



SAYS GERMANY WANTS

AMITY WITH ENGLAND

Can be No Possible Reason for War.

BERLIN, June 1—A leading article in Die Post, which is evidently inspired, draws attention to recent articles in a section of the London press calculated to sow dissension between Germany and England by statements to the effect that in Germany war between the two countries is regarded as inevitable. The Post, which is by no means friendly to England, emphatically states that in Germany no responsible politician holds this view. On the contrary, in Germany, as in England, responsible men know no higher object than the maintenance of peace, and regard existing armaments as serving this purpose.

Between the two countries, it says, there does not exist any question to cause a conflict. There are no points of friction which could lead necessarily to war. Not only is this the opinion of statesmen but of the vast majority of the people of both nations. It is only a dwindling minority on both sides which thinks otherwise, a minority which has no influence on international politics. It is a direct perversion of the truth not to recognize this and to give as the public opinion of Germany the views which fill the heads of fools or criminals. The Post stigmatizes this method of controversy as perfidious, as a warfare against which the sharpest measures are accessary.

SUMMER'S WORK

Has Come, He Says

No Longer a Question of Invention but improvement—Will Remain at laddeck for Some Time.

HALIFAX, N. S., June 2.—"The age of the flying machine has come. It is now no longer a question of invention, but of improvement, and I have no doubt that this year I will succeed in flying my kites with a motor attached. This year I will endeavor to lift a man and a motor with my kites, and I shall remain at Baddeck until I see the machine in the aid," said . Professor Graham Bell of Washington, who arrived on the Plant liner Halifax from Boston tonight, en route to his summer on the Plant liner Halifax from Boston tonight, en route to his summer home in Baddeck, C. B. He was accompanied by two of his assistants. He has spent the winter in gathering materials for his evperiments, which will be resumed at once. The new and very light motor and seven thousand tetrahedral cells will be used.

"Probably I will smash the machine half a dozen times before I get it flying," said Prof. Bell, "but that is usual in all inventions. There will be no damage, as I will be extremely care-

no damage, as I will be extremely care

In contradistinction to the aeropla In contradistinction to the aeroplane used by Santos Dumont, Wright brothers and other aeronauts, Prof. Bell proposes to make the lifting power commensurate with the weight of his kite by fastening a lot of small tetrahedral cells together to form one kite. These cells are constructed of four triangles fastened together to form a pyramid, two of the four sides being covered over with silk. The cells are fastened together at the corners. By this means the weight and lifting power of his machine increases in the same ratio. Last year the kite of 1,300 cells was successfully flown by Dr. Bell, who with 7,000 cells expects to have no difficulty in lifting his motor, which weighs one hundred and twenty pounds. Dr. Bell is confident of making many improvements in his flying machine this summer. He leaves for Baddeck tomorrow.




