pictures for a limited engagement of seven performances. These pictures consist of an entire evening's pictures taken within the actual war zone, as close to the firing line as it has been yet possible for moving picture operators to approach. They depict the operations and manoeuvres of the British, French, Belgian and Italian troops; captured German soldiers in the hands of our men; the bombardment of Antwerp and the British devastation wrought in that city and other places in Belgium by the German gas; the departure for the front of a section of the first contingent from Vancouver, and two complete reels (never before exhibited here) showing the Toronto battalions of the second contingent in the sham fight west of the Humber. All of these pictures are entirely new in Canada, and they convey a never-to-be-forgotten impression of the war as it is.

SEEKS GUARANTEES FOR ENTERING WAR
Premier Gounaris of Greece Willing to Fight if Entente Says Word.
ATHENS, Greece, June 11.—Via London.—Premier Gounaris last night delivered to a large assemblage his first speech since he took office. The premier explained the difference between his policy and that of his predecessor, M. Venizelos. He stated it was his policy to have Greece enter the war without determining the conditions under which she took up arms. His policy, M. Gounaris said, was to determine the conditions which would ensure the integrity of the kingdom and a successful outcome of its participation in the war.
On this account, the premier contended, the government was accused of being under the influence of the German viewpoint. He explained that his purpose was not to expose Greece to the perils of war unless her interests required it and the success of the enterprise, including the retention of any territory acquired and the satisfaction of national rights were assured.

CLEVEREST OF GERMAN SPIES HAS BEEN CAUGHT IN TORONTO AFTER SENDING INFORMATION

Louisa Marksfeldt Admits That She is One of Several Spies Working in Canada and the United States Who Have Watched Every Movement of Canadian Troops.

Nineteen-year-old Louisa Marksfeldt, as she calls herself, who appeared in the women's court yesterday on a vagrancy charge, turns out to be the cleverest of German spies on the continent.

Two months ago the British Government advised the Canadian military authorities that valuable information concerning Canadian troop movements was being sent to the German Government, and requested immediate investigation.

Louisa Marksfeldt is not her right name. When questioned in the detective office two weeks ago she frankly admitted this and smilingly defied them to find out who she really is.

Two years ago she came to the United States and spent a year in touring that country. Her time there was spent exclusively in securing military information, and she claims to have despatched sketches of American naval installations to Germany.

Asked how much German knew of British troop movements she frankly admitted that personally she had been able to despatch information by wireless in two out of every five times a movement of Canadian troops took place.

The local police kept the arrest a secret for a few days to try and get information from her which would incriminate others, but she finally gave up hope of getting the names of any of her confederates.

Knows Technicalities. Off-hand the girl named almost every point in Ontario where shells were being manufactured and displayed amazing technical knowledge regarding war equipment.

Mrs. L. King Stepped Into Excavation and Serious Operation Resulted.

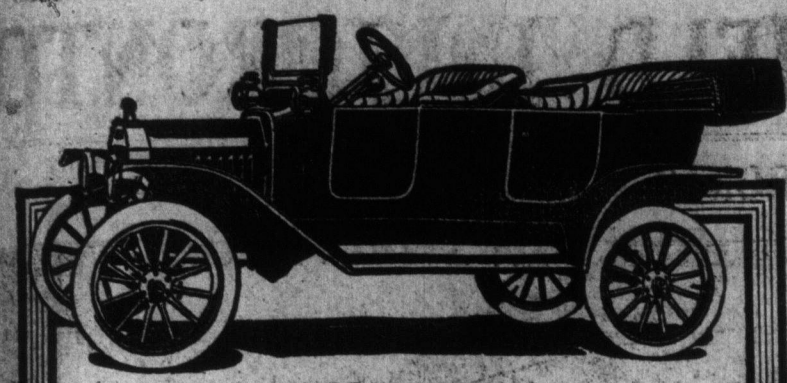

POSTOFFICE HELD UP

PROBE INTO CONTRACTS

WILL OPEN NEXT WEEK

By a Staff Reporter. OTTAWA, Ont., June 11.—The comprehensive inquiry to be conducted by Sir Charles Davidson into the purchase of war supplies will be formally opened next Friday morning. The scope of the commission will then be indicated and an ultimatum given as to the work to be undertaken. The taking of evidence will probably be begun the following week. 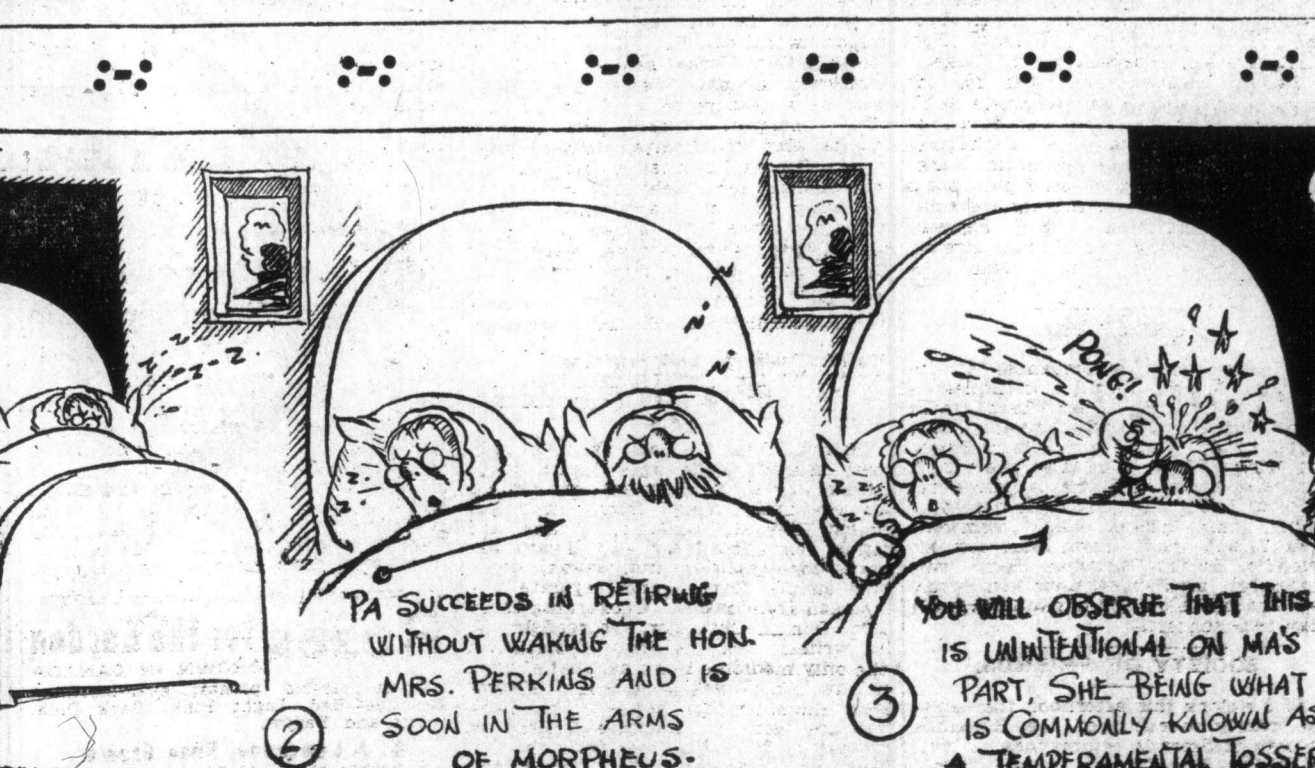
