### CZAR NICHOLAS DISMISSES PARLIAMENT: RUSSIA STEPS BACK TO THE OLD ORDER MEMBERS DEFIANT GATHER IN FINLAND

Emperor Packs St. Petersburg With Troops, Declares It Under Martial Law and Dissolves Duma---Wholesale Arrests Made---Autocracy Once More Supreme.

### Premier Goremykin Out and Followed by Stolypin.

St. Petersburg, July 22. - Russia's experiment in parliamentary government came to an ignominous end tonight with the promulgation of two imperial ukases, the first dissolving the present Parliament and providing for the convocation of its sucon March 5, 1907, more than six months hence, and the second proclaiming the capital of Russia and the surrounding provinces to be in a state of extraordinary security, which is only infinitesimally different from full martial law. This measure of safety is to provide for the outbursts which undoubtedly will be pro-Voked by this daring measure.



#### DIAMONDS RUNNING OUT

Purchase Them.

London, July 22.-It is no exaggerbe as much locked-up capital in a dia- travagance. mond necklace as there is in the average industrial concern today, and these stones will be at such a fabulous price as to be beyond the reach of any but the richest of the rich, says the London

Daily Mail. During the past two years the price of diamonds has jumped up 25 per cent. During the past six months the price has risen 10 per cent, and in another two years diamonds will be another 20

per cent dearer. Two years ago 2-grain (1/2-carat) stones could be purchased for £15 per carat. Now they are £22 10s, while 4carat stones have gone up from £21 a carat to £32 or £33.

Several of the largest firms, with sufficient foresight and capital, have for the last two years been steadily buying as many diamonds as they could get to safeguard themselves against this rise. "Our stock of dlamonds is worth now between £350,000 and £400,000," said Mr. H. Smith, of the Association of Diamond Merchants, Jewelers and Silversmiths, Limited, to a Daily Mail representative, "and we are still buy-

But it is exceedingly difficult to buy diamonds at all. First of all, an introduction has to be got to the syndicate that controls the South African diamond market, and when this difficult matter is arranged the buyer awaits his turn-g illy he has to wait about six month On the appointed day he goes to the offices of the syndicate and is shown a parcel of diamonds. There is no bargaining;

offices of the syndicate and is shown a parcel of diamonds. There is no bargaining; the buyer can either take the diamonds or leave them. One buyer asked for half an hour to consult his partner before taking a lot worth £100,000. When he came back they had been sold.

Men have been offered £1,000 for their "turn," and have refused it. The reason for the rise in the price of diamonds is that the mines are becoming less productive, although producing finer stones—whiter and more brilliant.

Emerals have gone up 50 per cent, and there has also been a big increase in the price of pearls and rubles.

Honolulu, H. I., July 23. - Edward Duvauchelle, of Molokai, is the hero of a remarkable story of human courage and endurance and of a mar velous escape from death. The fact that he was one of the team that represented the National Guard of Hawaii at the rifle shooting at Sea Girt, N. J., staggered to his feet and picked his last fall will perhaps add some interest way back to his own pen. No one dares to the tale of his thrilling experience Monday night, May 28, Duvauchelle, who is a fisherman, living at Pukoo, on the southern coast of

Molokai, with three native Hawaiians as companions, left home in a whaleboat with a load of fish for Lasheet fast. A sudden squall capsized them before they could ease off the sheet. The boat became waterlogged and began drifting out to sea. They were at the time a mile or two from Kaanapall landing, Maui. They made a float with four oars and the mast, and with this to help them, two of the natives, at their own request, started to
