REPORT OF THE SESSION.

The Session have again the pleasure of reporting to the congregation a year of substantial progress. The membership at the end of last year was reported as numbering 369, but by a careful examination it appears that 14 names of members who had been certified to other churches, or had been struck off the roll in 1882 had been included by mistake, so that our membership was really only 355 at the close of 1882. There have been added during 1883 46 members by certificate and 39 by confession, in all 85; there have been removed from the roll 27 who were certified to other churches, 2 who died, and 20 who have not as yet applied for certificates, in all 49; making our membership at the close of the year 391. Since the new year began 12 members have been added, making our membership up to date 403. In September last Mr. Alex. Murray, our Session clerk, was taken from us after a somewhat prolonged, though not painful illness, during which he was able to bear testimony to his readiness to depart, and to be with Christ, which is far better.

The Session put upon the minutes the following resolution, in which they not only expressed their own feeling, but that of

the whole congregation. "The Session desires to place on record the deep sense of the loss sustained by the congregation in the decease of Mr. Alex. Murray. Mr. Murray identified himself with the Central Church at the beginning of its history, and was appointed to the office of the eldership, an office which he had filled with honour to himself and benefit to the Church for many years in Scotland. Mr. Murray won the respect and affection of his brethren by his faithful discharge of his duties as Session clerk, and especially endeared himself to those members of the congregation who were under his spiritual oversight. With Mrs. Murray and the whole family we deeply sympathize in their bereavement, and we earnestly commend them to the love and tender care of the God who so blessed our departed brother all his days, and gave him so abundant an entrance into His kingdom and glory."

In November last three elders were added to the Session, who had already done good service to the Presbyterian Church as elders in other congregations. The Session are sorry to say that the attendance at the Wednesday night meeting does not increase in the same ratio as the increase in the membership, and they would urge upon those who have the spiritual welfare of the Church at heart, to consider their duty in this matter. The Pastor began in July last a prayer-meeting on Saturday evenings, which, although only attended by a few, has proved a source of great comfort to him in entering upon the duties of the Sabbath, as well as a means of blessing to those attending it. The Session are glad to note the increased attendance of late at the evening diet of worship on the Lord's Day, and would suggest to those members who consider the forenoon service sufficient for their own nourishment and growth in grace, whether it would not be well to deny themselves for the sake of others, and be in their places as regularly in the evening as in the morning. By so doing the Pastor would have the encouragement of a completely filled church, and the young and careless have an example set before them which could not but prove beneficial.

The Session thankfully acknowledge the good work which is being done in the Sabbath School and Bible Classes, and congratulate the congregation upon the band of devoted teachers who are engaged in caring for the lambs of the flock. They also desire to bear testimony to the valuable work done in connection with the William Street Mission by Mr. Goforth, and the Sabbath School teachers and tract distributors who have laboured with him in the district.

Of all the other work carried on in the congregation, it is

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not needful we should speak, as the various reports will be placed before you. This much, however, the Session feel it right to record in this report that both the Session and congregation owe a deep debt of gratitude to the Christian women among us who have grudged neither time nor labour in caring for the poor, furthering the cause of missions, and lending a helping hand in everything which concerns the well-being of the congregation.

Looking back over the past year we desire to erect our Ebenezer, and say, hitherto hath the Lord helped us, and looking forward we would keep before our minds the words of the Psalmist, "Except the Lord build the house they labour in vain that build it."

SABBATH SCHOOL REPORT.

The close of another year has again witnessed the Sabbath School enjoying the material prosperity and happy concord which for the past three years, through the blessing of God, has characterized its internal economy; and therefore the condition of affairs at present is such as to render the presentation of the 9th Annual Report, an agreeable duty to the teachers. The average attendance for the year has been 188, and the number of scholars on the roll, 243, of which 114 belong to the infant class. According to the last report of the proceedings of the General Assembly, the Sabbath School and Bible Classes in connection with this church rank third in point of numbers in the Presbytery of Toronto, and tenth in the whole Presbyterian Church in Canada, a very creditable showing, the teachers think, for a congregation so recently established.

It will be remembered that when the new school buildings were erected five years ago, the Sabbath School agreed to contribute towards their erection \$500, and the teachers have now pleasure in reporting that in June last this undertaking was accomplished, and the final instalment paid to the managers of the church. In this connection, while the teachers desire to extend to the congregation their hearty thanks for the increased liberality shown towards the school during the past twelve months, they would, in passing, call attention to the interesting fact that the school has yearly for the past five years handed over to the managers of the church a considerably larger sum than has been received in return for the maintenance of the school. This circumstance is mentioned out of no desire whatever to underestimate the generosity of the congregation, as the teachers are fully aware that many onerous burdens have had to be borne by it from time to time. During the past three or four years, however, the school has been managed with the strictest regard to economy, indeed to such an extent has this been the case that on one or two occasions several of the classes in the higher grades have furnished their own lesson helps. This, obviously, is a most undesirable position for the teachers to be placed in, and now that the church's difficulties have to a great extent been happily overcome, they hope to be enabled to make the requisite provision for managing efficiently the increasing and intelligent school over which they have charge.

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The amount collected in the school this year, for all purposes, exceeds that received last year by \$16.58. Since the liquidation of the Building Fund indebtedness, the collection formerly devoted to that purpose has been appropriated in purchasing new books for the library, which has been greatly improved during the year by the addition of about 130 volumes, at a cost of \$66.

The teachers again tender a hearty vote of thanks to Miss Annie McIntosh and Messrs. Kilgour Bros. for valuable services rendered during the year.

A large number have joined the Church through the year, there being nineteen from Mrs. Harvie's division, and also a number from the pastor's class.

About the month of May the young ladies remaining in the pastor's class were transferred to Mrs. Harvie's charge, and later on, upon Mr. H. B. Gordon accepting the charge of the Y. M. C. A. Bible classes, his class was merged in the pastor's, so that we have now but two divisions, viz., one for ladies and one for young men. A cordial invitation is extended to everyone to attend, no special qualification being necessary.

During the year we have lost two members by death—Miss Kate Gourlay and Miss Ada Wade—both of whom died after long and painful illness, their testimony being that for them “to live was Christ and to die was gain.”

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Twenty-six young ladies have been engaged in the work of distributing tracts through the back streets of the city, and much good has been known to result from this work. From five to ten members have given their services as occasional teachers through the year.

During the year we have held our annual excursion, and also our book reception; on both of these occasions opportunity was afforded to the members to become acquainted, and so to encourage a friendly feeling, eminently proper and desirable in any Bible class. We need not here record that each and every member appeared to enjoy themselves thoroughly.

In closing, we feel that we can speak for every member in thanking Mr. McLeod and also Mrs. Harvie for their many kindnesses throughout the year, and would ask our Heavenly Father for His continued blessing and love for the future years through which we may be permitted to worship together as in the past.

REPORT OF THE WILLIAM STREET MISSION,

FOR YEAR ENDING 31ST DECEMBER, 1883.

In presenting their Third Annual Report, the teachers of the William Street Mission Sabbath School have great cause for thankfulness to Almighty God for His manifold goodness to them during the year, in the marked success which has attended their labours.

At the beginning of the year there were forty-two scholars on the roll and six teachers, Superintendent and Secretary. At the close of the year there were ninety-seven scholars, ten teachers, besides officers and two visitors; average attendance of scholars for the first six months forty, and for the last six months sixty-seven. This large increase in the attendance at the Sabbath School is partly due to the faithful discharge of the duties devolving on the teachers, who, by regularly visiting their scholars at their homes, and by showing kindness in many ways, have gained an influence over them for good. In this connection also we would mention the names of Mr. Forman and Miss Brown, who visited many homes, and looked after absent scholars.

The Session of Central Church, in the end of March last, secured the services of Mr. Goforth, a student of Knox College, as missionary for the summer six months in connection with the William Street Mission, to take charge of the Sabbath evening preaching and the Thursday evening prayer-meeting; and at the close of the College we have to report that he entered into the mission work with zeal and earnestness, visiting from house to house in St. Patrick's and St. John's Wards, looking after parents and children who were not attending any church or Sabbath School, dealing personally with them about their soul's salvation, and urging

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them to attend some church, and to send their children to Sabbath School. After repeated appeals he succeeded in getting some of them to go to the Sabbath evening service, and to send their children to the Sabbath School, Mr. Goforth in many instances bringing the children. Much of the credit of the success of the Mission is therefore due to him; and we have cause to know that his labours have been blessed to not a few, some having been added to the Church, of such as should be saved. The ladies who have been attending the Mothers' Meeting at William Street, and the friends who have been visiting in St. John's and St. Patrick's Wards, as well as the teachers, can bear testimony to the change that has been wrought in some of their homes, in both parents and children. The preaching on Sabbath evening has been well attended, ranging from fifty to eighty during the summer and fall, but we cannot say the same for the Thursday evening prayer-meeting, the attendance being from fifteen to twenty-five. Mr. Goforth still continues to give his services to the Mission on both these nights, which must cause no small amount of labour and inconvenience to himself. We feel sure that all the friends of the Mission will join with us in earnestly desiring that the way may be opened up so that his services may be secured at the close of the College for next summer.

As will be seen by the Treasurer's report, the Sabbath evening collection at the Mission amounts to \$11.93. In the end of September last the teachers brought the subject of missions before the children, and during the last three months of the year they contributed the sum of \$8; this they voted to be given to our old friend, Mr. Coleman, for his work among the Chinese children in San Francisco. This year, at the request of their teachers, their contributions are to be given for our own mission work.

On account of the difficulty we experienced last year in obtaining teachers to help in the night school, we concluded not to take up this branch of the work, but urged the children to attend the public night school, and we have reason to believe that some of them have done so.

The Ladies' Aid Society have pleasure in presenting their report for the year 1883, which forms the third annual report. During last year the attention of the Society has been chiefly engaged in aiding the teachers of the William Street Mission to benefit the poorer scholars, and thus while ministering to the bodily wants, obtain an influence which might be exerted for their spiritual good. Others in connection with the congregation have also shared in the labours of the Society.

It is gratifying to be able to report that as far as known, the assistance rendered in procuring clothing has been thankfully

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received, and has very materially affected for the better the attendance on the services at the mission, both in the Sabbath School and evening meeting; while the help given in the provision of necessaries, by payment of rent or other relief has, we trust, made some of the burdens of life lighter, and cheered the hearts of the sorrowing. The social meetings held have been fairly attended, and we hope will effect a greater change when their character and aim have been more generally understood.

The efforts to aid the young girls going into service, by providing them with suitable garments, has proved a great boon to those assisted, though, as yet, this has only been done to a limited extent.

The work of district visitation has as yet been only partial, but when it has been fairly systematized, we are hopeful of good results to the Society itself, as well as to those whose good is immediately sought.

During the year an effort was made to reach the young women who were strangers in the city, and whose employment rendered it difficult to become acquainted with them though attending the church and Bible Class. A social meeting was held under the auspices of the Society, to which a cordial invitation was extended. This work has now grown under the aid and kindly superintendence of Mrs. Harvie into a Mutual Help Society, holding regular monthly meetings, which are profitable and pleasant.

We have great pleasure in acknowledging the aid in money through the Session, and solicit their continued interest in the Society's work, and while grateful to all the friends who have aided us by contributions in kind, we feel it to be especially due to Mr. R. Spence to mention the considerate and generous gifts of material of every suitable kind. May his liberality provoke others to similar good work.

It remains but to mention our own pleasure and profit in the regular meetings of our Society, under the leadership of our worthy President, Mrs. Meldrum. May the blessing of the Master be upon us in all our work, and may that work, however humble, be accepted by Him and redound to His glory and honour, who came not to be ministered unto, but to minister, and to give His life a ransom for many.

WILLIAM STREET MOTHERS' MEETINGS.

During the past year an increasing interest has been manifested in the William Street Mothers' Meetings, and we trust that our efforts, which have been so heartily seconded by the parent association (the Ladies' Aid Society), have not been unproductive of good to those whom they were intended to benefit. Material has been furnished to the mothers at wholesale prices, and they have been permitted to pay for it in weekly instalments. In this way mothers with families depending on them have been materially assisted without having their benefits take the humiliating form of charity.

It had been intended to discontinue the meetings during the summer months, but at the earnest solicitation of the mothers themselves they were continued, and the interest attaching to them throughout the season is the best evidence that their continuance was well advised.

The action taken by the Ladies' Aid Society in sending visitors to our meetings has also proved beneficial. These visits by the members of the parent association, besides encouraging those more intimately engaged in this work,

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have done much to promote that sentiment of womanly and Christian equality, the establishment of which is so estimable a feature in the workings of all undertakings of this kind.

Finding that the duties of Secretary and Treasurer were somewhat too onerous to be performed by one officer of the association, Mrs. McFarlane was elected Treasurer, and she has since managed the finances in the most satisfactory and efficient manner.

During the summer months, at Mrs. Stephens' suggestion, a coal fund was established, and the result is that many of the mothers laid up small sums for the purchase of fuel and other necessities to be expended at the present season of the year, when the demands upon their resources are sure to be exceptionally heavy.

Throughout the year our President, Mrs. Stephens, has been untiring in her efforts to promote the objects of these meetings, and to her devotion to their cause have they been largely indebted for the measure of success with which it has pleased Divine Providence to favour them.

Miss Cobban has also been regular in her attendance, and her interesting and instructive readings have become one of the regularly established and most attractive features of our meetings.

We would also thank the ladies who have visited us for their kindness in assisting us to provide such simple refreshments as we have been in the habit of furnishing at our regular weekly meetings.

SECRETARY'S REPORT OF Y. W. M. H.
ASSOCIATION FOR 1883.

At the suggestion of our pastor the Young Women's Mutual Help Association was organized in April, 1883, under the auspices of the Ladies' Aid Society.

The object of the association is to bring together all young ladies who are strangers in the congregation and city, that they may become acquainted with the members, have a home-feeling for the Church, and that we may be the means of practical benefit to them should they fall sick or need a situation.

The only officers required were a president and secretary—Mrs. Harvie was unanimously chosen for the former and Hannah McKay for the latter—no fees requested. The meetings are held the first Thursday of every month, and a social every quarter. We have endeavoured to make the meetings both entertaining and profitable. There is a short programme, the members often contributing readings and music. An intermission of about fifteen minutes, in which a social chat is enjoyed, is followed by a short address by the President. The meetings are usually closed at about 9.30 p.m. Mr. McLeod is with us as often as he can make it convenient. Although the association has been in existence so short a time, we have much to encourage us. We have become acquainted with each other, and all the members take a lively interest in the meetings. I might mention the case of one of our members who has been sick and in the hospital for several weeks. We visit her regularly. We learned from her friends of her speaking in the warmest terms of our meetings, and the kindnesses she received in Central Church. She is now recovering, and is looking forward to the time

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when she will be permitted to join us again. We beg to thank the ladies of the congregation for their kind assistance at our meetings and socials.

Of course the success of our meetings is mainly due to the untiring zeal of our dear president, who has succeeded in making each member feel that in her she has a real personal interest.

If we are spared, we hope to go on with our work of love, and would heartily invite all who wish to join us, remembering our beloved Master's words, "By this shall all men know ye are My disciples, if ye have love one to another."

REPORT OF THE CENTRAL CHURCH AUXILIARY OF THE W. F. M. S.

The Central Church Auxiliary of the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society was organized 11th October, 1881. A President, three Vice-Presidents, Secretary and Treasurer were duly elected. Twenty-six ladies became members at the first regular meeting, the number increasing during the year to fifty-three. The object in forming this Auxiliary Society was to endeavour to get all the ladies in the congregation interested in the missionary work now being carried on among the women and children of India. The meetings are held on the second Tuesday of every month from three to four o'clock in the afternoon, the membership fee for the year is twenty-five cents—the subscriptions per envelopes are entirely voluntary, more or less being given as circumstances will permit.

During the last year, 1883, this Society has been progressing very favourably, the members having now arrived at a better understanding of the work missionaries have to perform, and a fuller sympathy with them in all their trials and difficulties. There have been twelve meetings held since last December, the largest attendance, thirty-four, the average, twenty-one.

The number of members is now seventy-three, being an increase of twenty since last year; of these, fifteen are members of the General Society. The President, Mrs. Jennings, was presented with a certificate of life membership as a slight token of the high regard and esteem felt for her by the mem-

bers. • Mrs. Creelman materially benefited the Society by becoming a life member. At the monthly meetings letters from Indore, from Mrs. Wilkie, Mrs. Campbell, Miss McGregor and Miss Ross have been read, showing how God has sustained them in all their trials, and given them cause to rejoice in seeing His work prosper in their hands. Encouraging letters from Formosa, New Hebrides and Trinidad Missions have been read, telling of how gladly the Gospel has been received by the natives. Several of the members have written interesting and instructive papers on "Mission Life and Work," which increased the zeal of all who listened to them. Other members read carefully selected missionary information, all tending to show that God is both willing and able to help those who put their trust in Him.

Mrs. Keer was kind enough to come to one of our meetings, and in her pleasant conversational style to give us a far better idea of "Life in India," than we could obtain from reading. An open meeting was held on the evening of the 13th February, when interesting and practical addresses were given by Rev. Professor McLaren and Mr. Mutch. We are thankful to be able to say that those who have attended our meetings regularly, have become very much interested in Foreign Mission Work, and are very anxious that the women and children of India should enjoy some of our privileges, and have that Gospel light and teaching which the Lord has dealt so bountifully to us.

MANAGERS' REPORT

FOR THE YEAR ENDING DECEMBER 31ST, 1883.

To the Members and Adherents of the Central Presbyterian Church:—

In submitting their Annual Report for the past year, the Managers have pleasure in congratulating you on the increase in the number of Members and Adherents of the congregation, and on the fact that the ordinary revenue has during the past year equalled the expenditure.

At the close of the year ending 31st December, 1882, there were 168 contributors by envelope, subscribing weekly an average of \$89. At the close of the past year there were 163 contributors by envelope, subscribing weekly \$93.25.

The average weekly collections by envelope and loose contributions for the years 1882 and 1883 were as follows:—

The total average per week from envelopes and loose contributions for the year 1882 was \$101.71. The total average per week from the same sources for the past year was \$110.78. You will remember that at the end of the year 1882 there was a deficit of \$172. At the end of 1883, after liquidating which, there is a surplus of \$4.88.

It is expected that the ordinary expenses of the congregation for the year 1884 will amount to \$114 per week, which is a slight increase over the expenses of the past year, such increase being occasioned by additional insurance premiums and repairs to the church property.

At the close of 1882 the debt of the congregation beyond the mortgages was \$4,118.18. At the close of 1883, this debt

is \$3,149.01, this sum having been reduced to the extent of \$969.17 by contributions to floating debt and building fund account.

For your information we append the following synopsis of contributions at present.

In closing their Report the Managers have earnestly to request that each member and adherent of the congregation will carefully peruse the Financial Statements submitted, which, they feel, present every encouragement, and in view of the estimated increase in the expenditure, and of the urgent necessity for reducing the floating debt, the managers would ask those who feel that they can increase their offerings of the past year, to do so as early as possible during the present year.
