A dispatch from Pittsburg brings the important information that a complete revoution in the great industry of electric ighting will be effected before the end of are required each year for renewals fully which is destined to still further cheapen double that number, or 30,000 each day. There are engaged in the supplying of these lamps about twenty manufacturers, scattered about the country, besides several large glass concerns engaged in the manufacture of the glass. The incandescent lamp as usually made is wholly of glass fused at all points, and the entire structure when once the burner is broken, becomes useless and valueless and an incumbrance. There are also required in each lamp two pieces of platinum wire, costing from 3 cents to 5 cents each, which are scarcely worth the cost of reclaiming, so that the increasing demand for platinum, due to the extension of electric lighting, has frequently caused an advance in price. In fact, it may be said that the greatest use of platinum at present is in the manufacture of lamps. The present cost of sixteen-candle power incan-descent lamps averages about 40 cents each as the result of keen competition, and it has been believed a further considerable reduction could not be effected. however, all the former methods will be changed, for the Westinghouse Electric Company has begun at its works in Pittsburg the extensive manufacture by machinery of an ideal lamp. Instead of using a globe fused at all points, it uses one in two parts, which are separable for the replacement of the burner, so that the globe can be used repeatedly, instead of being thrown away, as with the Edison form. Right Reverend Phillips Brooks, bishop of the Protestant Episcopal Church for the diocese of Massachusetts, has gone home from the General Convention recently held at Baltimore, profoundly impressed with the objections to the practice of the House of Bishops in sitting with closed doors, which he characterizes as absolutely un-

This is a matter which concerns the pub-lic only so far as it affects the bishop's own denomination. Since his return to Boston from Baltimore, however, he is reported to have expressed himself thus in reference to

denomination. Since his return to Boston from Baltimore, however, he is reported to have expressed himself thus in reference to another matter suggested by his attendance at the General Convention:

"I have for a long time felt that another thing ought to be done. The entrance into our Christian ministry and exis out of it ought to be made easier than it is. Men ought not to be compelled to stay or go in disgrace, when, in the best of the light which God has given them, they feel that their work lies there no longor."

We do not quite understand how Bishop Brooks or any other man can think that the entrance into the Christian ministry ought to be made auy easier than it is at present. It has long seemed to us conspicuously true of the clerical profession that "fools rush in where angols fear to tread." Only a short time ago a New York bishop was publicly lamenting the facility with which incompetent young men, who could hardly make a living by any other cailing, gained admission into the ministry. We think he had good cause for expressing such views, and that the barriers to the pulpit should be raised higher instead of being lowered, so that nothing but high character and considerable attainments would suffice to overcome them.

On the other hand, Bishop Brooks is entirely right in saying that men who honestly feel that their work lies no longer in the Christian ministry should not be compelled to stay there or leave the pulpit in disgrace. A man may make a mistake in becoming a a lawyer, a doctor, an editor, or an engineer, and if he finds that he has chosen unwisely or erroneously, and is better fitted for some other pursuit, it ought not to be a reproach to him that he abandons the ministry and takes up the calling for which he is best adapted; assuming, of course, that there is nothing in his ministerial career which involves a stain upon his moral character.

9. Each State or Province to devise its own system of government, subject only to the limitation that it must be Republican.

10. Each Province or State can invoke the whole power of the confederacy to secure protection against foreign invasion or domestic violence.

11. There shall be two sets of judges, the Federal judges and the State judges. The former to be appointed by the president or governor, by and with the advice of the Senate and House of Representatives, their tenure to be for life, or during good behavior. Provincial and State judges to be appointed in such manner and for such termine. Provincial judges to administer the Provincial laws, the Federal judges to have jurisdiction only over the following termine. (a) Cases in law and equity, arising nder the constitution and laws of the Union, and treaties made under their

authority.

(b) Cases affecting ambassadors and other public ministers and consuls.

(d) Controversies to which the confederation shall be a party.

(e) Controversies between two or more States and Provinces.

(i) All matters not above enumerated to be exclusively assigned to the State courts; each Province to be at liberty to regulate the number of State courts, either of original or appellate jurisdiction.

12. There shall be one supreme and final court of appeal for the nation, the same to tonsist of nine judges, and no appeal shall be allowed to her Majesty in Privy Council.

13. It is proposed that writs and acts of Parliament shall run in the name of the people, instead of in that of her Majesty, and that no queen's counsel be appointed, or any patent of precedence issued for any

court.

14. Once every four years a president or governor shall be elected by the people for the purpose of checking the national legislature. This efficer to have no seat in the House, and to be removable only for crime; House, and to be removable only for crime; and to further secure his independence, it is recommended that his salary be neither increased nor diminished during his term. He shall be the chief executive officer of the confederacy, and shall have power, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, to make treaties, provided two-thirds of the Senators present concur, and shall appoint ambassadors, judges and other public efficers. His signature shall also be necessary to the validity of any bill, unless the same be passed by two-thirds of both Houses, thus giving him the power to veto

The members of this association pledge themselves to use all lawful and bonorable means to promote the cause of continental unity as herein described. Our aim is to form a a perfect union among the people of this continent; to promote trade and commerce, and the development of our vast natural resources; to simplify and improve the system of government; to lighten the burdens of taxation and give the amplest rewards to labor; to secure the blessings of freedom to curselves and our posterity; to insure peace; to pro-

Union Association of Toronto.

This association is formed to co-operate with the Provincial and all similar organizations in the effort to secure a free, equal and homorable union in commercial and political matters between Canada and the United States.

The more effectually to accomplish our objects, the following, among other changes, are recommended:

1. One federal, or national government, for the whole of North America, the same to consist of a Senate and House of Representatives. Representation in the House to be according to population, the unit of which shall be one member for every 200, 200 people, thus giving Canada 25 members, and the entire Union about 350.

2. For the purposes of this union, Canada to be divided into eight Provinces or States, each of which shall be entitled to two Senators, the same proportion as the American States of the Union.

3. The system of government to be federal in character, such as that now prevailing in Canada; but to be also strictly Republican, thereby insuring the election by the people of all presidents, governors or rulers. No title of nobility to be granted either by the mational, provincial or state government; and all persons holding any office of profit or trust under them be perpohibited from accepting any present, emolument, office or trust under them be be prohibited from accepting any present, emolument, office or trust under them be perpohibited from accepting and posterosal courts of justice, commerce, foreign adomestic, currency, copyright and patents; the postoffice and post roads; taxation for the foregoing purposes, and for the general support of the government to be proversed for the general support of the government.

5. The national government to be probabilited from establishing any religion, or firm interfering with the free exercise thereof.

6. The powers of our Provincial Legislatures, as defined by the British North America Act, to be enlarged so as to embrace marriage and divorce, as well as bear and the entire the provincial department of

This being the case, care should be taken in so treating wool, that too much bleaching powder be not used, from two to two and one-half per cent. of the weight of the wool being quite sufficient, this to be made into a clear solution, achidified with sulphuric acid, the wool being worked in this for 30 minutes, rinsed in water, and then dyed in the usual manner. It is also remarked that, for dying merdant dying coloring matter, a proliminary treatment with chlorine is a great improvement; that is, much deeper shades can by this means be obtained, due to the simple fact that the wool takes up the mordant very much better than untreated wool—with the exception of those dyestuffs which require copperas for a mordant, as in the case with the gambines, when, instead of a green, a brown is obtained, and the same may be said of logwood.

Some new ideas have lately attracted attention in the matter of pavements. In controverting the statement of Sir Oliver, the secretary of the ssociation writes as follows to the Seaforth

association writes as follows to the Scautth Expositor:

Dear Expositor—Would you permit me to draw the attention of your numerous readers to the great question of continental union, and to point out particularly an immediate advantage that would result to the Canadian farmer.

On looking over recent copies of the London Free Press and Detroit Free Press, I found that a fair idea could be obtained from the market prices as to the respective financial positions of the Canadian and American farmers. Taking the market prices as found in these papers, I was able to construct the following statement:

But as the American received \$117 30, he has \$80 83 cash left, while the Canadian farmer has 5 cents left. This is the advantage the American farmer has over the Canadian farmer on but one load of produce. What must it be in a year? 


