COMPULSORY BILL LIBERAL RANK MAKES ALL MALES STANDS CLOSE, 20 TO 45 SOLDIERS SIGNS OF

To Be Divided in Ten Classes, Starting With Single Men Up to Thirty-One Years---Exemption Boards for Each County.

Toronto, Jan. 11 .- The United Press Ottawa correspondent says today:

"This afternoon Sir Robert Borden will introduce his conscription bill for its first reading. According to its provisions all men between 20 and 45 are declared to be soldiers. They are to be called up in about ten classes, 20 to 23, then 23 to 27 and 27 to 31 single.

"The married men will then be started with, and if the necessity arises will go up to the limit.

"All those who have been married since May 18, when the bill was first announced, will be classed as single. Exemption boards will be created in each county to consider applications for exemption. Elements in exemption will be civil occupations in industries considered to be vital to the state, such as agriculture, munitions work and other lines of activity.

"The number of dependents will be another feature in determining exemptions.'

RUSSIAN WOMEN ARE TO INSPIRE TROOPS BY FIGHTING HUNS

Minister of War's Wife Enlists in Regiment 800 Strong.

Petrograd, Via London, June 11.—The propaganda in favor of a "women's fighting regiment" has made considerable progress. Eight hundred volunteers have already enlisted, among whom, it is reported, is the wife of the war minister. A. P. Kerensky.

Mme. Schabanof, president of the Pan-Russian Women's League, declares herself in favor of the plan. She says it is the only means to fire the courage and devotion of the men. Ensign Mile, Butchkareff, the originator of the plan, who has been decorated with the Medal and Cross of St. George for courage in the field, has quarrelled with those who aided her in the organization of the regiment, and has left Petrograd for the front because the others rejected her demand for spartan discipline, with punishment of execution for the smallest breach of discipline if thrice repeated. The corps will be formed without Ensign Butchkareff on a basis of voluntary discipline.

AN ARMISTICE TO RUSS TROOPS

Approached Soldiers After Dragomiroff Had Rejected Proposals

FOR A SEPARATE PEACE

Hinted at Invasion If Proposal For Conference Was Turned Down.

London, June 11.—It was after Gen-Dragoniroff had curtly rejected the peace proposals made to him by German military emissaries about the middle of May, according to a Reuter dispatch from Petrograd, that the German com-mander-in-chief on the western front sent wireless messages to all Russian troops, proposing an armistice by which, as he naively suggested, Russo-German military operations could be suspended without Russian defection from her al-Hindenburg's Bait.

CAMERON HAS SIGNED ON 1,000

Large Percentage Secured For Service of 63rd Battery.

MAY GO TO PETAWAWA

Order To Discontinue Recruiting May Have Effect of Transferring Unit.

More than one thousand men have been recruited in this district by Major Cameron and the members of his staff since February, 1916, for the 63rd and 55th Batteries of Canadian Field Artillery, recruiting for which has been discontinued, according to instructions received on Saturday from Ottawa. Of this number 775 have been secured by the 63rd Battery since April, 1916.

This is considered an excellent record, and speaks much for the energy and This is considered an excellent record, and speaks much for the energy and billity of the men who have been reponsible for obtaining the men, and thile a temporary halt to their activities has been called, it is expected that it he near future when more artillery-nen are needed, their good work will be outlined.

Response Came Early. When the 29th Battery left for over-seas service on February 23, 1916, Major Cameron, then acting officer in com-mand of the 55th Battery, began recruitng for the 55th, and such success did he men who were on his recruiting staff the men who were on his recruiting starf have that 200 men were recruited in 10 days, and before April 1, 1916, 234 men had been secured for the 55th. Of these, 100 left as a draft under Lieut. Morphy, and the remainder left as a complete battery, under Lieut.-Col. Lewis, accompanied by Lieuts. Mathewson and Mitchell, on May 31.

In the meantime, the formation of the 63rd Battery was authorized, and recruiting was started on April 1, 1916. The first man to enlist was given the serial number 333801, and the last man who reported on Saturday was given the number 334515, showing that 714 men have joined in that time. In addition to this number, a detachment of about 25 men was given to the 55th Battery previous to their departure for overseas service, and there are still about 35 men who have joined the battery, but who, owing to business obligations, or for one cause and another, have not been required to report for duty. When these are added to the 714 men shown on the serial numbers, the 775 Men in the 63rd men shown on the serial numbers, the total of about 775 men stands to the credit of the 63rd Battery. Six Drafts Sent Over.

Editors of New War Film Have Eliminated Unpleasantness.

THE GLORY OF VICTORY TWO SPLENDID SERMONS

Pictures Coming Next Week Record Duty Faithfully Done.

"Ye mothers of men take heart. They have given their lives for the Empire—for you, that freedom, honor and elvilization may live."

Such is the counsel thrown upon the screen when the film to be presented next week showing the fall of Bapaume comes to the portion of the battle scene where the inevitable price of victory is suggested. But the editors of this film have been very kind. They have not left a trace of the gruesomness or the morbid horror of the battlefield that pure realism would have permitted. It was thought that there, was sufficient understanding of the horrors of war. What was needed was to show the glery of duty well and faithfully done, the glory of victory. For this film is a record of victory, a record of the spring offensive of 1917, when after months of work, months of fighting, months of preparation, the Germans were driven out of their two-year-old positions and forced back to the "Hindenburg line."

The ruling classes in Germany have begun of late to profess a like liberality and justice of purpose, but only to preserve the power they have set up in Germany and the selfish advantages which they have wrongly gained for themselves and their private projects of power all the way from Berlin to Bagdad and beyond Government after government has by their influence, without open conquest or its territory, been linked together in a net of intrigue directed against nothing less than the peace of that intrigue must be broken, but ready done are undone, and adequate measures must be taken to prevent it from ever again being rewoven or repaired.

Must Alter Status. "Of course, the imperial German Government and those whom it is using for their own undoing are seeking to obtain pledges that the war will end in the restoration of the status quo ante. It was the status quo ante out of which this iniquitous war issued forth, the power of the imperial German Govern-ment within the empire and its widespread domination and influence outside of that empire. That status must be altered in such fashion as o prevent any such hideous thing from ever happening again. "We are fighting for the liberty, the self-government and the undictated development of all peoples, and every feature of the settlement that concludes this war must be conceived and executed for that pur pose. Wrongs must first be righted, and then adequate safeguards must be created to prevent their being committed again. We ought not to consider remedies merely because they have a pleasing and sonorous sound. Practical ques-tions can be settled only by practi-

justments will and whatever readjustments are necessary must be made. Secure Future Peace. "But they must follow a principle, and that principle is plain. No people must be forced under sovereignty under which it does not wish to live. No territory must change hands except for the purpose of securing those who inhabi it a fair chance of life and liberty. No indemnities must be insisted on except those that constitute payment for manifest wrongs done No readjustments of power must be made except such as will tend to secure the future peace of the world and the future welfare and happiness of its peoples.
