**The Farmer's Corner.**  
Raise More Parsnips.

The value of parsnips for feeding purposes has heretofore, by many farmers, been underestimated. By referring to Schenck's "Gardener's Text-Book" we see it is stated that the parsnip has many valuable qualities which commend it to both farmer and gardener. Hogs and bullocks are fattened upon it in a very short space of time, and the flesh is considered of superior flavour; while in cows it produces an extraordinary yield of milk, having a rich colour and a softening and excellent quality. The culture of parsnips is feeling, and as an ordinary garden vegetable it is also in demand. The soil that suits best will satisfy the parsnip. When the plants are five and fifteen inches high, respectively, they are weeded and hoed. The leaves are cut in the month of September, and allowed to stand for twenty-four hours before being given to the cattle. The roots can be taken up during the winter as required; frost does them no harm. The ration is sixteen pounds, three times a day, and the roots are cut. When given to pigs, they ought to be cooked. In the west of France the parsnip replaces the oat for horses, and, being nutritious, animals quickly put up flesh when fed on this root. Vick, in one of his annual catalogues, says that for feeding cattle no root is superior to the parsnip. In the island of Guernsey a few ears of corn, and perhaps the same state of things still exists—pigs and cattle were almost entirely fattened on this root. We have always thought that American farmers did not realize the value of this root. One great advantage in raising this root is that it can be left in the ground and dug in the spring, when needed.

**Hiring Horses.**  
It has been decided, says the *Turf Field and Farm*, that when a horse or carriage is let out for hire, for the purpose of performing a particular journey, the party letting warrants the horse and carriage fit and competent for such journey. If the hirer treats the horse or carriage as any prudent man would do, he is not answerable for any damage either may receive. But he must see the horse for the purpose for which he hired him. For instance, a horse hired for saddle must not be used in harness. If the hirer violates this express condition of the contract, he is liable for any damage that may occur. If the horse is stolen through the hirer's negligence, such as leaving the stable door open all night, he must answer for it. But if he is robbed of it by highwaymen, when travelling the usual hours, he cannot be held for damages. These questions are frequently in dispute, it is not out of place to shed a little light upon them.

**HOW TO CURE A BOSE FELON.**—Of all the painful things can there be any so excruciatingly painful as a borse felon? We know none that flesh is heir to, and, as this malady is quite frequent and the subject of much earnest consideration, we give the latest recipe for its cure. *Lancet* Lancet: "As soon as the pulsation which indicates the disease is felt, put directly over the spot a fly blister, about the size of your thumb nail, and let it remain for six hours; then the expiration of which time, directly under the surface of the blister, make a small incision, which can be instantly taken out with the point of a needle or a lancet."

**HEAVY ROBBERY FROM THE MAILS.**—On the 22nd of September two money packages were posted at the Halifax office, one containing \$100, and sent by the Bank of Montreal Bank here to the Bank of Yarmouth; and the other containing \$1000, and sent by the People's Bank to the Exchange Bank of Yarmouth. These packages never came to hand, and were probably abstracted from the mail. The money was both together in one bag Mr. Dewe, the vigilant inspector, who is at present in the city, has had the matter in hand, and every effort is being made to trace the money, and it is hoped with success. There is always greater difficulty in tracing such malfeasance in the Post Office Department than in any other; and for that reason, when the contents are discovered, must be employed punishment should be meted out.—*Halifax Recorder*.

A despatch to the St. John "Telegraph" says: "Hon. Mr. Laird has been appointed Governor of the North-West, and has accepted."  
This another pure and disinterested "Reformer" goes himself appointed to a public position of considerable importance. Under the late Governor this would have been vice corruption, and a sample of "Toryism" and "tamers." Mr. Laird has had this appointment in his eye for some time past, but has delayed the matter after it just like good Mr. Dorion, who a short time before he became Chief Justice of Quebec, declared that the rumor that he was going to do so was false. One by one these gentlemen will get out of the reform gallery, for it is sinking fast.—*Halifax Herald*.

His fortune was identified with the rise of California, to which he emigrated in 1846, and he was one of the great donors for the University of California. His money was chiefly made by judicious purchase of real estate about San Francisco, property rising in value with wonderful rapidity. Mr. Lick was an illiterate

man, but he took a deep interest in educational matters, and a considerable part of his money was given to educational objects.
