Lorin's artists, that they even expressed a regret that such gems should be allowed to depart to asmi-barbarous place like New York, where something less valuable and elegant would evoke more appreciation. THE CORNER STONE

of the new Cathedral was laid with imposing ceremonies, on the 15th of August, the feast of the Assumption, 1858. The foundations of the Cathedral rest on a bed of solid rock, in which excavations therefor had to be made. At the normal level of the surrounding grounds rest a chisel dressed base course of granite. From this springs a pure Gothic superstructure, similar in architecture to the style obtaining in Europe during the thirteenth and fourteenth centuries. Like the Cathedrals at Amiens, Reims, and Cologne, St. Patrick's is free from the heaviness and over ornamentation which are the distinguishing characteristics of ecclesiastical edifices of previous date. The main entrance, on Fifth avenue, is 12 feet deep, 30 feet wide and embowered in carved devices.
