The President, Mrs. A. O. Rutherford was in the chair, and conducted the devotional exercises, assisted by Mesdames, Locke, Lauder and Lytle.

On motion, the minutes of Executive meetings, held during the year, were taken as read.

Mrs. Moffatt, Mrs. Pugsley and Mrs. Starr were appointed a Credential Committee.

A message of love and sympathy was sent from the meeting to the Vice-President, Mrs. Cowan, regretting her absence and trusting that her daughter would speedily be restored to health.

The reports of the following departments were presented, by the Superintendents, and interesting discussions followed each paper. Sailors' Work, Mrs. Emory; Soldiers' Work, Mrs. Starr; Lumbermen, Mrs. Robinson; Franchise, Mrs. Henderson. Superintendent was ill and her report was read by Mrs. Bascom. Press Work, Mrs. Wrigley. In the discussion which followed this report a hearty vote of thanks was given the press for their kindness in publishing items sent them.

Sabbath School Work was reported by the Superintendant, Mrs. Lytle; Woman's Journal, Mrs. Gray; Parlor Meetings by Mrs. D. Rose and supplemented by Mrs. Orr, and School of Methods was verbally reported by the President.

The noontide hour having arrived, hymn 224 was sung and Mrs. Gray led in prayer, special mention being made of Miss Willard and Miss Scott, Ottawa, by request of the President.

After prayer the report of the Work Among Colored People was given by Mrs. Spence, Superintendent; and Flower Mission by the Superintendent, Miss Cook.

On motion of Mrs. Brownell, seconded by Mrs. Lauder, and carried, the name was changed to Flower, Fruit, and Delicacy Mission.

Meeting adjourned till 2.30 p.m.

#### AFTERNOON SESSION.

The afternoon session opened with a Bible reading by Mrs. Finch, Honorary President of the Central Union.

Minutes of morning read and adopted. Eighty-seven members answered the roll call.

Mrs. Spence took the chair while the President read her anuual address. She reviewed the work of the year and congratulated the members on the success of their labors, but expressed regret that there were so few Bands of Hope in connection with the Local Unions, and urged the necessity of more earnest work in this direction. In conclusion, she said the time had come, the work having grown to such an extent, that it was absolutely necessary to have a paid officer at Headquarters who could devote her whole time to the work.

The thanks of the meeting were tendered the President for her address and it was unanimously carried that it be printed in the Directory.

Mrs. Bascom, Cor.-Secretary, read her report, showing a total membership of 565 including 55 honorary members, an increase over last year of 105.

As full reports had not been sent in from the Unions, Mrs. Bascomwas authorized to embody these in her report when received.

The Treasurer, Mrs. Moffat, gave her report, which was adopted.

Report of the Girls Shelter was given by the Secretary, Mrs. Wilson. It was moved by Mrs. Bascom, seconded by Mrs. Meredith, and carried, that a special vote of thanks be given Dr. Lelia Davis, for free professional services tendered the inmates of Shelter during the year.

The Financial Statement of Shelter was given by the Treasurer, Mrs. Fletcher, and on motion the report was adopted.

Carried.

Mrs. Brownell read report of Literature Committee, and Mrs. Moffat the Financial Statement, all of which were received.

Mrs. Brownell moved a vote of thanks to the Fair Superintendents which was carried by a standing vote.

The Recording-Secretary, Mrs. Meredith, read a recommendation from the Sub-Executive, that the sum of \$100 be applied on the notes. It was carried that the recommendation be received and acted upon.

A solo tendered by Miss McClelland was listened to with pleasure.

The Report on Social Purity, by Mrs. Garrett, Superintendent, was most encouraging, showing an increase of interest in this department.

The President gave a verbal report on Conference with Influential Bodies.

The Doxology was then sung, prayer offered by Mrs. Finch, and the meeting adjourned.

# FRIDAY, OCTOBER 1ST.

Meeting opened at 10.30 a.m. with devotional exercises, led by the President, assisted by several other ladies.

Minutes of afternoon session read and approved. Reports of departments resumed.

The Report of Evangelistic Work, prepared by the Superintendent, Mrs. Cowan, was read by Mrs. Bascom.

In her paper Mrs. Cowan suggested that the first Monday in each month, hitherto held as a District Devotional Meeting, be handed over to the Central Union. Mrs. E. C. Rutherford moved, seconded by Mrs. Vance, that this be made a motion. Carried.

Mrs. Chamberlain moved in ammendment, that it remain a District Devotional Day, which after some discussion was carried.

As the hour had arrived for the election of Officers, the following were appointed tellers:—Mrs. Pugsley, Mrs. Birchard, Mrs. Ward, Mrs. Abercrombie, Dr. Skinner, Miss McConnell, Miss North and Mrs. Zeigler.

After a few moments of silent prayer Mrs. Fotheringham led audibly, after which Mrs. Spence took the chair during the election of officers.

Narcotics, by Mrs. Mason, with the following recommendation: That the Dominion Union be asked to manufacture an Anti-Cigarette Button and place it in the Literature Depository for general use. Moved by Mrs. Bascom, seconded by Mrs. Wilson, and carried, that the recommendation be sent to the Dominion W.C.T.U.

Mrs. Spence moved, seconded by Mrs. Watson, that the District Union request the Street Railway Company to take steps to prevent people being injured by tobacco smoke while riding on the cars.

Mrs. Carlyle moved an amendment "That we wait on the City Council."

The original motion carried.

The Superintendent of Scientific Temperance Instruction gave a very encouraging report of the year's work in that department.

The meeting adjourned till 2.30 p.m.

FRIDAY, OCTOBER, 1st, 2.30 p.m.

The meeting opened with a Bible reading by Miss Tilley.

The minutes of the morning and noon session were read and adopted.

The following Superintendents of Departments read reports: Work Among Young People, by Miss Wiggins. Sabbath Observance, read by Mrs. Bascom. Juvenile Domestic Kitchen Garden, Miss Faircloth.

Mr. F. S. Spence was introduced and addressed the meeting.

A solo was sweetly sung by Miss Doherty and listened to with pleasure.

Mrs. Ward, Superintendent Band of Hope, Work read her report, showing that Western Union is still the Banner Union in this important department, it having two Bands with a combined membership of 300 children.

The committee on preparing the Directory brought in the following recommendation:

In addition to this, the Reports of District Superintendents, District Corresponding Secretary, and Treasurer, and the Annual Address of the President, and that the expense be met by Local Unions.

It was finally carried, on motion, that 650 copies of the Directory be printed, and that the Committee of last year, with the addition of the Secretaries, be a committee to prepare the report for the printer.

Mesdames, Orr, Starr, Spence and Meredith were elected by ballot, delegates to the Dominion Convention:—

Mrs. Starr moved, seconded by Mrs. Relf, That we again federate with the Council of Women. Carried. Mesdames, Rutherford, Vance, Hilborn, Wilson and Gray were elected by ballot, delegates to the Woman's Council.

Miss Wiggins gave a synopsis of work accomplished by the Management Committee for the World's Convention, and read a communication from Miss Frances E. Willard, expressing regret for the disappointment we all feel at the enforced absence, through illness, of Lady Henry Somerset from the Convention, and threw out the suggestion that a letter sent to Lady Henry, expressive of our sympathy with her, in her illness and disappointment, would be most kindly received. Prayer was offered on behalf of Lady Henry, and Miss Wiggins moved that a letter expressing our love and sympathy be sent her, which was carried unanimously.

Moved by Mrs Spence, seconded by Mrs. Starr, that all unfinished business be left with the Sub-Executive. Carried.

Mrs. Orr moved, seconded by Mrs. Porter, that the District Officers and one representative from each Union, be a committee to decide as to having a paid Secretary at Headquarters. Carried.

The meeting closed with the Doxology, and prayer by Mrs. Chamberlain.

# CORRESPONDING SECRETARY'S REPORT.

One of the pleasant things that has come to me in these days, when we are so busy planning and working for the great convention, which will so very soon be within our borders, is a little paper covered book, entitled "Eighty Complete Years," a birthday offering to Mother Stewart, of Springfield, Ohio. Her name recalls to us days of the past, when we first learned through the newspapers of the great crusade movement in 1873, then begun in the State of Ohio. It may be we did not then take kindly to the thought of the band of women praying at the doors of the saloon, and that we agreed with Paul when he said "Women should be stayers at home," but how the years have changed us—and the work which then we perhaps despised has grown to be our chief delight. The woman who had the courage to be the leader of these woman, and who now numbers 80 years, has the blessed comfort of seeing that she was indeed led For years she went hither and thither seeming of God. scarcely to have time to eat or sleep, ever organizing, stimulating and appealing to the people to arouse and destroy the liquor traffic as the greatest foe of home and Christian citizenship. The crusade began in Hillsboro, Ohio, but it has reached out to the uttermost parts of the earth, till now we proudly and truthfully say, the White Ribbon encircles the globe. The work was begun with prayer, in faith and confidence in God, and it has gone on in the same spirit. The motto of Joseph Necsima, the Japanese convert "Advance on your knees," has been the motto of hundreds of consecrated women in the grand cause. "More things are wrought by prayer than this world dreams of." " Prayer moves the Hand which moves the world."

Toronto has made great strides this year in increase of membership and interest and knowledge in the work. Seven Unions return additions to their numbers, and we welcome to our annual report a new daughter, the Western Y.

The first event in the beginning of our new year was the entertainment of the Dominion W.C.T.U.

The echoes of that convention linger with us yet. The grand work for Purity that was so thoroughly discussed, and the words that were spoken by Dr. Amelia Yeomans, of the Prairie Province, are not forgotten.

No sooner had our guests bade us good bye than we began to plan for the enlargement of the Shelter for Girls which had been

so successfully carried on that the first little home proved too small, and Headquarters Building itself was altered so as to meet the requirements of the growing work.

A very pleasant opening reception took place on December 17th.

Later in the season, February 9th, we held our Annual Tea, resulting in valuable additions to our membership.

In May we undertook a little legislative work and letters were written to the Minister of Justice, Sir Oliver Mowat, and our members of Parliament, asking for their co-operation and support in favor of proposed amendments to the Criminal Code,

designing to secure better protection for women.

Following this came the famous contest against Sunday Street Cars, in which every Union in the city engaged, and our women worked faithfully against the proposed violation of the Lord's Day. We were defeated. It remains not for us to say how or why, but we are not discouraged in our efforts to promote a better observance of the Sabbath.

The thought supreme of the past twelve months has been, preparation for the Dominion and World's Conventions. Parlor Meetings in different parts of the City have been held, and the President and Miss Wiggins supplemented by the various committees have been indefatigable in their exertions to make the

conventions a grand success.

Willard reports good work done along the different lines of work, has held prayer meetings in the interest of Sabbath Observance and closes by saying, "One fact which we think worthy of notice is there is not one drinking place in our district where liquor is drank, and only one, that we are aware of, where it is sold as a beverage."

Gordon has had a very prosperous year, and has distributed 450 pages of literature, 8 Teachers Manuals in Scientific T. I. The special work in that Union is the care of the Boy's Brigade of which we shall hear of from Superintendent of Juvenile

Work no doubt.

Deer Park is instant in season in sending for distribution literature to Lumber Camps, to Miners' Camps, to Street Railway Offices and Reading Rooms.

The Secretary has written 80 letters, 60 post cards, sent out 101 circulars and distributed by mail over 100 reports.

## EVANGELISTIC.

In a city like Toronto where almost every congregation has its city mission, besides other non-denominational organizations, the question may be asked, what need is there for the W.C.T.U. to do evangelistic work? As a temperance society should it not confine its labors to advancing temperance sentiment? Our answer is, this is a temperance society composed of Christian women whose aim it is, not only to remove intemperance as a great hinderance to the spread of the gospel, but to win sinners to Him whose grace can alone deliver from this sin as well as every other sin. Most of our Unions have special Devotional Meetings once a month for the members, we trust they are "times of refreshing."

Central Union had a weekly meeting for six months in "The Centre Avenue Mission Hall," which was begun as a concert and readings, but at each meeting there was an earnest address given by different ladies and gentlemen, followed by recitations and music.

This meeting in spring was moved to Chestnut Street, and under another committee developed into a purely evangelistic work.

Gospel meetings were held every night for two weeks and then twice a week until the weather was too hot, then one or two out-door meetings were held and these have been continued by the Agnes St. Methodist Church during the summer.

During the services in the Hall, twenty-two people professed to have given their hearts to the Lord and many asked for prayer. The want of more workers hindered visiting and following up these converts.

Money collected and expended for Central Mission work \$52.55.

Western Union has a monthly Devotional Meeting for members, held one Evangelistic service in Wesley Church and conducts a successful Mother's Meeting, where Bible readings and prayer were held. 30 visits made to the poor and sick.

Gordon Union made some visits to the sick and poor, and distributed literature.

Northern Union addressed 1 Mother's Meeting, made 30 visits to the sick, gave relief in some cases, and distributed 300 pages of literature.

Creighton Union held 24 Mothers Meetings with an average attendance of 14.

At the prayer meetings the mothers gave texts on some given subject, leading them to search the Scriptures, one mother believed her husband had been saved from the drink habit in answer to the prayer at the Mother's Meetings.

Five mothers took the pledge, 8 quilts were made and 40 garments sold for nominal prices or given away.

Visits were paid to the poor and sick and flowers and delicacies given.

This is new work in the Creighton Union and we congratulate our sisters on such a good beginning.

Youmans Union has held 7 cottage meetings, given 27 baskets of provisions to the poor, made 19 calls and distributed clothing.

Dovercourt Union has done a good deal of visiting from house to house among the poor, caring for their necessities, distributing literature, reading the Scriptures.

Parkdale and Bathurst Unions have successful Mother's Meetings. No report has been sent in.

Many of these reports only consist of a few words but imply a great deal of faithful hard work.

One Superintendent says she feels deeply humiliated, because of work not being done, and is afraid to give a report because so much more might have been done for Him who did so much for us.

As a District Union we observe the Dominion day of prayer in January.

The printed programme was carried out, and we felt it good to be there.

The Prayer Union was held regularly on the first Monday in the month.

Your Superintendent gave short addresses when asked to do so at 8 Mother's Meetings, 5 prayer meetings, 2 Christian Endeavor and a children's gathering.

Central sent to Huntsville 120 papers and periodicals. Answers received much appreciated.

Creighton sent to Burks Falls 2,600 pages of literature, 1 comfort bag, 1 New Testament.

## FLOWER AND DELICACY MISSION.

We are glad to report 7 active Missions.

Northern W.C.T.U. Delicacy Mission has distributed 321 qts. of fruit, 1 basket delicacies, 1 doz. oranges, 1 plum pudding, 2 roasts of beef, Christmas dinner for 2 families.

Expenditure \$2.50.

Dovercourt has given out a large number of boquets and delicacies. Many sick have been visited and cheered. They also gave a pic-nic to the Morning Sunday School.

Youmans has distributed 60 boquets, jelly, eggs, meat, cakes and other delicacies, 27 baskets of provisions at Christmas.

Western has made 25 visits, also visited the Home for Incurables, also distributed 30 boquets, floral offering for the casket of Rev.

Bathurst has done good work, given out 120 boquets, 127 glasses of jelly, 24½ doz. eggs, 5 baskets of provisions at Christmas.

Western Y's started a Flower Mission in May, and have distributed 309 boquets at the Home for Incurables.

Central Y's W.C.T.U. has given to the sick and needy, 2,850 boquets, 25 qts. of delicacies, 40 doz. eggs, 5 doz. oranges, 5 doz. bananas, 5 barrels of apples, provisions for Christmas dinners to 65 families. Have arranged 45 visits each week. Expenditure \$252.00.

We have visited the Old Folks Home, Home of Industry, General hospital, Bethany Orphanage. Have distributed a large amount of clothing.

Northern Branch of this Union has done excellent work, having given out 2,080 boquets, 3,640 pages of literature, a large quantity of clothing, and Christmas dinner to 6 families. They have visited regularly Grace Hospital and held services each Sunday. They also have visited St. Johns Hospital and Sick Childrens Hospital.

We are glad to report increase in members and interest in this work in the "Master's Vineyard."

Central Y's held 2 Parlor Socials, one in November in Zion Church at the Dominion Convention, and one at their rooms, for Miss Gordon of Ottawa, Superintendent of Y work, who gave an address on Temperance. Here we must state that the Y's are always on hand to help in any of our entertainments belonging to the District.

The District held their annual Tea in March, which has been so useful in bringing out all our old members. They also held a successful meeting when the Shelter was opened, able addresses were delivered and refreshments served. Also an afternoon meeting when the mite boxes were opened. A great many of the members brought plants for

We want the very best and brightest woman in our Unions for this office, only those having ability and a good deal of leisure time for reading up this subject should hold this position, as it does not take boys and girls long to find out how much their teacher or superintendent knows.

The returns show Western Union still ahead in Band of Hope work. They report 200 members, with an average attendance of 83,

# SCIENTIFIC TEMPERANCE INSTRUCTION.

Owing to taking the Superintendency so late in the year, I have been unable to visit all the Unions, but since commencing with them, have received replies from all but Western and Eastern. The following Unions have appointed Superintendents, viz., Central, Central Y's, Willard, Gordon, Northern, Parkdale, and Eastern, but good work has been done among other Unions where no Superintendent has been appointed which is very encouraging and shows that our white ribboners are alive to the importance of this work.

Central W.C.T.U. sends an excellent report of faithful work done by the Superintendent, who has addressed the teachers in three schools, also with the aid of a friend, provided three schools with a copy each of The School Physiology Journal, while the principal of a fourth school (a lady) subscribed for it for her own school. Literature has been distributed monthly since March 1st to the amount of 1,456 pages, in addition to the copies of Journal above mentioned.

The Normal School has been visited and some literature given, and arrangements made for an address at the different schools in that locality later in the season. A teachers' social was given early in the year.

Central Y's report Scientific Temperance Instruction given regularly to a class of 64, of which 35 were boys, who, the Superintendent feels confident, are able to tell in an intelligent manner the evil effects of Alcohol on most important organs of the body. A large quantity of literature has also been distributed in the class and found its way into the homes of the children, which cannot but result in good.

Willard reports sending literature to the 3 schools in that District, 90 copies of 6 carefully selected leaflets, and over 450 pages given to Mr. Hughes, who kindly consented to send them to the schools.

Gordon reports having visited 8 schools, and distributing 450 pages of literature and 8 Teacher's Manuals in ward 2.

Northern has visited 2 schools regularly during the winter and spring, each teacher receiving a package of leaflets at each visit, and a copy of the Union Signal supplied to each school. Wellesley School was added to this District in the spring, and 2 visits were made also literature left with the principal for distribution. In all, 4,000 papers of literature have been distributed by this Union.

Parkdale, a teachers' social was given and literature distributed among the schools of this District.

At this meeting it was decided to arrange for a Conference of the chairmen of temperance committees and the presidents of each society. This Conference was held at Headquarters on Saturday evening, February 27th. A bright programme full of suggestions was given by practical workers, and the large number present carried home many new suggestions and some inspiration to work in the great cause.

We are indebted to the "Y's" for refreshments on this occasion as well as to those who took part in the programme, Mrs. Rutherford, Mrs. Bascom, Mr. Atkinson and Mr. J. R. L. Starr.

About three-quarters of the Young People's Societies have temperance committees. Your Superintendent has given much literature to those enquiring about methods of work. More demand is made for speakers than can be complied with. During the year twelve Young People's Societies have had a W.C.T.U. evening, when members from

that organization were the speakers. Through the efforts of this department the subject of temperance has been brought before the Christian Endeavour Union, and the work urged upon the individual societies. The work of this department is more than important during the coming year when the young people must be an important factor in winning the great temperance battle in the plebiscite campaign. The local Unions will find this work will pay them a heavy dividend as the enthusiasm of youth only needs wise direction to do efficient work.

## SABBATH OBSERVANCE.

Meetings were called in each ward, and our women were instrumental in holding some good public meetings as well as gatherings of women for organization.

Eastern held one meeting and though few in number did a good deal of canvassing in No. 1 ward.

One public meeting was held in Berkeley St. Methodist Church which was well attended.

Eastern, no Superintendent, no report.

As to personal work, your Superintendent has written 28 cards, 3 letters and sent 10 circulars for annual reports, visited 7 Unions which had no Superintendents for Purity and urged upon them the great necessity for work along educational lines especially. Superintendent was much gratified that in every case the Unions acceded to her request and appointed Superintendents at once, so that now only one city Union has no Purity Superintendent. Early in the year the District kindly voted \$5.00 worth of literature for this department, all of which has been distributed, and we hope has been seed sown in good soil which must yield a harvest of increased interest and intelligence along the line of Purity teaching. The subject was taken up at one of the regular District meetings, when the Superintendent read a paper which was followed by discussion, also at York County Convention she read a paper that led to a free and very interesting discussion on the particular line of the duty of the mother in teaching Purity to her young children.

Strong resolutions were sent by the District Union to Ottawa asking for support for the proposed Criminal Code amendments. We are glad to be able to say that the one raising the "Age of consent"

to 18 years carried without any opposition.

Though the good done seems small compared to the great need that exists, still we are thankful that instead of the almost entire indifference to the claims of this department which most of the Unions manifested at the beginning of the year, we now see great interest taken in the literature and an evident anxiety on the part of mothers at least to become better equipped for the great work of keeping the little ones in their care from every touch of impurity by leaving no room for it to gain a foothold. We are hoping for greatly added zeal in all our Unions as a result of the coming Purity Conference in connection with the World's Convention.

Your Superintendent would recommend Unions to furnish their Superintendents with the New Crusade, a little magazine published by Dr. Mary Wood-Allen, price 50cts per year, and which can be

## SABBATH SCHOOL WORK.

In presenting my report for this line of our work, I feel strongly impressed to say that the time has come when each one of us should say earnestly, help our local Superintendents with this work by seeing after our own Sunday school, asking our Sunday school Superintendent if he would permit us to bring an earnest temperance worker, to not only address his Sunday school, but also his teachers meeting, and if he would appoint a Temperance Secretary for his school. In this way all of the schools in the various Districts could be well worked. I wish to very heartily thank the President and all the other members of the W.C.T.U. who have helped in this work by their earnest addresses given in the different Sunday schools.

Youmans Union reports that Sunday school temperance literature has been distributed.

Creighton gives a most encouraging report, several ladies of the W.C.T.U. gave very able addresses in their schools, and if the interest shown by the scholars counts for anything, very favorable results may expected.

In Dovercourt Union they are commencing to work on this line.

Central is to the front as usual, giving a most satisfactory report, and shows that the volumn of work accomplished during the year is very large. 21 visits have been made by the Superintendent to the Sunday school in her District, and 12 addresses given by the W.C.T.U. ladies.

Northern Union reports all the Sunday school officers in full accord with our work. 8 addresses have been given by some of our own women, and the regular quarterly temperance lesson has been taught. The Superintendent of this Union suggests that we impress upon the Sunday school authorities more than in the past, the great importance of regularly presenting Pledge Cards.

A further report of Northern Union Sunday school held at the brewery 4 months during winter; young men from 16 to 20; attendance 8 to 20. Good attention to the lesson and to all the service, while we cannot report conversions, there is a wonderful change in manners and language. We are hoping that the seed sown will yet bear abundant fruit.

In closing, I would suggest in order to arouse public sentiment in favor of the Plebiscite, that each Sunday school hold half-yearly temperance, musical and literary entertainments, in which the children would figure prominently, in order to secure the interest of the parents and thus arouse a mutual interest.

#### SHELTER REPORT.

In submitting our second annual report of the Shelter work we are sorry to have to report a slight falling off in the number of girls received into the Shelter, there being 113 as against 130 of last year. This falling off in numbers may be accounted for somewhat, in the distracting influences which have been at work. In December last the Shelter was removed to the top flat of our Headquarters building, and while much larger, brighter and in every way adapted for the work, especially with regard to yard room, at the same time it has the disadvantage of being at the top of the house, and not so easy for the girls to find. Then in January our tried and trusted housekeeper, Mrs. Meredy, who had always made the house so pleasant and homelike, was taken seriously ill. A nurse was provided for her and everything done to aid her recovery, which was only partial, and after several months trying to get well enough to resume her duties, she gave up and was taken to Grace Hospital. Mrs. Farrar, who took her place, is giving good satisfaction. In July, Miss McIntyre resigned her position as Matron of the Shelter. Miss Lee, who followed her, a most estinable lady in every respect, and particularly fitted for the work, felt obliged to resign the position in six weeks time through failing health and a desire to reach her native land (England) before the winter set in. All these changes have had an adverse effect on the work, still we believe He who over-rules all things will bring blessing out of what may seem to us only disaster.

A large proportion of these girls are now in domestic service doing well, from whom we hear encouraging reports from time to time. Some have been helped out of difficult positions, and others returned to their friends who were glad to hear of them.

The opening of the new Shelter was a decided success, Mayor Fleming presided. Mrs. Rutherford gave an interesting outline of the work, music was contributed by several young ladies and gentlemen, refreshments were handed around, and best of all a number of substantial donations subscribed.

In February the annual "high Tea" for Headquarters was held, and a nice sum realized. In May the Mite Boxes donated by Mrs. Fletcher for the Shelter were opened with text reading and afternoon Tea. Each lady was asked to bring with her Mite Box a plant or shrub for the garden. That the response was generous, the garden itself will testify by its beautiful appearance all summer. Deer Park sent a number of bulbs and shrubs.

However, a hint to the wise is sufficient, and no doubt the bargain counters will soon reap the reward of this suggestion.

In June the Garden Party at Mrs. McDonell's was assisted by the Unions, all of them selling tickets and otherwise helping to make it popular. Also at Christmas time the Unions seemed to vie with each other in bringing good cheer to the poor girls in the Shelter. Friends outside the Unions were also very numerous with Christmas and New Year gifts, meriting the sincere thanks of the Committee. Circular letters were sent to the Municipal and Town Councils asking support for the girls who come to our home from outside the city. Interesting letters were received in return, and in many instances a liberal donation, all of which have greatly helped to lighten the burden on the shoulders of the committee.

Miss McIntyre presented the claims of the work in the various churches through the winter months, receiving in return in almost every instance, a generous collection. Considering the claims upon them and the continued "hard times" etc., the Unions have done well, and yet we might have done better for Headquarters, with more united action, and more of the spirit of loyalty.

The committee wish to thank the Unions and kind friends everywhere for assistance rendered, especially are our thanks due the press, who have kept the work before the public, also Dr. Lelia Davis, who, although the general health of the house has been good, has cheerfully given her services whenever needed, and has helped in many other ways.

In whatever success has attended our efforts during the year, we acknowledge the guiding hand of our Father, and for His sake we gladly labor on and offer all our work for Him.
