PREMIER LENINE OF RUSSIA NARROWLY ESCAPES DEATH AT

Four Shots Fired at Automobile of "Red" Leader While Proceeding Through Stree ts of Petrograd, One Bullet Striking Swed ish Official.

Petrograd, Jan. 15.-An automobile carrying Nikolai Lenine, the Bolsheviki premier, it is reported, was fired upon tonight when he was driving to a meeting of the Council of People's Commissaries. Four shots were fired. Premier Lenine was not hurt.

The bullets shattered the windows of the automobile. A member of the party with the premier was wounded slightly in the hand.

The attempt on the life of Premier Lenine was made just outside the hall in whch he had been addressing 8,000 of the Red Guard, who were going to the front. As his automobile swung through the crowd four shots flashed in the darkness.

One of the bullets missed its mark by but a few inches and the other lodged in the hand of a Swedish Socialist who was in the automobile. Scores of arrests were made.

Hungarian Cabinet Resigns Over Failure of Military Program.

London, Jan. 16 .- The resignation of the Hungarian cabinet on account of failure to obtain necessary support for the military program is reported in a Budapest dispatch to Copenhagen, forwarded by the Exchange Telegraph.

It is believed Emperor Charles will ask the Hungarian premier, Dr. Alexander Wekerle, to remain in office and reconstruct the cabinet.



Diplomatic Communications Made Public By U. S. Govt. Prove Caillaux Was Intriguing Against Allies Through Enemy Agents At Argentina and Using Bernstorff To Approach Berlin Foreign Office

Washington, Jan. 16 .- From its mysterious stock of intercepted diplomatic communications, the state department today published correspondence between Count von Bernstorff, former German ambassador here, and the Berlin foreign office, showing that former Premier Caillaux of France was in communication with German agents in Argentina in 1915.

The first Bernstorff dispatch contained very damaging evidence as to Caillaux's references to the French Government, and warned German newspapers against praising him. Another gave notice of the ship on which Caillaux was sailing from Argentina, and planned its capture by submarines.

The capture of the ship was sought because her captain carried important papers. The German Government was asked to treat Caillaux with every courtesy and consideration if the ship were taken.

If her offensive is successful, the Allies may have to back down; if the offensive fails, a more real and conciliatory offer may be expected from the central powers. On the result of the offensive hangs the whole balance of diplomatic moves.

If this opinion, which is widely held, is justifiable, then the anticipated offensive assumes a new and greater proportion than has been accorded it in many quarters.



The suffering may be great in Berlingreater, perhaps, than what has been experienced in an Entente country—but the prospect of victory, held out as only a German press agent can hold it out, can still allay the pangs of hunger.

Let such an offensive, once undertaken, fail, and every German who is hungry and cold today will become starving and frozen tomorrow. It is pretty well recognized that Germany cannot be starved out today, and it is certain that she cannot be while the prospect of a great offensive, with the hope of victory, lies before the people. The best thing the Allies could do ta starve Germany would be to smash her offensive.

Secrets of Health and Happiness

How the X-Ray Aids Science In Relieving Some Diseases

BY DR. LEONARD KEENE HIRSHBERG

RAYS are "a remnant of uneasy light." Who could have thought such darkness lay concealed within the beams of electric power! It is apparent that the man with the soundest, brightest, best eyes is more blind than a mole to the unseen matters of fact, of the hard, non-spirit reality in the universe. "The night has a thousand eyes and the day but one,

yet there are facts in the undreamed of world which X-rays, canal rays, cathode rays, radium rays and a myriad other rays yet to be discovered cannot penetrate. You know that X-rays make some solid matter as pene-rable and transparent as the air and the blue sky.

Radium rays make you see through still more solid matter. When X-rays are applied to the unprotected skin, it blushes, becomes as red as a boiled lobster, blisters, ultinately turns prown and peels, just as from severe sunlight. 


