It is also rumored that an attempt will be made to impose an almost prohibitive duty on American oil. THE SOUDAN EXPEDITION. London, Aug. 18.-The Chronicle

says the British Government has decided not to stop at Khartoum, but to advance eventually with the Egyptian forces of Lado or Wadelai, the object being to effect a junction with troops from Uganda, thus being in a position to dominate the valley of the Nile.

A GERMAN CRISIS.

London, Aug. 18 .- The dismissal of Gen. Bronsart von Schellendorf, German Minister of War, it is believed. indicates a crisis in the internal policy of the empire. Other removals, it is hinted, will follow, and the prospect of quiet political development is anything but reassuring. The removals are attributed to the influence Aide-de-Camp Gen. Hanke over the

HARVESTING. London, Aug. 18.—Rapid progress has been made with the harvest during the past week, the bulk of the product having been already secured. The quality is reported as excellent. The market for wheat ruled dull and inactive, but was occasionally easier. There was not much change in prices, buyers being very reserved and bids being scarce. The quantity of wheat offered was only moderate.

DUE TO THE DOGS. London, Aug. 18.-Dr. Nansen left Vardoe, Norway, yesterday morning on his way to Christiana. It now de-

velops that the meeting between Dr. Nansen and Jackson, the English explorer, was the result of the barking of the dogs. The Norwegian and his companion were exploring one day, when they heard barking, and, following the sounds, to their amazement they reached Jackson's camp. Vardo has been en fete and decorated in honor of the return of Dr. Nansen.

THOSE SPANISH CLAIMS. London, Aug. 18 .- The evening news papers comment at length on Spain's bill for damages against the United States, as a result of the fitting out in American ports of filibustering expeditions, destined for Cuba, and to the decision arrived at in the case of

the Alabama. The Globe says: "The United States' acceptance of the Geneva award makes it absolutely impossible for them to repudiate their liability under the present circumstances with any show of reason or justice.' GRAND TRUNK'S POSITION IM-

PROVING. London, Aug. 18.-The friends of the Grand Trunk Railwaydo not share the pessimistic talk which the half-yearly traffic statement has produced. On behalf of the Grand Trunk, it is noted, Apply T. H. TROUBLE IN BELFAST.

Belfast, Aug. 18.—Serious rioting occurred here yesterday morning in connection with the Nationalistic manifestations in favor of granting amnesty to the Inish political prisoners There were several processions of Nationalists through the streets as a beginning, and they finally were merged

into a large procession, headed by bandsmen, armed with spears. The procession soon attracted immense crowds of people, and stone-throwing commenced. This served to enrage the Nationalists, and then bandsmen attacked the crowds with their spears, wounding many people. The police charged the rioters, and used their batons freely, with the result that several persons were hurt before order was restored.

The rioting caused the greatest excitement throughout the city and further disturbances were feared in the evening if the demonstrators should carry out their threat of returning in very much greater strength and marching in procession throughout the main streets of Belfast. The police however, took steps to make a display of force calculated to prevent any further serious rioting, but rain fell heavily, and this had the effect of causing the mob to disperse.

PEACEFUL OUTLOOK.

The British Press Sees It in Lord Salis bury's Speech.

London, Aug. 18.-The statement concerning arbitration made by the Marquis of Salisbury when he was installed as lord warden of the Cinque ports, is attracting widespread attention here.

The Times, Daily News and Daily Chronicle, in editorial articles, this morning, comment upon the importance of the Premier's statements of Saturday, and the Pall Mall Gazette concludes a column leading article on the same subject this afternoon with the following remark: "Mr. Balfour's and the Marquis of Salisbury's arbitration statements have caused unfeigned satisfaction to thousands of members of our common, Anglo-Saxon stock on both sides of the Atlantic."

The remarks of Mr. Balfour, alluded to by the Pall Mall Gazette, were made on Friday last at the closing of dress in the reply to the speech from Parliament. He said the Government the throne will be moved by Mr. Benwas still considering the latest proposals of Secretary Olney, which, he added, are regarded as opening the way for an equitable and early settlement of the dispute. The statement was received with tremendous cheers. The St. James Gazette says that the country will receive the arbitration news with the greatest satisfaction, but further on, the same paper remarks that it refuses to believe that the Marquis of Salisbury will "be so feeble as to yield to Secretary Olney's be seen how the Conservatives act in demand for the inclusion of the set-tled districts of Venezuela in the ar-

Angus McLeod, the Sarnia bicyclist, lost his temper as well as his race during the meet yesterday afternoon, and last night his loss-was supplemented by a fine of \$5 and costs. Duncan Metcalf, of this city, formerly of Toronto, laid an information with Squire Lacey after the races, charging McLeod with assault. A warrant was issued for him, and Detectives Ward and Northgreaves arrested him at the Grigg House about 8 o'clock. He was taken before Magistrate Lacey. Angus said he was sorry he had lost his control of temper, and apologized for his conduct. He accused C. Elliott of trying to foul him in every track where the two had met for the past month. Angus said he lost his self-control in the finish of the race, and when he had dismounted, Metcalf, Elliott's friend, was the first man he saw, and he struck him. Victims of Sunstroke. 651 Fatalities From Heat in New

York Last Week.

Total Deaths From All Causes in th Seven Days, 1,591.

New York, Aug. 18.-Last week's mortality record for this city was the largest in the history of the bureau of vital statistics. There were 1,810 deaths, nearly 200 more thany any other week's record since the health board began taking statistics. The deaths from heat prostrations alone numbered 651, nearly thrice the number from that cause recorded for any single week in the history of the city. This number, however, includes many deaths of which the heat was not the primary cause, and which have been printed as "sudden deaths, cause not specified." The hot spells of 1872 and 1892 were completly eclipsed in regard to the number of deaths by the recent hot spell. The present really hot spell was preceded by five hot days on which the temperature was recorded

at 90 degrees and upward. During the hot week in 1872, out of 1,591 deaths, 733 were infants under 1 year, of whom 495 died of diarrheal diseases. In the hot spell of 1892 the deaths of infants under 1 year numbered 563 for the week, out of a total of 1,615, and 273 of these were from diarrheal diseases.

During the last hot spell there were ten days in succession on which the temperature reached 90 degrees or The mortality and the number of sunstrokes were highest on the tenth day of this high temperature. Out of the total of 1,810 deaths in the last week 391 were infants under 1 year, 137 of these having died from diarrheal diseases. The temperatures recorded by the health board were taken from the thermometer at the city observatory in Central Park. Of the deaths recorded during the week last past 651 were caused by sunstrokes and 72 by violence, that term including suicides, homicides, and all deaths resulting from acci-





HAMILTON HAS A SAY. The Hamilton Spectator says: "Now that Brantford has decided not to continue in the Canadian League, it is expected that representatives of the London, Guelph and Hamilton clubs will get together and arrange a new schedule of games. It is not known whether the games played so far will be counted or if a series will be ar-ranged for the championship. Several days ago London talked of arranging a series of games with Guelph and freezing out Hamilton. Guelph, however, would sooner play with the Hams; but there is no disposition on the part of Hamilton or Guelph to freeze out London. It would be better to arrange a series between the

three clubs, but Manager Sippi should be given to understand that London is not in a position to dictate terms, and must agree to a schedule that is fair to all the clubs." It is impossible to arrange a threeclub schedule on a paying basis, as two games a week must be played by each club to pay expenses. 


