Two Islands To Rent Islands are to let in the Atlantic.
The British Colonial Office are inviting tenders for a license conferring the exclusive right to occupy the Nightingale and Inaccessible Islands Nightingale and Inaccessible Islands and Gough Islands for whaling, sealing, and getting guano. The islands in question are, it may be remembered, a small group, of which Tristan de Cunha is the principal, in the Atlantic, midway between Cape Colony and South America. The licensees have to undertake that whenever they despatch a vessel to or from the islands it shall touch at Tristan da Cunha for mails and goods, and that they will maintain good order on the islands. This should not be difficult, as the population of the chief island, Tristan da Cunha, is only at the most probably 100 souls, while, according to the Colonial Office list, "there is no strong drink on the island and no crime." ALLEGED NEW ISLAND as yet been verified by the M. and F. department.

The existence of a new Island, sixteen niles E. N. E. of Sable Island, has been eported here by the American fishing chooner Lizzie Giffin, but no confirmatory formation on this subject has been r ceived by the Marine and Fisheries Department yet, although they sent a wireless to the Superintendent of Sable Island for a report on the discovery. The sands around this spot are continually shifting. Much of Sable Island has been washed away at various periods, only to be cast up again at other points by the waves.

Mr. Harvey of the Marine & Fisheries Department stated that the Lady Laurier when she leaves for Sable Island next Monday will make an undeavor to locate the supposed island which was reported some time ago by Captain Anderson, of Gloucester. eived by the Marine and Fisheries De

the supposed island which was reported some time ago by Captain Anderson, of Gloucester.

R. J. Boutiller, the late superintendent of the island, who is now connected with the Halifax offices of the Marine and Fisheries, says that the northeast bar extends a long way out from the Island, and that in his time vessels have been stranded on it as far out at ten niles from the lighthouse. The newly formed land may be a sand spit on the extreme end of the bank, but it being ten feet above high water, seems to be against this idea. Sable island in its present shape was the work of centuries and it would be impossible for the wind to throw up a great bank of sand, ten feet high, in a single night, or week, or month, or year.

No earth tremors have been reported at the various stations where such are recorded by the powerful instruments kept for that purpose. If the new island is the result of a quake, the sea waves which usually follow, have not been reported. Fin a violent sub-marine earthquake, the ordinary earth wave and sound waye are accompanied by sea waves, which may be 30, 30 or 80 feet higher than the highest ide and are very much dreaded. Nothing of this kind has been reported from Sable Island, where, if such a thing occurred, the whole island would have been under water.

SHIP ON FIRE.

The Sowwell, with her cotton cargo ablaze, put into Halifax yesterday.

The British freighter Sowwell arrived in port yesterday atternoon, with her forward deck red hot from fiaming cotton below her hatches. With a very valuable cargo in her holds the Sow well left Savannah, Georgia, for Havre, France, twelve days ago, calling for coal at Newport News en route. Early last Friday morning smoke was seen arising from the ventillators, and then began the battle to save the ship and the lives of those on board.

Hardly had the alarm of "Fire" brought all hands on deek than the steering apparatus—first the machine and then the hand, cear—broke down, and for five hours the ship floundered helplessly amid the waves of a northeast gale. She was turned towards Halifax and at top speed the Sowwell steamed the four hundred miles to this port.

No matter how high the pinnacle of fame we may have reached—in after years, long after the departure of the loving heart into the great beyond, we bow low still at that sacred thing, the vacant chair.

Elisa Cook was just what her noble poetry would lead you to imagine as the author of the Old Arm Chair, whose exquisite lines have sunken into the hearts of almost every living soul at some time. We read of her as being a frank, brave and warm-hearted girl, about 20 years of age when she penned those lines. She was born in London in 1317 and died in Wimbledon, Sept. 23, 1839.

What child can forget the pride and pleasure with which they sang Afton Water at school? The verse was written by Robert Burns, who died miserably poor at the age of only 37.

JUSTIFYING ITSELF.

Ontario Clay Belt Fulfils Exp Ontario Clay Belt Fulfils Repectations of Pioneers.

Indisputable evidence of the remarkable growth and development of Timiskaming was to be seen on all sides at the fall fairs held at Englehart and Charlon this autumn.

As proof of the rapid progress being made in Timiskaming, one only has to compare the conditions under which Englehart held its first exhibition five years ago with those that obtained at this years fair.

Five years ago there were stumps all over the lot where the fair was beld, in fact little more than the stumps occurred the grounds outside of the actual exhibits. The present grounds comprise 15 acres of classed and well prepared ground, with a splendid building for the display aroots and vegetables, gralls in the shear, with a portion reserved for the display of women's work.

Dealing with the much-discussed will of the clay belt, J. L. Englehart, the T. & N. O. Railway commissioner, said the other day:
