





Their Three Weeks' Strike Was a Failure -A Two Years' Agreement Yesterday the striging builders' la

Testerday the striging builders' laborers' threw up the sponge and the strike, which has interfered more or less with building operations for three weeks, came to an end. A committee of the Laborers' Union waited on the Builders' Exchange at 11 a.m. and expressed their willingness to go back to work at the old rate of wages, 18 cents an hour. An arrangement was drawn up and signed by both parties. It will have effect until May 1, 1898, and provides for an eight-hour day and 18 cents an hour.

There are no more than the ordinary number of buildings in course of erection, and the strike has not seriously interfered with business, the employers say. Although a number of the men have left Toronto, it is doubtful if all the strikers still in the city will find work.

Judge Morgan has reserved judgment in the case of Graham v. McIlroy, on an alleged breach of contract, with reference to the transfer of an hotel and its license, at Flinton village.

Heintzman & Co. were given judgment for breach of contract. The case was decided before, when \$30 costs were attached. The matter then came to the County Court for the assessment of damages.
