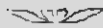

Joyful to hear.

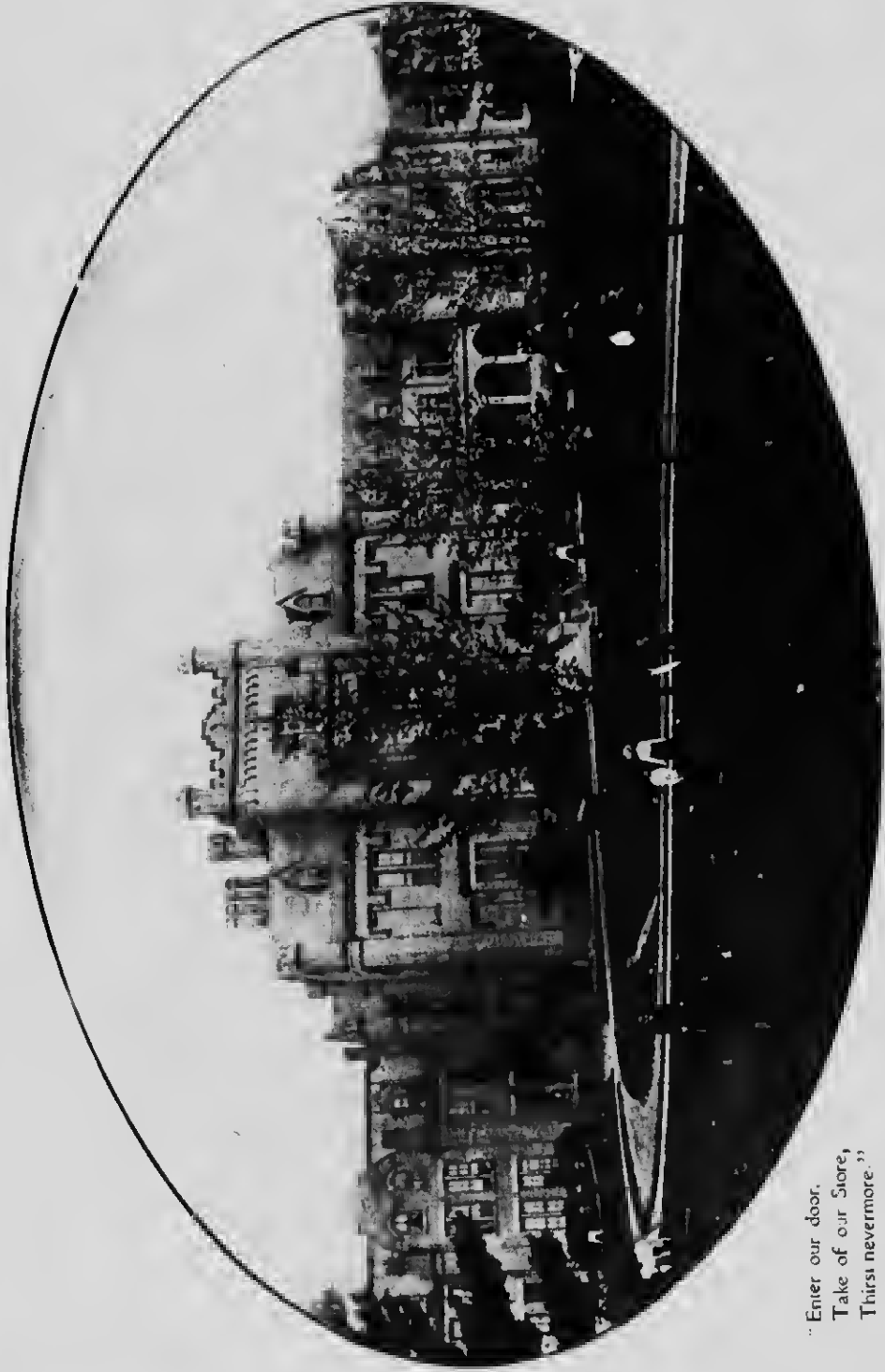
Screened by the chestnuts, a cottage appears:
