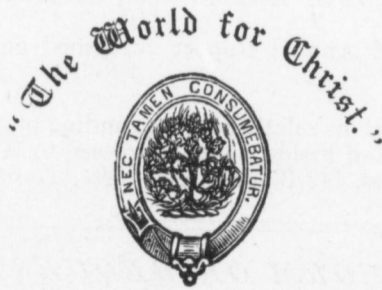

WOMAN'S FOREIGN MISSIONARY SOCIETY.

ANNUAL MEETING.

The Nineteenth Annual Meeting of the Society convened in Central Church, Toronto, on the 16th, 17th and 18th of April. The church was prettily decorated with palms, roses and Easter lilies, and a hearty and cordial reception awaited the large number of, over five hundred, delegates who had come from the various branches. These with the many members and friends in the city filled the large church at each of the several sessions almost to overflowing. On Tuesday and Wednesday, the President, Mrs. Ewart, presided; and at the devotional meeting on Tuesday afternoon was assisted by Mrs. Colin Fletcher, Thames Road; Mrs. Currie, Belmont; Miss Panton, Oshawa, and others, who voluntarily led in prayer. A devotional meeting was also held on Thursday morning, which was presided over by Mrs. Fletcher, Hamilton; Mrs. J. Fraser Campbell, of Central India, and others taking part.

The Society had this year a very special privilege and pleasure in having present during the sessions five of our returned missionaries. On Wednesday afternoon, Mrs. Goforth, Honan, gave a touching address upon the needs of the women in China, urging that more single ladies be sent out to engage in the work. On Thursday afternoon, Miss Jamieson, Central India; Miss McIntosh, Honan, and Miss Baker, Prince Albert, gave earnest addresses on the work in their several fields. Mrs. Watt, of Guelph, spoke very earnestly on Auxiliary work, and Mrs. Mutch, of Toronto, contributed a thoughtful paper on work in Mission Bands. A map exercise was also given by Miss Mac-Murphy. At the close of the meeting on Thursday afternoon, Mrs. R. Ross, Lindsay, spoke a few impressive words, urging the members to expect a blessing on the work, and as all had been stimulated by seeing the faces and hearing the voices of our missionaries, fresh interest and stimulus be carried back to the Auxiliaries and Bands.

Owing to the illness of the President, Mrs. MacLaren, First Vice-President, presided at the sessions on Thursday.

Conference.

On Tuesday evening, the Board (comprising the thirty six Managers and Presidents of Presbyterials, Auxiliaries and Mission Bands) with Presbyterian Secretaries and Treasurers, met for conference on matters connected with the working of the Society. Several subjects were discussed; one, a resolution from Hamilton, to print the Presbyterian Reports, was sent down.

Letters of Greeting.

Mrs. Campbell, Corresponding Secretary, read letters of greeting from the Women's Board of Foreign Missions, New York; Presbyterian Board of Missions to the Northwest, Chicago; from Queensland Presbyterian Women's Mission Union in connection with the Foreign Mission Committee, Presbyterian Church, Queensland; from Canada Congregational Women's Board of Missions; from Rat Portage Auxiliary.

Reception of Delegates from Sister Societies.

Addresses from representatives of sister societies were delivered by Mrs. Scott, of the Woman's Board of Missions, Montreal; Mrs. Langford, of the Woman's Missionary Society of the Methodist Church; Mrs. Charles Stark, of the Woman's Missionary Society of the Baptist Church; and Mrs. Cowan, of the McAll Mission.

Training Home.

It was reported that a Committee of the Board had met with the Foreign Mission Committee and it was arranged that the latter should interview the Committee of the undenominational school already established. The result, however, cannot be known until after the Foreign Mission Committee meet in May.

Letter Leaflet.

Arrangements for the enlargement of *The Letter Leaflet* has been completed.

Public Meeting.

The public meeting was held on Wednesday evening in Cooke's Church. The gathering was a very large one, the spacious church being filled in every part. Mr. Hamilton Cassels, Convener of the General Assembly's Foreign Mission Committee, presided. The Rev. Dr. MacLaren and the Rev. Dr. McTavish conducted the devotional exercises. The Rev. Mr. Patterson, pastor of the church, on behalf of the Presbyterians of Toronto, extended a hearty welcome to the delegates. A report of the work of the Society was presented by the Rev. R. P. Mackay. The Rev. Dr. Gillespie, of New York, member of the Foreign Mission Board of the Church in America, gave a most eloquent address on "Woman's Work for Women." The Rev. J. F. Smith, M.D., of Honan, and Rev. J. Fraser Campbell, of Central India, spoke on the work in those countries.

Allocation of the Money.

1st. Moved by Miss Harmon, Ottawa, seconded by Mrs. MacNaughton, Cobourg, and agreed to: "That the sum of \$25,535.92, being the amount of estimate for the year, \$40,198, less \$14,662.08 already paid to Dr. Ried, be paid to the Foreign Mission Committee."

2nd. Moved by Mrs. Needham, Orillia, seconded by Mrs. A. Ball, Woodstock, and agreed to: "That, as usual, \$1,200 be transmitted through Dr. Ried to the Foreign Mission Committee (Eastern Division), half of it to be applied by them to woman's work in Trinidad, and the other half of it to woman's work in the New Hebrides."

3rd. Moved by Mrs. Hossack, Lucan, seconded by Mrs. McLean, Guelph, and agreed to: "That the further sum of \$15,000 be now paid to the Foreign Mission Committee to meet salaries and other expenses in connection with the W.F.M.S. as they become due."

Next Place of Meeting.

A very cordial invitation to hold the next Annual Meeting in Peterboro' was extended, and it was unanimously accepted.

Votes of Thanks.

Hearty votes of thanks were passed to the friends in Toronto and to the ladies of Central Church for their kind hospitality to the Trustees and Managers of Central and Cooke's Churches, to the organists and choirs, to Mr. Long for auditing the Treasurer's books, and to the railway companies for reduced fares.

PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS.

MY DEAR FRIENDS,—It is with a deep sense of unworthiness and at the same time of sincere gratitude to our Heavenly Father for all His manifold mercies towards us, and with joy and gladness of heart that we meet you, the members and friends of our loved society, at its 19th annual meeting, for your Board has statements to present which are of a most satisfactory and encouraging kind, and will be spoken to by the several Secretaries and the Treasurer in the afternoon.

Looking back over these nineteen years, how marked is the progress made in all departments of the work since its organization. At first, but a few earnest women, and to certain extent ignorant of the work they were asked to undertake, but strong in the desire to enter on what their sisters in the United States had already found to be a very blessed one, now to-day,—but here words fail me, when I attempt to convey to you the pleasure and gratitude that filled our hearts, as, at one Board meeting after another, we read the Presbyterian reports (as well as those not in Presbyterian order), and we realized more vividly than ever before, that numbers of our most gifted and earnest women, from one end of our country to the other, were rising to a clear, firm and enduring consciousness of their high privilege in being fellow workers with their much loved Master in bringing the world to Himself, that in their labor of love He was greatly blessing them and giving to each waiting heart the assurance: "Fear not I am with you to strengthen and guide you by My Holy Spirit."

My dear friends, I am sure you have felt and still feel intensely happy over the success that has crowned your efforts. The women of this society are staunch believers in missionary work, not only in this department of it, but in all the other schemes of our church; and all these years have been striving to fulfil their loving Saviour's last command, and because that has been done only in the strength and faith that is God-given; therefore He has blessed and made you to prosper, notwithstanding that much of selfishness and indifference have marred your best endeavors. Is not this true? And I am sure not one of you will be led aside from the path to which you have prayerfully pledged yourselves. We all believe that the kingdoms of this world shall yet be the kingdom of our Lord Christ Jesus, and will most gladly bring all the powers of mind and body to bear on each and every effort to hasten on that glorious time. Dear friends, will you allow me to say, how proud and yet humbled I feel to be the presiding officer of such a faithful, earnest and persevering band of women, for I well know how wanting I am in many of the requisites necessary for such a position. But I have tried to do my best, and I have received from the Giver of all good, health, strength and energy, a willingness to do and a happiness in using all in His service.

We are all delighted to see so many of the members present to-day, and give you one and all a very hearty and loving welcome. May our

Lord's richest blessing be with us while we remain together, so that we may each be enabled to say at the close: "It was good for us to be there."

Your Board has tried throughout all the year to give a close attention to the various matters entrusted to it by the last annual meeting, a large proportion of the members regularly attending the weekly meetings. Of these matters the proposed Training Home and the enlargement of the *Monthly Letter Leaflet* will be presented to you in the afternoon.

The deputation to the North-West was most successful and has given us an insight into the needs there, which no amount of correspondence could have done; besides placing us in strict communication with the North-West Committee in Winnipeg, in whose hands that part of our mission work lies. But the readers of the *Leaflet* will have noticed, it has, as one of its results, entailed on us a very large additional correspondence, and in some cases an overlapping of letters, so that in the early months of this year it became quite impossible, from want of time, to read them at the Board meeting, and the space they occupied in our *Leaflet*—even when cut down—was proportionately large. Owing to this, it was proposed to arrange the work so that there should be only one secretary for the North-West, who should attend to the General and Educational work, as well as the supplies, and that the Foreign Secretary should attend to the prizes for our schools in India and also any gifts for the hospital, thus avoiding the multiplying of letters to be written both by missionaries, teachers and secretaries. After considerable discussion the motion was "tabled," as it was thought we were not yet ready for such a change.

Very many questions and suggestions have come to the Board from secretaries and others. These have each and all been most carefully considered and replied to by the various officers. But there are also some which have come to the Board too late for consideration, especially as they will involve a very large amount of thought and also intercourse with the Foreign Mission Committee.

The decision at last annual meeting, to place \$10,000 in Dr. Reid's hands "to meet the salaries and other expenses in connection with our part of the Foreign Mission work," seems to have been misunderstood, and has given rise to many very unwarranted statements, which statements, coming as they did from ministers of our church, and others, gave your Board very considerable trouble, and for a time caused us some anxiety as to the result on the finances, lest they should fall short and we be unable to meet our liabilities. But the anxiety was only for a brief moment. Our experience of the loyalty and clear business habits of the officers of the various branches, satisfied us that they would understand from the treasurer's statement in each *Monthly Leaflet* that such statements could not be true, and our confidence has proved correct, as is shown by the financial report. However, we were obliged at last to ask the Foreign Mission Committee to publish an official statement as to the position of the W. F. M. S., and its relation to the Foreign Mission Committee and the General Assembly. It appeared in *The Canada Presbyterian and Presbyterian Review*.

We regret very much to be obliged to announce that Mrs. MacLennan, who has for the last eleven years held the office of Treasurer, retires at this time, circumstances obliging her to do so, though, I am glad to say, we may still have the benefit of her experience and advice

as a member of the Board. Need I say to this audience that this is a decided loss to the Society. You all know how well and faithfully she has performed all the duties of her position. We also regret the loss of another who had, as Assistant Home Secretary, been only a comparatively short time with us—I allude to Miss Shortreed, now Mrs. Horne—but who, we are assured, will, in her new sphere, continue to forward in every practical way the best interests of the Society, as she did while with us.

We are all no doubt watching very closely the events occurring in connection with the war between Japan and China, and specially are we anxious as to what may be the result with regard to missionaries and mission work, in both countries. May I draw your attention to a deeply interesting and encouraging account given by the Rev. H. Loomis, Yokohama, a well-known missionary of the Presbyterian Church in the United States, of the distribution of Gospels and Testaments among the Japanese soldiers and sailors, and to the Chinese in the prisons and hospitals in Japan, and which should stir up in each heart deep felt gratitude and praise to our Heavenly Father for putting it into the hearts of missionaries and others to attempt the distribution at this time, and controlling the wills of those in power, who so graciously and heartily gave their influence and authority to assist the distribution. Mr. Loomis' first attempt was in Hiroshima, the capital of Japan, taking a basketful of Gospels and riding through the city offering them to all the soldiers he met. Many received them gladly, and some professed to be Christians. This continued three days, and with the help of others more than 4,000 were thus given. Fortunately the distribution began on Sabbath, for by Monday evening large numbers left for the seat of war. An assistant secretary of the cabinet, and an earnest Christian, expressed his hearty approval of the work, and offered to send a supply to a Christian officer on board the Flagship for distribution there, and through him 3,000 Gospels and 50 Testaments were sent. Next Mr. Loomis obtained permission to visit the hospital in Na-go-ya, Osaka and Hiroshima, where the sick and wounded Chinese were; and to those who could read copies in Chinese were given and received with evident pleasure. Next, Mr. Loomis went to the Red Cross Hospital, in Tokiyo, Dr. McCarter going with him, who, having spent thirty years in China, was able to converse with the soldiers in their own language, explain the object of the visit and tell something about Christ. The men listened with deepest interest, and accepted the Gospel with thankfulness. Both these gentlemen testified that all these prisoners received the same care and attention as the Japanese did, and that the Empress ordered artificial limbs to be supplied to both. Finding the commander of the Tokiyo division friendly to his work, Mr. Loomis asked for liberty to distribute to the Japanese also. At once he said: "I have the authority, and willingly give you permission in this Division," and also proposed that as there were about 1,000 wounded and sick in the hospital with nothing to do, they should be supplied first. Then Mr. Loomis asked for the same privilege among the soldiers of the Imperial Guard, and not only was this given but the Commander-in-Chief, a cousin of the Emperor, kindly expressed both his approval and thanks for the work which the Bible Societies were doing. Finding so much favour, Mr. Loomis next went to the War Department, and asked Gen. Rodama permission to visit all the garri-

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sons in Japan, and supply the men with copies of the Gospels. This, too, was granted, and letters were written to the commanders of each division to give Mr. Loomis such assistance as he might require, and list of locations with the number of soldiers in each. The latest reports from Hiroshima is that four chaplains have been chosen to send to the army in China to teach the soldiers Christianity. The result of investigation into the character and conduct of the Christian soldiers being favourable, it was decided that Christianity be encouraged. On the 23rd February, 12,000 soldiers were drawn up at Nagoya, and after an address on the Bible and Christianity, each received a Gospel. About 30,000 Gospels and Testaments have been distributed already. On the 1st February, 20,000 more were to be ready for the Imperial Guard, and on the 10th, 40,000 additional. Mr. Loomis adds: "In the course of a month we hope to put a portion of Scripture in the hand of every soldier and sailor in Japan."

You may have heard also of the successful distribution of Gospels and Religious Tracts, by missionaries of several societies and native Christians, to the thousands of students from the higher ranks in China who enter for the triennial examination at Wu Chang and Nankin. The distribution began at 4 p.m., and lasted all night and all next day till 45,700 copies—all they had—were accepted by the students, knowing they were Christian books. The same was done at Nankin. All the packets were wrapped up in attractive Chinese covering, with congratulations and complimentary greeting. Each contained St. Matthew's Gospel, the Acts of the Apostles, with Religious Tracts, and were carried to all parts of the Empire to do their silent work.

Our annual special day of prayer was held in January last, and, although the day was unusually stormy, there was a very considerable number present, and it was found to be a very delightful and blessed one. We have also since the announcement was made in December by Dr. Reid and the Rev. R. P. McKay as to the funds for the several schemes of our Church being so far behind, set apart a portion of every weekly Board meeting for special prayer that all members of our congregations throughout our land might be stirred up to a sense of their individual responsibility in this matter, and we may hope that prayers arising from devout hearts all over our country will have entered into the ears of our Lord, and that the answer will be in largely increased funds before the end of this month.

The members of our Church are realizing more and more the deep significance of communion with our Lord in preserving prayer, and the following extract is encouraging to anyone who is mourning over her inability to do all she would in missionary work: "Jesus is waiting to bless us in our darkest hours if we but lift up our eyes to see Him. We think of Him as willing to help us bear trial, or to overcome sin in spiritual duties, but forget He will help us in our trials of business or work of all kinds. Language is often inadequate to express what is the desire of our souls. Deep, pure love is never able to put into words its most sacred feelings. It is specially true of prayer that we cannot utter its deepest and holiest desires. But we do know that God can hear thoughts. Do not trouble then. There is not the feeblest, faintest glimmering of a desire of our being but God sees it. There is not a heart hunger, nor a wish to be holier and better, to be more Christ-like, to live to God and be a blessing to others, or a desire to be rid of sin's power, but God knows it."

FOREIGN SECRETARY'S REPORT.

"They that sow in tears shall reap in joy. He that goeth forth and weepeth, bearing precious seed, shall doubtless come again with rejoicing, bringing his sheaves with him."—*Psalm cxxvi. 5-6.*

The days succeed one another so rapidly in the flight of time that life seems but a dream, a shadow, and truly our years pass "as a tale that is told." So, to those of our number who were privileged to aid in the formation of the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society, as we look back, it appears but as yesterday since we assembled, comparatively few in number, in Knox Church, nineteen years ago, to celebrate our first anniversary. Then we stood upon the threshold of the "open door" into the hearts and homes of heathen women, which the God of Missions has in these days set before the women of the churches. Now we look back, acknowledging God's goodness, and rejoicing in all that He has aided us to accomplish, and yet we know that we have barely "touched the fringe" of woman's work, in the lands, where the representatives of our Society have been laboring.

In speaking of this subject, the magnitude of the field yet untouched, Mrs. Isabella Bishop, in her address at Exeter Hall, November, 1893, remarks, that naturally among the workers at Home there is a disposition to look at the *work done*. This may, or may not, always, be true; but, guarded by this thought, while we do think to-day, gladly and thankfully, and rightly so, of the steady development of our Society, of the growth of its work, both at Home and Abroad, of the aid it has been our privilege to render the Foreign Mission Committee in the plans and operations of the Church for the salvation of heathen women and children; with humility may we remember that our work is only beginning, that we are still but standing on the threshold of the "open door," and may we think more, much more, of what we might have done, of what we ought to have done, of what we would have done, if *each individual member* of our Society had been faithful even in that which is least.

We now ask you to follow us for a little in thought while we attempt to "sum up," in so far as it is possible to do this, by records and statistics, the work of the missionaries, teachers and helpers supported by our Society in the various Fields.

Trinidad and the New Hebrides.

As usual, for a considerable period now, we have this year, contributed to the educational and Woman's Mission work of the Church, under the care of the Foreign Mission Committee, of the Eastern Division, in these islands. In Trinidad there are four principal Mission Stations—Tuna Puna, San Fernando, Princetown and Couva—in charge of five ordained missionaries, assisted by four Canadian ladies, who have the

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care of the schools at these points and in the districts adjoining. At various distances from these centres there are 52 native schools, under the direction of as many native workers, with about a total of 5,500 pupils in all the districts. Mrs. Morton's Girls' Training School has been closed during her absence abroad, but we learn that the girls are doing well, and some of them filling good and useful positions. Rev. Dr. K. J. Grant and Miss Blackadder have kept us to some degree in touch with those Mission Schools. In writing, a few weeks ago, Dr. Grant says: "For many years we have been indebted to the ladies of the West for a liberal annual donation, and we can only hope it may not be less this year." Dr. Grant also mentions the case of an interesting young Chinese girl, a Christian, who is desirous of studying medicine with the view of devoting herself to medical mission work in China. Her parents are willing that she should carry out her desire, but they are not in a position to meet the expenditure necessary for her training. We pray that the way of this willing young worker may be opened up in our Lord's own good time.

The New Hebrides.

Last year we celebrated the jubilee of Foreign Missions of our Church. Through the guiding hand of God, the Synod of Nova Scotia was led in 1844 "to embark in Foreign Mission enterprise." The field selected was the New Hebrides, and the first missionary sent, the Rev. Dr. Geddie. In this group, comprising about 30 islands, with over 150,000 inhabitants, speaking twenty different languages, Mission work has never been discontinued by the Canadian Church, and at present three of the eighteen (or more) ordained missionaries laboring on the islands are supported by her. The Stations of our Church are in Erromanga, Efate and S. Santo. Mission Schools, taught by native workers, under the supervision of the missionaries, are in operation at all these centres, and many children are receiving instruction. Early in the year, in an interesting letter, Mrs. Annand informed us of the first baptism at S. Santo, and later of the establishment of a workers' training school, under the care of Mr. Annand, at Santo, their field of labor.

Formosa (China).

Our estimates for this Mission cover an amount sufficient to meet the salaries of twenty-five Bible women, and the expenses of the Girls' School, including Coolies, repairs, food and clothing, in all not quite \$1,200. In this school about 40 women and girls receive training from year to year, and the work of the Bible women, who visit the homes of the women, is characterized by devotion, earnestness and success.

Honan (China).

Owing to Providential circumstances, a number of the members of the Mission staff in this Province have been obliged to return to the Home land; this, and the present war between Japan and China have completely set aside woman's work for a time in both Hsin Chen and Chu Wang, where it had opened up most encouragingly.

The staff has been reduced to four ordained missionaries, Rev. D. MacGillivray and Rev. W. H. Grant at Chu Wang with Rev. M. Mac-

kenzie and Rev. K. MacLennan at Hsin Chen. Mrs. Mackenzie and Mrs. MacLennan are staying for the present at Pang Chuang.

More than one home has been visited by sickness this year, and the Angel of Death has passed by, not without striking here and there a deadly blow, as the newly made graves in "God's Acre" at Kobe (Japan) and Tien Tsin will testify.

Rev. Dr. J. F. Smith was ill for many weeks, and had only partially recovered when at Arima, Japan, where he and Mrs. Smith, with others of the staff had gone for change of air, their little daughter May, "the sunbeam" of the household, and much beloved by all the missionaries for her winning ways, suddenly sickened and was gathered to the household above. Mr. and Mrs. Smith are in Canada now on furlough. On account of "little Paul's" health, Rev. J. and Mrs. Goforth, with the children, returned home in the early autumn accompanied by Dr. and Mrs. McClure. There were other instances of sickness, but the heaviest trial came to this faithful band of workers in October, when Dr. Lucinda Graham and Mrs. Malcolm (the former very suddenly, Mrs. Malcolm after a short illness) were called at Cheefoo, from mission service in China, to heavenly service, in the Eternal glory. It was trying to part with the little flowers that made "the compound" so bright with their presence; but it was harder still to see these two stricken down in their fresh, young womanhood, and at the beginning of what seemed to be an honored and useful career. They were lovely and pleasant in their lives, and all unite in saying they were pre-eminently qualified for their chosen life work; but it is very comforting to know, and all linked to the departed ones, both relatives and co-workers have felt this—that it is well with them, that they have "sighted the golden gates," that they sleep in Jesus, that with them it is "peace, perfect peace."

"Asleep in Jesus! blessed sleep
From which none ever wakes to weep.
Asleep in Jesus! far from thee
Thy kindred and their graves may be;
But thine is still a blessed sleep
From which none ever wakes to weep."

It is a very great satisfaction to know that all the dear bereaved friends have been graciously sustained while passing through these deep waters. The language of their hearts has been:

"Hush, be every murmur dumb;
It is only 'till He come.'"

Subsequently, Dr. Malcolm and Miss McIntosh returned home, the latter being much prostrated. The strain upon her nervous system, as for months she had been occupied with nursing first one, and then another of her co-workers, laid aside by sickness, was very great. We are pleased to state that these months of rest have done much for our wearied sister, and that she speaks cheerily of returning in the autumn, if the relations between Japan and China are of such a nature as to render this safe. Earnest prayer is offered that the Lord, by His Spirit, may call other Canadian women to go forth, in the place of those who have fallen, to this needy field. The testimony of *all* our ordained Missionaries is to the effect that woman's work in Honan is a necessity.

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They tell us that native women are now asking for instruction, but they must wait as there are no lady missionaries to teach them. Rev. J. Goforth, Dr. Malcolm, and Rev. J. Slimmon were able to leave some weeks ago for China, and it is hoped that the country may be sufficiently settled for them to reach the interior, that they may strengthen their brethren who are "holding the fort" so bravely in Honan. Not much aggressive work can be done at present, but our Missionaries are fully and successfully occupied in giving instruction in station classes to enquirers, of whom several have been baptized. The number of baptized native Christians now at the two stations is 14. Mrs. Goforth's little son is recovering, and she expects to go back to the field in a few months. She has rendered good service by speaking most acceptably of the Honanese women and children at various meetings.

Rev. J. H. and Mrs. MacVicar are still hopeful of returning to the work.

Vancouver Island (British Columbia).

Miss Johnston and Miss Minnes, still continue their earnest work in the Boarding School for Indian children at Alberni. There are from 20 to 30 names on the roll, and we learn that early in June the school was opened with 17 resident pupils. There have been cases of sickness, and several have died giving evidence of faith in Jesus Christ as their Saviour. The boys are doing very well with their industrial work, mending shoes, getting out wood, etc. We are requested by the Foreign Mission Committee, to contribute \$3,000 this year for a new building for this school. The plans have been approved by government, and Mr. Swartout, has been advised to lose no time, in beginning its erection. The site agreed upon is just beside the present building, which is considered one of the most beautiful spots in that part of the country.

Mr. M. Swartout, who was sent as missionary to Alberni in February, 1894, opened up a new station, in September last, at Uclulhat, farther down the coast. A school had been commenced there, by Mr. McKee, previous to Mr. Swartout's arrival. There are 45 children on the roll, of which 23 are between the ages of five and 17 years, and of the remainder, 19 are over 17 years. The work is hopeful; but Mr. Swartout urges that at least three other points should be occupied, at each of which there are about 250 Indians, all pagans. Mr. J. W. Russell has been appointed to take charge of the school at Uclulhat, and application has been made to the Government for a grant.

Manitoba and the Territories.

An event of more than ordinary interest occurred this year, in connection with our work among the Indians of the North-West, namely, the appointment of the Supply and Foreign Secretaries by the Board, at the request of the Society, to visit all the Reserves and schools in this Field. This seemed an appropriate step, in view of the fact, that our Society aids the Missions to the Indians, to the extent of many thousands of dollars yearly. The Board believes that the work of the deputation will be of practical value, not only to the Society, but to the Foreign Mission Committee of the North-West, as a number of "recommendations," the outcome of the visit, have been approved by the

Board and graciously accepted by the Committee. From personal observation, also your Secretaries are enabled to speak more accurately of the good service rendered by the missionaries and teachers, of their patience and devotion and the results, in so far as these could be judged by the opportunities this short visit afforded.

We have had the satisfaction of seeing Christian Indians living an agricultural life, contented, industrious, happy, and more or less prosperous, meeting together regularly to worship God in comfortable little churches. Again we have looked with sorrow upon pagan Indians, living a wild and careless life, ignorant, indolent, superstitious and abjectly poor, without God and without hope in the world. Again we have seen pagan children neglected, untaught, unclothed and half famished, running about the Reserves, and, in contrast to this sad picture, have watched with interest and joy, the development of the Indian children and youth in the schools. Children and young people, well fed, well clothed, well educated and trained in every respect, both for this life and that which is to come.

Before passing from this subject, we avail ourselves of the privilege of expressing, thus officially, the deep gratitude of the members of the deputation, to Rev. Prof. Baird and Rev. Prof. Hart, Conveners of the Foreign Mission Committee of the North-West; to all the members of this Committee; also to all the Missionaries and Teachers for the innumerable kind and thoughtful attentions which conduced to make this visit a happy and *ever* to be remembered one.

Presbyterian Indian Schools in the North-west are of three kinds, namely, day, boarding and industrial schools. The day schools are at Okanase, Man., Prince Albert and Mistawasis, Sask.; the boarding schools at Portage la Prairie, Birtle, Man., Crowstand, Round Lake and File Hills, Assa.; while our only industrial school is at Regina, the capital of the Territories. The instruction given in the day schools resembles that of our Ontario public schools, the difference being that time is given to manual trailing, and religious teaching occupies a large share of attention. In the boarding schools, in addition, we have the simpler forms of industrial work, such as farming, domestic science, house-keeping, etc., added to which there is the spiritual influences of the Christian home life. At the industrial school, the children and youth have all the above mentioned advantages, with technical teaching from competent instructors in the trades, etc.

Thoughtful minds, who are interested in the problem of Indian education, will hail with satisfaction the recent legislation, making attendance at schools compulsory among the Indians. Sickness or the certificate of an agent or teacher, to the effect that the child is needed at home, will relieve the parent or guardian from the enforcement of these regulations. Doubtless this law will be enforced in a humane and kindly spirit; if so, only good can result therefrom.

The school and Mission work at Stoney Plain have been transferred to the Methodist church of Canada. The buildings will be taken at a valuation.

Rev. Geo. Flett, who was associated with Presbyterian Missions in the early days, both at Prince Albert and Fort Pelly, has resigned, on account of the burden of increasing years. Mrs. Flett has ever been a faithful helper, and their work has been blessed at Okanase. Another missionary will be sent in due time.

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Rev. W. A. Lewis, of Mistawasis, is leaving this Mission on account of the ill-health of Mrs. Lewis, who was obliged to return to Nova Scotia some months ago. Mr. Lewis, who has had our prayerful sympathy during these months of anxiety, leaves in May, when his place will be supplied by the Rev. W. S. Moore, of Lakesend.

Rev. Geo. Arthur, who has just completed his studies at Halifax, will be placed in charge at Lakesend, and it is understood that the Lakesend Boarding School, which has been closed for some months, will be re-opened on his arrival.

We also note with sorrow and sincere appreciation of their services, the resignations of Mr. MacLaren, of Birtle School, Mrs. Leckie and Miss Russell, of Regina School, and Miss Scott and Mr. John Whyte, of Crowstand School. Mrs. Leckie and Miss Russell were very much broken down on account of the strain of responsible work, but since their return to Ontario, they have been gradually regaining strength. The Foreign Mission Committee of the N.W. is now arranging plans for the opening up of woman's work at Indian Head, and it is expected that Mrs. Leckie will be settled there before the year is far advanced. The advisability of taking charge of the Mission on a Soux Reserve near Deloraine is at present also under consideration.

We remark, before describing individual schools, that in all these Mission Schools, Bible study and daily instruction in doctrinal and practical Christianity, occupy a prominent place—that industrial training is given daily, and practised by the children, as facilities and appliances afford opportunity—that the English education is of a high order, and that each school is a Christian home in the fullest sense of the word, having all the elements of a pure and loving family life.

Portage la Prairie Boarding School.

In this school there are 24 resident pupils, the average attendance in the class-room for the December quarter being 20. Three of the elder girls have united with the church this year, and good impressions are being made in the minds of the younger children. The building is very inadequate, and the Northwest Committee, counting upon our assistance, has decided to erect a new one. The plans are in preparation, and there is every prospect that the hearts of our workers will be cheered by its completion this year. With the very able assistance of Mr. Edward Brown, a very interesting Gospel Service is held at the Soux village four miles distant. A pretty church was erected this year, and from 60 to 100 attend every Lord's Day. There are two communicants, one man having been received this year. The teepees are visited regularly, with good results. Miss Fraser and Miss Laidlaw are very earnest and untiring in their labors, using to advantage the moments as they fly, and they have the sympathy and the co-operation of Mrs. McLeod and other members of the Auxiliary.

Rolling River.

This Mission was established fifteen months ago under the care of Mr. W. J. Wright. There is no school, but the parents may send their children to the Birtle Boarding School. So far none have been sent, as the prejudices in the minds of pagan Indians against sending their

children from home for training yield very slowly. Mr. and Mrs. Wright, with Miss Armstrong (Mrs. Wright's sister), have endured many hardships in the opening up of the work here, but now they are very comfortably settled in a new Mission House. Already Christian teaching and influence are yielding good results. New dwelling-houses are being erected, old ones whitewashed and cleaned, opposition is giving place to confidence and friendship, the services are more numerously attended, and a marked advance in attention and reverence for prayer and the Word are observable. The women are very ignorant and superstitious. Mrs. Wright has started a weekly sewing class, and a weekly prayer service is held, also a class of adults for the study of the Syllabic. There are quite a number of children of school age on this reserve.

Okanase.

This may be called a Christian reserve, as it is now 22 years since the Rev. Geo. Flett entered upon his labors here. He has witnessed the power of the Gospel in changing these Indians, to some extent, from a state of pagan barbarism to Christian civilization. The day school on this reserve is in the care of Miss. M. S. McIntosh, who stands deservedly high in the affection of both children and parents. She is assisted in the industrial training by Miss Jackson. The number of children on the December quarter roll was 16, average attendance 14. Since the holidays the attendance has been even larger. Several of the older girls are well advanced in their studies, and they take great delight in "fixing up" their homes, in knitting for the family, and in other ways making a practical application of the knowledge gained at school. The school building is prettily adorned with Kindergarten work. An interesting Sunday School is held, except in midwinter, and the homes of the children visited by our teacher. A weekly service has been commenced recently, part of the time being occupied by Mr. Boyer in teaching the adults to read the Syllabic character. Chief Moses Burns and his head men are in full sympathy with all the Christian and educational work.

Crowstand Boarding School.

The mission and school on this reserve are in the care of Rev. C. W. Whyte, who is ably assisted in caring for and training the children by Miss K. Gillespie, Mrs. Lochart and Miss Henderson. The attendance has increased since the new year, as in February the number resident was 39, the daily average 35. A Kindergarten class of 10 "little ones" has been formed and very good work is done, and both boys and girls are very systematically trained in house and garden work. The evenings are pleasantly spent in the dining room, and these children take an intelligent interest in what is going on in the world. The work among the adults has been specially encouraging since the opening of the new Church on Cote's Reserve. The Indians gave considerable help in building the Church, and it is to them a source of very great satisfaction. The services are well attended every Lord's Day. Chief Cote and the head men are friendly to the mission. Mr. D. MacVicar has a class in the Syllabic, and several of the young men have learned to read in Cree. The Indian women have raised about \$30 to help in furnishing the Church.

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Birtle Boarding School.

The number now resident is 31, average attendance 29. Visits to reserves in the vicinity have resulted in this increase of pupils. Mr. Neal Gilmour was appointed Principal in September last, Miss MacLaren and Miss McLeod assisting in the supervision of the children with special regard to their home life and duties. Dairying will be begun at the school as soon as the spring opens. The children attend the Sabbath School at the Presbyterian Church in Birtle, and the Pastor, Rev. Mr. Frew, has a weekly class at the school. In a recent examination in the Commandments the average of marks obtained by standards 3 and 4 was 80 per cent. Mr. Gilmour has visited Lizard Point, a pagan Reserve, 20 miles distant, regularly, and held Gospel Services. Hugh McKay, one of the older scholars, is employed in a printing office in Birtle, and Hagar, now a young woman, superintends the sewing-room at the school, while others assist in the housekeeping. These are some of the results of Miss McLaren's wise and patient training in past years.

Birdtail Reserve.

Rev. John McArthur ministers with faithful attention to the Indians of this Mission. There is a comfortable little church and about 20 communicants. The Christian Indian women here are very devout and earnest. The names of Mrs. Big Hunter, Mrs. David, Mrs. Bun, Mrs. Hanske and Mrs. Ben being all well known to us. Several of the children attend the Birtle school, others have been sent to Regina.

Round Lake Boarding School.

For more than ten years now Rev. Hugh McKay has patiently and prayerfully labored among the Indians of Round and Crooked Lakes, and in addition to the adult work has superintended the school, and the outside industrial training, of the boys. There are 23 resident pupils, and the children are making good progress under the well directed efforts of their teacher, Mr. Wm. Sahlmark. Mrs. McKay acts as matron and leads a busy life with this large family to think of and work for. Early and late these earnest women (matrons and teachers in these Indian schools and missionaries in the fullest sense of the word) labor with their hands, and in the midst of their toil take time to warn, admonish, correct, encourage, approve and love the children for whom they are responsible, thus laying a good foundation for the future up-building of character. At a Communion service recently held at "Gaddies" a young girl, a former pupil, was baptized, an evidence that the good seed sown is bearing fruit. The home life is very blessed and happy.

The work on the Reserve is arduous and often discouraging, but "Missionary McKay" is greatly beloved and his words, which are always listened to attentively, will not be lost. "They that sow in tears shall reap in joy."

File Hill's Boarding School.

This is a very interesting school, and, under the excellent management of Mr. and Mrs. A. Skene, good results are manifest. Since the

New Year, three new pupils have been added, making the number 13. Mr. Skene is a teacher of ability and experience, and the presence of his own children in the class-room is of immense advantage to the Indian pupils. The home life is very helpful, there being a wise admixture of firmness and affection. The Indians are nearly all pagans and miserably poor, there are no services held. One of the little boys died this autumn after a short illness. Our workers here are very much isolated; indeed it is scarcely possible for us to understand the "aloneness" of the situation.

Lakesend Boarding School.

Rev. W. S. and Mrs. Moore, have been settled here for a number of years, doing good and faithful work. A pretty and commodious church was built some time ago on Pasquah's Reserve, and services are regularly held at Muscowpetung's and Piapot's. Mr. and Mrs. Moore are now leaving for Mistawasis. The Indians feel their departure very much, as they have learned to value the labors of their missionary. The school has been closed since June last, but Mrs. Moore has had a very encouraging Sunday School. Upon the arrival of Rev. Geo. Arthur, arrangements will be made to re-open the school.

Regina Industrial School.

The educational mission work here is so many sided, and the appliances are relatively so complete, that it is impossible, in the short space at our disposal, to give any very correct idea of either methods used, or results secured.

Rev. A. J. McLeod, the able Principal, and Mr. Stewart, the Vice-Principal, are assisted by a well-qualified and painstaking staff. The instruction in English is in the hands of Mr. D. C. Munro, who has charge of the senior department, and Miss Nicholl, who takes the place of Miss Lily Russell in the Junior school room. Upon Mrs. Leckie's withdrawal, Miss Kate Cumming, industrial instructress, was appointed matron, and Mrs. Moffat, of Calgary, takes Miss Cumming's place as head of the sewing department. The trades and various kinds of industrial work, both for boys and girls, are taught by men and women who are both experienced and capable. There are 125 resident pupils, and the institution is a little world in itself. They have their own Sunday services conducted with beautiful simplicity and impressiveness, a model S. School, with Bible, infant and intermediate classes, a Mission Band and Missionary Society, a Boy's Brigade, an Orchestra, Temperance, Literary and Debating Societies, and twice a month a well-edited Indian Missionary magazine, called *Progress*, is issued, printed entirely by the boys. Mrs. McLeod, who takes a deep interest in all the work of the school, is President of the Girl's Mission Band. There have been several cases of serious illness through the year, and some have been taken to the Heavenly Home, happy in the love and grace of Jesus, their friend and Saviour. The building is taxed to its utmost capacity at present. It is very encouraging to know that many of these young people are giving evidence of having passed from death unto life.

Prince Albert.

The day school here, established by Miss Lucy M. Baker, has this year been under the care of Miss Annie Cameron, Miss Baker's visit having been protracted on account of ill-health. Miss Cameron's efforts have been very successful, and the school is increasing in numbers and interest, and will continue to do so as the prejudices of the Indians who are still pagans are removed. The number on the roll is 25, average attendance 11. The names of several young men and lads are on the roll, but these are obliged to earn their own living and cannot therefore attend regularly. It is pathetic to see these young men laboring to acquire a knowledge of the English language, and patiently repeating text after text from the Bible. John iii. : 16, is a favorite text. The government has given the Indians a grant of land about seven miles distant from the town, and this spring an effort will be made to occupy it to some extent. The government has also promised aid in the erection of a school house on the reserve. This will be much more convenient, as Miss Cameron now has a daily walk of between seven and eight miles. Miss Baker, as health would permit, has visited a number of our auxiliaries this year, and by her touching account of early struggles in the Indian work has deepened the interest in many hearts. Rev. Wm. Rochester, Mrs. Rochester, and other members of St. Paul's Church, Prince Albert, take a practical interest in this school.

Mistawasis.

The Indians on this reserve may be spoken of as a Christian community. Rev. A. W. Lewis has been ministering to them for the past two years with good results, as during that time eight have been received on confession of faith. Old Chief Mistawasis is himself a simple-hearted, consistent Christian, waiting for the call of his Master to come up higher. Many of the families are fairly well-to-do, and comfortable in their surroundings. The little church and graveyard are kept in beautiful order by the women. The day school, under the care of Miss Laura McIntosh, has been prosperous, the attendance being larger than usual; number on the roll 21, average 15. The industrial work of the girls is excellent, and several of the pupils are very bright and promising, a credit to their painstaking teacher. Rev. W. S. and Mrs. Moore are expected to arrive in May.

Pipestone.

The Mission here, under the care of Mr. Peter Hunter, has made good progress. With the assistance of our Society, a comfortable school building and church combined, with rooms above for the Missionary, was erected last autumn. The building was opened for worship on Christmas Day, and since, a few children and adults have been gathered in to receive instruction. The Indians are friendly to the Missionary and Christianity. The Lord's Day services are well attended. Rev. Wm. Beattie, the pastor of the Verden congregation (20 miles distant), and the Y. P. S. C. E., have greatly strengthened the hands of Mr. Hunter by timely counsel, especially in the building plans and arrangements.

CENTRAL INDIA.

The year opened discouragingly, as several of the members of the staff were completely prostrated by sickness, and as the weeks grew into months, others were called upon to endure severe bodily affliction. Rev. W. J. Jamieson, Mrs. Jamieson and Miss Jamieson returned to Canada by the advice of physicians, arriving in May, having remained some weeks in San Francisco. With very great gratitude, we state that both Mrs. and Miss Jamieson are almost fully recovered; and Miss Jamieson has been addressing, with good results, numerous meetings in the Province of Quebec.

In the midst of promising plans for future service, Dr. Maggie McKellar was called aside to "rest awhile." Dr. McKellar describes this "waiting time" as very precious and blessed to her spiritual life, and after six months prostration she was graciously raised up to continue her work under the guidance of the great Physician.

Rev. J. and Mrs. Wilkie, came home for a short season of rest, as Mr. Wilkie had been overworked during the previous months. They returned in September. Rev. N. H. Russeil was seriously ill for a number of weeks with typhoid fever. From recent letters we learn that his tour through the District has greatly increased his strength.

Rev. J. F. and Mrs. Campbell have been in Canada some months now on furlough. Mrs. Campbell has visited several of our Auxiliaries, and given addresses on Woman's Work in India to attentive audiences.

With sincere sympathy for Dr. and Mrs. Woods, we speak of the fact that the little babe, who had come into their bungalow, to gladden their hearts, was suddenly gathered home, leaving them bereaved indeed.

The health of Dr. Marion Oliver gave the Board considerable anxiety in the autumn, and it was feared for some weeks that she would be unable to return to India. Prayer was answered in her behalf, and in October she sailed, accompanied by Miss Kate Campbell, our new missionary. Both arrived safely and Dr. Oliver has resumed the charge of the Canadian Woman's Hospital at Indore. She will be assisted by Dr. McKellar. Miss Campbell will reside at Neemuch and at once begin the study of the language.

Dr. Oliver is in good spirits and writes that she was never happier in her work.

Mrs. Wilkie and Mrs. Russell have been "good correspondents," and we are sincerely grateful for interesting letters received frequently.

Mrs. Wilson has also sent us a valuable letter, giving an historical account of Rutlam, where Rev. W. A. Wilson and Mrs. Wilson are now settled.

From Mrs. Wilkie we have heard the interesting story of the movement among the "Mangs," which commenced some two years ago. While some fell away during Mr. Wilkie's absence, the majority remained faithful, even, though subjected to severe persecution and since his return, there have been many additional baptisms. The drawing of the *depressed* classes in India at present to the Lord Jesus Christ, as presented in the Gospel, is very striking. It reminds one of New Testament times, when "the common people heard Him gladly." The Sunday School work is very encouraging, especially in Indore and Mhow, where hundreds of children assemble regularly on the Lord's Day to learn about Jesus the Son of God. Miss McWilliams has re-

covered her usual health, and has given inspiration to many Societies by her earnest words. The Board has recommended her to the North-West Committee for service in that Field.

As we enter upon a description of the personal labours of our missionaries, it is important for us to explain that in all the work, medical, educational and Zenana, the *one* object is to help the sufferer to the Saviour, who alone can heal the sin sick soul, and to teach the child or the woman in school or Zenana the blessed truths of our glorious Gospel.

Canadian Woman's Hospital.

Indore.—Dr. Margaret O'Hara has continued the supervision of the Hospital until the month of January, when Dr. Marion Oliver entered upon the duties. God has graciously bestowed upon Dr. O'Hara the blessing of excellent health, and she has entered with great energy and delight into her work, which has borne good fruit. The number of in-patients during the year was 210, of these 46 were Christians, 58 Mohammadens, the remainder Hindu. The number of patients treated in the Dispensaries was 7,417; number of treatments, 18,572; houses visited, 154; visits, 467; obstetric cases, 62; amount received for fees,

enjoyed good health. Janbai was married in October, and her place was filled by Gowbai, one of the boarding school girls. Rebecca returned to her father in November. Her position was filled by Mettie, the daughter of the matron, whose services have been so efficient, and Hettebai has been employed in the City Dispensary. A morning and evening service, at the beginning and at the close of the dispensary work, has been held daily for the study of the Word and prayer. This has been very helpful in deepening the spiritual life of the workers. On Saturday evening a class is held for the study of the Sunday School Lesson, and on Sunday morning the matron and one of the workers take the lesson with the in-patients, the servants, and the native Christian women living in the compound. Hettebai has a class of women in the city dispensary, and Dr. O'Hara, with one of the workers, conducts the city Sunday School and a young men's Bible class. From this Bible class one young man has this year, joined the church on confession of faith, and a second, a young Brahmin, a few Sundays ago, in the presence of the class, confessed his faith in Jesus the Son of God. On Tuesday evenings a class of over 30 boys, under 15 years of age, is held, and the meetings are bright and helpful. One of these little boys, Rajoo, died recently trusting Christ, and since then, other, two boys of this class have united with the church. Two women in-patients in the hospital for a long time have confessed their faith in Jesus as their Saviour. On two occasions Dr. O'Hara was called to attend the wives of Rajpoot Chiefs, residing 60 or 80 miles distant. She was accompanied by Miss Dougan, and they had the privilege of telling the Gospel story to the women of these zenanas for the first time.

Dr. Agnus Turnbull, in the earlier part of the year, gave efficient help to Dr. O'Hara in the woman's hospital, and superintended one of the schools at Indore. Since July, she has been in Neemuch, taking charge of the medical mission work, at this station, and assisting with the school and Zenana work.

Boarding School and Marathi School.

MISS SINCLAIR, *Teacher.*

The number of girls now resident in the Boarding School is 28. Gowbai, the only one who left the school this year, is employed at the Woman's Hospital, and though not a promising student, is reported as being very willing and helpful. The number of promotions was 19 in Hindi and 12 in English. There are now 5 in the 5th standard, 7 in the 4th, 4 in the 3rd, 7 in the 2nd, 2 in the 1st, besides three little girls who are too young to attend school. Besides the three girls baptized some weeks ago, one has recently united with the Church, making in all seven communicants. Miss Sinclair is encouraged by the good results of this work.

At the Marathi School the attendance has been good, seldom falling below 80 daily. In the cold season the number is considerably larger. The number of promotions was 61. An increasing number of children from year to year bring their own books and slates, which is an advantage. Miss Sinclair has been able to give more than the usual amount of supervision to the school this year. Miss Sinclair left Indore for a well-earned furlough on February 28th. One of her co-workers, in writing of her departure, says: "We shall miss Miss Sinclair very much, and I am sure all her workers and our whole Christian community will feel her departure. My earnest desire and prayer are that I may do my work as faithfully and well and as much for the Lord as she has done hers."

Miss White will take charge of the Boarding School during Miss Sinclair's furlough. Miss White expects soon to pass her first examination, and in addition to her studies has had the satisfaction of being able to assist materially in mission work, having taken charge of the sewing class for the Mang women and the industrial work at the Boarding School; also, the class of English-speaking young men in the college morning Sunday School. These Mang women have improved greatly both in appearance and manners, and recently several of them came forward for baptism.

Miss Grier writes that though busy with her studies she has given a portion of time since July to the supervision of Dr. Turnbull's school, on account of her appointment to Neemuch. This school is principally attended by low caste girls. The number on the roll is 47, average attendance 35. The ages range from two years to thirteen, and only two of the girls are married. A Scripture lesson is given daily, and at a recent examination upon Bilbe subjects, three of the girls, received first prize, and five, second.

Miss Dougan, while closely engaged in the study of the Marathi language, has found time to visit several Zenanas regularly, to aid in the medical work at Neemuch, and since July to assist Dr. O'Hara. She will probably take charge of the Marathi School while Miss Sinclair is on furlough.

Medical Mission Work at Mhow.

DR. M. GRANT FRASER.

The medical work in connection with the Mission in Mhow is now well established, and as the population is not large, there is not much further scope for expansion. The regular work opened up some two years ago in Barwaha, has succeeded beyond the expectations of the workers, and

is full of encouragement. Barwaha is a native town, in an agricultural district a few miles from Mhow. The Bible women are very favorably received, and thoughtful attention is given to the teaching of the Word. A sewing class has been started in Mhow, in connection with the medical work, and is a source of much benefit to those attending.

Miss Fraser employs three English assistants—Miss Bayly, who superintends the work in Barwaha; Miss Louis, who is engaged in Mhow, visiting the homes of the women, holding meetings with them and doing outside dispensary work; and Miss Harbour, who takes entire charge of the work in the dispensary, without salary, and only from love to Christ and the cause of Missions. The native helpers are Gungabai, Taibai, Beekabai. Francesbai, Dr. Fraser's tried helper for three years now, was obliged to give up the work in September last. Dr. Fraser speaks very highly of her consistency and faithfulness.

STATISTICAL REPORT.—Dispensary treatments in Mhow, 11,690; in Barwaha, 3,927; medical patients treated at home, 722; in villages, 329; total treatments, 16,688. Bible Work—Total number of people present at all meetings, 9,729. The aggregate attendance is given, because it seemed better in many instances to gather the women together for a meeting, rather than visit from house to house. Dr. Fraser has been very earnest and self-forgotten in her work.

With patient faithfulness, Miss Ross has continued her educational work in Mhow. The attendance has been large but very irregular, on account of sickness, indifference of parents and poverty. These difficulties, Miss Ross says, continue a living foe to study and classification, and she acts upon the idea that the best classification is to give the children lessons whenever their presence can be secured; very many of the pupils read well. The average attendance from June to November was 83, from November to January, 101. The number of children in the Kishnapoora School is about the same as last year; the women's meeting there has been held regularly with much interest. The Girls' S. School is held on Sunday morning, with an attendance of from 73 to 104. Miss Ross' Bible woman has recently succeeded in opening a school at Barwaha.

Miss Calder is proving herself a most useful and efficient worker. The Pensionpura School has been continued with a better attendance, and the children have improved greatly in manners and obedience. A successful women's meeting is held regularly, with an increased attendance. Miss Calder is assisted in the Pensionpura work by Miss Lisby, an Englishwoman. After considerable opposition, new work has been opened up at villages called Old Mhow and Kackepura. The building used for a school was formerly a cattle shed, and one-half of it is still used for that purpose. In connection with the school work in these villages, Miss Calder has been dispensing medicines and treating patients, 513 cases having been relieved since December. Many of the patients come from distant villages and while waiting for medicine, they hear the Gospel either sung or spoken. In this medical work, a native Christian woman as helper has been most useful.

Medical Mission Work at Neemuch.

DR. MARGARET MCKELLAR.

After her recovery, Miss McKellar devoted herself, with her usual earnestness, to her labors in Neemuch. She reports the camp and

city dispensaries as having been open the whole of the year, Sundays excepted, the one in the afternoon, the other in the forenoon. During Dr. McKellar's absence, Mrs. James and Louibai did faithful work, under the encouragement and direction of Miss Dougan. In August, a new impetus was given by the appointment of Dr. Agnes Turnbull. The Bible women have held meetings regularly, with the patients waiting for treatment. Dr. McKellar speaks with regret of leaving Neemuch, but rejoices in that she was honored in being the pioneer medical missionary to the suffering women there. Since opening up her labor of love at this station 2½ years ago, she has given 33,384 treatments, and the daily attendance has grown from 7 to 150, 218 houses visited and 646 visits paid. No conversions are reported, but a deepening of intelligent interest in Bible truth.

STATISTICS FOR THE YEAR.—New patients, 3,880; treatments, 15,014; patients visited in homes, 46; No. of visits, 134; fees *Rs.* 142, *a* 14; sale of medicine, *Rs.*, 98, *a* 0, *p* 3. Donations, *Rs.* 88. Total—*Rs.* 328, *a* 14, *p* 3.

Miss Duncan has devoted herself successfully to the supervision of the Chamar school. About 50 are in attendance now, nearly all the children of the Mohulla, having been won. The attendance at the city schools has been between 20 and 30, the people being very indifferent. The new school building was opened in October. Some of the larger girls have been put into Jurdah, but they can still be reached by the Bible women. The camp school, is still in charge of the same faithful teacher. The Zenana work has been specially interesting.

As usual in past years, the members of the Foreign Mission Committee, and the North West Committee have aided us materially in this department of our work with encouragement and wise advice, and Rev. R. P. Mackay and Rev. Prof. Baird have been specially kind in answering questions and giving information whenever called upon.

This may seem a very full and complete statement of the labors, the encouragements and the difficulties of the representatives of our Society in the foreign fields, and yet it is but the barest outline, which must be filled out between the lines. It is satisfying, however, to know that our Heavenly Father knoweth *all* that has been done so quietly and lovingly in His name both at home and abroad and if the outcome of a pure motive, has received it as done unto Himself. While the money, the time, the strength, the service, are all precious to Him, and needed in the great work of carrying the Gospel to the heathen, let us not forget, that one may plant, and another may water, but it is God who gives the increase and that the greatest force that God has placed at man's disposal is Prayer. "If ye abide in me, and my words abide in you, ye shall ask whatsoever ye will, and it shall be done unto you."

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HOME SECRETARY'S REPORT.

Our mission sheaves for 1894-95 are garnered, and now, for a few moments, we are permitted to look back over the field of our labours. In doing so we shall see how graciously the Lord of the harvest has led us, and have opportunity to apply the lessons presented to us in our successes and failures. The year, like its predecessor, has been a very trying one in financial affairs. Retrenchment has been called for in almost every department of work. But, although strictest economy has been demanded of and exercised by many members of our Society, the Master's work was not allowed to suffer, and to-day it is our privilege to report advance over previous years—advance in devotion and zeal as well as in liberality. The standard has not been moved forward without struggle. The hosts of indifference and opposition have presented their usual resistance, and in not a few instances have discouraged timid workers. But the good hand of our God was upon us to shield and help, and to Him, with grateful hearts, we ascribe all praise for the successful issue of our past efforts.

Presbyterial Gleanings.

The efficiency of our Presbyterial organization cannot be too highly commended. The officers have conscientiously and effectively planned and carried on the work. Presbyterial annual meetings appear to have been most ably conducted, and must surely prove a stimulus and help to the workers. Only one note of complaint reached us, namely, that some of our women failed to make themselves heard when speaking at these meetings. It is unfortunate that this should be the case, for it matters not how good the paper or address may be if it cannot be heard by those to whom it is read or spoken. Many Auxiliaries report helpful visits from Presbyterial presidents and others, special reference being made to the good effected by the addresses of Miss McWilliams, who visited a large number of Auxiliaries in several Presbyterials. Mrs. Fraser Campbell, Mrs. Goforth, Dr. Marion Oliver, Miss Jamieson, Miss Baker, Miss Walker and our Foreign and Supply Secretaries have also done most excellent service in this way. The reports of Presbyterial secretaries are in most cases so full that there remains little more to present in regard to the general aspects of the work. But, as the abstracts of Auxiliary reports are not to be published this year, it may here be in place to notice a few of the items that have hitherto appeared in that form in our Annual Report.

Auxiliaries

One had a Visiting Committee of two appointed each month to visit those not connected with the Society, with a view to interest them in missions and invite them to their meetings. "St. Andrew's," Perth, invited four neighboring Auxiliaries to meet with them in September. Representatives from each took part in the programme. This interchange of thought was helpful. Some Auxiliaries report little bands of workers, in outlying districts, auxiliary to them, thus encouraging and strengthening the work where otherwise it could find no entrance or power to exist. Others hold their meetings in different sections of the district, so that all may be reached and interested. A good many have adopted the method of appointing, a month in advance, one or two members to take charge of the next meeting, and have found it satisfactory. This plan should be of value to our Society in training efficient leaders, and in making less frequent the disbandment of Auxiliaries and Bands for lack of officers. One Auxiliary reports the editing of a column of mission news in the local weekly paper, seeking in that way to interest others. One feature in the reports that has excited our admiration, is the way in which little bands of women persevered in the work, though confronted by many difficulties. Three Auxiliaries report only four members; in one, the average attendance was four, and contribution over forty dollars; one, with six members, says, "We would not for a moment think of giving up the work"; another, "We cannot give up our meetings, coming together for prayer has been such a blessing to us;" still another, "It was urged that we give up the work for a year, as our church required so much help, but it was decided unanimously that we could not afford to do that." Some were unable to meet during the winter months on account of impassable roads and long distances to drive, yet not a few of them sent in good contributions, in that way giving evidence of unabated interest. "Beulah" Auxiliary has sent us the same amount as last year, although its numbers are now reduced to five. Rev. J. McArthur writes: "This Auxiliary certainly has not the helpful influence of large numbers to inspire them in their work, and their grinding poverty would be an excuse to many white people for not trying to contribute anything to missions. But the fact that they are banded together as a missionary society, helps to keep them from burying their one talent. One of the members died a few weeks ago. In her life she had much sorrow and affliction, but unlike many Indian women, equally afflicted, she had a kind, Christian husband, who showed his kindness to her, and tenderness for her to the end. The end, we believe, to her was peace. Her cheering words, indicating her strong faith and bright hope, give us good reason to believe that she has gone to be one of whom it is said, "These are they who came out of great tribulation and have washed their robes and made them white in the blood of the Lamb." The secretary of the "Purab ka Tara" Auxiliary has sent us her report, beautifully written in Hindi. It was accompanied by an English translation, from which we glean that the work has prospered with them. Each month, from thirty to forty were in attendance at the meetings. The Bible woman engaged by this Auxiliary, has done her work with great ardour, and gave a report of it at each meeting. Their contribution is considerably in excess of previous years.

Mission Bands

have on the whole reported more fully than in former years, and in some respects show marked advance. In several of the Presbyterial Societies not one Mission Band is missing, and earnest faithful work has been done by many of them. Mission study seems to have had a fair share of their attention. A "geography match" on Trinidad is reported as pleasing and profitable. The "talent" system was worked in several bands. In one, 26 cents were distributed among the members, the aim being that each should earn one dollar in order to become a member of the General Society. Seventeen succeeded in doing so, and one earned enough to make herself a life member. Various methods of raising funds are reported and we feel that a word of caution may not be out of place just here. It is desirable that the children should be encouraged and trained to give for missions that which costs them effort and self-denial, but wise oversight is needed to ensure that only such means shall be employed as are fitting in the Master's service. Occasionally we hear of methods being used which indicate that the true spirit of giving has not been sought for nor attained. Such cases are now comparatively rare, and we trust will soon be unheard of amongst us. One Presbyterial Society has lost a number of its Bands, various reasons being given for their disbandment. It is always with deep regret that we learn of our young folk growing weary or faint-hearted in this work. There is in it so much of culture and blessing for them, and their bright young lives are needed in the work to give hope for its future prosperity. We would earnestly urge upon the Auxiliaries to take a deeper interest in the Mission Bands; they require and should receive fostering care from the mothers in the work, and not be allowed to dwindle and die of neglect. There is no part of our work that has in it greater possibilities than that of enlisting and training our young folk in this Christian service. Last year we urged the appointment of Presbyterial Mission Band Secretaries, in the hope that through such special agency more attention might be given to the Bands. The suggestion does not seem to have met with general approval. Possibly the time has not fully come for this addition to our staff of officers, but there can be no doubt that the time is now here that demands the fostering care of the Auxiliaries for the Juvenile Bands. Some of the reports speak of the advantage it was to the Bands that enjoyed such oversight and care. It is not intended, however, that the Juvenile Bands should lose their identity in the Auxiliaries. The mistake has been made of adding the amount contributed by the Band to that of the Auxiliary, the former appearing as though it had not contributed. In every case the Bands should be credited in the Presbyterial Report with the amount given by them.

Membership.

We are unable to report with anything like correctness in regard to the number engaged in the work of our Society. It was hoped that the tabulated form for the use of Auxiliaries and Bands would greatly help in securing a correct statement. That hope has been verified to a certain extent, but there is still much room for improvement. One mistake that appears to have been very general is the entering of one person as a member, in more than one column of the "form." This

should not be. Auxiliary members should be entered in the Auxiliary column; General Society members in their own column, and *in no other*. Life members who join during the year should be entered in the column set apart for them, and *in that only*. Life members of former years should be entered in the General Society column and should not appear in any other. It would be well in all cases to state total membership of Auxiliaries or Bands when sending in reports. Many of the Secretaries do not seem to realize the importance of reporting fully and correctly. Much additional labour is given our Presbyterial Secretaries through this neglect. Time and strength are wasted and there is also loss to the Society in additional postage, etc. All Secretaries should make it a matter of conscience to give every detail asked for and without unnecessary delay. Presumably, we engage in this work for love of the Master, should we not then manifest our love by faithfully performing the smaller as well as the larger duties assigned us?

Many touching incidents are recorded in the reports of trial and loss. Devoted, faithful officers and members have passed from earthly service. Their genial presence and helpfulness have been much missed and their removal mourned, as is testified by the loving tributes ascribed them in the reports. They have ceased from earthly effort, but their influence is still a living voice calling those who are left to earnest, faithful endeavour in the Master's service. In several instances sickness has seriously interfered with the progress of the work. The removal of efficient leaders to other spheres of labour has been cause of discouragement to those who had learned to lean upon them, and, in a few cases, has led to "disbandment." Disappointment and discouragement came to some through the loss of their carefully gathered funds. In one instance, a bank failed in which was deposited their contribution; in another, the funds of the Auxiliary and Band were stolen by the manservant when the Treasurer and her husband were from home. We have truly sympathized with these sufferers and many earnest prayers have been offered on their behalf.

The isolated Auxiliaries in most cases report advance. One Band and one Auxiliary were organized. One Auxiliary in British Columbia was unable to continue the work, and one Band has not reported. No report* has reached us from the Scattered Helpers, Richmond Church, B. C. The Society has received valuable aid from them in former years, and we regret their loss. The Scattered Helpers, on the whole, are better reported than last year, but there are still a few cases in which the number appears without the contribution, and others in which the amount is stated and the number of "Helpers" omitted. Now that columns are provided in the tabulated form, we shall expect correct reports in future.

We regret that we cannot report a more general observance of the day for special prayer. It should be recognized as an established feature in our work, as is the Thankoffering meeting. The latter is esteemed one of our special privileges, and is reported to be the means of interesting and enlisting many in the work. Much more of interest is to be found in the reports, but our time for retrospection is past. It is now

our privilege to take a pre-view of the new year. The outlook is more expansive than ever before, and the call for help more urgent. New fields are ready to be worked, and hearts are longing for the light and help that can only come to them through the Gospel of Christ. We are debtors to all who thus need our aid and must either carry the message ourselves, or help to maintain those who do. It is, therefore, plainly our duty to press forward, even though many difficulties and failures impede our progress. We know that the unerring hand of God is ever guiding, and that ultimate success is assured. Let us then *wait* upon the Lord, that our strength may be renewed and that we may be enabled to run and not be weary, to walk and not faint, and so accomplish our part in hastening the time when our blessed Saviour "shall see of the travail of His soul, and shall be satisfied."

REPORT OF SUPPLIES TO MISSIONS.

"I was naked and ye clothed Me."

"Inasmuch as ye have done it unto one of the least of these My brethren, ye have done it unto Me."

Some may think that clothing a poor, shivering body is not mission work, but our Master has said that He counted such work as done unto Himself, and that those who have engaged in it from love to Him and a desire to bring others to a knowledge of His love, will one day hear Him say: "Come, ye blessed of My Father."

The poor Indian can and does appreciate the love which sends the warm clothing to cover his nakedness during the severe cold of our Northern winter, and he is more willing to hear the Gospel from those who have first ministered to his bodily necessities.

During the past year about 28,000 lbs. of strong, warm clothing, quilts, blankets, etc., have been sent to the Northwest for the children in our schools and the men and women on our Reserves. This is less than the usual amount, but the falling off is accounted for by the recommendation of the North-West Foreign Mission Committee last year that a smaller quantity of clothing for adults be sent, as there was some doubt in their minds as to the advisability of providing clothing for able-bodied men and women, even in return for work done or supplies for the Missions.

In view of this recommendation, and also on account of the many conflicting reports coming to us regarding the supplies, it was decided at our last annual meeting to send a deputation to the North-West to visit the different schools and Reserves where mission work is carried on by our Society, in order that our members might know from the personal observation of its delegates the true state of affairs. This was done, and every station was visited by your delegates. All clothing remaining over from last year was examined (consisting principally of short, tight-fitting jackets about which so much has been said), and after receiving information from our Missionaries, the Indians under their charge, as well as from personal observation of the needs to be met, the conclusion arrived at was that too much clothing had not been sent. There was no clothing "moth-eaten, moulding and going to waste" on any of the Reserves, and our Missionaries were unanimous in saying that without these supplies they could not carry on their work. One writes: "When you decide to withdraw the clothing, you had better go a little further and recall the Missionaries." And another says: "Without the clothing sent by the W.F.M.S. last year many would have perished." When we saw the destitute condition of the

Indians, and the lack of employment by which they could earn the necessary food and clothing, we could easily understand that the burden of caring for these poor creatures without the clothing sent by our Society would be too great to be borne, for not only do our Missionaries carry to those under their care the "Bread of Life," but they must care for the body as well, and their own means are drawn upon to a large extent for this purpose. One writes, "That it costs more to feed the starving Indians than all the children in the school." We were obliged to appeal to our Societies for an additional supply for Round and Crooked Lakes Reserves, as the amount first sent was not sufficient. We thank them for their prompt response. Two or three other Reserves were short, but could get on for the present. The supply of clothing for boys was not at all equal to the requirements.

In several cases outfits for the children made from measurements sent by the Missionaries have been prepared by Societies. These have been a great help, as in many of the schools it is impossible to procure any assistance in the household work, and when we think of the lack of the conveniences to which we are accustomed and the hardships inseparable from the severity of the climate, we will realize how much such help is appreciated. We trust that many who have hitherto taken no interest in this work, and who could render valuable assistance, will aid us during the coming year.

We are glad to report that the money paid for freight on supplies for the Indians, amounting to \$603.83, has been refunded by the Indian Department, who thus show their appreciation of this part of our work.

We would earnestly request the Secretaries of Supplies in the different Presbyterial Societies to observe very carefully any instructions in regard to the shipping of clothing that may appear from time to time in our Letter Leaflet.

We desire again to thank our Societies in the East for their valuable assistance. St. James, N.B., St. Stephens, N.B., Scotch Ridge, N.B., and last, but not least, Salt Springs, N.S., have sent valuable contributions. When we opened the box from the latter place and saw the sixty girls' dresses of homespun and gingham, and the homespun shirts for boys, we were indeed grateful, and divided the contents between the schools at Round and Crooked Lakes and Portage la Prairie, where they will save our lady missionaries many hours of work.

Chalmers' Church, Que., sent their usual box to Mrs. Morton's School, Trinidad, and Ormistown and St. Lambert, Que., sent contributions to Rev. W. S. Moore, Lakesend School.

The Mission Bands in Toronto and Hamilton Presbyterial Societies and in Goderich and Cobourg, sent gifts and prizes to our schools in Central India and also some supplies to the Women's Hospital at Indore, where they were found very useful.

Some of our Societies in the North-West and British Columbia have sent supplies also, but as we have no report we cannot give details. The record of the year's work is closed and its results are known only to our Father in Heaven, but He has said that Christ "shall yet have the heathen for His inheritance and the uttermost parts of the earth for His possession."

PUBLICATION.

Once more we are called upon to record the work of the Publication Department for another year. We do so with gratitude and thankfulness, and would devoutly acknowledge that all the success we have met with, all the good influence this Department has exercised over the Society, every good resolve made is due to the Giver of all Good, who has owned our weak efforts to enlarge and help forward the work He left for His children to accomplish : His last commission to His Church, to make known His great love and His willingness, that all should be brought to know that there is Salvation in Christ and in Him alone.

The *Letter Leaflet* still continues a source of interest to the Auxiliaries and Mission Bands; almost all the Presbyterian Societies report increase in numbers. Still we are made to feel, when examining our order lists, that quite a number of our Auxiliaries are willing to be without its helpful influence, thus depriving their members of that information which would be sure to deepen and nourish a love for the work. We cannot work to any purpose in any walk of life if we are in ignorance of the work. No Society can be a live one, who from time to time does not make itself acquainted with the work of our Missionaries. These letters that come from the Missionaries are for you, the members of the Society, only sent to the care of the Board. Any member who feels indifferent whether she reads them or not, cannot be a help either to the Society, or a living worker in the Master's cause.

The issue of the *Letter Leaflet* is now 13,160. But during the coming year may we not aim at having it in every home connected with the Society. The price is within the reach of every one.

At the last Annual Meeting the Board was instructed to consider the enlargement of the *Leaflet*. It has done so, and in your February *Leaflet* you have the result of this consideration, as also the form it is proposed to take. The mind of the Board is to enlarge in size, but not in price; all feeling that if the price were advanced, the circulation would or might decrease, thus lessening its influence. The *Leaflet* has never aimed at any thing more than being a mode of communication between the Board and the Society. In May, 1894, we had a new contract for the printing of our *Leaflet*, which, considering the extent of the issue, we got on more favourable terms. But as the size of the page will be considerably increased a new estimate for 1895-96 had to be asked for. It will cost about \$200 a year more than we have ever paid for it before, but, as you will see from the state of the funds, the Board was warranted in making this addition.

We have received from sales of *Letter Leaflets* \$1,513.12; our payments have been \$1,268.54. Of this sum \$246.32 was paid for expenses of delegates to the North-West, leaving a balance of \$336.94

as surplus for the year. Perhaps some one may say, Why not spend more on the enlargement of the *Leaflet*? This would be a mistake at the present time. The *Leaflet* ought to be conducted on a proper commercial footing, for what periodical spends all it receives from its subscribers. Are not their expenses so calculated as to cover rent of office, salaries, etc.? Any business that did not make this provision, would not be conducted in a proper manner.

The publication, like all other departments of the Board, is worked free of charge. The time may come when it cannot be so done. We trust the day is far distant when we shall have to resort to paid officers. These things considered, we feel it is quite legitimate to have a surplus to pay over to the General Treasurer, to our Band of Willing Helpers, who assist in mailing the *Leaflet*. We say it is work for the Master, which service, if rendered aright, will not fail of its reward. May we not ask of each secretary to do all she can in her Auxiliary to have our *Leaflet* in the hands of all the members, especially the younger ones, who must be preparing to take up the work when others are called to lay it down.

Literature.

The past year has been more than usually marked by a desire on the part of the Auxiliaries for information regarding the different fields occupied by our Missionaries. We are indebted to our Foreign Mission Committee for help in this part of our work. The valuable pamphlets on India, Formosa, and the Catechism, by the Rev. R. P. McKay, have been much in demand. These, along with the History of our Work by the late Mrs. Macdonnell, and the interesting leaflet on African Missions by Mrs. McLeod, have all been helpful, and supplied a want felt by many who were anxious to gather all the information possible regarding our work. The testing little Leaflet, "The Measuring Rod," has gone into many of our Auxiliaries. May we hope its lessons have been felt? The Thank-offering Envelopes and Leaflets speak through the Presbyterian Reports of the part they now take in helping forward the work. The Thank-offering meeting is now looked forward to as one of the most delightful meetings of the year, all feeling that "it is a good thing to render thanks to the Lord;" 20,565 Envelopes, along with 15,000 Leaflets were sent out for these meetings. The contribution envelopes are quite in advance of previous years, 6,088 having been sold, showing, we trust, more systematic giving on the part of our members. The mite boxes are short of last year. We have sent out 61,205. This, along with 13,393 of free literature, makes a total of 74,598. We have received \$433.81 from sales and disbursed \$401.16, leaving a balance \$30.31 to add to the \$336.74 from the *Letter Leaflet* Fund, making a total of \$368.19 that has been paid to the Treasurer. You will see from the disbursements that the publications also paid the expenses of the delegates to the North-West. The treasury of the General Society was empty at the time; while the Publication had a good sum in the bank to their credit.

We have printed for the Annual Meeting, by permission of the Board of Foreign Missions, New York, 1,000 copies of that delightfully told story "Mr. Great-Heart, or the Life of Dr. Geddie." We have also on hand the "Life of Dr. Paton." There has been printed what should be of great use to the officers of Auxiliaries and Mission Bands—Mrs.

Byers' paper on "How to Conduct a Mission Band," Miss Shortreed's "Paper to Mission Bands," Miss Drummond's paper on the "Work of Officers," and the valuable paper read at Ottawa by Mrs. Grant of Orillia. A Leaflet, "Beginnings at Mud Creek," will be useful to those sending supplies to the missionaries, being the experience of a returned missionary regarding the boxes sent to the mission fields. In all we have added seven to our already large stock.

Our maps have been sought after, but we regret very much the loss of our map maker. Forty-four of the maps of the New Hebrides, Trinidad and India have been sold.

We close our report feeling that this small part of the work has been owned by the Master in helping forward the work of the Society, and we would go forward trusting that the blessing He alone can give may descend in double measure upon this part of the work in the coming year.

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REPORTS OF PRESBYTERIAL SECRETARIES.

BARRIE.

MRS. NEEDHAM.

In the first report of our Society we find that it numbered eleven branches, two hundred and eighty-six members, with a contribution of \$337. Now, at the close of our eighth year, we rejoice to report forty branches, over one thousand members, with a contribution of over \$1,200. During the year four Auxiliaries and four Bands have been organized. Thus, year by year, our work moves quietly on, the outcome of a natural healthy growth, each faithful member helping in her own humble way, without detracting from other important claims. Many who began the work or accepted office, with fear and a sense of weakness, have developed talents hitherto latent and are now efficient workers.

We glean from the reports that a loyal spirit prevails throughout our Society. Two features worthy of note are the increased average attendance at the meetings and a more careful and systematic manner of preparing for and conducting them. We have reason to believe that the excellent papers read and discussed at our last annual meeting have not been without their good fruit. One secretary writes: "This has been our best year since organization; we have had no difficulty in finding members willing to take part." Another: "Our president appoints a committee of two to prepare the programme, and we find the plan successful." The reports indicate a more thorough knowledge of the specific aim and object of our work and a desire for more accurate information concerning our missionaries and their fields. The Mission Bands are in a thriving condition, more especially those which have helped to contribute to the North-West supplies. The unusual number of references in their reports to systematic study of Foreign fields is highly commendable. One Band of boys has disbanded, or rather outgrown their privileges in the W.F.M.S. All our branches, with the exception of two, report General Society members and the envelope system of contributing. Our Presbyterial fund has been liberally sustained. The establishing of an expense fund in fully one-half of our Auxiliaries has no doubt helped to maintain the former in a vigorous condition. Nine bales of substantial goods were sent to the Portage la Prairie school—a good part of the material was new. Four hundred and seventy *Letter Leaflets* were subscribed for, and five dollars were realized from sale of literature at our Presbyterial meeting. Eight of our Auxiliaries were privileged to hear an excellent address from Miss McWilliams, and her earnest words will not soon be forgotten. The Thankoffering service has become an established feature of our Auxilia-

ries and Young Woman's Bands. The excellent results, spiritually and financially, are too far-reaching to be fully estimated. The impressions made at these meetings often tend to increase of membership and to fuller consecration. With us another period of time has passed, and, we trust, a round higher in the ladder has been reached. It becomes us with all humility to examine ourselves in regard to our individual part in this work. May we, with the feeble light with which we see, show others the way of life.

Ruskin says: "Do you believe in the prayer you utter, 'Thy kingdom come.' Do you want the kingdom to come? If you do not you should not utter that prayer. If you do you should do more than pray; you should work for it all your lives." Let us, then, with thankful hearts, go on, being mindful not to "weary in well-doing, for in due season we shall reap if we faint not."

BRANDON.

MRS. J. MURRAY.

The eighth annual meeting of this Society, held in Knox Church, Portage la Prairie, on June 5th, was well attended and very interesting. The large representation from the distant Auxiliaries proved the wisdom of the resolution changing date of meeting from March to June.

The reports for the year are on the whole encouraging, and testify to growing interest in the work.

Thankoffering meetings have been held in a large number of the Societies, and a day of special prayer for missions has been observed in others.

Three hundred and twenty-two copies of the *Letter Leaflet* are distributed each month, and the *Missionary Review* subscribed for in several of the Auxiliaries. One new Mission Band has been organized.

During the year a bale of clothing was sent to the Indians on Rolliver River Reserve.

Two or three of our Auxiliaries, which have done excellent work in the past, have recently become discouraged and fear they must give up the work. While we sympathize with those who, few in number, have met with special difficulties and disappointments, we would urge them not to be weary in well-doing, remembering that it is to the two or three met in Christ's name that the blessing is promised, and that it is "not by might, nor by power, but by the Spirit of the Lord" that His work shall be carried forward.

BROCKVILLE.

MR. GREENHILL.

As Auxiliaries are now formed in most of the congregations connected with this Presbytery, we can not look for much increase in the number of societies. The effort is rather to encourage their growth in membership, interest and liberality. With this object, the President, warmly seconded by the Vice-President and others from the stronger

auxiliaries, have visited many, if not all, the weaker ones, cheering, counselling and aiding each by every means in her power. A large number of reports refer to these visits in the most kindly terms and testify to the help and encouragement which have been given in this way. We are sorry that we cannot report much increase in the aggregate membership.

The fact that we have not fallen behind last year in contributions in these times of well-known financial stringency is an indication that whatever we may do elsewhere, we have not begun to economize in our Master's work. By far the larger part of the money is raised by voluntary contributions, most of the societies using the envelope system and twenty-five report a Thank-offering meeting. This annual offering has grown to be an important factor in our revenue. Quite a number report systematic study of the mission fields, lives of missionaries, Bible study, etc. This educational work is the promising feature of the Juvenile Bands and is referred to in almost every report. We are glad to have three Bands added to our list, all doing well. One new Auxiliary was organized at Ventnor by our President, another reorganized at Mainsville, and both send satisfactory reports and have good prospects for the coming year. We now number twenty-eight Auxiliaries and twelve Bands, and, with three or four exceptions, they show unabated interest in the work to which they have set their hand. Two life members were added during the year. The *Letter Leaflet* is distributed monthly in four hundred and forty-three families.

The Scattered Helpers scheme, which is intended to reach those so situated as not to be able to attend the meetings, is reported in only eight Auxiliaries, but by this means fifty-two families are interested through the Leaflet who would not otherwise be so. Two or three report the observance of the special meeting for prayer, recommended by the Board, and herein we are conscious of our weakness, for if we fully believed that "More things are wrought by prayer than this world dreams of," as one secretary quotes, we should have less cause to regret our own leanness, and that more of our women are not taking a part in this work.

CLOTHING.—The estimated value of the clothing sent to the North-West was over \$400, and the weight 960 lbs. Special instructions were received by the packing committee, which was in Prescott this year, as to repacking, listing and valuation of goods, which were carried out to the letter, and as a result the cost of shipping, which has always been a serious expense, was refunded by the Indian Department at Ottawa through Mrs. Jeffrey, the secretary of supplies. This action on the part of the authorities seems to be ample proof of the value which they set upon it. A great deal of time and attention have been given to this department of work, and so important was it considered that a deputation of two ladies, Mrs. Jeffrey and Mrs. Harvie, was appointed by the Board to visit the Indian missions and schools of our Church in Manitoba and the Territories. Besides securing information on all matters connected with the missions and strengthening the bonds of sympathy, they are now better able to judge of the condition and needs of each.

Not a few Auxiliaries report the loss of valued officers and useful members by death and removals. In the smaller societies especially

these changes are keenly felt, and we extend to such our sincerest sympathy.

Especially do we mourn with our widowed Honorary President the loss of him whose unselfish help and sympathy were always given in preparation for these meetings and whose last public act was a benediction to the W. F. M. S. at its annual meeting in Prescott. I refer to the Rev. Geo. Blair, M.A.

Let us gather from these strange providences the lessons they are intended to teach, and with renewed zeal and earnestness do with our might what our hands finds to do, for the night cometh when no man can work.

BRUCE.

MRS. FERGUSON.

The seventh annual meeting, held in Knox Church, Tara, September 6th, was a very successful one.

There was a good attendance of delegates and others interested. The work is gradually increasing. During the year one Auxiliary has been organized and one Mission Band, but we are sorry to add that one Mission Band has been discontinued for the present.

The membership shows a slight increase; there is also an increase in contributions. Interest seems to be well sustained, nearly all report interesting and profitable meetings.

A number of the Auxiliaries had the great privilege of a visit from Dr. Marion Oliver, and they speak of the stimulating effect her presence had upon them, and their increased knowledge of the work in India. Mrs. Johnston has visited among us also, and many of the reports speak of the interest and enthusiasm awakened by her visit and address. Three boxes and one bale of clothing were sent to Rev. Mr. Moore on Pasquah's Reserve.

Four life members have been added during the year. We are glad to note the increasing number of Thank-offering meetings that have been held. They continue to grow in favor. The *Letter Leaflet* increases in circulation yearly. Our desire as a Society is that the year upon which we have entered may be one of increased interest, more faithful work and warmer love to Him who has said: "Inasmuch as ye have done it unto one of the least of these my brethren ye have done it unto Me."

CHATHAM.

MISS L. McNAUGHTON AND MISS WALKER.

In presenting our report, we gratefully recognize the guiding hand of our Heavenly Father. From the various reports received we believe that the missionary spirit is deepening, from the fact the members take up the systematic study of Foreign fields, by preparing papers quoting missionary facts, and giving map lessons. They also write that they were cheered and enthused by Miss McWilliams' address, and greatly helped by the visits from Miss Stone, Mrs. Walker and Miss Walker.

One new Auxiliary has been added during the year, and we hope before long to have one in connection with every church in the Presbytery.

We are glad to note from the reports the account of the Thank-offering meeting, which is prayed over, little self-denials made, then the giving. Our Lord said, "It is more blessed to give than to receive." We regret that we have not done all that we might have. If these be earnest words, let us prove our disappointment by faithfully giving to our Master this coming year, *more time, more prayer, more money.*

We have in our Society twelve Mission Bands, two of which have been organized during the past year. In comparing their reports with those of the previous year we find that, on the whole, there is a decided improvement. Two Bands show a falling off in membership and contributions; still we do not feel discouraged, as those who attend are deeply interested in the work. One Band shows a decrease in contributions, but the attendance is as large as formerly. The work has been discontinued in one Band; but word has been received from the Auxiliary to the effect that they expect to re-organize it again next year under a new staff of officers. Owing to two of the congregations uniting, it was thought best that the Mission Bands should unite also, and make one strong organization. In almost all the reports we find that the children were much interested in making quilts, collecting toys, dressing dolls, etc., to send to the schools in the North-West. We have great cause for thankfulness in the encouraging reports of the work done in nearly all our Bands during the past year.

GLENGARRY.

MISS A. M. CLINE.

The annual meeting, held in Alexandria, June 6th and 7th, was most successful. Eighty-five delegates in attendance, not including the ladies of Alexandria. Vankleek Hill has been appointed for the 12th annual meeting.

It is with feelings of great thankfulness to God that we submit our report of 1894 and 1895, for, contrary to our expectations, we are in advance of last year—twelve Auxiliaries making up the deficiencies of others. Our secretaries, with one or two exceptions, have been more prompt in sending in reports and sent them in more fully than any previous year, thus enabling us to form a clearer idea of the work of our Society. We have gained one Auxiliary, but having lost one we remain the same as before, viz., twenty-five. Two Mission Bands were organized, making in all nine; and in this branch of our work we regret to find a falling off in contribution. The Scattered Helpers show a large increase over last year. Our membership is greater and the average attendance better. Besides the amount of clothing given by Auxiliaries in tabulated form, a quantity of strong homespun flannel was sent from Presbyterial Society; that is to say, a number of Auxiliaries supplied the yarn, and the weaving was partly paid for out of our Presbyterial funds. In addition to this, \$10.50 was expended upon blankets to help

relieve the extreme want felt on Mr. McKay's Reserves, owing to failure in the crops.

Leaflet Secretary reports, two hundred and forty-six letter leaflets taken by twenty Auxiliaries; therefore there are still some societies that do not subscribe for it at all. We would urge upon all the advisability of doing so, as it is in every way worthy of our attention.

GUELPH.

MISS KERR.

It is with a thankful heart that I bring before you our tenth annual report. Several of our country Societies, already small, have been depleted by removal of families to towns; others report beloved members as either "taken home" or laid aside for a time by illness.

One Auxiliary has been disbanded. One Mission Band has been absorbed in its Auxiliary; four others have disbanded. The reasons are, principally, homes so scattered that regular meetings are impossible, or so much dependence on grown-up officers, who have guided and planned, that if they are removed by any cause there is no cohesion. In some Societies the membership and giving has been greater than last year, in others less. Still, taken as a whole, the giving of our Presbyterial is a little in advance of last year.

Nearly all the reports speak of warm interest in the meetings, of the larger number taking some part in them, pleasure in reading missionary reports and letters, and learning about workers and work done; the pleasant Thank-offering meeting, sewing for our North-West bales, and in many places spiritual interest deepened.

Different Societies and congregations have during the year been visited by Mr. Goforth, Mr. McVicar, Mr. Wilkie, Mr. and Mrs. Fraser Campbell, and Miss McWilliams. In the autumn, Miss Bessie Walker, formerly of Regina Indian School, in an organized series, visited most of our Auxiliaries. Her addresses were exceedingly helpful, as she is the first of our North-West teachers whom, as a Presbyterial, we have had the pleasure of knowing face to face.

Though all our Societies did not contribute this year, 1,200lbs. of good useful clothing and new material were sent to Mis-ta-was-is day school.

The *Leaflet* Secretary reported that nine hundred and fifty-one copies of the *Letter Leaflet* had been taken. Only three Auxiliaries were reported as not taking this useful missionary paper. \$114.12 had been sent to Mrs. Telfer.

HAMILTON.

MISS FINDLAY.

The work of the past year has been very quiet but steady, nothing unusual having happened. Most of the reports are encouraging; some very hopeful, and nearly all wish for still greater results in the future. We have one new Auxiliary, Chippawa; and three new Mission Bands: Welland, Strabane, and Central Church Senior Band, Hamilton.

The Thank-offering meeting has now become a recognized feature of the work, and it is specially mentioned as being most enjoyable and profitable.

Four Auxiliaries mention having Scattered Helpers in connection with their work, and think in that way greater interest is kept up among those unable to attend the meetings.

We regret that there is a falling off of five Auxiliaries, and a decrease of fifty-seven *Leaflets* as compared with last year.

The call for clothing and material for Birtle School met with a most hearty response, nearly all the Societies contributing. Five bales and two cases, weighing 1,000 pounds, valued at \$596.18, were shipped.

At our annual meeting, held in Central Church, Hamilton, two most interesting addresses were given by Mrs. Goforth, of China, and Mrs. Jeffrey, who spoke of her recent visit to the North-West.

HURON.

MISS H. I. GRAHAM.

The tenth annual meeting of this Society was held in Carme Church, Hensall, on the 15th of January. Every Auxiliary and Mission Band was well represented, and there was besides a large attendance of ladies.

In 1893 there were six life members added. This year there were only three, which accounts for the slight decrease in the contributions.

The reports from the various Auxiliaries and Mission Bands were most encouraging, and showed a growing interest in the Master's work.

We are pleased to report the addition of the Sunshine Mission Band during the past year. There are at present in connection with this Society, fourteen Auxiliaries and seven Mission Bands. In all probability the Young Woman's Mission Band, Goderich, will be amalgamated with their Auxiliary during the coming year.

Thank-offering meetings have become a regular institution in all our Auxiliaries. They increase in favor every year and are the means of stimulating our members to greater consecration and benevolence.

The work of preparing clothing for the Indians is entered into heartily by our Auxiliaries and Mission Bands. In some places sewing meetings are held at stated intervals in order to further the work. A large quantity of goods of excellent quality was sent to Cote's Reserve in September last.

Our Auxiliaries and Mission Bands have been greatly helped and cheered by a visit from our esteemed President. The Scattered Helpers are only used in one Auxiliary.

We deeply regret the retirement of our Presbyterial secretary, Mrs. J. R. Lyon, who has served in this capacity since the organization of the Huron Presbyterial Society, and to whose faithful and efficient services much of the success of our Society is due. In parting with her we pray that God's blessing may rest upon and abide with her in whatever part of the vineyard her lot may be cast.

KINGSTON.

MISS FOWLER.

It is with feelings of deep thankfulness to our Heavenly Father that the officers of this Society present their eighth annual report. We have met with discouragements, but on the whole the progress made by our Auxiliaries, both in membership and contributions, has been marked. Most of the reports speak of increased interest, a greater willingness to take part in the meetings and a more general desire for missionary intelligence. In some of our country Societies, especially where the members live some distance apart and find it hard to attend meetings regularly, we would note the perseverance of the few faithful workers.

Thank-offering services have become a prominent feature in our work and are generally found of great value in stimulating the interest and increasing the membership. One new Mission Band was organized, and we welcome one new life member. In two Societies, Lansdowne and Tichbourne, no meetings have been held for some months, but the secretaries write that they have started again, and look forward to good work in the coming year.

A few of our Societies were favored with visits from two of our lady missionaries, Dr. Marion Oliver and Miss Baker. As our clothing was sent to Miss Baker, we feel an especial interest in her work. Eight hundred pounds of clothing, including complete outfits for nine girls and fourteen boys, were sent to the North-West. Forty-five copies of the *Letter Leaflet* were subscribed for. Prayer cards and other literature were also distributed. In a few Societies the Scattered Helpers' scheme was used successfully.

We again acknowledge, thankfully, our annual subscriptions from Mrs Shibley, of Harrowsmith, the Ladies' Missionary Society of Deseronto, and from two ladies in Pittsburgh.

We are glad to report an increase in our contributions, and trust that these outward signs of progress and prosperity are indications of a growing interest and zeal in the advancement of our Master's kingdom among the women of our Presbytery.

LANARK AND RENFREW.

MISS L. J. STARK FOR MISS SINCLAIR.

Another year in the history of our Presbyterian Society has passed away. That it has been a year of blessing we can not doubt, and in submitting our twelfth annual report we acknowledge that the good hand of our Heavenly Father has led us through these months in the enjoyment of much spiritual good, giving us advantages for growth in grace that are not granted to the many, and by which we are all the more laid under the deeper obligations to honor and serve Him whom we call Lord and Master.

None of us liveth unto himself. "To live for self is opposed to the very genius of Christ's religion." Christianity is love, universal, unbounded love, embracing within itself the present and the everlasting

interests of man, and the more we partake of its spirit the more entire will be our consecration and the more unreserved will be our activity and service. Our happiness will consist in doing good, and our minds will rest with complacency in the end which we contemplate.

We have organized one Mission Band and reorganized one Auxiliary. Beachburg Band is not working. Our Society now numbers thirty-eight Auxiliaries and eighteen Mission Bands.

Twelve Auxiliaries and Mission Bands were visited by the President, Mrs. Stewart, and her words of cheer and encouragement to the workers resulted in great good to all.

The call for clothing for the North-West did not meet with such a hearty response as last year. Ten bales, weighing twelve hundred and fifty pounds, were shipped to Crowstand Reserve.

Six hundred and thirty-nine *Letter Leaflets* were distributed each month.

LINDSAY.

MISS MACLENNAN.

The thirteenth annual meeting of our Society was held in Sunderland, February 19th, with over a hundred delegates present. The year '94 has been one of financial depression, which has told somewhat upon the offerings of some of the Auxiliaries, but we are thankful to report that on the whole there is an increase in contributions over last year. Our membership has also increased, but we regret that the average attendance is smaller. The majority of our Auxiliaries is in rural districts, and in unfavorable weather it is not always possible for the members to attend the meetings. Two Auxiliaries and two Mission Bands have been added during the year. Three Auxiliaries have not reported. The Mission Band reports do not speak of much advance, still all have reported and seem to have done fairly well. Two Auxiliaries report a circulating library. One Auxiliary, reduced through removals to four members, reports that the few who remain take a lively interest in the work.

LONDON.

MISS L. M. FRASER.

The reports from our Auxiliaries and Mission Bands are even more encouraging this year than formerly. Interest in the work grows with the work itself. From every Society in the Presbytery comes the voice of thanksgiving with the consecrated Thank-offering. In many cases the average attendance at monthly meetings has been small, but the little groups here and there composing Auxiliary and Mission Band have worked on cheerfully, not in the least discouraged, but hoping to be able to report an increased membership and a larger attendance in the coming year. Since our last annual meeting five new Auxiliaries and two Mission Bands have been added to our number. This is by far the largest increase that we have had for many years. While we warmly welcome the new Societies, we all feel cheered and strengthened by the increased numbers.

We have now thirty-four Auxiliaries and twelve Mission Bands, in all forty-six Societies, and hope for a few more accessions in the near future. Five hundred *Letter Leaflets* have been subscribed for. Clothing for the children in the Regina Industrial School, with bed and table furnishings, weighing 2,200 lbs., was sent by the Secretary of Supplies in August, nearly all our Societies contributing. For the special list asked for, \$156.41 were expended by a committee appointed to purchase. This money was supplied by a few Societies who were asked to contribute for this special purpose.

On our boxes over \$54 were paid for freight, which amount has since been returned to us by the Indian Department.

We look forward hopefully and joyfully to the work of another year, and feel sure that with the additional strength and zeal of our seven new Societies the tried courage, perseverance and experience of the older ones, and the hope we have of gaining others for the work, the twelfth annual report will shew increase in every department, and that our contribution for missionary purposes will be much larger than it has yet been. We have done well as a Society, but we have not yet attained to our highest possibilities. The work in the Foreign Field grows; more men and women are required to fill new stations; more money must be forthcoming to send and keep them. We are able to do and give more if we are "willing hearted."

The members of this Society are awaking more and more to the great necessity laid upon them to pray more earnestly, give more freely and to trust in God more entirely to advance His own Kingdom in the world, His own Son, our Saviour, being our example in all things, in whose service all work is "honorable and glorious," and whose Kingdom, which we are seeking to advance, is an everlasting Kingdom.

MAITLAND.

MRS. MACNABB.

The eleventh annual meeting of this Society was held in Wingham, on March 19th, 1895. There was a large attendance of delegates and friends from the various Auxiliaries. A pleasant feature of the meeting was an address from Mrs. J. Fraser Campbell. We cannot, as in previous years, report an increase in contribution and members; yet the year just closed has been crowned with many blessings. We note evidences of deepening interest in the work, and in the individual life a fuller consecration.

One Auxiliary has appointed an hour each day in which the members engage in special prayer in the interests of their Auxiliary. In another, the whole Auxiliary has been appointed a committee to enlist new members. From the reports we learn that the following and similar subjects have formed part of the programmes for the monthly meetings:—"Study of the various mission fields," "Short papers on missionary topics"; discussions on questions such as: "What are the benefits of Auxiliary meetings to the members personally?" "How best to increase interest in the work," etc. The most interesting event of

the year was the appointment of Miss Campbell, from Molesworth Auxiliary, as missionary to India.

Our Mission Bands report encouragingly and show a zeal in the work that is commendable. We are pleased to report the formation of the "Jewels" Mission Band in connection with Chalmers Auxiliary, and the "Happy Gleaners," Wingham. In reviewing our work let us balance it with the talents which God has given, and it is to be feared we must confess shortcoming. We have not hidden our Lord's money, but have we improved all His benefits to us? We are thankful that God has given us the will and means to do what has been done. We are taught by our Lord Jesus Christ that self-sacrifice for His cause is a condition of discipleship, and trust we can say like David, we have not offered to the Lord that which has cost us nothing.

ORANGEVILLE.

MRS. MYERS.

The ninth annual meeting of this Society was held in St. Andrew's Church, Orangeville, on Tuesday, January 8th. Delegates were present from seventeen Auxiliaries and four Mission Bands. In comparing reports received from Auxiliaries and Mission Bands this year with those of last, we rejoice to say we find no reason for feeling at all discouraged, for, on the whole, they are favourable. One or two Auxiliaries report few meetings on account of stormy weather and bad roads, and the distance people live apart, but most Societies hold monthly meetings. One secretary writes: "I am sorry not to be able to send in a better report, but it seems impossible to get any number of our ladies to take very much interest in our work." We have to report the organization of an Auxiliary at Ventry, in May last, the reorganization of Dundalk at the same time, also the formation of a Mission Band at Claude, making in all nineteen Auxiliaries and six Mission Bands. Most of the reports emphasize the fact that the contributions are free-will offerings. The circulation of the *Leaflet* is on the increase, and it is everywhere read with much appreciation. Several reports speak with great pleasure of visits from the President. A most successful semi-annual meeting was held in June at Claude, where the delegates were cordially welcomed and entertained. Miss McWilliams visited this Presbytery in November and held fifteen meetings, most of which were well attended and enthusiastic. All who heard her were delighted with her addresses, which were full of interest and instruction about the work in India. Nine bales of clothing were sent to Rev. Hugh McKay. Although the quantity was less than last year, the quality was very much better, a very large proportion of the goods being new material.

OTTAWA.

MISS H. E. DURIE.

As a Society we are glad to be able to report increased membership, and a larger offering than in any previous year. A Mission Band was

organized at Kenmore in August. We have now twenty-three Auxiliaries and five Mission Bands connected with this Society. Reports have been received from all. Contributions are in advance of last year. The reports from the Congregational Auxiliaries in Ottawa, organized last year, but reporting their first year's work now, are most encouraging. We have two hundred and forty-three members connected with these Societies, where we had sixty-four as a Union Auxiliary. Six bales of warm clothing, quilts and new material, weighing 1,020 lbs., were sent in the autumn to Crowstand Reserve. All unite most heartily in this work for the Indians. Four hundred and thirty-two copies of the *Letter Leaflet* are now in circulation each month. During the year nine Auxiliaries on the south side of the Ottawa, as well as the Auxiliaries in the city, were visited by Mrs. Thorburn. These visits are noted in the reports as highly appreciated and very stimulating. All the Mission Bands were represented at the annual meeting this year, and gave bright, interesting reports.

Our annual meeting was held in Knox Church, Ottawa, on Wednesday, February 27th. At the afternoon session Miss Baker, of Prince Albert, was with us and gave a most interesting address on her work there and among the Sioux Indians.

OWEN SOUND.

MRS. W. H. JENKINS.

Reports and contributions have been received from sixteen Auxiliaries and five Mission Bands, and in some respects they show advance over previous years. We regret that our contributions are not so large as formerly. This is due, no doubt, to the financial depression which has existed during the past year. Two Auxiliaries and two Mission Bands have been organized, making in all seventeen Auxiliaries and six Mission Bands. The request for clothing for the Indians of Muscowpetung Reserve was liberally responded to. The demand for the *Letter Leaflet* is ever on the increase. Three hundred and six copies are now subscribed for. In two of the Societies, the Scattered Helpers' Scheme has been adopted. In one they assisted in the preparation of the clothing for the North-West. One of the most pleasing features of the reports was the strong tone of earnestness and hopefulness with which they were pervaded, and the absence of anything like despondency or lack of harmony amongst the workers in the various societies.

In closing this report we desire to acknowledge the great loss sustained by our Society in the removal from Keady of one of our vice-presidents, Mrs. Hamilton, one of our most cheerful, earnest and effective workers; and of all the other members of our Society who have been called to rest from their earthly labours and to be with their Saviour, whom they loved and served.

PARIS.

MRS. MCWHIRTER.

The reports from Auxiliaries and Mission Bands tell of increased interest, perseverance amid difficulties, willingness on the part of members to take part in meetings, the deep-rooted hold that the work has on the hearts of the members; and, with a few exceptions, of increased offerings, so that the total contribution is considerably in excess of that of last year.

One new Auxiliary was organized in First Presbyterian Church, Brantford, making thirty-one Societies in the Presbytery—nineteen Auxiliaries and twelve Mission Bands.

Thank-offering meetings were held in almost every Society, and seem to have been as delightful as they were financially profitable.

The *Monthly Letter Leaflet* is thoroughly appreciated, and, indeed, could hardly be done without. Four hundred and thirty-seven copies are taken; these are read and circulated. The number of Scattered Helpers remains much the same; their contributions are very good.

Over 1,200 lbs. of clothing, of exceedingly good quality, were shipped to File Hill's School. All were delighted to hear that the money paid for freight had been refunded.

Rev. Dr. McKay, of Formosa, addressed the meeting for a few minutes, and told of the noble, self-denying work of the native Bible Women there, and the Rev. Mr. Goforth, of Honan, China, gave a very graphic account of the work in China, specifying its difficulties and dangers, and also its encouragements and prospects of success.

Gratitude to our Heavenly Father for what He has enabled us to accomplish during the past year, and for permitting us to have a share in the great mission work of the day, leads us to go on in the Master's service with renewed consecration, and with an earnest desire to be more faithful workers in His vineyard.

PETERBOROUGH.

MRS. GRAHAM.

Our Presbyterial Society has now reached a stage in its development when growth must come from within rather than from without; from inherent expansion rather than from external extension; and we are glad to be able to report such growth, together with the addition of two new branches. We have now thirty-one branches, of which twenty-two are Auxiliaries, six are Young Women's Bands and three are Juvenile Bands.

We note with grave concern that our Mission Band membership has fallen off seriously from year to year since the organization of the Y. P. S. C. E., to the existence of which the diminishing numbers in our Bands is attributed in most instances. It is a cause of abiding regret to us that such should be the case, and we prayerfully hope for an early adjustment of the difficulty which is assuming a somewhat

alarming aspect to the votaries of womans' work. Whilst we are grieved that our Bands have been shrinking, we rejoice that our Auxiliaries have been progressing along all lines. The average attendance has increased; and here, we are glad to say, the example is set by our Bands, which record a much higher proportionate attendance than the Auxiliaries.

There are four hundred and thirty-three copies of the *Monthly Letter Leaflet*, finding their welcome way into the homes of as many members of our Society every month. That they are also reaching the hearts we have abundant testimony to prove.

The response to the call for clothing was, as usual, hearty and generous. Our Branches have won a worthy reputation for the supplies they furnish; and this year the unfailing lovingkindness of our members enabled us to send two bales of excellent clothing to Rev. Hugh McKay, for the Indian children of Round Lake school. Ninety-three dollars were contributed for the purchase of necessary new material by the committee, which did its work with careful and conscientious deliberation.

The nature of our financial returns is, this year, a matter for deep thankfulness. Every Auxiliary reports "voluntary offering," and seven of our nine Mission Bands give the same encouraging report. The remaining two Bands have given "almost entirely free-will contribution." This record needs no comment. It tells its own story of deepening interest, of exalted ideas of the methods of service, of increased realization of the responsibility of the handmaids of the King.

Thank-offering meetings are now an institution in most of our Branches, and are proving of incalculable value in extending the claims of our work, and in enlisting the co-operation of many hitherto indifferent. We believe that our improved methods of replenishing our treasury is due in great measure to Thank-offering meetings.

Successful annual and semi-annual meetings have been held, the former in Port Hope and the latter in Keene; and we trust with results that will prove a blessing for eternity.

SARNIA.

MISS BREBNER.

Our seventh annual meeting was held in Knox Church, Thedford, January 30th and 31st. A large number of delegates were present and all the sessions were enjoyed. The secretary reported a marked increase in interest and income in spite of the prevailing depression. Notwithstanding many discouragements we have made satisfactory progress. One Auxiliary and one Mission Band were organized during the year by our president, who visited nearly all our Auxiliaries and rendered valuable service. We were also highly favored by a visit from Miss McWilliams, who addressed twelve Auxiliaries. We are pleased to remark on the increased interest taken this year in the amount and selection of goods sent to the North-West, in all, 1,200 pounds. Mr. Wright, of Rolling River Mission, especially mentioned the sixty-eight quilts sent him.

We now number fourteen Auxiliaries and six Mission Bands. Our contributions show an increase over previous years. We trust we may increase in all branches of our work.

SAUGEEEN.

MISS JESSIE YOUNG.

Our Annual meeting, held in Palmerston, on the 11th of December, was well attended and much interest manifested. We were pleased to have the Rev. J. Goforth, of Honan, China, address us, and hope that we shall all be stirred up to greater zeal in the Master's work in consequence.

Although it has been said that the past year has been one of unusual depression in business circles, the contributions of our Society have increased one hundred and twelve dollars over the previous year. The response to the call for clothing for the North-West Indians was also more liberal than ever before.

We have much pleasure in reporting the organization of three new Auxiliaries, viz: Dromore, Belmore and McIntosh.

The reports from the various Auxiliaries and Mission Bands were, on the whole, very encouraging.

The *Letter Leaflet* continues to increase in favour and each year notes a larger subscription for it.

The Thank-offering meetings are not only fruitful of much good, but also add largely to the contributions, and we trust that soon each Auxiliary and Mission Band in our Society will hold its regular thank-offering service.

STRATFORD.

MISS HAMILTON.

The report of the past year is very encouraging. The interest shown, the average attendance at the monthly meetings, and the contributions from the Societies are greater than ever before. The membership is not increased, owing partly to removals from the country and partly to the number of deaths. Several of our Societies have lost one or two of their active members by death; but to us is left their influence, the example of their lives, constraining us to be more diligent in the Master's work.

One new Auxiliary was organized and one reorganized, making a total of twenty-four Auxiliaries and seven Mission Bands. A large contribution of clothing was sent to the care of Rev. A. J. McLeod, Industrial School, Regina, for the children of the Muscowpetung Reserve.

Our annual Presbyterial meeting, which was held on January 16th, 1895, was most interesting. Addresses were delivered by two of our Honan missionaries, Mrs. Goforth and Rev. J. A. Slimmon.

TORONTO.

MISS GEORGE.

This Society has no great progress to report for the past year ; but, at the same time, we do not feel that there has been any retrogression. As there are now comparatively few congregations in Toronto Presbytery in which our Society is not represented, we cannot look for any great advance from year to year ; but should hope to maintain a steady progress, and not lose any of our present Auxiliaries and Bands.

During the past year one new Auxiliary and five Mission Bands have been formed, making a total of fifty-three Auxiliaries and twenty-eight Mission Bands, in all eighty-one societies. We are sorry to state that the names of three Bands have been dropped from our list this year ; though, in the case of one of them, hopes are held out that it may be reorganized before long. In two cases, the want of a President seems to be the reason for disbanding ; and in the third the formation of a Christian Endeavour Society. It is felt, in some cases, the Auxiliary does not take that interest in the Band belonging to their congregation, that it should. The Band is auxiliary to the Auxiliary ; and it is the duty of the latter to see that it is supported and upheld. To the Band the Auxiliary has to look for its future members.

We are glad to report an increase of over one hundred in membership, and over two hundred in the average attendance.

We are happy to state that our contribution shows an increase over that of last year. About 3,100 lbs. of clothing were sent to four Reserves in the North-West ; it was of good, strong material, a great part of it new. Also four boxes were sent to our missionaries in India, containing prizes for day-schools, bandages and material for use in the hospital and boarding-school. The sum of \$238.62 was received by the Supply Committee to aid in the work.

That the *Monthly Letter Leaflet* is highly valued, is shown by the fact that the subscribers now number 2,075.

The reports from the Auxiliaries and Bands, in nearly all cases, speak of continued interest and steady progress, and some of them are most encouraging.

 WHITBY.

MISS A. B. McBRIDE.

The fifteenth annual meeting of this Society was held in Whitby on the fifteenth of January. The attendance of delegates was not as large as we should like to see.

In some respects we cannot report the advance of previous years in our work, but faithfulness and self-denial have on the whole characterized our efforts.

We are glad to welcome a new Mission Band.

There were thirteen Auxiliaries and Mission Bands responded to the call for clothing for the Indians in the North-West.

The circulation of the *Letter Leaflet* has increased during the past year.

In reviewing the work, each Auxiliary acknowledges that very little has been done of the great work committed to us. Our desire is that the year upon which we are now entering may be one of increased interest, devoted work and earnest prayer, and that each member may realize the presence and blessing of the Master.

WINNIPEG.

MRS. COLIN CAMPBELL.

This Society now reports fifteen Auxiliaries and four Mission Bands. One Auxiliary and one Young Woman's Band were organized during the year. We deplore having to count as lost one Auxiliary and two Juvenile Bands. The amount contributed, less expenses, shows an increase over previous year of \$96.45. Nearly all of our Societies report the loss of officers and members by removal. Death has overshadowed two of them, taking the loved president from one and a member from the other. All our Societies, with one exception, have been visited during the year by officers of the Presbyterial. The results of these visits have been most gratifying. In the majority of our country Auxiliaries Bible study is the chief feature. It was most pleasing to hear those earnest, intelligent women testify to the blessing they had received in the hours thus spent together. Many thoughtful papers on missions and kindred topics, with maps to illustrate, have been prepared and read by members. Some of these have been a source of interest and help to other Societies, being circulated through our secretary, Mrs. McKay, who is glad to receive in trust any paper and send it on an errand of increased usefulness, when applied for. All our Societies have become subscribers to the *Letter Leaflet*, and, through the generous gift of a friend, a good number of copies have been distributed to the women of our churches who are not members of our Society. The Thank-offering meetings have all been a source of blessing, an enrolling of new members, and of a large addition to our treasury. The city Auxiliaries were much pleased to meet with Mesdames Harvie and Jeffrey, of our Central Board, Toronto, and were greatly interested in their presentation of our work in Foreign lands and amongst the Indians of Manitoba and the North-West Territories. We wish that all the women of our Presbytery had heard their appeal on behalf of missions.

The object of our Society is not only to form an Auxiliary or Band in all possible congregations throughout the Presbytery, and to nourish and strengthen those already existing, but also to interest *all* our women in this great work. We would have none missed. Is there an Auxiliary in your church? Are you a member of it? If not, is it because you can do a greater work for the Master in your own way? Then we have nothing to offer. But if you are not a mission worker,

why not? Who is doing your work? Let us urge you to join the Auxiliary in your church and give it the benefit of the little or much you can do. If you cannot attend the meetings because of the distance between you and your church, because you are an invalid, because of home duties or business, you can still have a part in this work. Enlist as a Scattered Helper to the Auxiliary of your church. If there is none, then organize as a band of Scattered Helpers, appoint a secretary and a look-out committee. Let these enlist every woman in the neighbourhood, no matter how isolated. Let none be missed. Follow the instructions given in the "Scattered Helpers' Leaflet" and the rules on the Scattered Helpers' card; these can be procured from Mrs. Telfer, 72 St. Albans street, Toronto. Ask each woman to search her Bible and find out God's plan for the world's salvation. Ask her to pray for missions and missionaries. God will bless her gifts. He will bless the loving heart which seeks blessings for others. These Scattered Helpers should become auxiliary to the Presbyterial Society, and annually send in their reports and contributions, as do our Auxiliaries and Mission Bands.

Oh, for more earnestness, more willingness to serve God first!—to do our duty no matter what may be in our way. There is so much "self-pleasing" or "pleasing other people." May we as Christian women rise to our privilege of pleasing God first—of working for Him with all our might. Let us give Him our best strength, our best time. Let not the young hesitate to give God their youth; it will be the one thing of their lives, no matter how long they may be, about which there will be no regrets. We cannot afford to stand still in this work, for the hours are passing and with them our opportunities, while souls are hungering all around us for the bread of life. It should be our joy to be honoured of God in thus helping to win souls for Him. This is our privilege. Let us then be much in earnest, and may God answer our heart's longings and fill us with more love to Him and His work. "The world for Christ" is the motto of our Society. What shall be your part in winning it for Him, and what shall be ours?

AUXILIARIES NOT IN PRESBYTERIAL ORDER.

HOME SECRETARY.

It is always a pleasing duty to present the report of our isolated Auxiliaries and Mission Bands. They are, as a rule, very loyal to our Society, and render most faithful and efficient service; and that without the encouragement and aid which Presbyterial Auxiliaries and Bands receive. Most of them never have a representative at any of our annual gatherings, and so they miss the inspiration and stimulus that comes through the comparing of work and interchange of thought. Notwithstanding this we find them always well to the front, both as regards methods and results. Their reports speak of financial depression, loss of members through removal, and other hindrances difficult to overcome; yet most of them show advance over previous year. Ten Auxiliaries, two Mission Bands and one group of Scattered Helpers have reported. In some instances a few of the necessary details were omitted, such as

membership, average attendance, post office address of secretary, etc., but on the whole the reports were full and satisfactory. The contribution of the Auxiliaries and Bands in Quebec, Montreal, Regina, Calgary and Westminster Presbyteries is \$49 in excess of that of previous year. The Auxiliary in Indore Presbytery also reports a larger contribution than ever before. Three Auxiliaries contributed clothing to the North-West supplies. In one report touching reference was made to the memory of a loved member removed by death. One Auxiliary was so discouraged by adverse circumstances that disbandment was the result. One Band has not reported, and one Auxiliary and one Band have been organized. Two Auxiliaries, Banff and Donald, had ceased working before our eighteenth annual meeting, but having sent their contribution of the previous year it was necessary that the names should appear in our report. So far as we know all those who contributed this year are still actively engaged in the work.
