

The warships went ashore while cruising from San Francisco to San Diego Saturday night shortly after nine p.m. in a dense fog. Mistaken position in relation to the coast line is believed to have caused the crash. The destroyers were speeding through the fog, hugging the shore in single file formation when they piled up on the rocks from 200 to 500 yards apart about 300 yards off shore.

Washington, Sept. 10.—The theory was expressed today by high naval officials that a tidal wave or other seisficials that a tidal wave or other seismic disturbance, reacting from the Japanese earthquake, caused the disaster to destroyer division eleven off the California coast yesterday.

A message received at the naval department early today from Admiral Robison, commanding the U. S. Pacific fleet, said no movable material could be salvaged from the seven U. S. destroyers stranded on the California coast at Point Honda, until the heavy surf abated. The message did not refer to the number of lives lost. It read as follows:

The clinics detect and treat contractors are called "sight conservation of the parents, unless under proper treatment, all candidates get a thorough eye examination and suitable cases are recommended for admission to sight conservation classes. 

# VICTORIES MARK RING CAREER OF FIRPO, SEEKING CHAMPIONSHIP INTO THIRD PLACE

Firpo's Ancestors

Possessed Castles

Remarkable Career of Argentine Pugilist - Meets Dempsey Friday.

Atlantic City, Sept. 10.—Luis Angel Firpo is a direct descendant of the Italian nobility of the Twelfth Century.

Shortly before he went to the dog park this afternoon for a sparring session in which he all but knocked out three of his helpmates, Luis Angel received an official looking sheepskin, decorated with gold seals, a coat of arms and Latin writing.

The coat of arms, a shield with three inverted "V's" across it had some Latin below the shield telling about the audaciousness of the family Firpo and then in the history of the family it is said that the Firpos, as far back as known, were of the highest caste, owned castles and were intrepid warriors.

New York, Sept. 10.—(A. P.)—In the winter of 1922 Luis Angel Pirpo, the Argentine who is to fight Jack Dempsey for the world heavyweight title at the Polo Grounds, September 14, came to the United States, one of the strongest and most courageous, if crudest fighters, that ever walked on a resin sprinkled ring floor.

Luis Angel couldn't talk American, except when money was mentioned, and it was several, weeks before he gathered some of his friends about him and arranged a match in which he was to prove to some of the doubters that he could punch.

The victors of that show, Firpo and Willard, met for the final test in the great pine bowl at Boyle's Thirty Acres, Jersey City, in July before one of the largest crowds in fight history. Firpo cleared the path for his match with Dempsey by knocking out Willard in the eighth round, but to many it was a disappointing conflict. They pawed at each other clumsily for a greater share of the first seven rounds, Firpo's body púnches doing the most damage, while in the final round a succession of rights to the body and head floored Willard, who took the count on the first knock-down.

Firpo followed this triumph by an exhibition tour of the Middle West and East, meeting a variety of opponents, two of whom managed to stay the limit with him. At Omaha Homer Smith was floored more than a dozen times by Firpo, but was on his feet at the end, while at Indianapolis, where 16-ounce gloves were used, Joe Downey stayed the limit of 10 rounds. Downey, however, absorbed so much punishment that he was taken to a hospital after the boút.

Jimmy DeForest, veteran trainer who conditioned Dempsey for his championship fight with Willard at Toledo in 1919, directed Firpo's battles with Brennan, McAuliffe and Willard, but shortly afterward he was dropped by the South American in favor of Horatio Lavelle, wealthy Buenos Aires sportsman. Firpo and DeForest both denied reports of a break over financial terms, but the boxer was the target for criticism by experts who believed he had made a mistake in disposing of the veteran who was credited with developing him into championship calibre. Firpo and Lavelle, however, insisted that the change was made because of the handicap caused by DeForest's inability to speak Spanish.
