Henri Bourassa, M.P., Says Catholics of Northwest Escaped With Little in Defeat.

Montreal, March 26.—(Special.)—The Ottawa correspondent of Le Nationaliste, who appears to be no other than H. Bourassa, M. P. for Labelle, writes as follows:

"The second act of the comedy is now being played at the great national theatre at Ottawa. The different actors and the accompanying choruses have been in their places since Wednesday, and as they all know their roles well, the piece is a very interesting one. The result appears to have been favorable to the government. Sir Wilfrid, in a moderate speech, announced the amendments, and it is finished. That contagious fever known as fear has done its work. As I announced last week, this half-measure is not satisfactory. The Tories find it exorbitant, and the Catholics, who know something of the subject, are right in thinking the concessions too excessive. I do not wish to discuss the question if the government can, in law, modify the constitution, but I believe it to be my duty to point out the effect the new amendment will have in the Catholic schools in the Northwest.

"In replacing sub-section I of article 33 of the constitution of 1867 by the Northwest ordinances 29 and 30, the minority were forced to accept public schools in almost alleplaces where there exists a Catholic group of any importance. It is true that, in the infamous system in which the Sifton amendment will crystallize, there is very little difference, if there be any at all, between the Catholic school and the public school. It also cannot be denied that the speech delivered by the prime minister on Wednesday is not to be compared with his first address. This, however, is easily accounted for. Sir Wilfrid has just emerged from a long contest with his cabinet, and he found no support from the deputation. The fanaticism of certain English members had full play in bringing to bear upon him all possible pressure. Did he seek support from his compatriots? They were alarmed, and had no disposition for a contest; consequently, Sir Wilfrid was pushed headlong towards a compromise. Tentsin, March 26 -Field Marshal Marquis Oyama to-day gave his first interview since coming into the field. He refused to discuss the probability of

"I am only a soldier," he said, "no a politician. The Japanese government this war in the interests of international peace and for the safety of out country. Personally, I have a high regard for Russians. They are soldiers. The officers and men are brave and able and have fought well.

"During the war between China and

"During the war between China and Japan I was the commander of the army which captured Port Arthur. With a divison and a half of troops we took the city in five hours. The result this time shows the wonderful difference between Russia and the Chinese, with whom we had previous experience. But our army, both soldiers and officers, performed their duty as Japan knew they would.

"I was minister of war for Japan for 16 years, during which time conscription laws were passed. I have closely watched the making of the Japanese army, which has proved what I say, that the officers and men have fulfilled every hope, as I believed they would, in the older days, when the Japanese army was composed of the Samurai, professional fighting men.

"The modern army was drafted from all classes, yet all our hopes have been fully realized by the work this army has done in actual work."

Field Marshal Oyama declined to discontinuation of the Japanese army. He intimated that he was gready to continue the war as long as necessary. Despite reports to the contrary Field Marshal Oyama's health is excellent. With his staff he is comfortably quartered in fine Chinese houses, placed at his disposal by the Chinese vicerby.




Provincial Geologist Miller Talks to Canadian Institute on Temiskaming Mines.

A lecture of much interest to mineral ogists and prospectors for precious metals was delivered at the Canadian Institute on Saturday night by Willet G. Miller, provincial geologist, on "Silver and Cobalt Ores of Temiskaming." The lecture was well illustrated with lantern slides, showing maps, views, rock exposures and the general topography of the district, also specimens of rocks showing the presence of these metals. The veins from which these ores were taken were discovered during of the building of the Temiskaming and Northern Railway in the early summer of 1903; but the workmen engaged in construction work did not recognize them as valuable. It was not until Octobes that the bureau of mines received samples, when their value as a provincial asset was at once recognized. The samples sent were of nickel, the color of copper, and from their hat ture it became evident to Mr. Millar that associated with this deposit would no doubt De silver and cobalt. He visited the locality and found just what he anticipated, silver cobalt and arsenic. There were four deposits, but until he went there no silver had been discovered. A station has since been built there, which is known as Cobalt It lies 103 miles north of North Bay. Some samples for the St. Louis Exhibition were taken out and have since been bought by the Dominion government for \$5000, for a permanent exhibit. A few tons for test purposes were also until October that the bureau of mines

Maps Ready for Prospectors.

Last May Mr. Miller went to the district with the object of mapping it and making a closer examination of the deposits. This map is to be ready for prospectors in April. A number of prospectors from British Columbia and the United States went in last year and at the present time there are a great number of prospectors staying at the hotels, waiting for the snow to clear away so that they can continue their explorations. The prospectors last year found a number of veins, among them the mine of W. G. Tathewey of Toronto, who immediately began operations. This lies within half a mile of Cobalt Station. He has made shipments of some rich car loads of ore to New Yor's, His first shipment of 20 tons gave him a return of \$38,000. When it is considered that gold can be worked at a profit of \$5 to the ton, it will be understood what Mr. Tatheway's mine means, He showed up over \$200,000 worth in a short time and three others of the original veins have been worked at a hondsome profit.
