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



By virtue of authority vested in me by orderin-council 3004, passed at Ottawa Thursday; 5th day of December, 1918, all railways, transportation and shipping companies are hereby prohibited from accepting at any point on their lines within the Province of Ontario any bituminous coal for delivery to any point on their lines or to connecting lines within or without the Province of Ontario unless the shipper of the coal presents to the duly authorized agent of such railway, transportation or shipping company within whose jurisdiction such point may be, a permit in writing or in the form of a telegram signed by the Fuel Administrator for the Province of Ontario, permitting the shipper to make such shipment.

This prohibition shall not apply to bituminous coal tendered for shipment to points in the Province of Manitoba and beyond or to bituminous coal tendered without the Province of Ontario for shipment to points within the Province of Ontario.


