



"We are all ready to go," remarked Harry Beach, castern manager of the Western Packing Corporation, manu-facturers of jams, jellies, marmalades, canned fruit and vegetables, when ask ou yesterday when ne thought the com



pany's new plant would get underway at Coldbrook.

"Pipe fitters have been on the job for the last six weeks getting everything into shape and, except for a machine or two being completed by local concerns, which will be ready in a couple of days, the factory is ready to turn on a full head of steam and will keep running continuously for the next few months at full capacity."

An interesting statement made by Mr. Beach was that the plant would be in operation during the slack season as well as during the black season as well as during the blusy months. Work of making marmalades and compound jams would be undertaken during the slack times, he said.

"At present," Mr. Beach said, "about 200 men and girls have their names down to start work, and more may be required to take care of the heavy supply of strawberries, which we expect to come in. More than 100,000 cans are on the way to the factory and delivery is expected in plenty of time while there are other supplies in the factory at present, and are all ready,"



Contributions to be Asked For Erection of Shakespeare

LONDON, July 18—The council of governors of the Shakespeare Memorial Theatre are planning a world-wide appeal to all lovers of dramatic art to contribute to the rebuilding and endowment of the national memorial at Stratford-on-Avon.

The governors, recently selected, are five distinguished men representing art, architecture, finance, literature and the stage. They are Sir Charles Holmes, director of the National Gallery, Guy Dawber, president of the Royal Institute of British Architects, Reginald McKenna, the famous banker, Sir James Barrie, the playwright, and Harley Granville-Barker, playwright and producer.

Several meetings have been held by the governors, and the available ground at Stratford has been carefully examined. It is generally agreed that it will be impossible to build an adequate modern theatre on the old site, which is on the river bank, restricted in area and generally below water level. Other adjacent sites already in the possession of the governors, are considered more suitable.

The money available at the moment for rebuilding the theatre consists of \$125,000 paid by the insurance company and about \$100,000 subscribed since the fire of the old theatre. This is totally inadequate to do the work ambitiously contemplated. It is prob-






