## MINUTES OF CONFERENCE,

TAKEN IN

ST. PAUL STREET CHURCH, IN THE CITY OF ST. CATHARINES, ONT.

Organization of the Conference, June 7th, 1876.

THE Third Session of the London Annual Conference of the Methodist Church of Canada began in the St. Paul Street Methodist Church, St. Catharines, at 9 o'clock a.m., on Wednesday, June 7th, 1876.

The Rev. John A. Williams, President of the Conference, in the Chair.

The Rev. WILLIAM WILLIAMS, Secretary of the Conference, read the 2nd Chapter of 2nd Timothy; the President gave out Hymn 478; and the Revs. WILLIAM WILLOUGHBY and JAMES MCALLISTER led in prayer.

The roll was called by the Secretary, and One Hundred and Sixty-Nine answered to their names.

The Rev. George R. Sanderson was elected President of the Conference, and briefly addressed the brothren.

The Rev. WILLIAM S. GRIFFIN was elected Secretary, and briefly addressed the Conference.

On nomination of the Secretary, the Rev. John B. Clarkson, M.A., was appointed Assistant Secretary, and the Rev. George H. Cornish, Journal Secretary.

The Rev. EPHRAIM EVANS, D.D., and the Rev. Joseph H. Robinson were appointed Official Letter-writers during the present Sessions of Conference.

The Revs. John Kay and John Ridley were appointed Reporters for the Christian Guardian and Evangelical Witness.

#### QUESTION XII.-

#### Who have died?

1.—John B. Keagey, B.A.

Mr. Keagey was born on the old homestead near Dundas in the year 1839, of parents very highly esteemed in that region of country. His conversion occurred at 14 years of age. Shortly afterwards he was sent to Victoria College, where he remained a faithful student till his graduation. In 1862 he entered upon the work of the Christian ministry, in which he remained about five years. In a supernumerary relation, he continued to labour untiringly for Christ—a portion of nearly every Sabbath being spent in preaching the Word of Life.

When the Dundas Wesleyan Institute was opened, he accepted a place as teacher, which he filled with acceptance and ability till impaired health obliged him to resign. Through most of the winter of 1874-5, he was a great sufferer, but in his affliction he was patient and peaceful, testifying to the power of grace to save and to sustain. As soon as possible he was again at his loved employment of striving to save souls.

In the summer of 1875 he went to Ocean Grove, New Jersey, for the purpose of seeking health amidst circumstances of great spiritual privilege. There, while he spent his strength in labours more abundant, he was seized with typhoid fever, and despite the utmost endeavors of the most skilful physicians, he speedily yielded to the inveterate disease. During his last sickness his mind was often obscured, but in his rational moments his trust in Christ was firm, and his experience perfectly satisfactory. He died on the 1st day of September, 1875, in the 37th year of his age.

Bro. Keagey was a man of great worth. One of the most marked features of his character was his devotion to duty. Whatever he undertook to do he did most heartily. His love of

truth and sincerity was very strong. He had clear, honest convictions, and was not afraid manfully to express them.

His love for the Church and the cause of God had all the fixedness of principle and all the fervor of passion. Whether preaching the Gospel, working on his farm, or engaged in teaching, he tried to do it for God's glory. He was always ready at the call of duty to preach the Gospel, visit the sick and dying, or bury the dead. During the last year of his life he undertook to do more than he was able, for his whole soul seemed to be inflamed with a desire for the salvation of the unsaved, and for the welfare of the Church.

At Ocean Grove, he said, "What a place to go to heaven from! It breathes of Christ. The power of faith lifts my spirit up." When told by Dr. Stokes, the pastor, that unceasing prayer was going up for his recovery, he said, "My work is done. I am going home. Your prayers are being answered, or will be. God is holding up my wife. He will keep her and my little ones." "If God should call you, what then?" some one asked. "I have no will but God's will. That was settled when I was 14 years old. I have given myself, wife and children to Him, and he has accepted them. I am all His."

Thus passed away one of our most amiable and faithful brethren, who during the last year of his life grew most rapidly in mental and spiritual stature. And if his sun went down at mid-day, the splendor of the setting was more glorious than the effulgence of the noontide.

#### 2.-WILLIAM HERKIMER.

William Herkimer was born at Rice Lake in the year 1800, and died at his residence on the New Credit Mission, on Sabbath, the 3rd of October, 1875, at seven o'clock a.m., in the 75th year of his age.

Like all the Indian people before their reception of the Gospel, he held to his pagan worship, and no doubt was a strong votary of their cause. When on a hunting excursion he visited the Grand River Indians. There he heard the late Rev. Alvin Tory preach. His mind was enlightened; the truth reached his heart; and his soul was made happy in the love of God, when alone in the woods hunting. We have reason to believe that the grace imparted then was retained by him to the end of his useful life.

When young, the privileges of education were very few, and consequently his education was very limited. In 1843 he was received on trial for the ministry, and stationed at Owen Sound, and was afterwards stationed at Rama, French River, Saugeen, St. Clair, Beausoliel Island, Rice Lake, Walpole Island, and Garden River. On all those fields of labour he was successful in winning souls to Christ, and led many a poor pagan to forsake his idol-worship for that of the true and living God. Though lacking in education, he possessed a good deal of natural ability, and his sermons were very earnest and pointed. He aimed at the heart.

He was strongly attached to his ministerial brethren and the cause of Methodism; and, after his superannuation, was always a true friend to the Missionary on the New Credit Mission.

In 1861 he was superannuated, but labored some at Cape Croker, where he lost his wife, and where also—by hard labor in a camp-meeting—he contracted bronchial affection, then consumption, which caused his death. During the last two years of his life he had severe trials, but he bore up under all with Christian patience and fortitude.

In his last sickness he expressed unshaken confidence in God. He said, "All are friends, but Christ is the best friend I have;" and used many expressions testifying to the goodness of God, and his abiding trust in Jesus as his Saviour from all sin. After a useful life, he passed away with an unblemished character, and leaving good evidence that he had gone to be "forever with the Lord."

#### 3.—WILLIAM WILSON GRAHAM.

William Wilson Graham was born in the Township of Manvers, June 27th, 1841. His parents were deeply pious, and trained him up for the Lord. In early life he was the subject of powerful religious impressions. At the age of 14 he sought and obtained forgiveness of sins. The evidence of his acceptance was so clear and satisfactory that he shouted the praises of God. In the year 1870 he was licensed a local preacher. The Conference of 1871, of the late N. C. C., stationed him on the Hillier Circuit, on which he remained two years. His next Circuit was St. Catharines, where he remained two years. His health failed so rapidly the second year that he was obliged to desist from preaching altogether. His preaching was characterized by earnestness, and many instances of conversion were the result of the regular Sabbath services. He was blessed with an amiable disposition. His affectionate nature endeared him to all who became associated with him. Cheerfulness never forsook him.

Last Conference he retired from the active work of the ministry, and removed to his father's residence on the Milbrook Circuit, where he spent the remaining months of his life. He died Jan. 15th, 1876. On the morning of his death, when questioned about the state of his mind, he said, "I'm happy, happy," He then desired to rest a little. Soon his lips began to move, and his wife stooping down to listen, heard the words, "Blessed, blessed, blessed,"—and he fell asleep to wake in the realms of glory.

#### CHILDREN'S FUND.

#### CONSTITUTION.

This shall be called "The Children's Fund of the London Conference," "for the purpose of providing effectively and uniformly for the payment of the allowances of the children of our ministers, and of equalizing the claims for this object on the several circuits within its bounds," subject to the regulations contained in the Discipline, page 117.

This Fund shall be managed by a Committee composed of the Financial Secretaries of the several Districts and the Treasurer, who shall be appointed annually by the Conference. It shall be their business to ascertain the number of children having claims each year upon the Fund, and to recommend to the Conference the rate required from the membership for the payment of such claims. They shall also attend to any general matters connected with the interests of the Fund, or which may be referred to them by the Conference.

The Treasurer shall keep a record of the names and ages of all the children of our ministers and of the transactions of the Committee in a book provided for the purpose, and shall meet the Financial Secretaries one day before the Conference in order to receive from or to pay over to them the balances accruing from or payable to their Districts, after the claims of the children on said Districts have been paid.

The Financial Secretaries shall ascertain at the Financial District Meeting, and insert in their District books, the names and ages of the children of the ministers within the bounds of their Districts, and at the May District Meeting record the names of any children born during the year, reporting them to the General Treasurer at the Conference. The 15th of May shall be considered as the close of the year, and no child born after that date will have a claim for the current year, though this is not intended to prevent the payment of the claims for eighteen years.

The Financial Secretaries shall be Treasurers for their respective Districts, and shall collect from each Superintendent the amount payable by the members under his care, and pay to the parents and guardians of the children the amounts due for the year. The Minutes of the Conference shall be taken as the standard by which shall be reckoned the number of members on each Circuit required to pay into the Fund.

A schedule shall be furnished by the Treasurer each year to the Financial Secretary of each District, in which shall be recorded by them the statistics necessary for his infor-

mation.

Two Auditors shall be appointed by the Committee from among themselves to examine and certify the accounts of the Treasurer previous to their publication in the Minutes adopted.

## REPORT OF THE TEMPERANCE COMMITTEE.

The Committee re-affirms its conviction that the manufacture, sale, and use of intoxicating liquors is the fruitful cause of most of the social and moral evils which afflict and curse our country—a position affirmed by our fathers in the Conferential address of 1830, and continuously maintained by our Conference to the present time.

It strongly reiterates all its former positions in reference to the Temperance movement, and especially its continued adhesion to the resolutions of the General Conference in behalf of Total Prohibition, which it regards as the goal of our efforts in legislative enactments. We urge upon our ministers, official Boards, Sunday-school authorities, and membership in general the formation of Temperance Societies and Bands of Hope (where such are deemed needful), and the putting forth of every effort for the dissemination of sound temperance principles in the community.

The Committee recognises in the recent Act of the Ontario Legislature a step which, though not as complete and perfect as we would wish, yet in advance towards Prohibition; and we are further encouraged to hope that gratifying results will follow the passing of the Dunkin Act in our Municipalities. We earnestly recommend our societies and congregations' hearty co-operation with all

# REPORT OF THE SABBATH-SCHOOL COMMITTEE, 1876.

Your Committee have carefully reviewed the work of Sabbath-schools within the bounds of the London Conference during the past year, and are gratified to be able to report many pleasing features of the work.

The number of conversions reported is 2,325, being an increase of 203 over the number reported last year. The number meeting in class is 4,797, being an increase of 996 over last year. There is also a gratifying increase in the following items: Number learning catechism, 5,306, increase, 226; amount raised for school purposes, \$14,503.83, increase, \$1,150.39; amount raised for General Sabbath-school Fund, \$218.22, being an increase of \$42.75; number of schools using uniform lessons, 332, increase, 61; number of schools open during the whole year, 324, increase, 52.

Decreases have to be noted in the following items: The number of schools is 22 less than last year, which is no doubt caused by the uniting of schools consequent on the recent union of the Churches; the amount raised for missions is \$3,797.58, being a decrease of \$483, which may

The following Resolutions were unanimously adopted by the Committee:

I. That whereas not a little inconvenience has arisen to the members of this Committee from the want of harmony in several particulars between the schedules of the various departments of our work; therefore we would most respectfully request the Conference to direct that a Committee be appointed, whose duty it shall be to see that the Circuit and District Schedules, provided by the Bookroom, shall contain columns in which the Sabbath-school funds may be reported.

II. Whereas great difficulty has arisen from the incorrectness of the Circuit Schedules—Resolved, that we recommend the district meetings to appoint a Committee to examine these schedules before being copied into the District Schedules for presentation at Conference, and that Blank Schedule No. 3 be inserted in the Annual District Meeting Books before they leave the Book-room for the use of Secretaries of the Districts.

III. That your Committee regret that many of the circuits have neglected to take up the General Sunday-school collection, and we would again remind the members of Conference of the law of the Connexion requiring a collection be taken up in each school for this fund.

IV. That when the Circuit Schedules are sent out by the Secretary of the Sunday-school Committee, he be also requested to notify Superintendents of Circuits and also of Schools of the importance of giving prompt and proper attention to the filling up of those schedules, and that they be reminded of this matter through the *Christian Guardian*. Your Committee would also direct the attention of the members of Conference to Resolutions II., IV., and V. of last year's report.

Whereas the Itinerancy is based on the principle of Mutual Concession both of Ministers and laymen, the former relinquishing the right of choosing their own field of labour, and the latter that of choosing their own Minister; and both parties agreeing to place the Ministers' appointment in the hands of the Stationing Committee; And whereas, the present system of private negotiation between Circuits and individual Ministers is calculated to trammel that freedom of action which is so desirable and necessary in the Stationing Committee, and is attended with other grave evils:—Therefore, Resolved—That while we disclaim any wish to interfere with the conceded rights of our people

to make any request to any Courts or Boards which they may deem desirable, or to treat such requests or the authors of them with any want of courtesy, yet in order to check what we consider a growing evil, we pledge ourselves that we will not, either verbally or in writing, accept of such invitations to the pastorate of any Church, and we will earnestly advise our people to refrain from making such requests in future.

#### Oka Indians.

Resolved,—That a memorial relating to the difficulties at Oka, be prepared, signed by the President and Secretary of Conference, and sealed with the Conference seal, and forwarded to the Government.

Resolved,—That the Conference respectfully acknowledges the receipt of a letter from the President of the General Conference, the Rev. Dr. Ryerson, relating to the taking up of an extra collection to meet General Conference expenses. The Conference did not deem it advisable to take action this year.

Resolved,—That Revs. Jas. Gray and W. Williams, and J. Lister, Esq., be a committee to prepare forms of schedules, to be submitted at the next Conference.

Moved by Rev. W. R. Parker, M.A., seconded by Rev. Doctor Fowler, and resolved,—That this Conference would hereby express its approval of the action of the Central Board of Missions, in yielding to the urgent appeal of the Rev. George Cochran and Rev Dr. Macdonald, our esteemed Missionaries in Japan, to reinforce our staff in that our foreign field; and we moreover hereby record our sense of the honour done our Conference in the selection of the Rev. G. M. Meacham, M.A., and the Rev. C. S. Eby, B.A., our gifted and devout brethren beloved, as the labourers designated for this distant and most important Mission.

# Standing Resolutions.

#### Order of Connexional Collections.

Resolved,—That the Connexional Funds shall be taken up in the following order, viz:—

- 1. CONTINGENT Fund—In the months of September and March.
- 2. SUPERANNUATED MINISTERS' FUND—In the month of October or November.
- 3. EDUCATIONAL FUND-In the month of February or April.
- 4. SABBATH SCHOOL FUND-Any time during the year.

#### Collections for Connexional Funds.

Resolved,—That it is the judgment of this Conference, that when collections for Connexional purposes are appointed to be taken in any of our churches, the whole of such collections throughout the day shall be appropriated to the respective Funds to which they are related, without any deduction for the Circuit, or any Trust, or other Fund.

#### Treasurers and Financial Secretaries.

Resolved,—That it shall be required of every Financial Secretary, either by himself or by a proxy, to meet the Treasurers of the several Connexional Funds, to report the receipts of their respective Districts, on Tuesday, at two o'clock P.M., the day before the annual meeting of the Conference.

#### Financial and other Returns.

Whereas the Returns sent from the Districts to the Conference are frequently incomplete and incorrect, making it quite impossible to compile perfect and accurate tabular statements for the Minutes of Conference, it is—

Resolved,—(1) That the Financial and District Secretaries be required to have their accounts and tabular statements audited and certified as correct before handing them to the Conference authorities.

(2) That the Secretary of Conference, when sending the books for the May District Meetings, shall call the attention of the Chairmen to the above resolution.

#### Sabbath School Reports.

Resolved,—That Superintendents of Circuits shall report in making up their schedules all Sabbath Schools held by our people in connection with our work, whether they are governed in accordance with the published Constitution or not.

#### Ordination Sermon.

Resolved,—That it shall be the rule in this Conference in the future, that the retiring President shall preach the Ordination Sermon.

#### District Secretaries.

Resolved,—That each District Secretary be instructed to forward to the Superintendent of the Circuit where the Conference is to be held, the name of the member of the Stationing Committee, and all other ministers who purpose attending Conference, at as early a date as possible, and that only those whose names are forwarded shall be provided with billets.

#### Superannuated Ministers' Fund.

Resolved,—That whereas the rule requires that all widows, claimants on the Superannuated Ministers' Fund, shall be members of our Church; therefore it shall be the duty of the Chairman of each Annual District Meeting to make enquiries into the case of widows residing within their respective bounds, as to their membership, and report the fact annually to the Conference.

#### Income of Domestic Missions.

Resolved,—That the Financial District Meeting shall examine into the circumstances and probable income of Domestic Missions, in the same way as in respect to Circuits, and suggest the amount that should be appropriated for the support or assistance of such Missions.

#### Chairmen and Domestic Missions.

Resolved,—That the Chairmen of Districts forward to the Missionary Secretaries the amount recommended by the several September Financial District Meetings for the Domestic Missions, as soon as practicable after the close of each meeting.

#### Preachers Attending College.

Resolved,—That in all cases when Preachers, who have travelled four years, are then allowed by the Conference to attend College, their reception into full connexion and their ordination are thereby deferred.

#### Relating to the Book Room.

Resolved,—That every Minister and Preacher is henceforth peremptorily required to settle his account with the Book Steward, at or before the Meeting of Conference.

Resolved,—Should any Minister or Preacher, having claims on the Connexional Funds, fail to pay up his account with the office as above directed, it shall be the duty of the Book Steward annually to draw upon the Treasurer of any of those Funds an amount not exceeding one-fourth of the claim of the Brother on such fund towards the payment of his debt; and the Treasurer of such fund is hereby directed to honour such drafts when presented.

#### Probationers.

Resolved,—That any Probationer, assisted by the Educational Fund, who, within the period of ten years after Ordination, may wish to withdraw from the Conference, shall be required to refund the amount of aid given him before receiving a Certificate of standing; provided always that this requirement shall not apply to those who retire from ill health.

#### Registration of Baptisms.

Resolved,—That the Conference re-affirms its resolution of 1843, on the Registration of Baptisms, viz:—

- 1. That it shall no longer be required to keep Registry Books on the various Circuits, but that there shall be kept, at the Conference Establishment in Toronto, one General Registry of Births and Baptisms for the whole Church.

#### MODE OF EXAMINATION.

Candidates for our ministry and Probationers shall be examined by means of printed papers prepared by the respective examiners.

There shall also be an oral examination if required.

The Members of the Board of Examination shall meet

the Candidates and Probationers of the several Districts on the last Wednesday of April, in the town of Woodstock, at 9 o'clock, a.m. The Examiners shall pronounce upon the papers of the Candidates, and issue the certificates accordingly.

In addition to the usual thorough Theological Examination of Candidates before the District Meeting, the Chairman shall examine each Candidate as to his Studies and General Reading for the year, with a view to giving advice as to his course and method of study. No Candidate shall be allowed the year of probation until the studies for that year are completed.

#### REGULATIONS RESPECTING CANDIDATES.

Every person, before being received as a full Local Preacher, shall have previously laboured at least three months as an Exhorter, and three months on trial as a Local Preacher; and no Candidate for our Itinerancy shall be recommended by a Quarterly Meeting to a District Meeting, who has not laboured at least three months as a full Local Preacher.

No Candidate shall be recommended by any District Meeting, to be received on trial for that year, who does not produce a Certificate from the Examining Committee of the District to which he belongs. But the cases of all young men on trial shall be reported to their respective District Meetings.

All recommendations of Candidates to be received on trial shall be made at the February Quarterly Official Meeting, and the Candidates recommended shall appear before the next meeting of the Examining Committee of the District to which they belong.

be received on trial, to give a written statement of his religious character, talents, and usefulness, educational advantages and acquirements, employment and means of support, and such other particulars as the meeting may deem necessary; which statement shall be signed by him and recorded in the District Book.

If in any given year the number of Candidates recommended by the District Meetings shall be greater than the Stationing Committee deem it prudent to employ for that year, the examining Board shall meet at Conference, and determine who are the most suitable to be employed in our Itinerant work, and who are to be placed on the List of Reserve; being governed by their own class lists, and those of the District Meetings.

The District Meeting shall examine, as heretofore, all the Candidates in regard to their religious experience and belief of our doctrines, together with their general qualifications and suitability for our Itinerant work, and shall arrange them in three classes, according to the results of the Examination.

The Conference requires Candidates for our Ministry to preach a Trial Sermon before the District Meeting by which they are recommended, or before a Committee appointed by the District Meeting, who shall report their opinion on the sermon, and embody it in the recommendation of such Candidate to the Conference.

Nothing in our present Course of Study shall be understood to prevent a District Meeting, in special cases, from recommending a Candidate to the Conference for reception on trial after examination by the Chairman, before the District Meeting, on the subject of the preliminary Course of Study.

remember how brightly the revival flames have blazed on our Church altars, how the wintry and waste places have been revived and gladdened, how the Lord of the Church has manifested His saving power and wrought His wonders as in the days of our fathers. There has not been a day through all the year in which conversions have not taken place, and we still echo the words of Wesley, "the best of all is, God is with us." "God, ever our God, has caused us to joy before Him according to the joy in harvest, and as men rejoice when they divide a spoil." This large accession has been the result of a quickening of Church life. For, while numbers do not necessarily bring life; spiritual, earnest life, inevitably brings numbers. "Blessed be the Lord, the God of Israel, who only doeth wondrous things."

But while our God of His abundant grace is making us to abound more and more, we remind you of the need in these serious times of walking in the old paths, and living under the sanctifying influences of the Divine Spirit. We are jealous over your personal piety, "not as lords over God's heritage," but as pastors who watch over your souls, we would affectionately remind you of your duties and privileges and dangers. The Church, consisting as it does of undivided Christians collected in one body, can be faithful to its mission only as its members are personally devoted The collective power of the Church is the sum total of its individual life, and if the fervor and tone of individual piety be low the aggregate spiritual life will be feeble and powerless. Seek "first the kingdom of God," which is "righteousness, peace and joy in the Holy Ghost." Cultivate a deep religous experience. Know the "truth as it is in Jesus." Beware of the world. The command rings out clear and full, "Love not the world, neither the things that are in the world. If any man love the world the love of the Father is not in him. For all that is in the world, the lust of the flesh, and the lust of the eyes and the pride of life, is not of the Father, but is of the world." We especially urge upon you the avoidance of all companionship, pleasure, and practices which do not tend to the knowledge and love of God. "Be not conformed to this

world, but be ye transformed by the renewing of your mind, that ye may prove what is that good and acceptable and perfect will of God."

We remind you of the importance of the means of grace for the maintenance and development of the Divine life in the soul—ours is a rich heritage of social means. If you would be vital members of a living Church, if you would know the deep ever-during joy of saints, let your voice be heard in the class-room, let the meetings for prayer and fellowship be crowded, let the love-feasts be hailed as seasons of spiritual communion. Be living sons of Zion and not dumb mutes. And that you may thus edify one another pray, "O Lord, open thou my lips, and my mouth shall show forth Thy praise." Let the aroma of family piety be in your homes, and seek not to make your children conspicuous in circles of fashion and worldliness, but "bring them up in the nurture and admonition of the Lord."

In these days of false liberalism and indifference to orthodoxy, when attempts are being made to obliterate the ancient landmarks, we have need to remember the Master's caution, "Beware of the leaven of the Sadducees." We inherit all the sound words of the ancient faith, God has given us a banner to be displayed because of the truth, and the mission of Methodism is not yet accomplished. For while Romanism lifts its head proudly and Ritualism would imitate its superstitious practices, there is need of the proclamation of the old doctrine of the Reformation "justification by faith." While rationalism and skepticism are rife we must emphasize the experimental doctrines of the New Birth, adoption into the family of God and the conscious witness of the spirit, and while utter ungodliness prevails we must have doctrinal testimony to Christian Holiness. Give not heed to vague teachers and loose speculators in theology. The "doctrine" which is "according to godliness" is repentance toward God and faith in our Lord Jesus Christ. "Therefore, brethren, stand fast and hold the traditions which ye have been taught, whether by word or our epistle."

sonal searching of the Scriptures. We know no other rule of faith. In this age of many books the too common neglect of His own "sure word" must be grievous to that Divine Spirit who inspired it and who makes it quick and powerful.

Turning from the vital question of personal piety to the various departments of Church work, we dwell with satisfaction upon the Sunday-school enterprise. The Schools within the bounds of our Conference now number 475, having in attendance 39,966 scholars.

Of these about 4,797 are now meeting in class, and our Sunday-schools are constantly pouring into the Church a volume of young and sanctified life. The work demands the sympathy and support and the cordial co-operation of all who love the Lord Jesus. We are especially concerned that all our Sunday-school children should be converted, for if at a suitable age they do not join the Church the evidence is clear that they have joined the world. Claim the children for Christ. "Lift up thy hands unto Him for the life of thy young children that faint for hunger at the top of every street."

Our Church is Connexional. And while we are broken up into local Conferences it is of the utmost importance that this Connexional character be maintained and preserved.

The great agencies of the Church are strong ligaments of union. Our Church, from ocean to ocean, is vital with the Missionary spirit, and while successfully grappling with the ignorance and destitution of our expanding settlements and endeavouring to meet the vast spiritual needs of our Indian population, the great Head of the Church has set the seal of His approval upon our mission in Japan, which, through your zeal and liberality, we were enabled to undertake. In answer to the call for more labourers two of our most cultured and most devoted brethren, Rev. Geo. M. Meacham, M.A., and Rev. Charles S. Eby, B.A., have gone from us to lift up the standard of the cross in the high places of heathenism. Surely you will sustain them. For while our brethren go forth to labour and to die like our own martyr missionary, George McDougall, who, on the wild

We commend also to your generous support the Educational Institutions of the Church.

Mighty interests are involved in this work of higher Christian Education—the prosperity and permanence of the state, the intelligence and power of the Church, the welfare of our children and children's children in the coming generations.

Our Theological Schools need to be maintained with greater efficiency. The age demands a thoroughly furnished ministry, men educated and worthy of being educated, as well as "full of the Holy Ghost."

We are pleased to make reference to the proprietory Institutions within the bounds of the London Conference.

The Collegiate Institute at Dundas gives promise of great usefulness. The Female College, in Hamilton, with the Rev. Dr. Rice at its head and a large staff of thoroughly competent teachers, with all the facilities and equipments gained by years of experience, still commands the patronage and support of the community. We cherish the strong confidence that in all our Educational Institutions the sons and daughters of Christian parents not only receive a superior education but are trained up in the duties and privileges of Christian citizenship, and become "as corner stones polished after the similitude of a palace."

Our Church is also endeavouring to meet the demands which the intellectual advance of the age is making upon us, by providing healthy and vigorous current literature. The Christian Guardian and Evangelical Witness takes

first rank among family and religious newspapers, and the *Methodist Magazine* is a monthly of acknowledged power and wholesome influence. Our publications are all worthy your regard, for the object of our Book-room is not to make money, but to provide our people and the public generally with the right kind of religious literature.

We are devoutly thankful that during this year of commercial depression and disaster the various Connexional Funds have been well sustained; but the limited allowance granted to our aged and worn-out ministers constrain us to urge upon you the necessity of making a larger provision for these venerable men who have spent their life in the service of the Church.

Brethren beloved, suffer us as ministers charged with the responsibility of delivering to the people the whole counsel of God, to urge upon you the scriptural duty of systematic giving, of devoting a certain proportion of your income to charitable and religious purposes. It is needful to give heed to the solemn monitions of Scripture that we may have a true estimate of property, a clear sense of stewardship for God. Giving is an essential part of Christianity, and while the industries of the country are staggering under the pressure of restricted finance it is well to enquire whether we have not been robbing God. Malachi we have a promise of temporal blessing following the bringing of tithes and offerings into God's house, "The liberal soul shall be made fat." Proportionate giving is according to the New Testament method; it promotes a sense of personal dependence upon God, excites gratitude for providential favours, sets up a check against random and extravagant living, keeps down covetousness and lifts up business from the mere drudgery of an earthly calling into a divine service, enabling you to rejoice in success, chiefly because of the larger funds you can devote to Christ.

Sharers in your temporal things, we can also say, "We seek not yours but you." Nevertheless, for our own sakes, for the sake of our families, for the honour of Christ and for the advancement of His Church, we urge upon you this duty of

giving as an act of worship. As you cheerfully accept Sabbath time for worship, so cheerfully render Sabbath tribute to maintain it.

And along with the consecration of treasure let there be the fuller consecration of *self*. Our declared vocation is "to spread Scriptural holiness throughout the land," and that not by keeping it packed away in our creed but by enjoying it as an experience, and exhibiting it as a *life*.

Be earnest in personal effort to save souls. Let your sympathies flow out toward every work of reform, especially the Temperance movement, that is so essentially related to the cause of Christ.

Be earnest witnesses for God, attest the glory of your Master, rise in the freshness of His strength, be angels of light, be flames of fire, so shall your life-beauty shed its fragrance afar and the world take knowledge that you have been with Jesus.

Never before have we, as a Church, held so influential a position in this land. Never were our responsibilities so great. What issues are dependent on our fidelity! The inheritance we have received from our fathers must not deteriorate in our hands, but be transmitted to posterity uncorrupted in principle and pure in faith.

If your heart is still as our heart, upon us shall rest the benediction of the Most High; we shall help to mould the character and destiny of our nation until this Dominion shall become "the glory of all lands" and the "joy of the whole earth."

Brethren, we shall come to you again, we trust, "in the fulness of the blessings of the Gospel of Christ." A mighty impulse has been given by this annual assembly to our faith and hope, and as each goes forth to his appointed field, the cry shall ascend "Save now, I beseech thee, O Lord, I beseech thee send now prosperity."

We commend you, with ourselves, "to God and the word of His grace,"

Now the God of peace that brought again from the dead our Lord Jesus, that great Shepherd of the sheep, through the blood of the everlasting covenant, make you perfect in every good work, to do His will, working in you that which is pleasing in his sight through Jesus Christ; to whom be glory for ever and ever Amen."
