## DR. W. W. DOHERTY IS FOUND NOT GUILTY

### Twelve "Good Men and True" Say that Evidence was Not Sufficient to Convict the Accused of Killing Mr. D. J. Bruce.

### SOME OF THE EVIDENCE.

At the Spring court in Dalhousie, when he turned round Doherty was in front as he seemed to be finishing the blow.

Cross examined, Dr. Doherty spoke in an ordinary tone when he addressed Bruce. Witness knew Bruce well. The remark to him which accompanied the blow seemed to be "Take that" not "Fit for tat" as suggested by Mr. Powell.

Chief of Police Hughes gave evidence of the arrest of Doherty in the latter office on the afternoon of Sept. 21st last, and identified the umbrella as the one admitted to him by Doherty with which the blow was struck.

Cross examined by Mr. Powell witness could not say if any conversation had taken place between Doherty and himself.

#### The Medical Evidence

Dr. Joseph Price was then called and being sworn deposed he was a duly qualified medical doctor, a graduate of McGill University and practising in town of Campbellton. He remembered the case on record. He was called into Ferguson's store by Wm. Ferguson and there saw the late D. J. Bruce. He was leaning over the show case supported by Mr. McGinn. He had a wound in his eye and there was a lot of blood on the floor and on the show-case. He got a clean handkerchief and bound up the eye and had him removed to the hospital. He followed. At the hospital he examined the eye and found a ragged cut on the upper left eye lid and a cut along the outer side of the eye-ball. The wound was a recent one, and would be caused by a blunt instrument. He considered the wound could be caused by an umbrella. The lids were swollen and discolored. He ordered dressings to be prepared at which time Dr. Lunan who had been called arrived and took charge of the case. Together they examined the eye but found no more than the wounds already described.

Witness had seen Bruce two or three times during the day and he was perfectly natural and in good health. Bruce was conscious when witness saw him at the hospital and did not see him again until his death. Witness then gave a technical description of the bony structure of the eye socket and was cross-examined by Mr. Powell on the thickness of the bone at the back of the socket.

Dr. Lunan was next witness. Being sworn he stated he was a duly qualified medical doctor, a graduate of the McGill University and had practised in Campbellton about 30 years.

Witness knew both accused and the late Daniel J. Bruce. He remembered the 21st September 1911. He was called to the hospital and there found Bruce sitting on a chair with a bandage on his left eye. He took off the blood stained bandage and made an examination then dressed the wound. The eye lid was greatly swollen and the eye closed. There was a wound on the upper eyelid about a quarter of an inch long which appeared to be produced by a blunt instrument, the external part of the eye ball was grazed and the white of the eye bloodshot.

Witness washed and dressed the wound and remained at the hospital about half an hour. Bruce then lay down on the bed and said he had little pain. He desired to go home but preferred to wait in the hospital till after dark rather than create any fuss. He was quite conscious, but spoke thickly and appeared to be dazed. The wound, witness stated, was a recent one would have been made within half an hour.

Witness saw Bruce again at his home about 8.30. He was then unconscious and his condition very grave. Witness asked for a consultation and Dr. Martin and witness examined the patient together. They agreed that an operation was useless, and agreed on certain treatment. Bruce's condition was entirely different but there was no other external wounds. Dr. Lunan stated that he had been Bruce's family physician for 17 or 18 years. Bruce was in good physical condition, and was sound and normal on 21st September; Bruce was a man of medium height.

The witness then produced a skull and gave a demonstration of the construction of the eye-socket and showed the jury the position of the wound where it penetrated the bone. Witness stated he was present when Dr. Pinault made the autopsy. The cause of death was clots of blood at the base and cavities of the brain pressing on the brain. In his opinion the blood from a burst artery the result of the blow was the cause of death.

This finished Dr. Lunan's evidence at this time. Dr. Pinault was then called, and being sworn stated that he was a duly qualified medical doctor a graduate of Laval University and had practised in Campbellton for a number of years. Witness knew the deceased D. J. Bruce well and saw him at his home on 21st September last about 9 p. m. He was then in a comatose condition and had a dressing soaked with blood on his left eye. Witness corroborated Dr. Lunan as to the treatment at the consultation and agreed with him that the wound was caused by a blow from a blunt instrument.

Witness stated that he made the post mortem examination at the request of the Coroner Dr. Martin. He found a cut on the upper eyelid 3/4 inch long and about 1 1/2 inches deep inside. At the base of the brain and at a point opposite to the orbit there was a small piece of bone turned towards the brain and the membranes torn. There were three other small pieces of bone fractured on the orbit part of the skull. The cause of death was clots of blood forming at the base and cavities of the brain. The wound inside the eye was a continuation from the outer wound and was caused by a blunt instrument.

Shown the umbrella witness stated that such an instrument would cause the wound. He had examined all the other organs of the body and had found them healthy and nothing abnormal.

The blow was sufficient to cause the hemorrhage and would require considerable force to make such a

wound. Witness could not say more than considerable force.

The court then adjourned for lunch.

At the resumption after lunch Dr. Pinault was still on the witness stand. An increased number were present, the ladies being accommodated with seats behind the solicitors table.

Mr. Powell cross examined Dr. Pinault on technical points, on re-examination by Mr. Hartley, Dr. Pinault stated that "death was the result of the blow."

Dr. Lunan was recalled and corroborated Dr. Pinault's evidence, stating that "considerable force would be necessary to make the wound."

Wm. M. Ferguson recalled gave a rough sketch of the store, showing the angles of the building, and the side lines, also the position the parties were standing at the time.

This closed the evidence for the prosecution.

#### The Defence

After consultation with Judge White and the Crown Prosecutor, Mr. Powell called on the prisoner to give evidence on his own behalf; and being sworn, Doherty took his place in the witness box.

He stated he was the party against whom the charge was made.

He remembered the 21st September and he was acquainted with the late D. J. Bruce for a number of years. Witness stated in evidence that he was going down the street about 2 or 3 o'clock and met Ed. Alexander. In conversation with him it was remarked that Bruce was saying that Doherty had a supply of liquor in his office for the corruption of the electorate. Later on he was returning to his office for the first time since meeting Alexander and on the steps of Ferguson Brother's store he saw Dan Bruce, Billy Ferguson and another man, he did not know who he was. He thought he would see Bruce about the statement he was making and said "Dan I want to see you". On entering Ferguson's store about 15 or 20 feet he said "Dan you are circulating a report that I have liquor in my office for distribution to the electorate." Bruce replied "Yes and its true." Witness then said "You're a d—liar." Bruce rejoined "Yes its true and if you call me that again I'll hit you on the jaw." Witness reiterated the epithet and stated that Bruce hit him on the jaw with his left hand, and was making towards him again when witness held up the umbrella to defend himself, and the accident happened. In answer to his counsel he had an accident to his right arm in 1893 in Richibucto, in the healing of which the elbow joint was removed and he had not the full power of his arm. He could pull with it but could not push.

Witness stated he did not aim nor intend to hit him in the eye, in fact he did not intend to hit Bruce at all. He agreed with the witnesses for the prosecution, regarding the position of the persons in the store, and he identified the umbrella as his. After the occurrence he went

## NOTICE OF MOTION BY MR. LABILLOIS

Regulation of Automobiles on  
Public Roads is  
Desired.

WILL COME UP TUESDAY

Hon. Chas. H. LaBillois gave notice of the following motion for Tuesday next.

(1) WHEREAS, the whole question of rural social conditions is so connected with agricultural development that some of the various conditions which contribute to the amelioration of the social as well as business difficulties and the isolation of country life must be considered.

(2) WHEREAS, the pleasure and remuneration that the large majority of our farmers derive is by going themselves to market, carrying produce with their own teams and in a great many cases they are accompanied by their wives and daughters and,

(3) WHEREAS, the reckless running of automobiles upon country roads is a serious menace to the lives, limbs and property of the people, who have to drive horses thereon and upon some highways the farmers and his family are seriously inconvenienced, and

(4) WHEREAS, in a great many cases the people are so afraid to drive to different stores in country parishes, villages and towns, or to railway stations for fear of meeting automobiles, that they send their money to the department stores of Toronto, Montreal, etc., depriving the merchants of our province from receiving thousands of dollars which will result in driving many business men to the West.

(5) WHEREAS, it is necessary in order that the farmers who are the backbone of our province should be protected in the enjoyment of country life and that their families be placed in a position of security and safety while travelling on our highways.

THAT WHEREAS, in the opinion of this House, the Government should introduce legislation providing that during one day of the week (not Sunday) no motor vehicle or automobile be allowed to travel on the public highways of New Brunswick except in Incorporated cities and in the case of a doctor or clergyman being called hurriedly to the bedside of a sick person, who either by accident or illness requires the services of a specialist or medical doctor or the spiritual visit of a clergyman of any denomination.

## FLIGHT TO EUROPE

Possible for the Aviator to Alight on Land or Sea if His Engine Stops.

Pontons of an entirely new type, which can be inflated or deflated and attached to an specially-designed aeroplane that will fly over land or sea, have been patented by Harry N. Atwood, of Lynn, Mass.

The invention, devoted to flying say, promises to revolutionize the art. With his improved type of pontons and other attachments, which will be added to a machine he is designing, Atwood's projected flight to Europe seems certain.

According to the young aviator, but one other improvement is necessary to ensure absolute safety on a long flight such as that proposed. It is an engine which can be started without the assistance of anyone. The new engine would have to be one which could be started at a moment's notice by the aviator, without moving from his seat. Atwood has told friends that he has ideas along this line, which he will develop just as soon as his latest invention is thoroughly tested.

The new pontons are very simple in structure. With them it will be possible for an aviator to make a landing on land or sea in case his engine stops.

They are constructed of one-eighth inch rubber over a light framework of fabric, which gives them shape. Despite their frailness these pontons, Atwood declares, will stand up in any sort of sea, or wind.

PLOWMEN'S WORK BASIC

Good Tillage Essential to Advancement—Federal Aid Sought.

"If there is to be the forward movement in agriculture that is talked of as necessary in this province, the foundation of it must be a proper cultivation of the soil," declared Mr. J. Lockie Wilson, Superintendent of Agriculture and Horticultural Societies. Mr. Wilson was hopeful of considerable revival of interest in the matches of the Ontario Plowmen's Association, which will hold its annual meeting on February 2 in the Toronto City Hall. The association gets a grant of \$260 a year from the Ontario Government and has asked the Dominion to grant a sum of not exceeding \$3,000 to each of the nine provinces for the encouragement of agriculture along this line. Very favorable replies had been received to such a request from the Liberal Government, but owing to the change at Ottawa it has been necessary to renew the request.

## ONE MAN ONE VOTE IN QUEBEC

Bill Finally Passed—Males  
Over 21 Allowed  
to Vote.

The "One man one vote" bill was finally passed in the Legislative Council last Friday, when it was read the third time on division. Hon. Mr. Chapais dissenting.

By the new law suffrage is practically given to every British subject in the Province of Quebec over twenty-one years of age, and while a considerable number of votes will be removed by the new system, it will on the other hand serve to add a thousand more to the list of voters.

By the new bill the right of suffrage is given as follows:

To any owner of property, lessee or sub-lessee of property, of any value whatever.

To any son, stepson, or grandson of an owner, lessee or sub-lessee of property.

To all laborers or tradesmen providing they receive a salary of at least \$120 a year.

To all clergymen irrespective of denomination, and without any other qualification.

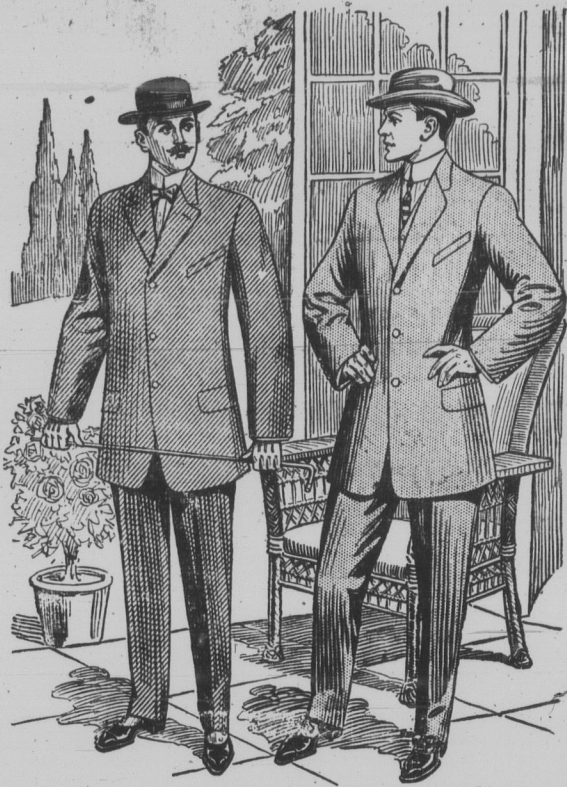
To all engaged in the teaching profession, irrespective of salary. The only restriction is that the voter must be a British subject, male, and must be twenty-one years or over.

There is no limit of time made for residence or ownership of property.

The new measure is about the nearest step to universal suffrage, and will entirely revolutionize the old system of suffrage, in the Province of Quebec.

Hon. Mr. Chapais characterized the measure as a regrettable innovation, and he pointed out that many years ago when Sir J. Macdonald had a bill passed at Ottawa giving the right of vote to the sons of proprietors he had differed in opinion with his chief. He had always considered, and he was still of the opinion that it was a bad policy to annul the vote of the head of a family by that of a son, who has less experience and less interest in public affairs. Since that time suffrage had been further extended, and that the present measure meant practically universal suffrage.

Mr. Chapais declared that he was for equality, but he was not one of

**BRITISH EMPIRE BOUND BY WIRELESS**

British Postmaster-General Has Accepted Contract Tendered by Marconi Co.

Mr. E. A. Reoch, Secretary-Treasurer of the Canadian Marconi Wireless Telegraph Company, received information from England, to-day, which confirms the statement made some days ago, a cable dispatch to the Star that an Imperial string of wireless stations would be established throughout the Empire.

According to the information received by Mr. Reoch, the Postmaster-General of Great Britain, acting on behalf of His Majesty's Government, and the Governments of the Dominion and Colonies, has accepted the contract tendered by the Marconi people for the construction of all the wireless stations which will form the Imperial wireless scheme.

The scheme consists of the placing of wireless stations throughout the empire in such a manner that immediate communication may be had with any of the Colonies. The Postmaster's acceptance of the Marconi contracts will therefore be the first step towards the establishment of wireless around the globe.

The practicability of this so-called Imperial wireless scheme was acclaimed by the Colonial Premiers at the Imperial Conference of last June, immediately following their endorsement of the plan experts were set at work making estimates as to the cost of the establishment of the six stations which will constitute the aerial links of communication which will serve to more closely unite the Empire.

According to the reports of these experts, the six stations will cost approximately, some four or five thousand pounds; and will be established at London, Egypt, Aden (Arabia), Pretoria, (South Africa) Bangalore, India and Singapore. These stations will be of immense power, and will easily radiate etherical waves for a distance of 10,000 and three thousand miles.

Although the officers of the Marconi Company refuse to detail all the conditions of the contract, it is known that the stations will be operated by the Marconi Wireless Company for the first six months following their establishment, and will then be completely taken over by the Government.

Another clause of the contract states that the Government will have the power to terminate the agreement at the expiration of eighteen years; but, by so doing, must forfeit the right to the use of any machine or instrument, the patent of which is held by the Marconi Company.

The value of a wireless chain to the Empire cannot be over-estimated for by this means, the Home Government will not only secure cheaper and easier communication with the Colonies, but will be able to remain, continually in touch with its fleet, and will be entirely independent of the submarine cables.

**HOME FOR BANKRUPTS**

A curious will provides for those who have been unfortunate.

A singular foundation is to be established near St. Petersburg through the will of the wife of the jeweller Ivanoff, who left two and a half millions under strange conditions. A million had to be spent on a sanatorium for bankrupts, so that as a result of the anxiety their failures cause them, they can spend a few weeks under conditions which will contribute to the restoration of their shattered health. Part of the money, according to the widow's instructions, had to be spent on those daughters of bankrupts who had seen better days by preparing them for occupations. Money was also left to establish schools for manual workers. The widow's relatives are contesting the will, contending that she was not of sound mind when it was executed.

## DALHOUSIE JUSTICE.

The citizens of this town and of the County of Restigouche should feel thoroughly ashamed of the recent proceedings of the Spring Court held in Dalhousie this week. On Wednesday the famous Doherty case was tried, Dr. Doherty being charged with the murder of D. J. Bruce in September last, and acquitted.

Before dealing with the facts of the case it would be well to remember that this is the sixth occasion in this county and vicinity where the taking away of life has been of little moment. In each of these occasions no conviction was recorded, and it would be well for us to stop and think for one moment whether we are becoming a sympathetic people, or losing our ability to judge between right and wrong.

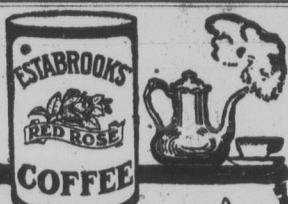
The verdict returned at Dalhousie on Wednesday evening has both shocked and surprised all the right thinking people in the County of Restigouche.

Now what are the facts? First the grand jury brought in a true bill of murder. Now the accused is tried; the evidence led for the prosecution, and in spite of cross examination, no material departure is made from that tendered at the preliminary inquiry. Now what comes in? The defence seek to prove that the death of D. J. Bruce was a lamentable accident. If we look at the judge's summing up of the case, we shall perhaps be better able to understand the wonder and surprise that such a verdict should be returned. The judge in his charge to the jury stated that, in the case before the jury, they had the option of three verdicts: First, murder; second, manslaughter; third, acquittal. The learned judge took great pains to point out to the jury that the charge of murder must be eliminated, and then quoted the law to them that manslaughter was culpable homicide, which meant the killing of a man by an unlawful act, whether in self-defence or not. He instanced the fact of a learned judge of the Province, before whom a charge of manslaughter was preferred in the case of a prisoner who stabbed a man to the heart, against whom the jury returned a verdict of guilty and sentenced to 30 days imprisonment. The judge was careful to point out that the jury had nothing to do with the sentence, that part being protected by statute. Now we come to the fact that the defence admitted that Dr. Doherty killed Daniel J. Bruce. Against that fact we have the summing up of the learned judge, that the killing of a man by an unlawful act is manslaughter. We are now troubled to know how any sane jury could return the verdict of not guilty, taking these two facts as a guide for their conduct. There is no doubt in the public eye that the jury were influenced by the remarks of H. A. Powell, wherein he characterized the evidence of Allen E. McGinn as false. Of course the jury had only to deal with the evidence led before them, so that if the evidence of McGinn was not accepted, neither could the evidence of the prisoner himself be taken, for the same reason of it being unsupported testimony. The statements of these two persons being removed from the case, there was no evidence whatever left for the jury to convict on the charge before them.

Now who is to blame for this state of affairs? What has the local Government to say on the matter? How was it that a strange lawyer was sent to look after this case, a man who knew nothing whatever about it until he arrived in Dalhousie on Monday, to conduct the trial? Was it of so little importance that the Attorney General had not the inclination to bother, or were they afraid that some political trouble might ensue their getting up against a shining light of their own party? How can lawyers stand up and rave about the glorious privilege of Canadian Justice, when they know that political jobbery is responsible for trying up that same justice in a Coridan knot?

This travesty of what is called justice is laid at the door of the Government. Their conduct of the case has been most reprehensible, and will no doubt become an important factor in the coming local elections. The disgust and wonder of the people will not die down very quickly and we shall look forward with interest to the explanations which will be made in the house when some trenchant questions are asked.

There certainly does not seem any use for a lock-up when there is no necessity for arresting a person for manslaughter, knowing that the jury will not convict when the trial comes off.

We are afraid some of the jury will have a busy time within the next few days doing their best to explain just why they did not convict. It will be a hard nut to crack.

Answer. Mr. John B. Delaney has been recommended for appointment as Sitting Magistrate in place of Mr. Mathias Comeau, resigned. No recommendation has yet been made for appointment of a Police Magistrate for the Town of Dalhousie, or Commissioner of the Parish of Dalhousie Civil Court in place of W. A. Trueman, resigned.

3. Who is dispensing the local patronage in Restigouche County, since the defeat of Mr. W. S. Montgomery, as a candidate at the Federal Elections on Sept. 21st, 1911?  
Answer. The local patronage of Restigouche County is dispensed by Messrs W. S. Montgomery and Arthur Culligan, the nominees of the local Government party in said County.

### DALHOUSIE.

Two interesting events which to the town of Dalhousie and the county of Restigouche will require more than passing interest. On June 13th, the Hon. Chas. H. LaBillette will celebrate his silver wedding and on June 19th, he will have attained his thirtieth year of service in the Local Parliament. Hon. Chas. H. LaBillette it is not generally known, is the "father of the house," and his many friends will see that such a record as his will not pass unnoticed.

Already there are schemes afoot to make fitting recognition of these two events and more will be heard later.

Civic affairs in Dalhousie now bulk largely in the public eye and are becoming interesting. For some time there has been a feeling of dissatisfaction with incorporation government which is considered a failure. Potts has been approached to head a ticket which is likely to be in the field for the coming town election, pledged to work for and if possible carry out this reform. From reports it seems certain that this ticket will be returned by a thumping majority.

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## CANADIAN PEAT BOGS

Said to Have a Fuel Value of Four-  
teen Billion Tons of Coal.

The known peat bogs of Canada are  
estimated to cover an area of approx-  
imately 38,000 square miles, from  
which about 82,000,000,000 tons of air-  
dried peat could be produced. This  
is said to be equal in fuel value to  
some 14,000,000,000 tons of coal. To  
encourage the utilization of these re-  
sources, a peat bog of 300 acres, with  
an average depth of 8 feet, has been  
acquired by the Canadian Government  
at Alfred, near Caledonia Springs,  
Bruce County. About five miles  
of ditches have been dug, and a stor-  
age shed to hold 300 tons of air-dried  
peat, a blacksmith's shop, and an of-  
fice have been built. It is estimated  
that the erection of a peat plant ca-  
pable of producing 30 tons of air-  
dried peat daily should not cost very  
much, and since workable peat bogs  
are scattered throughout the farming  
regions of Ontario and Quebec, the  
most economical plan for utilizing this  
fuel would be the erection of a num-  
ber of plants at convenient points, to  
be operated in the interests of the  
neighboring communities.

Edward Alexander was called and deposed that he had seen the accused on the 21st September between 2 and 3 p. m. He related the conversation he had had with the late D. J. Bruce as in ordinary conversation.

This closed the evidence in the case.

### Speech for the Defence

H. A. Powell in his address to the jury complimented the court with the celerity the case had been tried, and complimented the Crown on the fair and just handling of the case. He regretted deeply the unfortunate occurrence which culminated in the death of one of Campbelltons best loved citizens, and said that one could almost say Bruce came to his death through his goodness. Human nature the world over was ever excitable over sudden death, hence his earnest desire to have this case postponed until public feeling had died down. He said he had taken up the case not for the dollars and cents but on behalf of an old schoolmate, to give him the benefit of his help and to see he received which he had got, a fair and just trial. He went over the facts of the case as outlined in the evidence, and said that the jury had three verdicts before them murder, manslaughter, or not guilty. He object in bitter terms to the evidence of Mr. McGinn describing his testimony as false from beginning to end. He asked the jury to discredit the testimony of McGinn and accept that of the prisoner. If they did so they would find that there was no conflict of testimony, and that the conclusion of the matter would be found in the fact that the occurrence was a deplorable accident. Mr. Powell's speech occupied 45 minutes.

J. C. Hartley K. C. for the Crown spoke very briefly on the case. He stated he was there on behalf of the Crown as much to see an innocent man freed as to convict a guilty person. He deprecated the remarks of Mr. Powell as to the testimony of McGinn, remarking that if the jury set aside the evidence of Mr. McGinn they were not holding to their oath. If the remarks of H. A. Powell were believed by the jury that the witness Mr. McGinn had framed up his story to convict an innocent man then he (McGinn) was a scoundrel of the deepest dye and worst than the man in the dock. That was not so. Counsel then pointed out that the evidence laid before them that day was in every detail similar to the evidence brought out at the preliminary enquiry. They could not accept the evidence of the prisoner when they looked at the motive for establishing a plea of accident, but that the evidence was all before them, and they had to adjudge on that without thought of sympathy.

### The Summing Up

Judge White then gave the charge to the jury and occupied a little over half an hour in the summing up. In the law he said there were three verdicts open to them, Murder, Manslaughter and Aqutal. He eliminated the charge of murder and explained the law of manslaughter. He said manslaughter or culpable homicide was the slaying of a man by a cupable or unlawful act. The prisoner did not deny killing the man, it was for the jury to decide what was an unlawful act. He instanced the case of a charge of manslaughter preferred before one of the leading judges of the province wherein the prisoner stabbed a man to the heart and was sentenced to thirty days imprisonment.

The jury therefore had nothing to do with the sentence the law provided for all that by statute or by appeal. Dealing with the contention of the defence that the words spoken at the time of the blow were "Fit for tat" and not "Take that" as contended by the crown the learned judge that this made little difference, the mere fact of the prisoner saying tit for tat would infer that a blow was struck. He told the jury that the evidence was all before them and reminded them that their verdict must be unanimous.

The jury then retired and were out two hours.

On their return to the court when asked if they had returned a verdict, the form said "We find the prisoner not guilty to the indictment." Surprise was depicted on every face as the judge said "What do you mean by that? Do you find the prisoner not guilty of the charge?" "We do," answered the form and the jury unanimously said "We do."

H. A. Powell then moved for the discharge of the prisoner, and on being told to come out of the dock the accused was so surprised he sat still.

The jury were then discharged and the court adjourned.

## MRS. LABILLOIS DEATH RECORDED

Dies Suddenly at Fort William Ontario.

RESIDED IN DALHOUSIE

Retiring for the night, apparently in the best of health, at her home at 509 McKellar street Fort William, it was found that a few hours later, Mrs. John Labillois had entered on the sleep which is not broken till judgement day. During the early hours of the morning the deceased's granddaughter had occasion to go into the room, and she found that the angel of death had once more visited the household.

It is believed that grieving over the loss of son and father weakened her heart and death from heart failure was the result. Last year a son was drowned in the Kam, and it was only two weeks ago that her husband was laid to rest.

Mrs. Labillois was one of the pioneers of this city. Coming here from Charlottetown, P. E. I., where she was born in 1843, she and her husband first kept house in West Fort William, 25 years ago, moving to the east end a few years ago.

Until quite recently a prominent worker in St. Patrick's parish. Mrs. Labillois had made numerous friends who respected her in a high degree. Two sons, Charles of this city, and Joseph of Menominee, Mich., and a daughter, Mrs. D. J. McNell, of this city, survive the deceased.

Mrs. Labillois was an aunt of the Hon C. H. Labillois and was well known and loved in Dalhousie and Bonaventure county. She resided in the town of Dalhousie for a number of years.
