And Now the Stars and Stripes Flout Over the Whole
of Eastern Cuba.

SPANISH TROOPS WILL RETURN TO SPAIN

It Was a Conditional Capitulation at Uncle Sam's Own Terms—
A Commission Will be Appointed to Arrange For Carrying
Out the Terms of Surrender—Major-General Miles Gives
Credit to General Shafter, the Officers and Men—Yellow
Fever Patients to be Specially Cared For.

Washington, July 14.—The War Department has received the following despatch
from General Miles, written apparently before the final surrender of Santiago at 3
o'clock.

Playa del Este, July 14.—Secretary of War, Washington: Before Santiago, July
14.—General Toral formally surrendered the troops of his army—troops and division
of Santiago—on the terms of the unconditional surrender of the island of Santiago to
Spain. General Shafter will appoint commissioners to draw up the conditions of ar-
rangements for carrying out the terms of surrender.

This is highly gratifying, and General Shafter and the officers and men of his
command are entitled to great credit for their bravery and fortitude in overcoming
the almost insuperable obstacles which they encountered.

A portion of the army has been infected with yellow fever, and efforts will be
made to separate those who are infected and those free from it, and to keep those
who are still on board ship separated from those on shore. Arrangements will be im-
mediately made for carrying out further instructions of the President and yourself.

EATING SHARKS IN HAVANA.
Catch Them in the Harbor and They
Are Worth \$13.50 Each.

Liquor Alone Is a Cheap Commodity
and Cubans Are Dropping
Dead in the Streets From Starv-

Key West, July 14.—A Cuban by the
name of Blanco, who has just arrived here
from Havana, reports that the conditions
in that place are constantly growing worse,
the greatest distress necessarily falling on
the Cubans, because nearly all the food is
seized for the troops.

Here they were met by an accurate vol-
unteer from the men of the Sixteenth In-
fantry, who had a perfect range on the
end of the trench. The first volley killed
and wounded many and drove the others
back again into the trench in great dis-
order.

The field mortars are being tried, but
the results are not yet entirely satisfactory,
owing to the difficulty of getting a perfect
range.

On the whole, the offensive operations
were weak, so far as giving a basis for a
new proposition to surrender.

Siboney and Altamira are being burned,
and this improves the sanitary outlook
somewhat. Had this been done at first
conditions would now be better.

The burning of the two villages is en-
dorsed by the general, and the fact that
lives were spared by the explosion, caused
by forgotten ammunition for Mauser rifles left
in the houses.

Under Spreading Mango Tree.
The Americans were met by General
Torol and his chief of staff under a spreading
mango tree, at the bottom of the valley,
about half way between the lines. The
interview that followed lasted almost an
hour. The situation was placed frankly be-
fore General Torol, and he was offered the
alternative of being sent home with his
garison, or leaving Santiago Province, the
only condition imposed being that he should
not destroy the existing fortifications, and
not leave his arms behind. This latter
condition the Spanish General, who does
not speak English, explained through his
interpreter was impossible. He said the
laws of Spain gave a general no discre-
tion. He might abandon a place when he
found it untenable, but he could not leave
his arms behind without incurring the
penalty of being court-martialed and shot.

His Government, he said, had granted
him permission to evacuate Santiago. That
was all. Further than that he was power-
less to go.

Toral Saw It Was Hopeless.
Without saying a word General Miles
said the tenor of General Torol's remarks
all betrayed his realization that he could
not hold out long. When General Shafter
explained that his reinforcements were com-
ing up, and that he was completely sur-
rounded, and that his batteries were being
posted, General Torol simply shrugged his
shoulders.

"I am but a subordinate," said he, "and
I obey my Government. If it is necessary
we can die at our posts."

During the course of an interview, Gen-
eral Torol said the bombardment of Sun-
day and Monday had done him the damage.
He admitted the shots from the guns of
the fleet had destroyed four houses, but
he asserted that only half a dozen soldiers
of the garison had been injured. He also
volunteered the information, when Gen.
Miles gallantly inquired after General
Linares' condition, that the latter would
probably be compelled to suffer the ampu-
tation of his left arm at the shoulder.

Camara Sailing Towards Watson.
New York, July 14.—A despatch to The
World from Gibraltar, Spain, says: A
steamer just arrived from the Mediter-
ranean reports having sighted Admiral Ca-
marra's squadron steering in the direction
of Cartagena.

Gun practice was constantly carried on
aboard the warships as long as they were
in sight. The report that Commodore Wat-
son's fleet had been sighted from the Mediter-
ranean is coming to Spain has caused
great excitement and profound anxiety.

The inhabitants of Ceuta and Algebras
are leaving for inland towns.

German Government Out of It.
Berlin, July 14.—In response to an en-
quiry on the subject, the correspondence
of the Associated Press was officially in-
formed today that nothing, either official-
ly or unofficially, is known by the German
Government of the cruiser Irene's inter-
ference with the insurgents at Subic Bay.

Ten Thousand in Annual Convention—Anglo-American Amity—Drafting Report.

Buffalo, July 14.—Ampleminded indeed was the opening of the eighth international convention of the Baptist Young People's Union in this city this morning.

Thousands of delegates arrived yesterday and last night in anticipation of this the greatest meeting of the union, and it was estimated at registration headquarters at 10 o'clock this morning that between 9000 and 10,000 delegates and visitors had given their names and received badges.

Each regular train arriving during the past 18 hours has had from two to six special extra cars attached, all being loaded to the full capacity with delegations from almost every portion of the United States and Canada.

This morning the interior of the old 74th Regiment Armory presented a brilliant and beautiful appearance. The great auditorium had been decorated from the peak of the roof to the floors with the flags of all nations and colored bunting.

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STRIKE AT WALKERVILLE.

Malleable Iron Moulders Want Higher Wages—Large Toronto Contracts to be Carried Out.

Walkerville, July 14.—The employees of the Malleable Iron Company and the Kerr Engine Company, Walkerville, are out on strike. The trouble started with the moulders in the malleable iron works, who demanded a raise of 20 per cent. in the price of their work.

They sent a deputation to the Malleable Iron Company, but he told them that such an increase was altogether out of the question. He promised, however, to do something for them later on.

The men were not satisfied with this and went out, talking with them the cookmaker, laborers and others. The company expected the men back in a day or two and made no attempt to fill their places, although they had some large Toronto contracts on hand.

This morning it was found necessary to transfer some of the work over to the engine works. As soon as this was done the men in the latter place struck work also. There are over 100 of the engine company's men out and 300 of the iron company's men.

Mr. Keating Done Out of \$150. Some days ago Manager E. H. Keating of the Great Western Railway was done out of \$150 by a man who asked him to sign a recommendation. He did as the caller requested, but the man next morning left his account was short the above amount.

Yesterday John F. Keating, a Toronto man, was charged with obtaining the money by fraud. Detective Black will leave this morning to bring him back.

Taken Back to Hamilton. Louis Shoemaker was arrested yesterday by Detective Davis on the strength of a telegram from Hamilton, charging him with theft. An offer of bail was refused and he was taken back to Hamilton on the 11 o'clock train.

GOVERNMENT'S FATAL MOVE

Condemned on Every Hand the More it is Studied.

Officials at the Parliament Buildings are Disgusted, No Precedent or Reason, Other Than Self-Preservation, for a Midsommer Session—The Handwriting on the Wall.

The inmates of the Parliament Buildings were an air of suppressed—very much suppressed—indignation yesterday. Plans for the summer have been knocked on the head and all on account of the strange order for the Legislature to meet on Aug. 3. This feeling is not confined to the city, for those who have got away will have to all rally round the standard, probably more for the sake of the rally than any work they will do. These civil servants were not nearly as civil as usual.

Outside of two or three officials, to judge by what is said of the move, it came as a thunderbolt to the different departments. The Ministers were all on hand yesterday and had a conclusive, and everyone around the building were in a stir as if something had happened, or was going to happen—certainly there is not much sympathy with the movement amongst the minor officials.

The extra session, or rather to be entirely correct, the initiatory phase of the regular session, will cost the province about \$15,000. Preparations will not be on as large a scale as for a regular session. There will be no extra clerks engaged, and only a small number of extra seasonal writers and no budget speech.

Thinks it a Necessary Step. Probably the game warden's department will feel the effect of the proclamation more than any other, yet Chief Game Warden Threlkoff does not seem a bothered expression, and moreover, he is declining any personal action in calling the House together, he does not seem to care a great deal.

He greeted the World with the same formula as usual. "What do you think of the action of calling the House together?" asked The World. "Well, I think it is a very necessary step. It would have to be to get the fishery question settled and apply the provisions of the statute."

"Was it for that reason the step was taken?" "Well, no; there is also the question of the right of constables to vote that will be determined, and it is a very important subject."

"Which is the most important?" was a query by which the chief game warden replied that both were equally important, and that the latter question would have to be settled before the election trials came on.

"However, I myself am in the position of the crown at the circus, who stood aside and told the spectators to 'let the animals fight.'"

The Minister of Agriculture. Hon. John Dryden agreed that it was a nice day, and left the office hurriedly for his inner room.

"There is no news and I have nothing to say," he said. "But people are saying things of you." "Yes, I know. They want me to get out. Well, I am quite ready to get out at any time."

Asked his opinion as to the cause of the untimely calling of the Legislature on Aug. 3, Mr. Dryden replied that he saw nothing unusual in it. He quoted the precedent of the late Premier in answer to the question, considered it constituted a precedent.

"Which is the most important question to be settled, the constables or the adjustment of the fishery question?" was asked. "I think if you consider the Premier's statement, you may arrive at the requisite information yourself," said the Minister.

"But to your own mind, which do you think is such?" "I don't know. I have nothing to say on the subject, and I am afraid to talk in the presence of a World reporter," was the final reply, and the Minister of Agriculture smilingly disappeared. He left town last night.

Hon. J. M. Gibson preferred to talk of jobs, and instead of giving much valuable information, filled up the time signing cheques.

A Long, Hot Time. Another accessible gentleman was Capt. Hobbs, Deputy Provincial Registrar, who said the announcement came as a total surprise to him.

"In my opinion there is a hot time and the session will last much longer than is expected—a couple of months at least. Hon. Gibson and Dryden will get their seats."

Another Liberal official expressed the opinion that these gentlemen would get seats, "but not by direct legislation."

Difference Between the Two Acts. Nicholas Murphy, C.C., speaking in reference to Premier Hardy's action in calling the House together in holiday time, said: "I have right along opposed the opinion that constables have no right to vote, a fact which I believe the Government has recognized. They have taken this step in Toronto to the vote legal, which is highly necessary to the courts begin to be held, and that they have used as a precedent the declaratory act of Sir John A. Macdonald, but there is a great difference between them. The Ottawa Government were not holding on to power just by the passive action of the election court. Before leaving the reporter, Mr. Murphy stated that he had not yet carefully read the Premier's memorandum to the Lieutenant-Governor and could not, under the circumstances, speak at further length on the subject."

Strong Condemnation. Dr. R. A. Fyne, M. L. A., has set the East End of the city by the ears over the August session of the House.

"I regard Premier Hardy's move in taking away a matter already submitted to the courts as a serious straining of constitutional powers," exclaimed Dr. Fyne to a World reporter last evening. "It is a very gross, and dangerous as the 'Terrible Turk.'"

"The Liberals say that it means the saving of considerable expense to the province," exclaimed The World.

"That's all humbug," it was right for two months over the question of giving constables the vote, we shall be entitled to our money, and if anyone thinks the Conservatives will let a matter go through in that time?"

"Then you look for extended session?" "I assuredly do," replied the Doctor, slapping one of his big thighs with the self-same satisfaction that was a Roman gladiator regarded his well-trained limbs in the arena, "and we Conservatives will give a good account of ourselves in the fray."

"What do you say about the precedent of 1887, which the Liberals quote to defend their course?" asked The World.

They prate about the principle," exclaimed the Doctor derisively. "But they have no principle at all. Dr. Fyne looked as if he were about to take the whole lot party with his knives, and, hoping that no Liberal would be fortunate enough to fall into his hands while in this humor, the reporter took his leave."

Hardy's Downfall Sure. The World representative called on Dr. Ryerson last evening, when the ex-member for East Toronto was found busy engaged in his surgery. When asked his opinion on the sudden summoning of the Local House, he said: "It is only an attempt to evade the law, override the courts and escape the condemnation of the people. It will be an impossibility for Hardy to carry out the Government's policy in this ruin in sight. It is a very untimely season for the House to be called together. Mr. Hardy's downfall is sure."
