# BRITISH GUNS AT 300 YARDS WIPE OUT MASSED GERMANS

## UNCLE SAM HANDS OUT 200 MILLION TO AID JOHN BULL

Gigantic Loan Will Meet Immediate Needs of British Gov't for War Purposes and Save Millions Yearly in Interest.

Washington, April 25.—The \$200,000,-000 loan was transferred to the British Government today.

The transfer of the big sum was made in Secretary McAdoo's office in the presence of Lord Cunliffe, governor of the Bank of England, federal reserve board, treasury and British embassy officials.

The amount of the loan was deposited today in the Federal Reserve Banks, by each bank subscribing to the \$250,000,000 each between the federal reserve board.

Spending Vast Sums.

Great Britain is spending, it was represented, approximately \$8,000,000 a day for foodstuffs and munitions in the United States. Her needs, therefore, approximate \$250,000,000 a month. Should the Government adopt a policy of collecting the proceeds of the first big bond issue by installments, covering four months, Great Britain's needs during that period would be about \$1,000,000,000.



### THE WAR SITUATION

One of the greatest and most bitterly contested battles of the war has entered its third day on the British front in France. Massed German reserves are being hurled forward in bloody counter-attacks in a supreme effort to check the forward surge of Gen. Haig's khakiclad troops. Some minor positions, including trench lines and villages, have been selzed by the British, but the Woran line, their main chiecture, is still intact.

Sensations Elsewhere.

Sensations Elsewhere. While the mighty struggle in France rages, developments in other fields of the world upheaval are occurring with sensational rapidity. Spain has taken a long step forward on the path along which she is apparently being pushed, slowly but surely, into the universal conflagration. The Madrid Government has addressed a note to Germany which, on its face, must result in an abandonment by Berlin of its uncompromising attitude on ruthless submarine warfare, or its acceptance of a new and important foe. The reports are taken seriously enough in the Russian capital to induce many hundreds of civilians to flee to the interior. According to rumor, the German plan is a combined assault by sea and land; and transports, escorted by a powererful German fleet, are said to have already sailed from Libau. The political situation in Russia remains confused, but there are uncomfortable reports of the activities of Radical Socialists, and of renewed outbreaks of agrarian troubles, some of a counter-revolutionary character. ## SETTLE ON SOIL OF HOLY LAND

Troops Entered El-Arish, the Historical Gate of Palestine.

MEANS NEW ERA OPENS

Progress by Three Stages From Desert Sands To Green Fields.

With British Forces in Palestine April 2-(Correspondence of the Associated Press) .- It is over two months since the British troops entered El-Arish, which geographically and historically is the gate of Palestine, and the continuation of the advance has now put them firmly on the soil of the Holy Reach Green Fields.

Reach Green Fields.

Progress from the sands of the desert to the sown land was gradual, and was marked by three separate stages. The first ended at El-Burg, bringing the troops to the region of grass. After a year of yellow sand, the green vistas were soothing and refreshing to the eyes, especially with the relief afforded by the tamarisk trees rising between the sand dunes. The second stage was from El-Burg to Sheik-Zoweid, marking the transition from the green meadows to a land of barley fields.

Sheik-Zoweid is a mud village, but boasts a fruitful orchard with a cactus hedge such as surrounds every place of fruitfulness in Palestine. The orchard's blossoms were a joy to the eyes of thousands of men who had seen no sign of spring for two years past.

In Wheat Country.

The third stage of the transition was from Sheik-Zoweid to Rafa, and marked entry into the country of wheat. The grass was no longer found in patches, but stretching away in undulating plains, like the downs of Sussex and Hampshire in England.

With the passing of Rafa, the British army began the English occupation of Palestine and opened a new era in the history of the east.

At Point Blank Range British Artillery Rips Massed Ranks of Enemy at Gavrelle --- Most Desperate on North of the Scarpe --- British Take Another Hamlet---3,029 Prisoners Since Monday.

(By William Philip Simms.) With the British Armies Afield, April 25. -Frightful losses were inflicted on German troops vainly counter-attacking at Gavrelle today.

From a range of 300 yards—almost point blank— British artillery poured concentrated fire upon the Germans' massed ranks.

The attacking forces were literally and completely cut to pieces. South of the Scarpe the British are advancing steadily. North of the river, however, the battle counter today was in the standstill stagethe most desperate fighting of the war featuring violent attempts by both sides to gain.

### 3,000 PRISONERS SINCE MONDAY.

London, April 25-12:41 p.m.-The British have taken 3,029 prisoners since Monday morning, including 56 officers, according to an official statement issued by the war office today.

British forces captured the hamlet of Bilhem, east of Havrincourt Wood, last night. The statement follows:

"In the area east of Havrincourt Wood, during the night, we captured the hamlet of Bilhem, Trescault village. Fighting took place early this morning along our front between the Cojeul and Scarpe rivers. Further progress has been made by us, and the ground gained has been secured.

"The number of prisoners captured by us since Monday morning is 3,029, including 56 officers.'

### GAIN IN CHAMPAGNE.

Paris, April 25-Noon.-Ground was gained by the French last night in the Champagne, the war office announced today. A German attack in the neighborhood of Hurtebiz was repulsed.

With the British Armies in France, via London, April 2.—The intensely bitter ground fighting of the last two days has been reflected in the clouds, and the British Royal Flying Corps yesterday established a new record by bringing down 40 German machines. Fifteen of these were actually seen to crash, while 25 collapsed or fell in spinning nose dives, completely out of control.

Strangely enough later in the day another British pilot encountered the same German machine. The Britisher was winging his way home after a hard day's work, but he jockeyed with the German for nearly a quarter of an hour before flying on.

In strange contrast to this was the experience of one British pilot, who somewhat peevishly complained last night that "I only got a rabbit." He explained this by saying that while his opponent had a good machine he was a clumsy fellow and could not fight at all and was sent spinning with the first burst of gunfire.

Still another pilot mounted a fast new machine and deliberately allowed a German to get on his tail. Then he suddenly looped behind his adversary and caught him just within his sights, the burst of fire killing the German instantly. The machine swerved and the dead man pitched out 10,000 feet from the ground.

The fighting yesterday was all within the enemy territory. Several British machines had bullet holes through and took the air again this morning.




