OF CEASE OF BUILDING OF WARSHIPS

Japan's Best Course to Prevent Cessation of Hostilities Developing Into a Mere Truce.

Paris, March 26.—It was stated in diplomatic quarters here today that among the conditions of the peace which Japan might ask would be that Russia give a pledge to build no more warships for a term of years. A diplomatic official said that such a condition would be the most effective means of assuring Japan against Russia's carrying out her cherished project of naval rearmament for the renewal of hostilities under better conditions than those at present existing.

JAPS TO TAKE PENAL COLONY.

Korsakov's Heterogeneous Population is Expected to Be Expelled. St. Petersburg, March 27.—(12.40 a.m.)—According to government mail advices, brought to the mainland from Sakhalen and telegraphed from Kharbin, the Japanese were expected to land at Korsakovsk within a fortnight, the port being free of ice early in April.

ALL QUIET ALONG THE LINE.

Gen. Gripenberg Has Been Relieved of His Command. St. Petersburg, March 26.—Gen. Linovitch, in a despatch dated March 25, reports no change in the position of the armies. Imperial order relieves Gen. Gripenberg from the command of the second Manchurian army, but permits him to remain as aide de camp to the emperor.

KUROPATKIN PROPHESED WAR AND TRIPLE ALLIANCE INVASION

Forebodings of Danger on European Frontier, Communicated in 1903, Deterred Czar From Sending Troops to Front. St. Petersburg, March 27.—(12.40 a.m.)—Prince Utkomsky's new paper, Dawn, has unearthed a remarkable report made by Gen. Kuropatkin to Emperor Nicholas in the fall of 1903, in which the then war minister expressed the opinion that the Yalu concession was sure to induce war in the far east, and look for an optimistic view of Russia's ability to cope with Japan on land and sea, but expressed forebodings that the triple alliance might take advantage of the western frontier.

POLICE CHIEF OF WARSAW KILLED BY BOMB-THROWERS

One Outrage to Permit of Attack on Him—Pursuing Policeman Later Found Dead.

Warsaw, March 26.—A bomb was thrown into the carriage of Baron Von Nolken, chief of police of Warsaw, at 8 o'clock to-night. He will recover. The attack on Baron Von Nolken was the result of an elaborate conspiracy of the revolutionary party. Shortly before 8 o'clock an elegantly dressed man went to the police station at Praga, a large suburb of Warsaw, on the other side of the Vistula, and threw a bomb into the room of the station where the men assembled before going on duty.

RECEIVED FULL CHARGE.

Baron Von Nolken, who was sitting on the side nearest the assassin, received the full charge of the bomb, while his companion escaped unhurt. The coachman was thrown from the box, the carriage was smashed, Baron Von Nolken was removed to the city hall and the assassin was shot dead. A telephone messenger was wounded and has been placed in the hospital.

MURDERERS PURSUING POLICEMAN.

Half an hour later a man in a red coat led in Sowiastreet, where the police believed to be the bombthrower, but who was identified as the plain clothes policeman who pursued the murderer, and who was shot down while in pursuit. A girl who was the only one who survived the attack was taken to the hospital.

IN SHOWING HOW, KILLS HIMSELF

AYR, March 25.—A fatal shooting accident occurred on the C. P. R. bridge spanning the river this afternoon, when Percy Babcock was instantly killed by the accidental discharge of his gun. LUNATIC STRANGLES BROTHER WHOSE HAIR HE WAS CUTTING

Tragedy in Caradoc on Saturday Afternoon—Murderer Was Thought to Be Harmless.

Strathroy, March 26.—(Special)—A tragedy which has shocked the residents of the community occurred in the Township of Caradoc Saturday afternoon. A farmer, residing in the 10th con. about 4 o'clock, when Robert Quick, a young farmer, about one and a half miles south of here, killed his younger brother, Alfred, by choking him to death. The murderer is a widower with five small children. For some time previous to his marriage he was in the insane asylum, but was thought to have recovered. He and his children lived together on his farm. His brother, whom he murdered, was unmarried and the sole support of his mother, who was with him and resided on the homestead, a short distance away.

900 SOULS IN 5-HOUR RACE WITH DEATH PARISIAN RAIN HELD AT HALIFAX HARBOR

New Rosts on Mud Bottom, Beside Dock—Albano, With 300 Aboard, Also Badly Damaged.

Halifax, N.S., March 26.—(Special).—One of the narrowest escapes from an accident which might have horrified the world took place in this harbor this evening when two ocean steamers, the Parisian, the Allan Line, and the Albano, the Hamburg-American Line, with almost 300, crashed together about five miles from their piers. Both vessels made the pier all right, but at present the Parisian is down as low in the water as it is possible for her to get with her stern half cut off, and the Albano in the adjoining dock has her stern badly twisted and is making water rapidly.

NOTED CAMBRIDGE DIVINE A "PARISIAN" PASSENGER

Rev. Dr. Kirkpatrick, soon to visit Toronto, Tells of Narrowness of the Escape. Dr. A. F. Kirkpatrick, professor of divinity and master of Selwyn College, in Cambridge University, England, who was one of the passengers on the Parisian, is to be an early visitor to Toronto, and his coming has already excited something of a stir among local Anglican churches. He speaks of the averted disaster in these words: "I shudder to think what might have happened if that clumsy German had rammed us in the engine room and our fires had been put out or the ship sunk. The idea of the sudden sinking of a ship with 800 or 900 people on board at the very mouth of the harbor is too terrible to think of, but it seemed to me that we came very near it. For a few minutes I thought it was not impossible that I should be landed in a little alien in the clothes I stood in, with all my possessions, including my lectures, at the bottom of the harbor."

LAST TRIP AS MAIL BOAT TURBINE TO TAKE ROUTE

"Parisian" Considered Lucky—In Service for 25 Years and Was to Have New Run. Henry C. Boulter, local agent of the Allan Line, stated last night that the only notification of the accident to the Parisian that he had received was from General Manager George Hannah at Montreal. "Parisian" arrived 6:30 Saturday evening, landed passengers, 21 first, 281 second and 441 third-class; all well. Parisian was injured in a collision off Halifax harbor. Will advise you later concerning time required for repairs. The Parisian, it was stated, had been considered a very lucky boat, she having been running for 25 years without meeting with any accident of account. Even should the Parisian be shelved for some time, no inconvenience would result, as the new turbine steamer, due this week, could easily adapt itself to the Parisian's schedule of sailings. As Mr. Boulter understood it, it had been intended to discontinue the Parisian's services as a mail boat, and the trip from which she arrived on Saturday was her last in that capacity. It had been designed to place her on the Glasgow-New York route during the summer.

WANT PEACE FOR NOTHING WAR'S COST ENOUGH NOW

Moscow, March 26.—With the exception of The Moscow Gazette, practically all the newspapers of this city are for peace on condition that there be neither cession of territory nor payment of indemnity. At a banquet a prominent merchant declared that "the happiest end of the war would be immediate peace, but if the government consents to indemnity we will throw the bomb. Enough Russian gold has been spent in Manchuria."

\$325,000,000 IN RUSS GOLD SIGHT OF IT "DEPRESSING"

Newspaper Correspondent is Given Best Evidence That There's Still Funds in Treasury.

London, March 27.—The correspondent at St. Petersburg of The Daily Mail reports that he accepted the invitation of Finance Minister Kokovtsov to inspect the reserves of gold in the state bank and describes his visit to that institution. He says: "The bank officials made much ceremony of unlocking the gates of the strong rooms, but the actual view of the \$325,000,000 of gold was found a surprisingly uninteresting, tedious and depressing spectacle. Over 15,000 sacks of gold coin stacked in rows on the floor of the long vault looked no more impressive than sacks of merchandise in an ordinary warehouse, whilst 15,915 gold ingots closely packed on shelves like a library less suggested their value than the shelves of an ironmonger's store. It had the effect of a dado in a subdued yellow tone not unattractive as a color scheme taken in combination with the gray canvas sacks and the white ceiling.

BOOTH TUCKER JOINS HAGGARD.

Will Tour Salvation Army Colonies and Visit Earl Grey. New York, March 26.—Commander Booth-Tucker of the Salvation Army is expected to arrive here from England on Tuesday next, having been directed to join H. Rider Haggard, who is investigating the Salvation Army's colonies in the United States, on which he will make a report to the British government. Commander Booth-Tucker will meet Mr. Haggard at Amity, Col., the principal Salvation Army colony in the United States, and will accompany him on his visit to Earl Grey, governor-general of Canada at Ottawa.

PUSHED INTO COMPROMISE BY "ENGLISH ANTIATOS"

Henri Bourassa, M.P., Says Catholics of Northwest Escaped With Little in Defeat.

Montreal, March 26.—(Special).—The Ottawa correspondent of Le Nationaliste, who appears to be no other than H. Bourassa, M. P. for Labelle, writes as follows: "The second act of the comedy is now being played at the great national theatre at Ottawa. The fanaticism of certain English members had full play in bringing to bear upon him all possible pressure. I do not seek support from his compatriots. STATE BINDER TWINE FACTORY.

Nebraska Appropriates \$250,000 to Go Into the Business. Lincoln, Neb., March 26.—Following the lead of Kansas in its fight against the Standard Oil Company, Nebraska will fight the binder twine and cordage trust, and to that end the state legislature Friday appropriated \$250,000 with which to build and equip a factory for the manufacture of binder twine. The plant will be constructed at Lincoln within the walls of the state prison and the cordage will be sold at cost. Should the experiment prove a success, the markets of adjoining states will be invaded in time. Work is expected to begin immediately, and if possible, the output will be ready for use in harvesting this coming autumn. Nebraska, Iowa, Kansas and the Dakotas use thousands of tons of cordage yearly, and the exactions of the trust have been increasing from year to year, ladies say.
