

Sabbath Services, at 11 a. m. and 7 p. m. Sabbath School at 3 p. m.; quarterly service for the young at 3 p. m. on the last Sabbath of March, June, September and December. Young people's prayer meeting every Sabbath morning at 10.15. Mission Sabbath School in Grant's Sail Loft every Sunday morning at 9,30.

The Pastor's Class, every Monday at 7.30 p.m in winter and 8 p.m. in summer.

Opportunities for Conversation with the Pastor at his residence every Tuesday evening.

Stated Meetings of Session are held in the Session Room, on the second Tuesday of every month at 8 p. m.

Stated Meetings of Managers are held in their room on the second Tuesday of every month at 8 p. m., and a committee meets in the church on the same evening at 7.30, for the purpose of allocating pews.

Weekly Prayer Meeting every Wednesday at 8 p.m.

Sabbath School Teachers' Meeting every Wednesday at the close of the prayer meeting.

The Executive Committee of the Missionary Association meets in the Library, on the last Wednesday evening of every month.

The Regular Meetings of the Sabbath School Association are held on the last Thursday of every month.

The Ladies' Association meets every Thursday at 2.30 p.m.

Band of Hope meets every Friday at 7.30 p m.

The Ordi nance of Baptism is dispensed on the first Sabbath of every month, at the commencement of the morning service, and on the first Wednesday of every month at the commencement of the prayer meeting.

The Ordinance of the Lord's Supper is dispensed on the last Sabbath of March, June, September and December.

A Preparatory Service on the Friday immediately preceding each of the said Sabbaths at 7.30 p.m.

Special Collections for the poor are taken up on the Friday evening and Sabbath morning, on every Sacramental occasion, separate from, and unconnected with the envelope system.

The Annual Meeting of the congregation is held on the third Wednesday of January.

The Young People's Association meets the first Monday of every month.

Literary Society meets every Monday evening except the first Monday of the month.

Members and Adherents leaving the church are requested to give notice to the Managers, in order that their seats may again be allocated.

When members change their residence they should give notice either to the Pastor of the Elder of the District, otherwise they cannot reasonably expect to be visited or have their communion cards delivered.

Minutes of the Annual Business Meeting of Knox Church, held on the evening of Wednesday January 18th.

At/the close of a short prayer meeting, the Rev. Mungo Fraser, M.A., called on the congregation to elect a chairman, when Ald. David McLellan, on motion of W. H. McLaren, seconded by Wm. McAulay, was elected to that position.

W. H. McLaren was then elected Secretary, on motion of A. McPherson, seconded by Wm. Givin.

The minutes of the last business meeting were then read and confirmed.

The report of the managers was presented by J. G. McIntyre, chairman of the board, on whose motion, seconded by Colin Arthur, it was adopted.

The financial statement was submitted by the Treasurer, F. H. Ross, who moved its adoption. This was seconded by A. McPherson and carried.

The report of the Sunday School was read by Wm. S. Cunningham, Secretary. Its adoption was moved by M. Brennen, seconded by Wm. McAulay, and carried.

The report of the Missionary Association was read by R. McRae. Its adoption was moved by W.H. McLaren, seconded by Edward Bethune, and carried.

The Band of Hope report was presented by Wm. Givin, on whose motion, seconded by M. Brennen, it was adopted.

The report of the Mission Band was presented by W. H. McLaren, on whose motion, seconded by F. H. Ross, it was adopted.

The report of the Young People's Association was read by W. H. McLaren, and on motion duly seconded was adopted.

The report of the Session was read by David McLellan, On motion of W. H. McLaren, seconded by J. G. McIntyre, it was ordered to be printed in the Year Book. The election of three managers was then proceeded with.

Moved by James Dixon and carried, that in the event of there being more than three nominees, the election be by ballot.

Seven gentlemen having been nominated, A. McPherson and Thos. W. Laird were appointed scrutineers, who reported F. H. Ross, W. H. McLaren and J. A. Moffat duly elected for a term of three years.

Moved by David McLellan, seconded by J. G. McIntyre: That the duties of the Precentor, Organist and Organ Blower are to attend all services on the Sabbath, including the aftermoon services, when held, also weekly prayer meeting, and the services held preparatory to every communion, as also any special congregational services that may be held from time to time, and the Precentor and Organist to attend the Sabbath School. Their salaries to be as follows: Precentor, \$300, Organist, \$240, with one month's vacation each summer, the session to procure substitutes when required; the Blower to receive \$52.00 per annum.

Moved by David McLellan, seconded by F. D. Boyes: That the salary of the Rev. Mungo Fraser, M. A., for the year 1888, be the sum of twenty-seven hundred dollars, payable on the first of every month, in advance, commencing first of February, 1888.

In accordance with the recommendation in the Manager's Report, the following gentlemen were appointed Ushers for the ensuing year: Joseph A. Attwood, Andrew Parkhill, Hugh F. Wallace, Walter Turnbull, J. Alex. McLaren, John Gillespie, John M. Gow, Robert Wyllie, Walter Mathie, W. J. McFaddin, Donald McLean, W. R. Davis.

Moved by James Dixon, seconded by M. Brennen: That the Manager's fill any vacancy that may occur on the staff of the Ushers until next year.—Carried.

Moved by J. G. McIntyre, seconded by A. Richardson: That James Dixon and J. E. Tuckett be auditors for this year.—Carried.

Moved by J. G. McIntyre, seconded by William Givin: That M. Brennen, W. McAulay and D. A. McNabb be Trustees.—Carried.

FORTY-FOURTH ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE-

Managing Committee of Knox Church

For the Year Ending 31st December, 1887.

In presenting their Annual Report the Managing Committee do so with sincere thankfulness to God for the very large amount of prosperity which the congregation has enjoyed during the past year.

By referring to the Treasurer's Report it will be seen that the collections by envelope amount to \$4999.71; loose collections, \$1184.24; and the special collections to \$961.56, making a total of \$7145.51. And after meeting all current expenses and paying off \$2,000 of the mortgage debt, there still remains a surplus of \$555.82, \$400 of which is held as payment for seats for the new School and Lecture Room, which was voted at the last congregational meeting.

The number of subscribers by envelope has increased from 361 to 405, and the contributions from \$100.60 to \$105.30 per Sabbath.

The arrears due by envelope amount to \$181.00.

The very marked success which has attended the policy recommended by your committee during the past two years, of asking for special collections in the months of June and October for reducing the mortgage debt, has been such that your committee recommend that the same course be followed during the current year.

Your committee would ask power from the congregation to re-let all sittings which are unoccupied for three months without notifying the Managers, and that no subscriber shall hold more sittings than his or her family require.

Your Committee would further recommend that a committee of twelve persons be appointed by the congregation to act as ushers at both of the Sabbath services, said persons to be members in full communion of this congregation.

The Managers who retire this year by rotation are Messrs. M. Turnbull, J. A. Moffat and F. H. Ross, all of whom are eligible for re-election.

In conclusion, your Committee recognize with thankfulness the very liberal manner in which the congregation has contributed towards the current expenses of the church, as well as the large amount given for reducing the mortgage debt, and that the congregation may be placed in a still better financial position would ask the favorable consideration of all the recommendations mentioned in the foregoing report.

FIFTY-FIRST ANNUAL REPORT

--OF-

Knox Church Babbath Behool Association.

For the year ending 31st December, 1887.

The Sabbath School Association take pleasure in presenting their report for the past year as follows:

The total number on the roll is, boys, 312; girls, 360; officers and male teachers, 22; female teachers, 35; total, 729, or an increase of 123 over last year.

The average attendance for the past year has been 441, composed of the following: Male teachers and officers, 20; female teachers, 26; boys, 192; girls, 203.

We are pleased to be able to state that the average attendance during the past year is the largest of any year in the history of our school, it being 71 above last year. The smallest attendance of any Sabbath during the year was 252, on August 21, exactly the same number that was present at the smallest turnout last year; while the largest during the year was 536, on December 18th, an increase of 62 over last year's largest attendance. Our Superintendent has been striving hard to get the attendance up to 500, and so heartily did the scholars cooperate with his exertions, that on five different Sundays during the last six months of the year we have had over that number present.

During the past year a prize card has been presented to every scholar who has been instrumental in bringing a new pupil to the school, and this we think has been the means of adding not a few to our school who have become regular attendants. As a further means of keeping up the attendance, we have given prize banners to the classes in the school having the best attendance for a certain length of time, and the scheme has been found to work with admirable success.

The present seating accommodation has been found to be very unsatisfactory, and we have accordingly placed an order for sufficient very commodious benches to seat the scholars on the ground floor of the school. We expect them to arrive in a very short time, and they will, no doubt, add greatly to the appe teac scho

appearance of the school, as well as to the comfort of both teachers and scholars. The congregation kindly voted to the school a sufficient sum wherewith to purchase these seats.

A new feature in our school is the formation of a catechism class and a normal class. The former is intended to drill the scholars more minutely on the catechism, and to give a better general idea of important Bible events and the general divisions of the Bible. It is largely attended and, under the tution of Mr. Davis, gives every appearance of becoming a useful branch of our school work. The normal class is intended for the young ladies and gentlemen and parents. The idea being to take up for each Sunday one lesson in advance of the school, so that, in case any of our teachers are absent, the Superintendent can always secure persons who are well acquainted with lesson to fill the vacancies for the day. This class will be conducted, jointly, by Rev. M. Fraser and Mr. Wm. Givin.

During the past year we have been called upon to mourn the death of one teacher, Miss Aggie Gillespie, who taught an advanced class of girls; and one scholar, Maria Cunningham, a pupil of Miss S. H. McKean's class. This dealing with us by a loving Father should cause us to be increasingly active in His service, for we know not how soon our work will be done or how early in life those for whom we are laboring may be removed.

The scolars have been regularly supplied with papers every month, the older scholars receiving the *Northern Messenger*, and the younger the *Children's Messenger*. We believe the circulation of these papers among the pupils is of great spiritual benefit to them. We are happy to be able to report that the school has been supplied with the Moody & Sankey Hymn Books, and under the able leadership of our worthy Precentor, Mr. James Johnson, the singing has improved wonderfully.

The teachers meet every Wednesday evening after prayer meeting for the study of the lesson. As a general rule this meeting is well attended and is much appreciated by the teachers, as they derive great help in the preparation of their lessons from it. We hope that still greater interest will be taken in it during the ensuing year. Most of the teachers subscribe to the *Sunday School Times*, a very valuable paper published in Philadelphia, which contains well written helps to the lessons as well as other comments on Sunday-school work in its various branches.

nd to be n order plars on ive in a to the The quarterly services for the past year have been held in the church as usual, and have been largely attended by the scholars. The parents have, as a rule, taken a deep interest in these services and have attended in fair numbers. Still, thankfull as we are for this, we would like to see more at the meetings, as it encourages the young people wonderfully. The services for this year have been of a varied character, the first one consisted of short temperance lectures by some of our prominent male teachers. The second was devoted to missionary intelligence, and was also addressed by some of the teachers. The subject for the last two was a review of the quarter's lessons by Mr. Fraser, who made the meetings very interesting to even the youngest present.

The collections have been very good indeed. There has been given for General Expenses during the year, \$144.78; for Building Fund, \$229.32; and for Missions, 114.55: in all \$448.65, or an average collection per Sabbath of \$9.39.

Our Librarian, Mr. Kilgour, reports 555 books in the library, of which nearly all are in good order. The average number of books changed on boy's Sunday is 85, and on girl's Sunday, 136, or an average per Sabbath of 102. At the beginning of the year we added fifty dollars worth of new books to the library, and it has been decided to make a further addition of fifty dollars worth very soon, so that we shall then have a very good assortment.

In conclusion, we desire to return thanks to our Heavenly Father for all His goodness to us as a Sabbath School in the past, and pray for a still greater outpouring of the Holy Spirit on all connected with the school, more especially the office bearers and teachers who will take part in the oversight of the school in the future, and that His blessing may attend their labors, without which all our efforts are of no avail.

NINETEENTH ANNUAL REPORT

-OF THE-

Missionary Association of Knox Church.

In presenting this, the nineteenth annual report, your committee do so with feelings of devout thankfulness to our Heavenly Father for the great measure of success that has attended their efforts during the year.

In their last report, the committee expressed a desire to have the contributions for the coming year reach, at least, one thousand dollars, and, notwithstanding other important demands upon the liberality of the congregation, this desire has been fully realized, and your committee are pleased to report an increase of \$725.00 in the contributions.

The collectors have put forth renewed efforts, and an increased measure of success has attended their labors. In the opinion of the committee, great credit is due them for their untiring zeal and the regularity with which they have performed their duties, in many cases, in the face of great difficulty.

Their collections are as follows:

District No. 1, \$131.38; No. 2, \$26.35; No. 3, \$47.20; No. 4, \$99.15: No. 5, \$122.45; No. 6, \$83.13; No. 7, \$23.35; No. 8, \$35.90. Total, \$568.91, being an increase of \$283.00 over the previous year. To this amount is to be added the following: From the S. School, \$107.00; Mission Band, \$125.00; Ladies' Aid, \$105.00; Special Church Collections, \$88.67; Literary Society, \$6.32. Total, \$1000.00. We would also add to this the following smaller sums: Welland Canal Missions, \$12.53; Mr. Goforth, \$14.25; Sunday School Association, \$10.00; Mission Band donation to the N. W. Indians, \$50.00, which makes our actual contributions for mission purses, \$1.086.78.

The congregation having thus reached the standard of former years, and being in a more prosperous condition than at any time in the past, with the membershp regularly increasing, your committee sincerely hope that thankfulness for both temporal and spiritual prosperity will be manifested by a still greater increase in the contributions for the current year.

CONSTITUTION

-OF-

Knox Church, Hamilton, Ont.

Ist.—The Church, Manse, Burying Ground, and any other Houses or Real Estate now belonging to or which may hereafter become the property of the Congregation, shall be held in Trust by three members of the said Congregation, in full Communion, in accordance with a Deed of Trust—bearing date the Sixth Day of September, in the year of our Lord, One Thousand Eight Hundred and Fifty-six.

2nd.—The members in Full Communion with the Congregation shall have the sole power of choosing a Minister or Pastor and Elders of said Congregation.

3rd.—The election of a Minister or Pastor shall take place at a meeting of the Members of the Congregation, which shall have been called from the Pulpit of the Church by the officiating minister on each of the two Sabbaths preceding such meeting. The majority of Members present shall determine the election.

4th.—The method of the election of the Eiders shall be determined, from time to time, by the Session, as occasion may require; but the election shall be by the Members of the Congregation, and notice of meeting for such election shall be given as provided in Clause Third.

5th.—The constitutional duty of the Session to superintend the Spiritual affairs and watch over all the interests of the Congregation is recognized and reserved to them.

6th.—Nine managers shall be elected to take charge of the secular affairs of the Congregation, three of whom shall retire annually in rotation, but shall be eligible for re-election. In case of a vacancy/occurring by resignation or otherwise, the Managers themselves shall fill the vacancy at their earliest convenien e; and a Manager absenting himself from three successive regular meetings without leave shall cease to be a Manager.

7th.—The Managers shall elect their own Chairman, Treasurer and Secretary; hold regular meetings as often as their business may require; and may give notice of their meetings, either from the pulpit on Sabbaths or by the Secretary to each Manager, when demanded by any three of them. Five Managers shall constitute a quorum. When the Managers shall themselves deem it necessary, or when requested to do so by seven or more Members of the Congregation in Full Standing, they shall with concurrence of the Session call a special meeting of the Congregation stating the object in the notice thereof; and no business shall be entertained at any Special Meeting excepting what is mentioned in the notice thereof. Should any Manager cease to be a member of the Congregation he shall cease to be a Manager. The Treasurer shall open an account with some regular Chartered Bank in the city, and deposit in his own name, as Treasurer of the Managing Committee, monies from time to time as may be convenient.

8th.—The use of the Church property for public and general purpose not connected with the Congregation shall be under the control of the Man

agers, with the concurrence of the Minister.

9th. - The whole revenues of the Congregation, from all sources, shall b received and disbursed by the Managers in payment of Stipend, Salarie and other expenses, including such as may be required for preserving the property and providing for the dispensation of Divine Ordinances; but no repairs, improvements or alterations exceeding the sum of One Hundred Dollars shall be gone into without the consent of the Congregation. The "Poor's Fund," however, shall be distributed by the Session, and contributions for Missionary and Benevolent purposes shall be disbursed by the Association appointed for these special purposes.

10th. - The Members of the Congregation shall choose their Organist and Precentor, and fix their salaries, and in the discharge of their duties they

shall be under the control of the Session.

11th. - The Managers shall have power to engage or dismiss, and regulate salary of any one who may act as Church Officer or Door Keeper; and appoint or pay such person or persons as may be required to keep the church

clean and comfortable.

12th.—The Managers shall be accountable to the Congregation for their acts, and shall, at each annual meeting in January, submit a full printed, audited, articulate Statement of the Income and Expenditure of the preceding year-copies of which shall be distributed in the pews on the Sabbath before the Annual Meeting; and said Managers shall be regulated as to the proportion of revenue to be applied to any particular purpose by the instructions they may receive from the Congregation at any Special or Annual Meeting.

13th.—A Committee, consisting of the Chairman, Secretary and Treasurer of the Managing Committee, two members of Session, the Secretary of the Sabbath School, and Secretaries of all the organizations in connection with the congregation, shall annually arrange for the printing-in pamphlet form-of the reports of all the different organizations in connection with the congregation, together with the list of office-bearers, members and adherents, with their residences; said pamphlet to be distributed to the congregation as early as possible after the annual business meeting and not later than March 1st. The Chairman of the Managers shall be Chairman of said committee.

14th.—The Managers or Trustees shall have no power to contract debt

on property without the consent of the Congregation.

15th -At each Annual Meeting the Congregation shall elect three

Trustees and two Auditors to serve for one year.

16th. - The foregoing rules shall be in force until altered or amended; and no motion to alter or amend said rules shall be put, unless due notice of such motion has been given at the annual meeting of the Congregation; and when notice of motion shall have been made, a Special Meeting of the Congregation shall be called to consider the same—not sooner than two weeks, nor later than two months, after said Annual Meeting.

17th. - In the foregoing rules, no one shall be held to be a member of the Congregation who is not in Full Communion with the same, and whose name does not appear on the "Communion Roll" of the said Congregation, and no other than Members in "Full Communion" shall be allowed to

vote at any Congregational Meeting.
