Men Postpone Coal Strike Notices, Owners Admit Principle of Minimum Wage; All Negotiate to Settle Amount of It

(Canadian Press) London, Feb. 23.—According to the Daily Telegraph, Premier Asquith, at the conference at the foreign office yesterday, proposed: First, postponement of the date of operation of the strike notices; Second, that the owners should admit the principle of a minimum wage; Third, that negotiations should cease to settle the amount of the minimum wage.

SHIP REPAIR WORKS FOR LIVERPOOL

Harland & Wolff to Have Plant These Employing Nearly 1,000 Hands

London, Feb. 23.—It is now certain that Harland & Wolff, Belfast, shipbuilding firm, intend to establish a ship-repairing works at Liverpool. At a meeting of the Mersey Docks and Harbour Board yesterday, it was recommended by a committee that the North Dock yard at Bootle should be let to Harland & Wolff and the location was decided. The site had been taken on a sixty-year lease.

KING LUMBER MILLS COMPANY WINS IN SUIT AGAINST C.P.R.

St. John Lawyers Get Word of Outcome of Case in Nelson, B.C. — Senator King, Company President

A telegram received by Messrs. Barnhill, Deane & Sanford has conveying from Nelson, B. C., announced that the King Lumber Mills, Ltd., had won a unanimous verdict in their action against the Canadian Pacific Railway. The action was brought for damages caused to their lands by a fire which the lumber company alleges was started by reason of the negligence of Canadian Pacific Railway employees. The fire occurred about two years ago and burned over a small portion of the lands which the lumber company owns situated at Cranbrook, B. C. The amount involved is about \$100,000. The King Lumber Mills Limited has amongst its largest shareholders several New Brunswick men, including Senator King of Chatham, who is president.

SETTLEMENT OF STRIKE WILL RELEASE STEAMERS

Glasgow Sailings Now Expected To Go On As Usual

New York, Feb. 23.—Settlement of the dockers' strike at Glasgow, which has tied up the shipping there for the last five weeks, is confirmed on a cablegram received today by the Anchor Line from the representative at the Scottish port. The cablegram reads: "Labor strike is over; work has been resumed and service will go on as heretofore."

CHINESE IS PRIZE ORATOR

South Bethlehem, Pa., Feb. 23.—A Chinese student is this year's winner of the first prize in the junior oratorical contest at Lehigh University. He is Chaimin Chu Fuh of Nanking, Jiang Su. His subject: "The present revolution in China." He won the Wilbur scholarship last June. This amounts to \$250, and is the largest cash prize at Lehigh.

BATHURST LUMBER CO.

A Bathurst letter to the Chatham World says that the parties who bought off E. D. Adams a vice of the Bathurst Lumber Company, and that they own all the lumber lands on all the rivers that are worth anything. There is about thirty million feet of lumber at the two mills to ship yet, and they have been shipping for six or eight winters. SAYS ANGEL CAME AND CURED HER

Remarkable Recovery of Health, Hearing and Sight By English Girl

Bedridden Five Years Says That on Last Sunday She Saw Vision and a Voice Announced That Her Sufferings Were Over — Keen Interest Aroused

(Canadian Press) London, Feb. 23.—There is a great interest in the case of Dorothy Kern of Horne Hill, a short distance from London, who says she has been restored to health and regained a vision of an angel last Sunday.

The girl says that she saw a vision of a figure and heard a voice saying: "Thy sufferings are over" and that she was able to get up and walk. Miss Kern, who is twenty-two years old, was bedridden for five years, with a mild attack of hysteria. She has been blind and deaf.

Many physicians who examined her case are inclined to the opinion that the cure was effected by auto-suggestion through her intense emotional state, and that this caused her vision. Her account of the angelic vision which restored her senses and relieved all pain is ascribed to hysteria by skeptics, but the facts of the recovery are beyond dispute.

The young women have been the guests of the family of P. A. Hutchings, manager of a large lumber camp operating at Madras. Owing to the increased activity of the rebels at Chihuahua, it is said that Governor Wilson has made demands that his daughter and her friend be conducted to the American border. The rebels refuse to permit the railroad company to run a train from Madras to Juarez until the situation improves.

Madras has declared in favor of Antonio Rojas, a rebel leader, and in celebrating the event burned a large part of the Mexican quarter.

STORM TOLL IS LIVES OF TWENTY

South Hard Hit in Hurricane—Eight Men Dead in Burning Mine and Casualty List May Be Increased

(Canadian Press) New Orleans, Feb. 23.—Twenty persons were killed and at least three score injured, many of them seriously, by the cyclonic storm which swept through a strip of northern Louisiana and Mississippi on Tuesday evening. Dozens of small houses were blown down, and many cattle killed.

The property damage, according to the incomplete reports received here, will probably total a half million dollars. The fatalities, except in three instances were confined to negroes. One white woman was killed at Shreveport, an aged white woman was killed at Homer, La., and a white man named Timmon was killed near Ringgold, La.

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MINISTERS PUT "GO PREACHERS" ON NORTH SHORE ON DEFENCE

(Chatham World). The Johnston schoolhouse, Napan, was packed to the doors, Tuesday night. Rev. J. M. MacLean and Rev. Geo. Wood led the meeting and notified the Go preachers to attend. Mr. Wood read affidavits charging certain tramp preachers in Europe with stirring young women away from home and other offences, and charged that the two Napan missionaries belonged to the same gang; and that one of them had been personally concerned in the disappearance of a P. E. Island girl.

The accused admitted being in fellowship with the persons accused by the affidavits, but denied that there was any organization. They admitted knowledge of the island girl's disappearance, and said she was working as a preacher for the salvation of souls. The seance lasted till midnight.

The Chatham ministers held the tramp preachers down to the personal issue pretty closely, and declined to engage in a doctrinal debate with them. U. S. SECRETARY OF STATE ON MISSION TO CENTRAL AMERICA

### THE PROVINCIAL DAIRY SCHOOL

The next session of the New Brunswick Dairy School will open in Sussex on March 19, when there will first be a ten day course in butter-making, both for creamery and home butter makers, with a full course of lectures upon the production

and care of milk and cream, covering the selection, testing, care and feeding of dairy cattle as well as the prevention of and remedies for common ailments. Instruction will be given on the care and operation of hand and factory separators, and for those who desire it there will be training in soft-cheese making for home dairies. During the course, to which ladies are especially invited, lectures upon the production and marketing of poultry and eggs will be given by Seth Jones, provincial poultry superintendent. Lectures upon animal and field husbandry will be given by Professor E. S. Archibald and veterinary science by Professor John Standish, both of the Nova Scotia Agricultural College. This course will close on March 29, and on April 2 a course in cheese-making will begin, continuing till April 12. During both courses, instruction in milk-testing will be given. It is expected that all those who are intending to operate creameries or cheese factories will attend one or both of these courses. Tuition is free and board can be obtained at reasonable rates. ## LIBERALS OF MONCTON IN RALLY

Great Enthusiasm Over Victory of Hon. Mr. Graham in Renfrew

### STRAIGHT TALK BY SPEAKERS

Senator McSweeney, C. M. Leger and Geo. R. McCord—"Borden Not Big Enough for His Job"—Mr. Flemming Gets Raking

(Special to Times)

Moncton, Feb. 23.—The Moncton Liberal club at its monthly meeting last evening was addressed by Senator McSweeney, C. M. Leger, M.P., George R. McCord, of Sackville. The meeting was an excellent one. As strong points were made by the speakers, and announcements of the results of the bye-election in South Renfrew were made, much enthusiasm was manifested.

H. C. Charters, president of the club, occupied the chair. Senator McSweeney spoke briefly, reviewing conditions at Ottawa since the opening of the present session, contrasting the Liberal and the Conservative parties, showing that the opposition, under the leadership of Sir Wilfrid Laurier, is ably dealing with the issues of the day, while the government forces are endeavoring to evade important questions. Senator McSweeney spoke of the club on the splendid quarters, spoke of the feeling of confidence in the ranks of the Liberal party. He dealt with various phases of provincial politics, contrasting the record of the government now in power at Fredericton with the promises made while in opposition. He also criticized the gerrymandering of Westmorland county, saying that it had been done by the government in the hope of partisan gain, and contending that the city of Moncton should have been given more than one representative.

Mr. McCord delivered an able address. He said that there was a feeling abroad that the present government at Ottawa would not last long. He declared that reciprocity was not dead, it was a live issue in this province, as it was in the west, and he believed that this question would take a leading place in the discussions during the next provincial campaign. He noted that an effort was being made to put the Liberal party in the position of a "kicker".

Partners supporting the Liberal party had been brow-beaten by the Conservatives, expressed doubts as to the success of Mr. Flemming's policy. Farmers said that before farmers were brought into the province, attention should be given to conditions which have resulted in so many vacancies in the province. Production should be encouraged by giving larger markets to the farmers of the province. Mr. McCord took up the statement credited to Mr. Flemming in his party journals to the effect that farmers do not raise enough. Mr. McCord argued that if farmers were assured of larger markets for their products, there would be a large output. He requested the impatience that the farmers of the province were indulgent to produce what they should. "Production is stifled in this province," said Mr. McCord.

On motion of Dr. C. A. Murray, a vote of thanks was tendered the speaker. The conclusion of the meeting the Moncton Liberal club sent a telegram to Hon. Mr. Graham congratulating him upon his magnificent victory.



NEW SUGAR PROJECT

The matter of a sugar refinery in the city was revived yesterday by the visit of Norman J. C. Mather, of the financial firm of Murray & Mather, Toronto. Mr. Mather says his firm has made the financial arrangements for the Atlantic Sugar Refineries, Limited, the successors of F. C. Durant, and Mr. Mather came here to determine the present status of the company's agreement with the city.

GREAT CITY HERE

What may be taken as expert evidence as to the present boom having a very real existence was given yesterday by Mr. Mather, who has been making inquiries with a view to investment here. He was particularly interested in the possibility of bringing a cheaper power to the city and regards this feature as one of the essentials of "making the city a great manufacturing as well as a great exporting city."

"There is no reason why you should not have the greatest city of Canada right here," Mr. Mather told a reporter. "We are only on an island here, St. John and we have nearly 400,000 population. I think the wise young man in St. John today will conclude to stay right here and help to boost, and in fact, I had more of the western spirit prevailing in St. John today than I have found anywhere else on the Great Lakes. I am often at Ottawa on business and in meeting the members of parliament I find they are beginning to talk their own provinces and to insist that you will get a fair share of the money spent for attracting immigration to the Dominion. This is not my first visit to the maritime provinces and I find that after all they were not dead, but sleeping and that now they are beginning to wake up."

WHOLE FAMILY ARRESTED FOR FEARFUL CRIME

Slew Father and Buried His Disembodied Body in Yard of Home. Madrid, Feb. 23.—A terrible story of crime is reported from Alicante, Spain. A well-to-do cattle dealer, named Pascual Panabá, lived with his wife, six daughters and two sons in the village of Almoradi. The father was a man of excellent repute and much respected, but his sons were notorious gamblers and evil livers. On January 20 Panabá had occasion to remonstrate with his youngest son over some act, and the lad resented it so strongly that his father boxed his ears. From that date the father was not seen by the neighbors. The family spread the report that he had left home after a quarrel. This explanation did not satisfy the missing man's brothers, who set on foot searching inquiries. As nothing could be ascertained as to Panabá's whereabouts, the local authorities were consulted, and a magistrate visited the family to question them. Their answers were so contradictory and confusing that the magistrate's suspicions were aroused, and he had the house searched. Still no trace of the missing man could be discovered. Then the magistrate ordered a newly-piled heap of wood in a corner of the garden to be removed and the earth dug up. As soon as the wife heard of this she fainted. After digging for a little time the body of the cattle dealer was unearthed. It was frightfully mutilated, the head being severed from the body and one leg being missing. The family then confessed their crime. One of the sons dug a hole for a dead animal, and the father was asked to see if it was big enough. As he peered into it the eldest son killed him with an axe. Finding that the hole was not large enough, the body was dismembered, and one leg subsequently found, was buried elsewhere. All the family were arrested and as they were being removed to jail the neighbors tried to lynch them. The Deirer Mint is coining new nickels for the first time in its history, at the rate of \$9,000 a day. The coinage will continue for ten days, and in that time about 1,000,000 of the five-cent pieces will be struck off.

West Trade of South America

The foreign trade of the Latin-American republics with all the world during the last five years has advanced from \$1,700,000,000 gold to \$2,300,000,000 gold, an increase of \$600,000,000, according to the annual report of Director General John Barrett, of the Pan-American Union. The total value of the trade exchanges between the United States and the other republics of this continent has grown in the same period from \$600,000,000 to \$900,000,000, an increase of \$300,000,000. These figures serve to give an idea of the commercial importance of the Latin-American republics. Impressive as the figures are they represent only a fraction of what the trade of the Latin-American republics will become when all of them settle down to a tranquil orderly and industrious existence and they begin to be developed in a really systematic manner and on a scale commensurate with their varied and inexhaustible resources. NORTON GRIFFITHS' GREAT CONTRACT ON THE PACIFIC

Understood That the Cost of British Columbia Work Will Be More Than Seven Millions

(Victoria Colonist) The Norton-Griffiths contracting company has been awarded the contract for building the government docks at the port of St. John, an undertaking that will cost in the neighborhood of seven million dollars, and while the fact is interesting on account of the magnitude of the contract which has been signed and ratified by the parties, it is also interesting on account of the fact that it represents the first government contract to be awarded this great contracting firm in the Dominion, and when it is considered that Sir John Jackson endeavored to obtain the same for his world-renowned dock-building company it will be realized what the contract means to the Norton-Griffiths concern, which, within the past few years has extended the field of its operations all over the world. While there is no definite date to go upon it would not be at all surprising in the event of the government deciding to construct similar docks on the Pacific coast a project that has been long considered and long agitated for, if the same company secures the contract. At the present time the Norton-Griffiths firm is largely represented in the city of Victoria, being engaged in the construction of several important blocks among which might be mentioned the Belmont hotel on the corner of Humboldt and Government streets and the Union bank on Government street. It is only recently that the company has come to Canada at all, but their name is well known throughout Europe, the United States, South America and the Far East. Only a few months ago Mr. Norton Griffiths, the head of the great concern, was in the city of Victoria consulting with Premier McBride in regard to provincial developments, and it is yet possible that as a result of these conversations something tangible may ensue. When Mr. Norton Griffiths left here he went to Mexico where his contract has been awarded for the construction of a great line of railroad. After putting things in shape there he went back to London where he negotiated for another great railroad contract in Russia, and at the present time he is in the city of St. John, in the country after having signed up an important agreement for the execution of work there. Railroad construction is the special forte of the company but, of course, they are open to do all kinds of contracting work providing it is big enough for their enterprise. The present contract to build the docks at St. John for the Canadian government is the only work of the kind they

VERDICT GIVEN IN THOS. EVANS INQUEST

The coroner's jury, which investigated the death of Thomas Evans, a fisherman who was killed by falling down the hatch of the steamer Shenandoah on July 7, 1911, brought in the following verdict last night.

"We, the jury empaneled to inquire into the cause of death of the late Thomas Evans, find that he came to death through injuries received by falling down a hatch on the steamer Shenandoah while discharging cargo and also

"We find that from the evidence, although the steamer is equipped with an electric light plant, such lights were not turned on at the time of the accident, also

"We find that the hatch cover was of the bunk type which should not have been used

"That these facts are evidence of negligence on the part of the officers of the steamer and contributory to the cause of accident."

The victim of the accident lived for several weeks and before his death his sons also sickened and died. Coroner Berryman commended the jury. Judge J. H. Armstrong represented the steamship company and D. Mullin, K. C., the Evans' family.

Annexation Decree Proclaimed

Rome, Feb. 23.—The royal decree proclaiming the annexation of Tripolitana and Cyrenaica, was presented yesterday by Premier Giolitti in the chamber of deputies and in the senate. Patriotic speeches were made and scenes of enthusiasm ensued.

WILL BUILD MANY APARTMENT HOUSES

This Summer to See Great Activity in This Line in Toronto

There are now about one hundred apartment houses scattered throughout the city. This number will probably be nearly doubled by the end of the summer.

Eight or ten apartments are now under construction, chiefly in the north end of the city. Several architects are known to have plans under way. Builders are promised considerable work of this class of structure.

Enquiry for sites is quite a feature of the real estate market, and as the number available is rapidly decreasing, keen competition is resulting. Locations close to downtown are most in demand.

The proposals to ask for legislation to keep apartment houses out of certain districts of the city has, so agents say, developed the building of them this spring. Demand for room is the chief reason for the activity, for there is difficulty in getting tenants months in advance.

Many of the objections to apartment houses have disappeared. The building of them has been learned that they must be put up in keeping with architectural standards of the city.

MARRIAGE REFERENCE TO COURT

Dominion Cabinet Has Fixed on Terms, Text of Order

QUESTIONS SET FORTH

Concluding Words of Judge Charbonneau in Giving Hebert Case Judgment Yesterday—Some Interviews in Connection With the Judge's Decision

Ottawa, Feb. 22.—The cabinet has fixed on the terms of the reference to the marriage law. The text of the order in council is as follows:

"The committee of the privy council, on the recommendation of the minister of justice, advise that pursuant to section 69 of the Supreme Court Act, the following questions be referred to the Supreme Court of Canada for hearing and consideration, namely:

1.—(A)—Has the parliament of Canada authority to amend the whole or in part, Bill No. 3 of the first session of the twelfth parliament of Canada, entitled, "An Act to amend the Marriage Act."

2.—(B)—Does the law of the Province of Quebec render null and void contracts entered into by a Roman Catholic priest, a marriage that was solemnized by legal binding, which takes place in such province?

3.—(C)—Does the law of the Province of Quebec render null and void contracts entered into by a Roman Catholic priest, a marriage that was solemnized by legal binding, which takes place in such province?

4.—(D)—Between persons who are both Roman Catholics, or

5.—(E)—Between persons one of whom only is a Roman Catholic.

MOUNTAINOUS SEAS IN THE BAY

Mount Temple Commander Reports a Wild Night in Fundy Waters — Today's Waterfront News

The C. P. R. liner Mount Temple, Captain Moore, from London and Antwerp with a large general cargo and 573 passengers, arrived at Sand Point this morning about nine o'clock and docked at No. 1 berth. The big liner, which left Antwerp on Feb. 8, arrived off the island yesterday morning at last past eight o'clock, after having had a fairly good passage across. While waiting for the tide, in order to come to Sand Point, the storm, which did so much damage on land and sea yesterday, arose, and she was forced to remain anchored there. At night, however, the gale grew so violent that Captain Moore thought it would be advisable to turn his vessel seaward again.

This course was pursued and the steamer was taken down the bay for several miles and rode out the storm without any mishap. She came up to the island again early this morning and from there proceeded direct to her berth at the point. Captain Moore said this morning that last night's storm was one of the strongest he has ever in. The wind blew at the rate of sixty miles an hour and the seas were mountainous high, washing the docks at frequent intervals. Everything was all right on board the big liner however, and there was little, if any, alarm among the passengers.

The Mount Temple brought 573 passengers, most of them of the same nationality, and a fine, healthy looking lot. There was very little sickness among them on the way over. Most of them are for western points and will go forward by special trains this afternoon. They were inspected at the wharf this morning by the immigration officials and with the exception of one or two, will be allowed to proceed on their way. The C. P. R. liner Empress of Ireland will dock at the wharf at the same time during the afternoon.

The S. S. Blodestan, Captain Forest, sailed this morning at eleven o'clock for Bermuda via Halifax with a large general cargo. The S. S. Manchester Commerce which was due in port yesterday afternoon, did not arrive until early this morning, having been detained on account of last night's storm. The big liner anchored in the harbor at Sand Point and will dock early this afternoon. The Allan Star, Pomeranian was to arrive at the wharf at the same time. The S. S. Inishowen Head, Captain Kane, sailed between 10 and 11 o'clock this afternoon for Dublin with a large general cargo, coming principally of grain, deals and flour.

PETERSON TOLD HIM DALEY BREAK WAS MADE BY ANOTHER

Detective Killen Adds to This Interesting Evidence in This Case

Hearing in the case against William Peterson, charged with breaking and entering the barber store of James Daley in Dock street, and also the premises of the Church of England Institute in the same street, was continued in the Police Court this morning. Detective Killen told of going to Barber shops in the city and securing razors, which the prisoner had sold. This closed the case for the prosecution, and E. S. Ritchie for the defendant announced that he would call one or two witnesses to-morrow. The case was then adjourned, and the prisoner was further remanded to jail.
