## THE R.C.Y.C. DEFENDER.

DESCRIPTION OF THE YACHT THAT WILL MEET VINCEDOR.

This is now being put together at Oakville under the supervision of Mr. James Unkown, but the people of Oakville, where the latter is being built, take the interest in the matter. A stranger might spend a week in the town without having the fact forced on his notice that the yacht which will before many weeks are over be discussed and commented on by every Corinthian sailor from Oswego to Duluth is now under construction by the side of Oakville creek.

The frames arrived from Scotland on Monday and no time was lost in setting them up. Mr. Andrews, the Oakville boat builder, has charge of the work and, probably under instructions, he does not encourage curiosity. "No admittance" is the sign over the doorway of the shed, and when the inside is gained, the further notice. "Ask no questions" greets the over-inquisitive stranger. These signs are, of course, necessary, but at first an outsider is apt to wonder whether secrecy cannot be avoided.

When the shed is entered and the frames of the new boat exposed to view, the first impression is rather one of disappointment. It is far too early as yet to form an opinion, but so far as one can judge at present the hull of the new yacht will not be pretty; it will be, unless one can see beauty in a typical fin level. On Lake Ontario, so far, there have been no large fin boats, none in fact larger than the 20-foot class, and with them the fin is merely a steel plate with a "chase" of lead bolted on. In the new boat the steel plate is dispensed with, and the construction of the hull is similar to that of Defender and Valkyrie. The lead is cast in a solid mass and bolted through the keel, becoming narrow above the lead, and then widens as it joins the hull proper. Looking up at the work from the bow one gets the impression of the fitness and apparent lack of strain of the new boat. The through bolting will, however, be sufficient to stand the strain.

Another feature of the yacht which is very noticeable to an accustomed eye is the manner in which the tremendous overhang both fore and aft. The overhang is not merely a decorative feature, but it is a practical one. It is a steel plate with a "chase" of lead bolted on. In the new boat the steel plate is dispensed with, and the construction of the hull is similar to that of Defender and Valkyrie.

It seems somewhat early for criticism, but what applies to all boats of her class will apply to the new one. She appears to be very much of a racing machine, and for a boat of her dimensions she is very small. There will be no head room to speak of in any part of her cabin, while the idea of a galley forward of the mast seems ridiculous. It is said that the yacht will not be fitted with bunks and that the crew will use hammocks in order to have no useless truck in the boat. It may be too soon to judge, but from the present appearance the boat seems to be a racing machine, and for a boat of her dimensions she is very small.

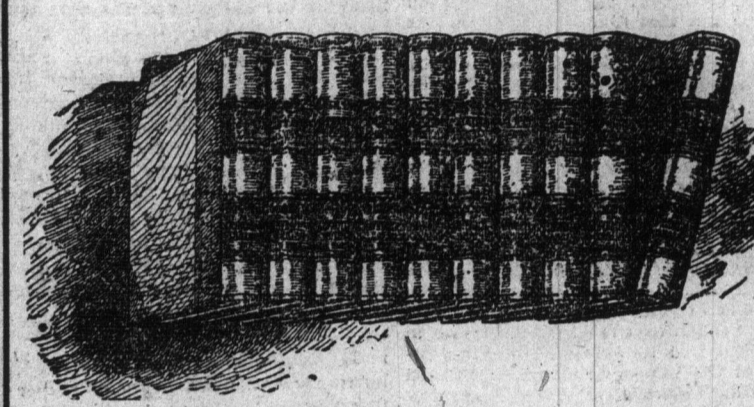
