



BRITISH SENSE OF FAIR PLAY SHOWN IN MAHON MURDER CASE

United States Lawyers Were Astonished at Conduct of Case.

London, Aug. 16—(United Press)—
British sense of fair play and absolute justice has just been demonstrated here by the astonishing tactice used in one of the most sensational murder trials ever known in England — the "Mahon case."

That sense of fair play and justice caused the court to withhold from the jury, and caused every newspaper in England to refrain from printing, the fact that the man accused of one of the most revolting crimes ever recorded here, had a long criminal record previous to the crime for which he was being tried.

After the verdict had been returned and sentence passed, the judge informed the jury of the man's previous crimes—and the next day the news papers, which for weeks had been filled with the trial and stories of the crime printed the facts they had known all along, of the defendant's previous life of crime.


Americans Astonished.

U. S. lawyers, here for the international bar association meeting, have been utterly astounded at this situation, by comparison with what would have happened in the United States under similar circumstances.

They admit the splendid ideal of justice involved—the theory that a defendant should be tried only for the single crime of which he is then accussed. But they point out that a hardened and habitual criminal might escape justice under the operation of that theory.

Referring to the bill presented to the British House just before prorogation which would make effective the decision of the Ulster Boundary Commission whether or not there was an Ulster representative on it, Lord Beaverbrook pointed out that unless a settlement was effected between now and the opening of the House, the bill must be presented. 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





M. E. Agar, chairman, presided.
Others present were Commissioners Mrs. J. V. McLellan, Dr. E. J. Ryan, W. E. Emerson, J. L. O'Brien, Hon. Dr. W. F. Roberts, J. King Kelley, K. C., and R. H. Gale, superintendent.
The committee stated it did not join in the adverse criticism of the Colwell Fuel Company, and could not place unquestioned reliance upon the statements that had been made against the company or upon the data supplied. The committee had considered the statement that the Board would suffer a loss of \$1,500 this year because of its contract with the company, and the statement that a ton of coal a day more than was necessary was being burned. The committee believed the facts did not justify either statement and gave a review of measures leading up to the calling for tenders for this year's coal when, through the committee's action, as it was believed, prices 25 cents a ton lower than the contract of the previous year were secured. If the same amount of coal was consumed this year a saving of \$423.50 would be secured, it was stated. The records of the previous showed the weights of

coals consumed to be 1,071 tons in 1923, and 1,096 this year, counting to the end of July in each case.

Miss M. Murdoch, superintendent of nurses, forwarded a letter asking the board to contribute \$50 to the University of the State of New York for inspection of the nursing school in order that the nurses might be recognized in New York and the standard of the school approved by that organization.

Mr. Agar took the view that this was simply a request to fit the nurses to go away to New York to practice their profession. Between July, 1892, when it was opened, and May 31 of last year there have been 2,866 admitted to the home. There is accommodation for 250, and the average number of residents during the fiscal year 1923 was 211.

are eligible at any time after 18 months membership. The home is maintained by a monthly assessment on all the members of the union.

He was sent out there by the St. John union some months ago. Many tourists, he writes, visit che home. Many conventions meet in Colorado, and the delegates do not fail to call at the printers' institution. In April there were 5,000 Rotarians, 8,000 Elks and the musicians' union there, and all had pictures taken on the grounds.

Mr. McEachern's cheery message will be read with interest by many friends at home. In addition to his other activities here he was a member of the McEachern Brothers' Quarette, whose singing has been an enjoyable feature of many entertainments in St. John and vicinity. The picture of Mr. McEachern, here produced, shows him looking well in his temporary home, far from the St. John hearthstone. 
