TORRID AND TEMPESTUOUS.

A Wave of Tropic Heat Sweeps the Country.

Violent Rain Storms Reported in

CHICAGO, Aug. 10.—Saturday was the hottest day of the year at Chicago. The signal service thermometer registered 93° at noon. There have been several case of heat

noon. There have been several case of heat prostration.

The extreme hot weather is causing great alarm at Jamestown, N. D., about the wheat crop, which is not within ten days of harvest. The hot wave has prevailed over the entire State, and is also reported as being felt to an equal extent in South Dakota. The crop is in a critical state, and much anxiety is manifested as to the outcome.

HAVANA, Tex., Aug. 10.—There is great misery among the Mexican population this year. The staple crop of the Rio Grande Valley is corn and the Mexican frijole, but the drought has been so terrible for the last eighteen months that scarcely anything has been raised and stock has died by the thousands. The drought is confined to a few counties in Texas but extends far into old Mexico. into old Mexico.

New York, Aug. 11.—Yesterday was the third day of the heated term in this city, and it was the hottest of the three. At 3:30 p.m. it was 97° in the shade on the street level. From noon until 4 p.m. to-day the ambulances were busily engaged in carrying to the hospitals scores of human beings prostrated by the heat. Nothing like it has been recorded at this time of the year for nearly twenty years, and a continuance of the hot weather during the week would cause an enormous increase the week would cause an enormous increa of mortality, especially in the crowded tenement district. Five deaths have octenement district. Five deaths have oc-curred and many persons are in a precari-ous condition. A number of policemen had to leave their posts. The theaters are al-most deserted. Three persons were ren-dered insane by the heat. The scenes east of Broadway and south of Houston street were beyond description. The entire popu-lation deserted their tenements and sought the housetops and the streets in the hopes of getting some relief.

THE STORM.

TORONTO, Aug. 10.—Sultry heat, rain in torrents, a thunderstorm overhead that rolled and cracked all day, lightning that as bed weather as folk have ever had in Toronto on a summer day. The rainstorm was so heavy that many cellars were flooded, and on many of the streets the limbs of trees were lying around where they had been blown. No damage to life or limb is reported, but it is feared to-day's reports will show some damage to crops.

He was only suspended after the

matter had been brought up in the House. In May, 1890, as reported in the Empire, Deputy Minister Lowe consented to take own the charges. Instead of sending the chief of the service in Manitoba to make an investigation on the spot, however, and make the immediate change necessary if the ugly charges alleged were found to be true, the department sent a letter to the accused asking him to reply. After a lapse of six months-on Nov. 17, though the Free Press says it was a month later-Tetu replied, asking permission to come to Otawa and make a personal explanation. He was told not to come, but to write. Did that dillydallying look as if Mr. Carling and his subordinate were very anxious thout speedily investigating these serious charges? Tetu apparently made up his mind that the department was playing with him, for he ignored the request. Then another letter was sent, and was not answered. Still no decided action was taken. Four months were allowed to drag past, and then, in February, 1891, the Manitoba, called on the accused and got a such as oats, millet, Hungarian, verbal statement from him. Then an investigation, wound up in interminable red tape, was resolved on. The sleepy Minister and his deputy let matters continue in this most unsatisfactory condition—they were "left in doubt," the Free Press tells us—till "Mr. Lynch was sent to Emerson in July last. When he returned the Minister Shought his statement sufficiently serious to warrant the suspension of Tetn." This summary of dates and of action

taken is gathered from sources friendly to Mr. Carling and his assistant. It certainly does not show that the department acted with that regard for the public interest that the taxpayers have a right to expect. By ordering the most common place investi-gation, to which no honest government official could object, the entire charge could have been cleared up in a couple of weeks after they were made. The business manager of any financial concern would have so decreed and so acted. Why should there not be business methods in conduct ing public affairs? The country has lost millions of dollars by a system moulded after the fashion of that which characterized the methods pursued in the Department of Agriculture in this casesometimes, as we have seen in the Lange vin-McGreevy case, by fraudulent conniv-ance, at other times by sheer leniency cowards the accused or lymphatic slownes on the part of those charged with his supervision. In this case, as was shown before the Public Accounts Com mittee, hough forgery had been resorted to, though the department accountant swore that Tetu sent in fictitious accounts, the brought the case into Parliament, and it

HARVEST AND DAIRY NOTES. The Ontario harvest of 1891 is now well advanced, and as far as Western Ontario s concerned the second week of August will see the bulk of it gathered in. In the main the weather has been favorable, being cool, with plenty of bright sunny days to hasten growth and an occasional heavy shower has, with other favoring causes, developed wheat much plumper in the kernel than last year. Wheat threshing is in progress, yields as high as 45 bushels and over being reported. The average of marketable wheat, however, will be nothing like that, though some think it will reach 30, but even that is a high mark if the country generally be taken into consider-ation. We notice that there is a disposition in some quarters to magnify yields, especially at "threshing time," or where there are prospective sales of seed grain at high prices ahead. What fields of spring wheat there are have also come on particularly well this season. The yields of oats and barley,

both in straw and grain, will be large, and, with favorable weather, one in quality. Peas are not likely to be correspondingly good, many fields having suffered severely from the heavy rains, of which this grain will stand but little. Other grains will make up the

loss in this respect.

promising appearance.

Small fruits have been abundant and of uperior quality. The apple crop is coming on satisfactorily and is almost certain now to be an improvement over that of last year, which with us was a general failure. Excessive early pasturing and the early dry weather had a most injurious effect upon pastures, which for weeks have been too short to keep up the milk flow. In fact, the shrinkage of late has been not only steady but decidedly serious. This, of course, affects the output of dairy products, especially cheese, and prices will tend upward. Many dairy farmers have been already forced to supplement heir pasturage by green fodder, such as oats and corn, but even with that aid the milk yield fell far below that of June. The summer feeding of cows is becoming a grave problem, and it would seem that partial "soiling" at least must be resorted to. The pastures, except in an exceptional locality, cannot be depended upon for more than a month and a half, or at most two months, after which there must Deputy Minister, who was on a visit to be a succession of supplemental green foods In some sections alfalfa clover, from which three or more cuttings can be got in a single eason, is being tested. The situation is causing many farmers to consider seriously the question of whether or not it pays to devote such a large area of land to pasture as is now usually the case.

The cheese business appears to be extending westward, a large factory costing some \$3,000 having been recently established at Harrow, in the county of Essex. At the request of those promoting the new enterprise, Hon. Thos. Ballantyne, M.P.P., of Stratford, whose practical and fatherly interest in dairying continues unabated, visited the locality the other evening and delivered an address to the patrons, giving them the benefit of his long and successful experience in connection with this branch

of dairying. In some quarters there is talk of fitting up cheese factories for winter butter making, which can be done at an outlay of from \$500 to \$700. Where new creameries are established we believe they should take the precaution of putting in a cheesemaking outfit, which can be done at a small cost. Then when summer butter drops to 15 and 17 cents or thereabouts, and chee is going at from 8 to 10 it is a losing game for the Onta-io farmer to put milk into butter. The man who can make good cheese can make good butter, and thus be able to change from one to the other in a day. 


