



ONE moment it looks as though Poland were striding forward to new power and predominance in Eastern European affairs; the next Poland. The fact of the matter is that Pilsudski plays a very patriotic and statesmanlike game. Poland has always been the Eastern European buffer Buffers are appreciated by the weak, but hated by the predatory and strong. Palond was "partitioned" during the last quarter of the eighteenth century by Russia, Austria and Prussia. As a country Poland was wiped off the map, but the Polish nation was never subdued, and during the country's darkest days produced a crop of patriots unequalled in the history of the world. Poles

were never Russianized nor Prussianized. Post-war Poland was again and remains the Eastern European buffer, but the fortunes of war had given the land back to the Poles. Little wonder it is that this people, so long persecuted, has found difficulty in setting up a stable internal policy, and yet what marvelous things have been accomplished. Despite internal rivalries and difficulties, republican Poland has revised and consolidated its finances, set up healthy industrial machinery, and pours out its manufactures through the "Danzig corridor." But last spring the internal situation became too acute and the State was near shipwreck. Marshal Pilsudski, the war hero of Poland, stepped into the breach. He declared then that his object was to clear "rascals

and incompetents" out of office. He did so.

Since then he has taken a strong hand, suppressing squabbles. He is described as a "titanic personality" and "having an eye that can look through a wall." Yet he has never dictated. He has allowed Parliament to have its opposition and has permitted the opposition to oppose. Every Last One of Us Loves Flattery, So the Art is Worth Cultivating-But Don't Be a Bungling Jollier and Lay It On Too Thick or Too Often-The Subtlest Flattery is the Implied Compliment.

WHEN the cheerful workers of society start out to do their fellow creatures their chief weapon is flattery. They hold that the compliment is the skeleton key that unlocks every heart and opens every pocketbook.



BUT, while this theory is good, the execution of it is often so bung-ling that it fails of its object. For the or the jollier is one of the most difficult arts in the world and requires a master hand.

TOUCH too little-and it damns its object with faint praise. A touch too heavy-and it nauseates with its fulsomeness. The merest careléssness of technique—and it awakens The slightest error in judgmentand it offends where it was meant to please.

IN a word, successful flattery must be that perfection of art that hides all art, and a compliment must be so cleverly disguised that the recipient does not recognize it as a jolly but accepts it as a simple and deserved tribute of his

DOROTHY DIX

NOT appreciating this, is where flatterers make their great mistake. Knowing that all of us love praise and that every mother's son and daughter of us is amenable to the soothing influence of having our fur stroked the right way, they think that our appetite for soft talk is insatiable and that we can be stuffed with fulsome compliments ad lib.

THIS is a lactical error. Few of us are sufficiently egotistical This is a lactical error. Few of us are sufficiently egotistical to care for flattery that is open, unblushing and inexhaustible. To be agreeable, it must be applied sparingly and judicially, as if it were ointment, not thown at us with a trowel as if it were some adhesive sweet stuff that could be trusted to stick where it hit.

AS BETWEEN the sexes, women are more adept flatterers than men, because they have had more experience. From time immemorial man's well-being has depended upon the skill with which she could jolly some man along. Thus has she become ambidextrous in handing out flattery with both hands.

ANY Dumb Dora can hit the mark with a compliment every time and tell in two minutes after she meets a man just where the vulnerable spot in his vanity is.

A GOOD illustration of the incidious and subtle flattery with which women treat men may be observed in the general attitude of the feminine sex, which adopts the position of incense burner toward men

ALSO, if you will notice in any company, every woman wears an alert, interested, I-am-having-the-time-of-my-life expression no matter how dull and stupid is the man to whom she is talking.

LIKEWISE, women pretend to receive every word a man utters with the reverence befitting an oracle no matter how much more they know about the subject than he does. Having thus practiced throwing bouquets at mankind in general, woman seldom misses her alm when she singles out some particular man as the target at which to hurl flattery. Now, generally speaking, there are four mistakes that the jollier

THE first is in fumbling his approach. Out of a clear sky he hurls the obvious compliment at you, and the individual who pays an obvious compliment is either a fool or takes you to be one.

FOR any one to break into a sudden rhapsody about your beauty or your cleverness does not rouse a thrill of gratified vanity in your breast. It suggests to you that you are about to be worked and that you will have to pay for this burst of admiration with cold cash or pull a string somewhere for the behoof and benefit of the flatterer.

THE next mistake that the unskilled flatterer makes is in not using sufficient discretion in paying his compliment.

OCCASIONALLY you meet a person whose vanity is so colossal that it is impossible to go astray in mixed compliments and every one of them will hit the bull's-eye every time.

BUT most of us are only vain in spots. We have a dim suspicion that we are a little shy on some good qualities, and so when we are praised for virtues we do not possess the compliment fails because our intelligence gives the lie to it.

THEREIN is where the indiscreet flatterer errs. He complimented us

THE third place where the individual who starts out to soft-soap

his way through life fails is in being too universally flattering.
Women are particularly prone to this mistake. WE ALL know women who think to make themselves agreeable by heaping compliments upon every one they meet. Every man is so handsome, so brave, so intelligent, so strong. Every new gown a sister woman wears is the most exquisite creation they ever saw. Every baby a wonder. This pean of praise that would be music to your ears if it

were sounded for you alone becomes a jarring note when you discover that they say the same thing to everybody else. IT IS only the inexperienced flatterer who compliments self-evident merit. He has his reward, to be sure, but it is noth-ing compared to that of the discriminating jollier who seeks out the hidden quality that we feel a cold and unappreciative world has overlooked and compliments us on that.

THE ugly man who has made a name for himself in literature of art or business or one of the professions is a thousand times more pleased to be thought a lady-killer than a genius. The clever woman would rather be praised for her complexion than her brains and the domestic woman will cook herself to death for him who praises not her bread but

BUT the subtlest form of flattery and the one that goes to our heads is the implied compliment. No praise of your judgment inclines your heart to an individual as having him come to you for advice. No tribute to your beauty or sonnet to your eyebrows is as flattering as finding that some one has bought a real silver frame for your photograph. Only women and diplomats are deft enough to do this, and insinuate admiration too great to be uttered.

And they are the past masters of flattery.

"VANITY of vanities, all is vanity," saith the preacher. It can get us all one way or another.







Noted Mahdi Firebrand Passes in 90th Year

LONDON, Dec. 9.—The death at Wadi Halfa of Osman Digna, the Mahdi firebrand in the Sudan of the eighties and nineties, is reported in a Cairo despatch to the Exchange Times. Emir Osman Abubekir Digna, or "Osman the Ugly" as he was nicknamed, lived to be more than 90 years of age, notwithstanding all the battles he had fought. His origin has always been a matter of doubt, whether a pure native or a mixed native European breed. He was originally a slave dealer and joined the Dervish Mahdi in 1883, when the latter revolt-
