GLOOMY REPORTS FROM CONGO COUNTRY CONFIRMED.

THE KNAVERY OF BELGIANS

LONDON, Feb. 5.—Private advices from the Congo confirm the gloomy reports that found their way into print, and even more.

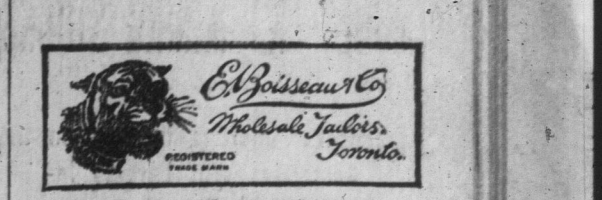

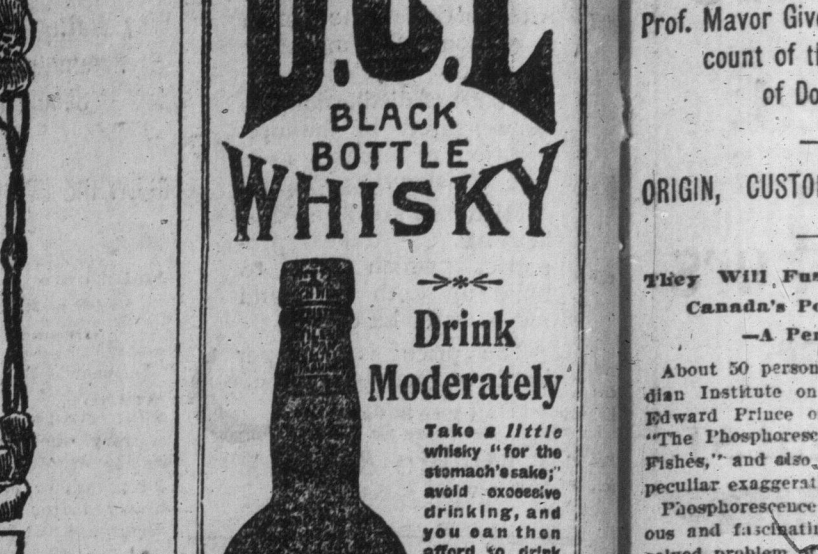

Argentine's Crop.

In view of the opening of new markets for Siberian wheat in Sweden, Norway and the Great Britain, the Russian section of the Imperial Agricultural Society of Moscow is petitioning the Government to establish a service of steamers on the River Obi and the Kara Sea, and to construct a harbor and warehouses in Nakhod Bay - Brest.

Wheat in Farmers' Hands Jan. 1.

On an estimate that there are 16,000,000 bushels of wheat in farmers' hands on July 1, and accepting the late estimate of the Washington Bureau for crop of 1898, 170,000,000 bushels, The Chicago Daily Bulletin calculates that there remained in farmers' hands on Jan. 1, 2,000,000 bushels of wheat for seed and food requirements up to July 1, it reckons that the United States will be able to provide for a total food movement, leave 50,000,000 bushels in farmers' hands at next harvest more than at last harvest, and with a considerable increase over last year in the visible supply on July 1.
