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THIRD REPORT

OF THE GENERAL COMMITTEE OF THE DIOCESAN CHURCH SOCIETY OF NOVA SCOTIA.

THE Annual Meeting of the DIOCESAN CHURCH SOCIETY OF NOVA SCOTIA took place at Halifax, on Wednesday, the 24th day of February, A. D. 1841.

Divine Service was performed in St. Paul's Church at 11 A. M., and an appropriate Sermon was delivered by the Right Revd. the LORD BISHOP OF NOVA SCOTIA, President of the Society, from Galatians, vi. 10.

The Society assembled in the large room of the Hotel in Hollis Street, at 7, P. M., on which occasion were present, The Right Revd. the LORD BISHOP OF NOVA SCOTIA, President.

The LORD BISHOP OF NOVA SCOTIA, President of the Society, took the Chair, and opened the proceedings by calling upon those present to sing two verses of the Hundredth Psalm.

The Revd. GEORGE MORRIS, M. A. read prayers.

The Right Reyd, the PRESIDENT then delivered an animated and interesting Address, referring to the origin, objects, and prospects of the Society, and concluding with some most cheering information respecting the largely increased resources of the Venerable Society for Propagation of the Gospel in Foreign parts.

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His Lordship then called upon the Secretary to read the following

REPORT.

THE General Committee of the DIOCESAN CHURCH SOCIETY OF NOVA SCOTIA is again called upon to welcome the attendance of the Members of the Society at its General Meeting, and to present a brief Report of the proceedings and prospects of the Society during the year that has elapsed.

The objects for which this Society was formed having been defined in the standing Rules which were adopted at the time of its formation, it does not devolve upon this Committee to report any thing new in design or particularly striking in its operation. Yet it is its pleasing duty to report to those who take an interest in its progress, the quiet and peaceful workings of its principles, and, as it would acknowledge with devout gratitude to the Great Head of the Church, the successful and beneficial influence of its expenditures upon various parts of the Province, within which the field of its exertions lies. The means of keeping alive an attention to the Church's services, by the ministrations of Lay Readers, at such times as the Missionaries were unable to be present, has continued to be extended to many of the Clergy of the Province ; supplies of books have been afforded, on application from various parts of the Province ; and important help has been supplied towards the erection or enlargement of Churches in needy and destitute settlements. And so long as the Committee is enabled, from year to year, to report a continuance of these useful agencies, it will have abundant cause to thank God and take courage ; abundant ground of appeal to the continued liberality and support of Colonial Churchmen, though there be nothing in its doings to bring it very conspicuously before the Public, or to fill the trump of fame with the notes of its praise.

The Committee feel it to be necessary to insist thus briefly upon this point, because the question is not unfrequently asked both by the friends of the Society and others, "What is the Church Society about ?" The Committee trust that the reply may be given with all humility, yet, with all confidence, that "The Society is about the great work for which it was originally instituted ; that it has already been the means of no inconsiderable degree of usefulness, and that it trusts, by the blessing of the Great Master in whose service it is engaged, to make many a desolate place to rejoice in the knowledge of that Word which maketh wise unto salvation, and in the use of those ordinances, which, though not in all cases ministered by the ordained servant of God, are yet, of themselves, so beautifully adapted to the edification and comfort of those who partake in them."

LAY READERS.

The applications of the Rev. N. A. Coster, the Rev. C. J. Shreve, and other Clergymen of the Province, lawing been repeated, for the continuance of the aid afforded to Lay Readers employed under their superintendence and within their charge, the sums which had been originally voted, and which, though small in themselves, were gratefully acknowledged as an important help by those to whom they were paid, were respectively continued for one year, from the date of the original appointment. The Committee regrets its ina-· bility to lay before the Members of the Society a detailed account of the services performed, and stations supplied by these lay readers respectively ; but the Ministers to whom their assistance is rendered, and upon whose recommendation they have in all cases received a License from the Bishop of the Diocese, report in general terms the value of the aid they render, and their continued sense of its importance in supplying their unavoidable lack of service in the distant portions of their ministerial sphere.

In one case only was a departure made from the usual limit which this Committee had fixed for the amount of its aid to Lay Readers. Your Committee would recal to mind the account rendered at the last General Meeting, by the Rev. A. D. Parker, of Dartmouth, in a letter to the Secretary of this Society, of the important help afforded to him in his ministrations by Mr. Jamieson, at that time a Lay Reader under his supervision. It having appeared to this Committee, that Mr. Jamieson had given up his former means of support in order to devote himself entirely to the work of preparation for the ministry of the Church, the Committee readily contributed its aid toward his support under such circumstances ; and the sum of £20 was placed at the disposal of the Rev. A. D. Parker for the current year, for the purpose of his securing the services of Mr. Jamieson. The Committee, while regretting the loss from the number of the Lay Readers to whose support it had contributed of one so efficient and acceptable as Mr. Jamieson, is yet called upon to congratulate the Ministry of the Church upon the accession of a brother, who, in his humbler sphere had so commended himself to the sympathies and regards of those who knew him, by the simplicity of his conversation and the godliness of his life.

The Committee cannot but take this opportunity of expressing its thankfulness, that the services of Mr. Jamieson, since his admission to the holy order of Deacons, in August last, have been engaged in affording the ordinances of the Church and ministering the Word of Life, to that long desolate portion of our Province, known as the district of the Eastern Shore. In a Report of his proceedings submitted by him to the Right Rev. the President of this Society, and by him kindly communicated to this Committee, the Rev. Mr. Jamieson speaks of the uniformly kind reception he had met with in the different Settlements along the Shore, and of the extent of favourable feeling which appeared to him to be manifested towards the ministry and services of the Church. He felt constrained,

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however, to remark upon the difficulties in the way of his having such a place of abode among them as would enable him to have his family about him with any prospect of their probable comfort ; as, with every disposition to minister to his comfort, the people of the shore are quite unable to erect him a suitable residence, or to furnish him with the means of procuring one on hire. This Committee naturally felt an earnest desire to assist him in this difficulty ; but, being aware that no such case was contemplated or provided for in the standing Rules of this Society, was unable to make any grant for his relief from the General Funds. Being assured, however, that such an object was quite within the spirit if not the letter of the Society's designs, the Committee appointed a Sub-Committee of five, for the purpose of procuring special subscriptions towards the erection of a Mission House at Ship Harbour, to be the property of this Society, and to be appropriated, under the direction of this Committee, as the residence of such Ministers as may from time to time be appointed to serve that district. The Committee would urgently recommend this object to the regards of those who have so long been compelled to mourn the desolation of the Eastern Shore, and trust that the exertions of the Sub-Committee for the furtherance of this object will be crowned with that success, which may be expected in a community rejoicing in the abundance of its religious privileges, and blessed with the means which this community possesses, of relieving the necessities and ministering to the wants of their poorer Brethren. In providing for the services of these Lay Readers, the Committee has expended

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BOOKS.

In the institution of this Society, it was considered an object of great importance, that it should provide an abundant supply of such Books as were in the Catalogue of the Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge, for the cheapest possible circulation through the Province. Among the earlier appropriations of its funds, a large proportion of the amount contributed by the friends of the Society was expended in procuring and sustaining such a stock as might be probably sufficient to meet the wants of the Province in this respect.

The Committee is happy, however, in being able now to announce an arrangement, by which the supply of Books in the Depository may be well sustained, and yet the whole yearly contributions of the members of the Society may be appropriated to the other important objects which this Society has in view. Shortly after the formation of this Society, and the announcement of its auspicious commencement to the Venerable Society for the Propagation of the Gospel in Foreign Parts, that Society was pleased to express its gratification with the commencement of this Institution, and to accompany its consent to be the Patron of this Society with a substantial contribution of the sum of £300 to its funds. In communicating to the Committee this monificent donation, the Right Rev. President accompanied the intimation with a request that this sum might remain unappropriated until his return from his visit to England. Immediately after his Lordship's return to this Province in July last, a resolution was adopted by the Committee, with his Lordship's sanction, by which this sum of £300 was applied to the single purpose of keeping up the stock of Books, and this fund, with the general concerns of the Depository, placed under the care of a Sub-Committee, whose duty it is to arrange the orders for Books, and to take care that such supplies are imported, from time to time, as may probably meet the wants of the Province. The Committee trust that the fund thus appropriated will be found

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amply sufficient for the purpose, but would earnestly press upon all Clergymen and Local Committees, who receive supplies from the Depository of the Society, the necessity of prompt and punctual remittances, as the only means of keeping up the fund on which the importations from the Parent Society must now entirely depend.

The Committee is not enabled to report so favourably as it had hoped and anticipated, of the success of the Branch Depository which was established a few months before the last Annual Meeting, under the charge of Mrs. Nicholls, in George Street. The occasional calls for the publications of this Society, which this Dépôt was designed to meet, have not proved so extensive as had been anticipated ; while all orders from the country have been, as formerly, forwarded to Mr. Maxwell, the attentive and faithful depositary of the Society, and by him supplied from the general Dépôt under his care in the building of the National School.

During the year that has now elapsed, the Committee has made the following grants of books and tracts for gratuitous, circulation, viz:-

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With regard to the two last named grants, the Committee think it right to mention, that, upon a discussion how far the privilege, accorded to Local Committees, of receiving back one fourth part of their contributions to the general purposes of the Society in books at cost and charges, might be considered applicable to the contributors in the town of Halifax, it was ruled that the claim to such privilege on their part should be waved, and that application should rather be made to the Committee for grants of Books in such cases as might stly press ceive supcessity of of keephe Parent

The Committee feel that while the funds of the Society are in so large a proportion derived from the town of Halifax, it is but right that the clergy of the town, and any charitable institutions under their care, should receive occasional benefit by supplies of books for gratuitous distribution from the stores of the Society.

In making up the grants enumerated above, in supplying orders from various Local Committees, and in meeting the occasional demands for religious works, there have been distributed from the Society's depositories, during the year,

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MISSIONARY VISITS.

The subject of Missionary Visits to neglected and destitute settlements has been from the first proposal of this Society, as this Committee believes, a favorite object with those who became its members. The Committee is happy to believe that the endeavour of this Society to provide for a Missionary entirely from its own resources is rendered less necessary than it appeared to be at the time of the Society's formation, as the Venerable Society for the Propagation of the Gospel in Foreign Parts has since that period received so material an increase of its funds, that it avows its readiness to provide Missionaries, so soon as suitable men can be found, for all the destitute portions of the Province. Under these circumstances, all that appears to remain for this Society to do in this matter is to fulfil the pledge given at the Annual Meeting of May 1839, by paying the expences which may be incurred by such Missionaries as are in the service of the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, in visiting those settlements which are, for the present, unsupplied. It has been unnecessary, until very lately, to call upon this Society for the fulfilment of that pledge, as the Venerable Archdeacon

Willis was enabled, from a fund derived from other sources, to defray the travelling expences which had been so incurred. No greater demand has therefore been made, as yet, upon the funds of this Society, with reference to this object, than could be met by a grant of £10, which was placed in the hands of the Venerable Archdeacon in August last. Nor can it be expected that at any time, the sum thus expended will form a just criterion of the amount of Missionary Visits that may be made ; as, in every case, the Missionaries are urged by their Diocesan to esteem it a duty to accept of such hospitality as may be tendered them in the course of their visits, not with the mere view of lessening the expence, but with the more important design of promoting their friendly and intimate acquaintance with the inhabitants of the districts The influence of this friendly intercourse they may visit. between the Ministers and the people may reasonably be expected, under the Divine blessing, to produce the happiest results in the edification and improvement of the families with which such intercourse is maintained, and in strengthening the bonds of Christian affection between them and those that watch for their souls.

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CHURCHES.

In affording aid to the erection and enlargement of churches, this Committee have felt persuaded that they were fully carrying out the purpose of the Society's formation, and materially contributing to the advancement of the Church's interests in the Province. No application of this sort, this Committee is happy to state, has been made in vain ; while, in several instances during the past year, the contribution of a portion of the funds at their disposal to such objects has so far aided in the completion of new places of worship, as to enable several congregations to assemble where the voice of prayer and praise had never before arisen from an assemblage of worshippers of the Lord within the walls of a building dedicated to His service.

Archibald Gray, a small sum which had been voted in a previous year towards the erection of a Chapel at Hammond's Plains, but which was found insufficient for the purpose, was increased by a further vote of £15; making the whole amount contributed to this case, £25; a sum which Mr. Gray considered a very material assistance, and by which he hoped to effect the completion of this building for the public worship of Almighty God.

The inhabitants of a portion of the Settlement of St. Margaret's Bay, called Boutilier's Point, having made great exertions and contributed to the full extent of their means in labour, materials, and money, to the erection of a Chapel for their neighbourhood, an application was made by the Rev. John Stannage for aid towards its completion; and the sum of £25 was voted, on his application, and has since been paid on his certificate that the work had proceeded with so much spirit, that the building, which was scarcely more than in contemplation at the last Annual Meeting of this Society, had been boarded in and shingled, and was already capable of being used in its rough state for the celebration of Divine worship.

The new Church at Chester, with regard to which the hopes of the Rev. Missionary of that place were at one time well nigh cast down, has made such progress, that the Rev. Dr. Shreve has been enabled to apply for the sum of £25 which was voted to him in May, 1839, but was not to be paid until he could certify that the frame was boarded in and shingled. A new Church at Musquodoboit, which has been some

time in progress, and was indeed near its completion, having been found to be in some respects insufficiently built, and requiring a greater outlay than had been anticipated, on application from H. A. Gladwin, Esq. the sum of £25 was voted in aid of the same; and, as the work has not yet been , finished, remains due from this Society until the certificate of its completion is forwarded.

Under this head may also be mentioned, that a most interesting congregation having been gathered by the exertions of the Rev. J. Storrs, Curate of St. George's, in the vicinity of the Three-mile House, and Mr. Storrs having become personally liable for the expences incurred in providing a room at all suitable for their assembling on the Evening of each Lord's Day, on application from the Rev. R. F. Uniacke, the sum of £10 was placed at his disposal, in order to relieve his Curate from this responsibility, and to continue to him the use of the room in which he had gathered this little flock for the Sabbath exercises of prayer and praise. This Committee have understood that it is in contemplation to attempt the erection of a Chapel for that needy district, and cordially recommend to their successors in the charge of the funds of this Society such a contribution to the accomplishment of this object as their circumstances may warrant.

And the return of $\frac{1}{4}$ of the contributions of some of the local Committees; the salary of the Depositary of the Society; and expenses of printing, stationery, postage, and other matters to the amount of £37 14 1, make up the total of the year's disbursements to the sum of £225 4 1.*

INCOME.

From this view of the outgoings of this Society, the Committee turns to the subject of the contributions to its funds.

* Note. In addition of the above, the sum of £8 18s. 11d. currency, which had been contributed by different Local Committees in aid of Missions to the heathen, has been remitted, according to the X. Standing Rule of this Society, to the East India Committee of the Society for propagation of the Gospel in foreign parts.

The Committee has not the pleasure of announcing any large accession to its funds from the town of Halifax, but is happy to believe that this circumstance is not owing to any diminished interest in the support of the Society, but is attributable to its having been deemed advisable to postpone the collection of subscriptions until after the present General Meeting. This Committee has found, that, in the intervals between the general meetings, many persons, who are not aware of the workings of the Society, are led to suppose it inactive and inefficient, and are consequently indisposed to afford it that cordial support, which the Annual Report of its proceedings is likely to call forth. The Committee was so gratified by perceiving the favorable impression produced by the last Annual Meeting upon the minds of those who were present, and of many who only heard of its proceedings, that it entertains the confident expectation that a similar result will attend the present meeting, and that those who have already been enrolled among its friends, will contribute more heartily, and those who have not hitherto subscribed will be disposed now to join in the work and labour of love, in which, this Committee trust, the Society is engaged. Instead, therefore, of intending to relax its efforts, or to neglect the means of its support, this Committee earnestly calls upon all Churchmen to unite themselves with their families to a Society designed to promote the truest interests of the Church of their affections, and to contribute of their abundance to the great object of circulating the Liturgy and the Word of God, and of providing for the assemblage of their poorer and more desolate brethren in the public worship and service of Almighty God.

There was received immediately after the General Meeting of February last, the sum (inclusive of the collection made at the Meeting) of £51 5 $4\frac{1}{2}$, which occasional subscriptions have made up to the amount of £56 5 $4\frac{1}{2}$.

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The Committee is unable to acknowledge as large an in-

crease of the funds of the Society from the contributions of Local Committees throughout the Province, as it had anticipated; but earnestly hopes that this circumstance may rather be attributable to any other cause than a failure of interest in its proceedings. The Committee would press upon all the Local Committees the necessity of keeping alive the attention of their members by frequently bringing the concerns of the Society before their view, and the importance of promptness and punctuality in their remittances, in order to sustain in vigour and efficiency the operations of the General Committee.

The contribution of the Lunenburg Committee, which, this Committee has been informed, was intended to have been forwarded in time to be acknowledged in the last Annual Report, was received immediately after the General Meeting, and amounted to £13 15 0.

There was received in June last from the St. Margaret's Bay Committee, what was stated to be a balance of the collections of the years 1839 and 1840, amounting to $\pounds 1$ 16 3.

From the Yarmouth Committee was received in August last the sum of £8 9 0, as a contribution to the general funds of the Society.

From the Aylesford Committee was transmitted by the hands of the Revd. H. L. Owen in September last, the sum of ± 3 17 $7\frac{1}{2}$.

In the same month, from the Cape Breton Committee, by the hands of Revd. W. Y. Porter, the sum of £9 was handed in; and at a subsequent period, the Revd. Charles Ingles, of Sydney, C. B. transmitted the sum of £1 8 9, which he requested might be acknowledged in this Report as "the amount of a sacramental collection made at Cow. Bay."

Since the commencement of the present year a Committee was formed by the exertions of the Revd. R. J. Uniacke, aided by the Revd. G. Morris, in the parish of Newport; and a letter has been received from Mr. Alexander, the Secretary of the Committee, expressing the warm interest which appeared to be taken in the formation of the Committee, and covering a remittance of £13 12s. $3\frac{1}{2}d$. This amount has since been increased by the addition of £1 3s. 9d. which makes up the total of the contribution of the Newport Local Committee to the sum of £14 16s. $0\frac{1}{2}d$:

The exertions of the Dartmouth Local Committee are worthy of especial commendation by this Committee. Great pains have been taken by the Revd. Missionary at Dartmouth to carry out the spirit of the resolution of this Committee, that, if possible, every member of every family in his charge should become a member of this Society; and the result of his labours has been an increase in the subscriptions of the Dartmouth Local Committee, till they amount to the sum of £40.

A third contribution has also been received from the Local Committee at Sackville to the amount of £6 2s. 6d.

The Guysborough Local Committee, whose promptness and efficiency were acknowledged in the last Annual Report, again calls for the acknowledgment of this Committee for a remittance of £16 19s. 6d. ; accompanied by a resolution of that Committee calling the particular attention of the Society to the aid and encouragement of Schools, and requesting that £10 of their remittance be applied to that object ; 10s. to the 5th ; £5 4s. 6d. to the 7th ; and £1 5s. 0d. to the 8th object of the Society.

Within the past week the Liverpool Local Committee has transmitted by the hands of S. P. Fairbanks, Esq., their delegate at the present meeting, the sum of £21, to be appropriated to the general purposes of the Society, with the exception of $\frac{1}{4}$ which by the rule of the Society is to be returned in books.

The St. Margaret's Bay Committee, which, tho' its contributions have not been large, has been remarkable for the

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punctuality of its remittances, has also within a few days forwarded the sum of $\pounds 6$ 5s. by the hands of the Revd. Missionary at that place, who expresses his gratification as being not greater at the increase of amount over the contributions of former years, than at the readiness and good spirit with which it was offered.

Besides these contributions to the income of the Society, its funds were replenished during the past year by the sum of £25, which had been lent to Mr. P. J. Filleul, of King's College, Windsor, to aid him in the prosecution of his studies at that University; and which was returned by him with many expressions of thankfulness for the benefit he had derived from its temporary use until some funds of his own had become available.

Although, therefore, the income of the Society for the past year has not been augmented by the usual annual subscriptions of the town of Halifax, and although, comparatively, so few of the Local Committees have remitted anything during the past year, yet the funds of the Society have been increased by the following sums, viz :--

The deduction from this amount, of the same upper ated and paid during the year, leaves a considerable balance in the hands of the Treasurer at the present time. The partly to rally foreeting of angement of placed in the hands of the General Committee late in the year, a larger amount of the funds than they could calculate upon in their earlier appropriations, while they supposed that the supply of books was dependent upon the annual contributions.

In bringing this Report to a conclusion, the Committee would express its confidence that nothing is wanting but the cordial assistance and co-operation, the prayers and sympathies, the contributions and the countenance of Churchmen, in order to make it extensively useful in promoting the glory of God and the best interests of the Church which they love. They have the gratification of finding their Right Revd. President at their head, ready in counsel, unabated in zeal, and earnest in effort for the promotion of the great objects which the Society has in view. They have the comfort of believing that, through his Lordship's exertions when in England, the operations of the Venerable Society for the Propagation of the Gospel in this Diocese have been more extensively known, and its means of promoting the spiritual welfare of this Colony, so far as human means avail, materially aug-They are assured that, while that Venerable Society mented. undertakes the provision of Missionaries for this Province, an abundant field still remains for this Society's usefulness and exertion in carrying out the objects particularly had in view in its formation. They humbly trust that its past operations have been attended with the Divine blessing, and have been productive of spiritual benefit to many portions of the Province. And they feel a firm confidence and persuasion that those who love the Church of their fathers will not allow themselves to be appealed to in vain for that continued, yea, and increased support, with which, under the continued favour and prospering smile of the Lord's countenance, they may hope to be increasingly instrumental in building up the walls of our Zion, and in circulating far and wide that Word which maketh wise unto salvation through faith in Christ Jesus.

STANDING RULES

FOR THE CONSTITUTION AND GOVERNMENT OF THE DIOCESAN CHURCH SOCIETY OF NOVA SCOTIA.

- 202----

I. His Excellency, THE LIEUTENANT GOVERNOR OF Nova-Scotia for the time being, and THE Societies FOR THE PROPAGATION OF THE GOSPEL, and FOR PROMOTING CHRISTIAN KNOWLEDGE, shall be respectfully requested to be the Patrons of this Society.

II. The Bishop of the Diocese shall be the President of the Society, with a control over all their proceedings. His approval shall be necessary for the completion of all important acts of the Society, and especially for the revocation or alteration of any of the standing rules, and for making any addltion to them.

III. There shall be two or more Vice Presidents, of whom the Archdeacon of Nova-Scotia shall be the first; a Secretary, an Assistant Secretary when necessary, and a Treasurer.

IV. There shall be a Standing Committee, consisting of the Officers, all the Clergy, and as many Laymen as it shall be thought convenient to choose at the Annual Meeting of the Society. The Lay Members shall continue in the Committee for a year, or until other Lay Members be chosen in their place; and any or all of them may be re-elected. Seven of the Committee shall be a quorum, provided four of them be Laymen. V. The Society shall be open to all the Members of the Church, all of whom shall be invited to unite with it. Ten pounds paid at any one time shall qualify a person to be a Member during his life, and the payment in advance of any sum, however small, shall qualify a person to be a Member for a year.

VI. The members of the Church in every part of the Province shall be invited to co-operate with the Diocesan Society, by joining Committees of it which shall be formed, under the direction of their respective Clergymen, either in each mission or parish, or in more than one mission or parish united, as shall be deemed most convenient, and in strict accordance with the designs and rules of the Diocesan Society ; and it is recommended to the Committees to forward their funds, as they may be collected, to the General Committee, who will faithfully apply them to the general objects of the Society ; but when the Local Committees desire it, they shall receive books at cost and charges to the amount of one fourth of their remittances.

VII. There shall be one general Meeting of the whole Society, including any members of the Local Committees who can conveniently attend, on such day and at such place as the President may name, of which due notice will be given, with an invitation to every Committee to send at least one Clergyman and two Laymen to represent such Committee, and with a recommendation that each Committee shall meet at some convenient time immediately before the General Meeting of the Society, that any necessary suggestions may be offered to the representatives of the Committees for their guidance at the general meeting. And a special General Meeting may be called at any time and in any place, when the President, or, in his absence, two or more Vice Presidents, shall consider it desirable to appoint such special General Meeting.

VIII. The objects to which the attention of the Society

shall be directed shall be, generally, those which have engaged the two great Church Societies in England for the Propagation of the Gospel and for Promoting Christian Knowledge, and none other.

IX. The following objects shall more particularly engage the attention of the Society, as soon as their means may enable them to afford such attention:

1. Supplies of Books and Tracts from the stores of the Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge, and none other, except in cases where other Books or Tracts, in strict conformity with the principles of the Established Church, and particularly adapted to local circumstances, shall first be carefully examined and approved by a Committee of revision, to be appointed by the General Committee, the approval of which General Committee shall be necessary in the next place, after which the books must likewise receive the written approbation of the Bishop.

2. Missionary visits to neglected and destitute places, under the direction of the Bishop.

3. Upholding by all possible and proper means the Collegiate Establishments at Windsor.

4. Assistance to deserving young men desirous of being qualified for the Ministry of the Church, but requiring aid in pursuing their studies at the Collegiate Establishments at Windsor.

5. Aid to Sunday and other Schools, in which due attention is paid to instruction in the principles of the Established Church.

6. Encouragement to the instruction and training of respectable Teachers for Sunday and Daily Schools.

7. Assistance to the erection or enlargement of Churches and Chapels belonging to the Established Religion, in peculiar or extreme cases.

To these objects, generally, the general contributions will be applied ; while contributors who desire it may have their individual contributions scrupulously confined to any one or more of these objects. And as some members of the Church, who are not unmindful of the great spiritual wants in their own neighbourhood, still feel constrained, in pious gratitude for the blessings they enjoy, to allot something, however small, from the means with which a gracious Providence has blessed them, towards the spread of the glorious Gospel among the nations which still sit in darkness. X. This Society will gladly receive and forward to the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, whatever sums may be given for the conversion and instruction of the Hea then, to which object such sums will be strictly confined by the East India Committee of that Society.

XI. Books and Tracts will generally be on sale at cost and charges; and whenever in particular cases a deviation from this rule is desired, it must be considered by the Standing Committee, and only permitted when recommended by them and approved by the President, or, in his absence, by two or more of the Vice Presidents.

XII. All Meetings of the Society and of the Committees shall be opened and closed with the prayers used by the two Societies in England, adapted to our situation under the direction of the Bishop.
