London, April 19 .- The Greco-Turkish situation is understood to be substantially as follows: War has not been officially declared between Turkey and Greece, but it has been declared officially to have "broken out." The Turkish Cabinet has decided to sever diplomatic relations with Greece, and ordered Edhem Pasha, the commander of the Turkish forces, to take the offensive. It is considered in London that war between Turkey and Greece has actually begun, the Turkish de-claration that war has "broken out" being merely for the purpose of diplomatically putting the onus of the war upon the Kingdom of Greece.

GREEK STEAMER SUNK. Athens, April 19 .- The Turkish bateries at Prevosa, on the north shore of the entrance of the Gulf of Arta, fired on and sank a Greek steamer, the Macedonia, yesterday morning while she was attempting to leave the Guif of Ambracia. The crew of the steamer were saved by boats from the shore. But the captain of the Macedonia was severely wounded. Upon the receipt of this news, the Greek Government sent orders to the Greek fleet in the Gulf of Ambracia to bom-bard Prevosa. Prevosa, which is in Epirus and eighteen miles from Arta, point. is strongly fortified.

The Greek commander at Actium opposite Prevosa, telegraphs that the Greek steamer Macedonia did not sink in deep water, but was able to run ashore near the entrance of the gulf. The Greek commander requested instructions by telegraph, and the Min-Provosa immediately. At 10 o'clock a.m. the Safidaki fort fired a few shots on a Greek gunboat, which replied. effectually silencing the Turkish forts outside the entrance of the gulf,




