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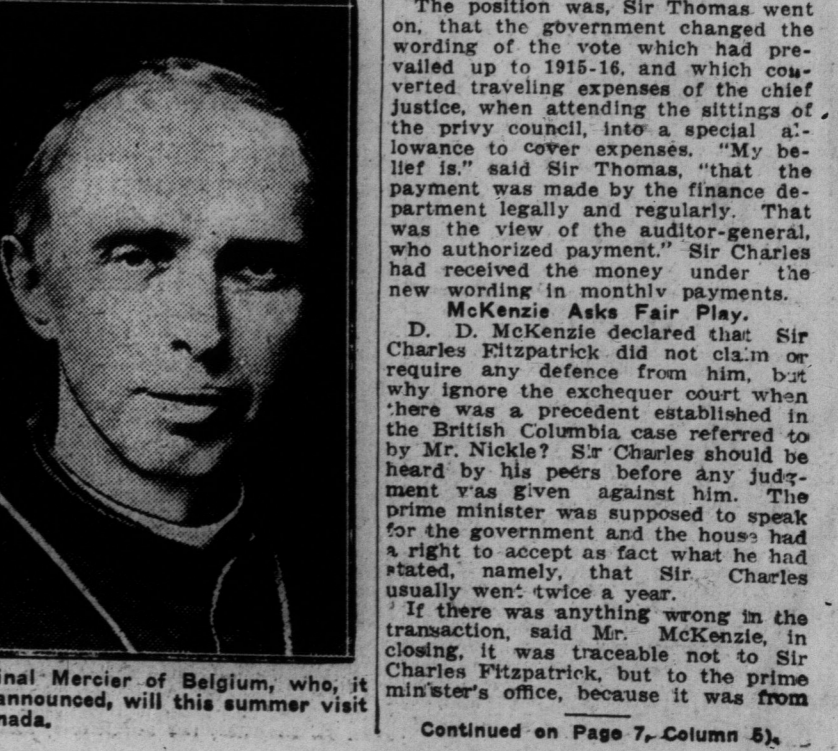

EAST TORONTO POULTRY ASSOC. HOLD ANNUAL GATHERING

Under the auspices of the East York Poultry Association, the annual concert and social gathering was held in Snell's Hall, Main street, last night. Aid. F. M. Johnston occupied the chair. The following artists participated in an excellent program: Mrs. W. Rogers, Pte. J. Clonnes, Geo. Miller, J. McKilloch, J. Fellows. W. Geo. Patton, president, in a short address, outlined the progress made during the past year, and stated it is the intention to present the returned veterans with a free setting of fertile eggs for hatching. He pointed out that there are now over 200 members on the rolls, and many new applications for membership. Aid. Johnston stated that, thru the efforts of Jos. Russell, M.L.A., director of the Canadian National Exhibition Poultry Association, new and up-to-date coops will be installed in the poultry department, and the best government inspectors available appointed. The speaker did not recommend an amalgamated show, but for each association to still hold their own local shows. W. Howard, J. North, W. Hodge, J. Pickering, Albin Small and others also spoke. Refreshments were served and an enjoyable time was spent.

RAILWAYMEN ENJOY REOPENED Y. M. C. A.

Previously Had Nothing to Sleep in But Empty Cosh on Siding—Are Now Comfortable.
Since the reopening of the East End Y. M. C. A., Main and Gerrard streets, on Feb. 15, many railwaymen have been greatly benefited. According to the statement of the superintendent, the building is open day and night, and on an average between fifteen and twenty train crews working between Belleville and East Toronto are accommodated daily. For each train of 25 cents a day for members, or 35 cents for non-members, first-class sleeping quarters, with hot, cold water, private baths, cooking ranges, reading, writing and smoking rooms, are provided. Previous to the opening of the building, which had been closed for the past two years, the railwaymen had no other sleeping quarters than an old railway coach on the East Toronto railroad siding. At a recent meeting of the east end business men, held at the Y. M. C. A. building, John Brandon, chairman, pointed out the success attending the opening of the building, and said it would be necessary to enlarge the structure at an early date owing to the big demand for accommodation by railway employees. "The institution is supplying a long-felt want in the east end," said Mr. Brandon, who added that a bowling green would be opened shortly in connection with the institution. The building is being used at present solely by the railwaymen.

Hamilton, March 26.—Hamilton's \$400,000 memorial school on Ottawa street will be completed about the end of May. The World was informed tonight. MEN FROM CRETIC ARRIVE AT CAMP

Over Four Hundred Quickly Discharged at Exhibition Yesterday.

Soldiers to the number of 468 from the S.S. Cretic arrived in Toronto yesterday afternoon at 4 o'clock, and were discharged at the Exhibition Camp. The arrangements for their reception were fully worked out prior to their arrival, and everything passed off smoothly. Five minutes after the train drew in the first man was up, and headed by the C. O. H. band, the entire body marched down to the transportation building, crowds of citizens who lined the route of march cheering them meanwhile. It was not very hard for relatives of the men to break thru the cord of police, and many wives and mothers marched with the soldiers. The huge transportation building was enough to accommodate them all. Here the Y. M. C. A., with about forty workers under the direction of Mrs. T. A. Brown, served coffee and light refreshments to the weary men and their women folk. After a lapse of thirty minutes, the work of discharging began. Each man went to a position alphabetically marked, and was relieved of his kit. He then went thru the various other formalities and came out a civilian. A large number of motor cars, under the direction of Ald. F. M. Johnston and F. Goforth, carried the Toronto men and their families home.

PLEADED THE CAUSE OF WIDOWS AND ORPHANS

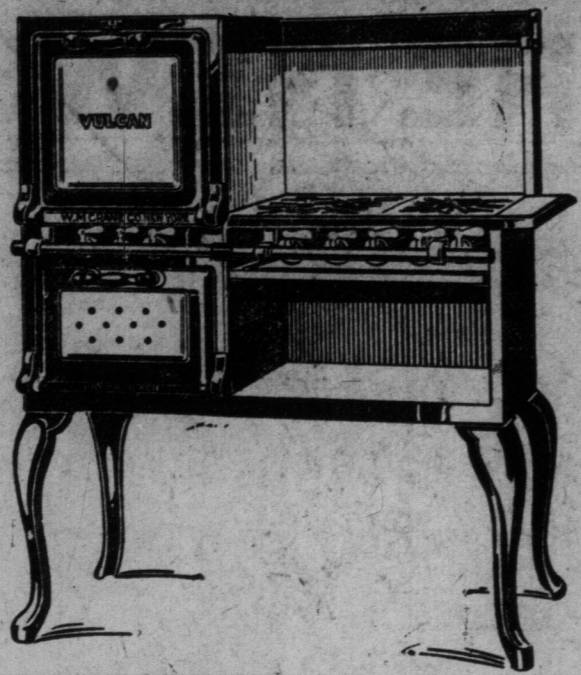
Rev. Peter Bryce Deplores Small Pensions as Being Insufficient.

Rev. Peter Bryce in an address yesterday, before the Kiwanis club at the King Edward hotel, pleaded the cause of the widows and the fatherless. He evidenced the case of the widow of the Canadian soldier, who, if she had three children, drew a government allowance of \$70 per month, to which \$8 was added for every additional child. The speaker was thankful to say he could add that if the widow lived in Toronto she had an additional grant of \$30 per month until \$1,000 had been paid.

He had determined to compare these conditions with those in the U. S. There he found that the widow of an American soldier drew only \$47.50. Upon further investigation he discovered that the U. S. government had provided an insurance system by which the American soldier could, by the payment of about \$6 per month, insure himself for \$10,000. As practically every soldier had availed himself of this, the widows received an additional \$75.50 a month, placing their total at \$105.

British Pensions. The case of the widow of the British reservist was exceptionally sad. She had but \$26 a month. In Australia it had been decided to make these widows a grant which would place them on a footing with the widows of Australian soldiers. "I think, gentlemen, the government here should do the same," he said. "We owe more than we will ever know to the men of the contemptible little army. We have their widows and children with us. They are not many, and it would not cost us very much, so surely we ought to see that they have enough to live on."

Measures ought to be also taken whereby the widow of a member of the R.A.F. should receive a Canadian pension instead of an Imperial one. The widows, under the Workmen's Compensation Board, no matter how many children they had, could not draw more than the maximum pension of \$40 per month. The worst case was the widow who was absolutely without any source of income. In his district, chiefly as a result of the "flu," there were 25 such homes, which he was trying to keep intact, in the hope that the government would pass a mother's allowance act.

VETERANS

Items of Interest to Returned Soldiers Will Be Printed in This Column if Phoned or Sent In.

NO GRATUITY FOR STRETCHER BEARER

Men Who Did Brave Work Beyond Should Receive Acknowledgment.

Comrade Walter Willcocks, of 652 Ashdale avenue, a man of over 40, who saw considerable service in both the fire trenches and in no man's land as a stretcher-bearer, yesterday brought up another problem affecting returned soldiers vitally. He stated that he had been classed as a non-combatant because of the fact that his work had been with the Canadian Field Ambulance, and that for this reason he had been given to understand he was not eligible for the war gratuity given to those on active service on any war front. Interviews with returned soldiers generally showed that opinion was unanimous that stretcher-bearers had done work on the front line, which in many cases was beyond expression by pen or lip, and that few men were more entitled to the war gratuity than the men who had carried their comrades thru hell and brimstone to the comparative safety of the field dressing stations.

Without Dissent.

Not a dissentient note was found among the score of interviews obtained with representative returned men. The gist of the sentiment expressed was that the stretcher-bearer, no matter how classed, had invariably done his bit in the very heat of forays, as well as during the ordinary routine of trench warfare, when shells and trench mortars and explosive bullets killed and maimed large numbers of men. The opinion was generally expressed that those comrades who had been stretcher-bearers were mistaken in their belief that no gratuity was coming to them.

CAME OUT ALIVE.

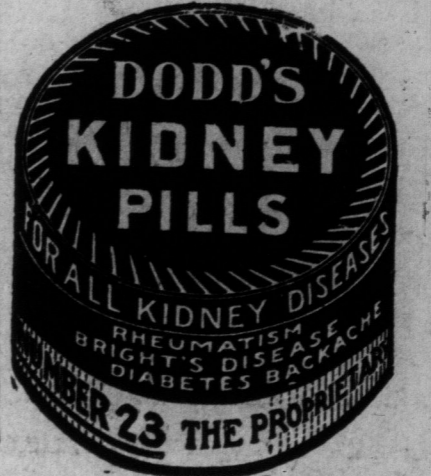
Alfie Jones of Broadway avenue,

Finally, believing Jones to be dead, they left in disgust. Later on some friendlies came upon the scene, and he was rescued from his rather perilous position.

Permission to hold the train at Oshawa for two hours, while a parade was held, has been negatively by the Canadian Railway Board, the reason being that all rolling stock must be returned to Halifax as soon as possible to take care of the soldiers who are arriving daily. Upon the request of the citizens of Oshawa, Col. Gibson, the officer in charge of demobilization, had granted permission to do so. The train will be brought direct to the Exhibition camp and the men will be demobilized immediately, being provided with transportation on the regular trains to their homes.

CHILDREN'S AID SOCIETY WISH TO CLOSE SHELTER

A deputation from the Children's Aid Society, headed by J. K. Macdonald, waited on the board of control yesterday asking that they be relieved of the responsibility of keeping up the children's shelter. Mr. Macdonald said that the shelter had been maintained by the society for some years and that now the liability was \$8,000. The deputation will meet later with the social service commission and the board of control. For the month of April the shelter will be maintained with the financial assistance of the city.

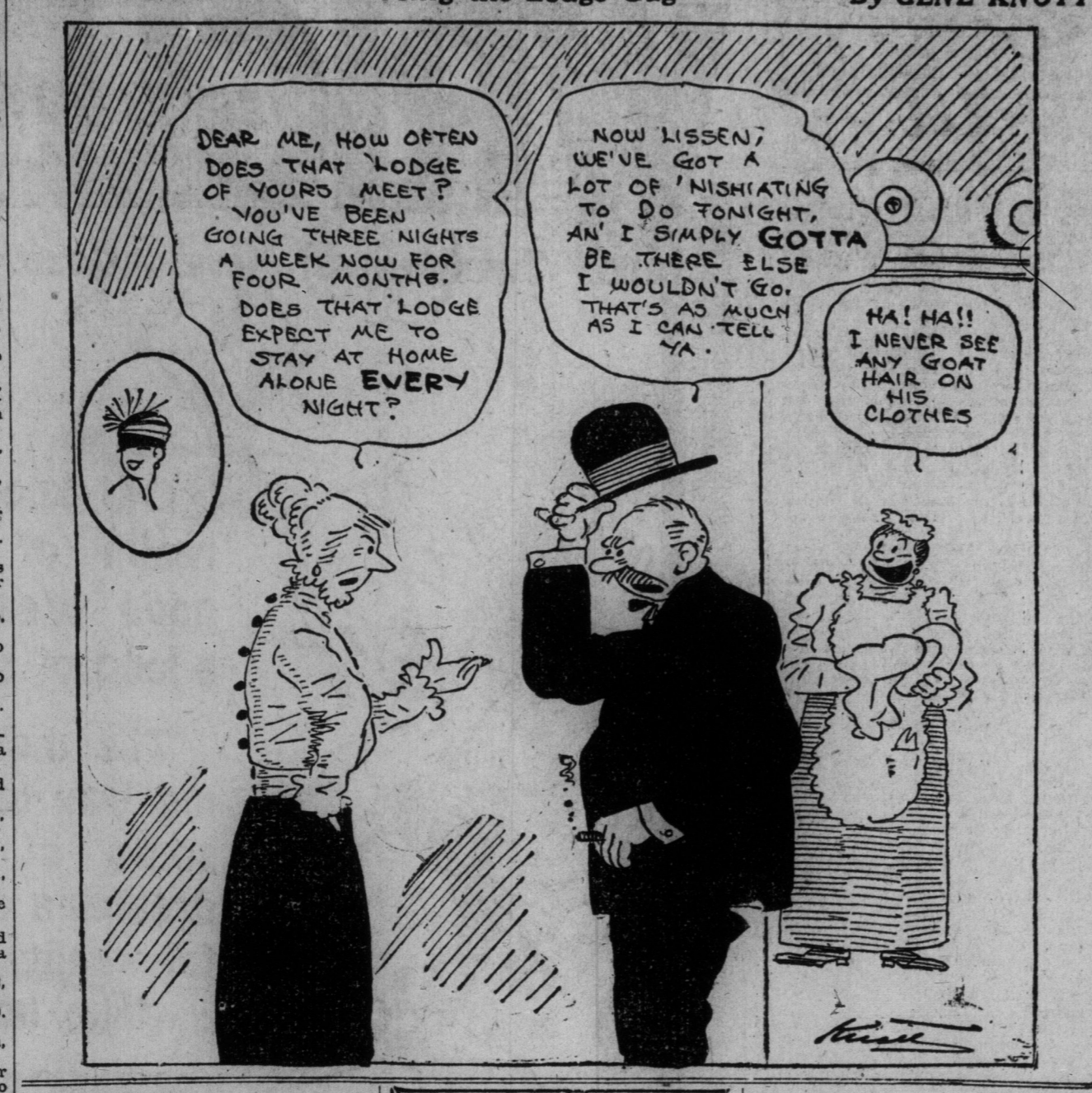
