

OLD-AGE ANNUITIES BILL

Will be Introduced by Dominion Government This Session.

OTTAWA, Friday- The bill which the Government will introduce this session in regard to old age annuities is about the same as that which Sin Riichard Cartwright laid before Senate last session. The object of the bill is to encourage the opening up of savings accounts by the working classes so that they may have provision for old age say at the age of 60.. If man begins paying at 20 an annual contribution of \$13 he will be entitled to \$120 a year when he reaches 60, or if the payment is deferred until he reaches 65 then he can have \$200 a year. Payments will be made for annuities in the local post office, and the Government will allow inteerst thereon, compounded half yearly at either 31-2 or four per cent. The Government will undertake the business of management, and payment of annuities will be guaranteed by the whole credit of the Dominion. The annuities will not be subject to seizure for debt or any other cause and will not be trans ferable. No annuity can be taken for more than \$400 per year.

Dr. Curtis, who is also a coroner, was called, but the man was dead when he got there. No inquest is considered necessary. 

He therefore telephoned to the station master at Aigues-Mortes, who dispatched a pilot engine and several truck: arrying two lifeboats.

The relief train was driven as near to the submerged train as possible, and ther the Mayor of Aigues-Mortes, accompanied by two sailors, put off in one of the lifeboats and pulled across to the train.

THE TREATY WITH FRANCE.

The text of the Convention respect ing the commercial relations between Canada and France, signed by British and French plenipotentiaries in Paris on the 19th of September (two of the three representatives of Britain being Hon. W. S. Fielding and Hon. L. P. Brodeur of the Canadian cabinet) was laid before the House of Comm

the 28th ult. This treaty appears to be very advantageous to both Canada and France, and will no doubt be ratified by the parliaments of both countries It supersedes the old treaty signed in 1893, and is on a more reciprocal basis. It is intended to run for ten years but may be terminated by either party

upon twelve month's notice. By the new treaty Canada gives the French Republic and all its vast dependencies except Tunisia (which state may hereafter be brought under its operation) the benefit of its internediate tariff on 99 articles. and admits a few French specialties not exported in any quantity by Britain to a still lower tariff. In return France admits 152 Canadian articles, including most of our farm and forest products and many of our manufactures, at her minimum tariff.

This arrangement, if ratified will creatly increase our trade with France, and will tend to draw us in other ways still closer to that highly civilized and influential country.



(1). At least six months' reslerce upon and cultivation of the land in each year for three years. (2). A homesteader may, if Me so desires, perform the required residence duties by living on farming land owned solely by him, not less than eighty (80) acres in extent, in the vicinity of his home-stead. Joint ownership in land will not meet this requirement.

(3). If the father (or mother, the father is deceased, of a homesteader has permanent residence on farming land owned solely, by him, not less than eighty (80) acres in extent, in the vicinity of the homestead, or upon a homestead entered for by him in the vicinity, such homesteader may perform his own residence duties by living with the father (or) moth-

(4). The term "vicinity" in the two preceding paragraphs is defined as meaning not more than nine miles in a direct line, exclusive of the width of road allowances crossed in the neasurement.

(5). A homesteader intending to perform his residence duties in accordance with the above while living with parents or on farming land owned by himself must notify the Agent for the district of such intention.

Six months' notice in writing should be given to the Commission of Dominion Lands at Ottawe of intention to apply for patent. W. W. CORY,


