U.S. SENATE KILLS WILSON'S PEACE RATIFICATION BILL

URGENT IMMEDIATE ACTION BY STATES AND CANADA TO DEEPEN WATERWAYS

Sir Adam Beck Goes to Washington Tomorrow in Connection With Power Development on the St. Lawrence Waterways Association Appoint Officers

Special to The Toronto World, Windsor, Nov. 19.—Addresses by Sir Adam Beck, Hon. Sidney Storey, board of commerce, and George E. Hooker, of the United States, addressed commission members at the second day's program of the Canadian Deep Waterways and Power Association in inauguration convention in Windsor.

According to the constitution adopted: "One of the objects of this association shall be to act in conjunction with and co-operate with the Great Lakes, St. Lawrence Tide Water Association and any other like organization having similar objects in carrying on the work that is most urgent and most essential to this part of the country; the opening up of the natural waterways from their head to the tide waters on the St. Lawrence river and to facilitate and cheapen transportation and power development."

The resolution calling for the joint undertaking of the deepening of the Great Lakes waterways for ocean-going shipping, by the governments of the United States and Canada, was moved by O. E. Fleming, K.C., of Windsor, and seconded by Clarence E. H. Jones, of London. A resolution moved by E. L. Cousins of Toronto, on methods of financing the association, and the constitution are bylaws to govern it was referred to the executive for consideration.

### CRERAR ADVOCATES DIRECT TAXATION

#### Also Says Policy of Protection is Canada's Greatest Curse.

Canadian Press Despatch.

Brandon, Man., Nov. 19.—Advocacy of direct taxation to make up any losses in revenue occasioned by removing the customs tariff from the necessities of life, an increase of the income tax and federal adoption of the inheritance tax were advocated last night by Hon. T. A. Crerar at a meeting called by the grain growers for the purpose of educating Brandon people to the political platform of the Canadian Council of Agriculture.

"The Canada Council of Agriculture has formulated a platform which contains the best set of political principles before the Canadian people today," said Mr. Crerar, after explaining that the farmers, having the leisure, pondered matters and are making a valuable contribution to the public life, and that the responsibility of government in the past is directly due to the lack of interest taken in public affairs by the electorate. Again and again the ex-minister stated that the platform is not a class platform or class movement but a national platform, a new national policy for the whole Canadian people.

### UNBRIDLED SPECULATION

Washington, Nov. 19.—The recent break in the New York stock market was due to "unbridled speculation," Governor Harding of the Federal Reserve Board, said in a letter tonight to Senator Owen of Oklahoma, who had asked for a direct explanation of the price crash. Speculators took heed of warnings issued by the board and by the Federal Reserve Bank at New York that reserves were declining and that a halt must be called. Mr. Harding said, and the speculative movement continued. These circumstances, he added, then forced the New York Bank to call the attention of discounting banks to the situation. VIOLENT BREAK IN FOREIGN EXCHANGE

Pound Sterling Nears Four Dollar Mark, and Demoralization Prevails.

New York, Nov. 19.—Complete demoralization overtook the foreign exchange market today, when new low rates were quoted against England, France and the former central European empire.

Commercial and banking bills on London fell to 4.02 1/2 to the pound. Francs declined 9/4 to the American dollar, and the normal rate having been 6.18 1/2, and marks and kronen were more than 90 per cent. under parity.

Dealers in exchange again ascribed much of the latest unsettlement to the course of the peace treaty negotiations in the United States senate, and the extremely unfavorable trade balances, which favor this country to an overwhelming degree.

NEW YORK CURB

New York, Nov. 19.—The curb market closed fairly firm with considerable buying and short covering evident in the last hour. Stock exchange interests were reported as being purchasers of huge blocks of stocks at the low levels which prevail.
