

**JAP RESERVES IN REVOLT NOT ALLOWED TO GO HOME**  
Report is From Chinese Sources—Oyama's Tactics Puzzle and This is One Explanation.

Qumshu Pass, Manchuria, May 26.—The Japanese tactics are puzzling. They give way at the slightest pressure against their centre on both the rail-road and the Mandarin road. The Chinese ascribe the retirement to trouble among the reserves some of whom they say are almost in a state of revolt because the government has not kept its promise to return them to Japan. The retirement of the Japanese centre is interpreted by some of the Russian officers as a postponement of Field Marshal Oyama's offensive because of the bad state of the roads, but this view is not shared by all the officers.

**Fleet May Be Divided.**  
Shanghai, May 26.—There are indications that Rear Admiral Rodzestvensky has divided his fleet. Seventeen vessels of the Baltic fleet anchored at Suidie Island last night. It is believed that they could there, and thence from that point they will proceed north.

**Call It a Diversion.**  
Tokyo, May 26.—It is believed here that the action of the Russians in sending some vessels to Shanghai is part

of a diversion plan to draw off a portion of the Japanese fleet. It is thought that possibly the Russians intend to return the slower craft, but the visit and withdrawal of the faster vessels is regarded to be without purpose unless as a diversion.

**British Consuls Held.**  
Nagasaki, May 26.—Three British consuls, who were loaded with coal at Moji (terminus of the Kishu Railway, Japanese) for Hongkong, have been detained under orders from the government.

**Chief, May 26.**—All Japanese steamers arriving at this port to-day have been ordered held here pending further instructions.

**Japanese Finances.**  
Tokyo, May 26.—Baron Kemura, minister of finance, and Baron Shibusawa, addressed the clearinghouse association today. Baron Kemura said that the financial capability of Japan had completely surprised the world. He was glad that Japan was showing a financial and productive ability as well as strength on the battle field.

**CONDUCTOR MAY DIE.**  
Brantford, May 26.—(Special.)—Conductor F. Henry of the G.T.R. construction crew, while trying to board his train near the Governor's road subway in the outskirts of the city, slipped and fell thru the subway to the ground, 25 feet. He sustained a serious fracture of his skull.

**Smallpox Cases.**  
Several cases of smallpox have broken out in Jerseyville, near here. The families afflicted have been quarantined and all precautions have been taken to stay the spreading of the malady.

**BALFOUR WON'T BE BOUND.**  
(Canadian Associated Press Cable.)  
London, May 26.—Premier Balfour, replying to a question by the matter to be discussed at the colonial conference, said he had no control over the colonial governments, and nothing done by the conference can be binding on his majesty's government.

**Liberal Convention on Tuesday.**  
Woodstock, May 26.—The Liberal convention nominate a candidate for the house of commons for the by-election in North Oxford on June 13 will be held here on Tuesday next.

**REFUSED DEATH BED MARRIAGE.**  
Fiancée of Jas. Fitch Thomson Thus Loses His Fortune.

The funeral of the late James Fitch Thomson will take place in Cayuga this afternoon.

The rule of the Episcopal Church forbidding the marriage of divorced persons met to Miss Edna Alice Little, a young woman, but Rev. Dr. Dyer, Episcopal chaplain, refused to perform the ceremony because he had been divorced, and the woman he loved will have no share in the estate.

**Work Will Go on at Once.**  
Montreal, May 26.—The action of the trustees of the Ontario settlement in putting off the settlement of the Katakaba Falls dispute till next session will not interfere with the construction work of the Katakaba Falls Power Company, which is being organized by H. S. Holt, president of the Montreal Light Heat and Power Company; C. R. Hoerner, director of the C. P. R.; and F. W. Thompson, vice-president of the Ogilvie Flour Mills Company, Limited.

The construction work will be pushed forward as rapidly as possible, and the first installation of 10,000 complete-lamp power into Fort William on June 1, 1906.

**MEETING HELD IN A SCHOOL TRUSTEES ARE INQUISITIVE**  
Request That Principal Appear and Give His Reasons—Caretaker, is Censured.

The property committee of the board of education was in a critical mood yesterday, and the actions of the principals of both Phoebe-street and Queen Alexandra schools came under the ban of its displeasure.

The committee appointed to act as mediators in the differences between Principal Hicks of Queen Alexandra School and the caretaker thereof reported good results likely to come from the holding out of the silver branch in the way of future harmony. Mr. Hicks was censured for not having reported to the board a fire that lately took place in the school.

**Traffic at Level Crossing.**  
A report compiled by Engineer Rust shows the amount of traffic at the Grand Trunk crossing on East Queen-street is interesting as evidence to be adduced when the city makes application to the railway commission for a level crossing there. The test was taken for the twenty-four hours beginning with 6 a.m. May 24, and it is as follows: 1346 street cars, 1772 other vehicles, 1228 pedestrians, 129 bicyclists and 301 perambulators crossed, while 94 trains went thru.

**Grand Trunk Railway System.**  
Earnings from May 15 to 21, 1905, were \$46,176, as compared with \$695,225 during the same period last year, showing a decrease of \$47,658.

**ACCIDENTS AT LINDSAY.**  
One Man Succumbs and Two Others Badly Hurt.

Lindsay, May 26.—(Special.)—Early this morning a man named Robert W. Lindsay, an employe at the Raven Lake Cement Works, near Victoria road, died in the Ross Memorial Hospital here as a result of his injuries, received by being caught in the machinery on Tuesday. His right arm was torn off, his left broken in two places, and he suffered from severe internal injuries.

**Caught in Machine.**  
This morning a young man named Dennis O'Leary, an employe at the Sylvester works, was caught in the gearing of a machine he was operating and had his left hand badly mangled. The little finger and the one next to it had to be amputated, but the third can be saved.

**Jammed Against Tree.**  
About noon to-day Robert Graham, constable at Sturgeon Point, a summer resort near here, was jammed between a tree and a wagon he was driving and was badly injured on the head and right arm.

**Burglars at Belleville.**  
Belleville, May 26.—Fred Robinson was set upon by three tramps, knocked senseless and robbed on Wednesday night. The affair happened in the outskirts of the city.

During the last few months there have been small burglaries in this city, and today the police arrested Ernest Flieger. In Flieger's house were found articles belonging to the different places robbed. His brother, Walter Flieger, was a short time ago sent to Kingston for four years, being found guilty of porch climbing in Toronto.

**Woman's Auxiliary Thanking.**  
The third annual thanksgiving service of the St. Barnabas (Chestnut) branch of the Woman's Auxiliary will be held on Tuesday morning at 10 o'clock. There will be celebration of holy communion and a missionary address by Rev. H. C. Dixon. The vicar of St. Barnabas hopes there will be present as many members as possible of the other branches, to whom cordial invitation is extended.

**HIS JUMP FOR DEATH OR LIBERTY**  
Athens Loses Building Which Was Erected in 1846.

Brockville, May 26.—(Special.)—The saw and grist mill of S. X. Bullitt, situated near Athens, and containing much valuable machinery, was burned early this morning.

The mill was a large frame building, five storeys high, and was built about 1846. The origin of the fire is not known.

It was one of the most desperate attempts at escape that Provincial Detective Greer has witnessed in his long career. When the train was about five miles from White River, and traveling along a spur of at least thirty-five miles an hour, the prisoner jumped from a window and made good his escape.

Andreas, who was handcuffed, requested to go to the closet. He was followed by the detective. In entering the place the prisoner went first, and he then slammed the door in the detective's face, springing the lock.

He saw Andreas breaking the window, and he hurried away to the backman to get a key. When he returned the prisoner had gone. The train was stopped and the detective went back, expecting to find the man killed. He found a hole in the sand about a foot deep where Andreas had fallen. The man had made good his escape. Greer then put the section and bridge crews employed on the line on their feet. Andreas kept traveling in the bush until 3 o'clock that night, when he again came out to the track, some miles east of where he had jumped from the train. A bridge crew was employed in repairing a bridge at this point, and the man not being able to cross the river with his hands cuffed, had to come out to the track. He went to some of the men of the bridge crew and implored them to cut the brackets. The men had been informed of his escape, and they took charge of him. It was a miracle he was not killed, as in the spot in which he alighted was about the only place on the road where he could have escaped so luckily, as all along the line it is very rocky and only a few yards on either side of the spot where he struck were large boulders.

**Dragged to Death by Cow.**  
Kingston, May 26.—Cuthbert Summers, residing near Lansdowne, was fatally injured while leading a cow. The rope became entangled about his feet. The cow ran away throwing the farmer and dragging him. He was found against a fence and pulled over a seeding machine. His abdomen was torn open, and he was otherwise mutilated.

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


