Alexieff Throwing a Big Army Into New Chwang.

RUSSIA LOSES MANY TORPEDOES

Japanese Have 120,000 Troops in Corea-Great Britain Will Send a Consul to Mukden.

London, Wednesday, Feb. 17. - According to a special dispatch from Tokio, the Russian squadron has returned to Vladivostock. The Tokio correspondent of the Daily Mail says in a dispatch that two Russian warships appeared off Oki Island in the southern part of the Sea of Japan or

Sunday. The correspondent at Chemulpo of the Daily Express makes the astonishing statement that Japan has already landed 120,000 troops in Korea, 80,000 of whom are extended along the fighting front south of the Yalu

The press attaches a great signifi-cance to the departure of Viceroy Alexieff from Port Arthur, and comments upon the sudden throwing of Russian troops into New Chwang as indicating Russian apprehensions that Port Arthur is in danger, and that the Japanese attack may not after all be made where it is expected in the Yalu. All reports tend to confirm the impression that Russia has little or nothing to expect from sea operations.

The Advertiser states that the U. coal, which it removed for one year in consequence of the miners' strike. It says the Free Press and the London Board of Trade seem not to be before writing on the subject, and urging the Government to reciprocate in the interest of Ontario manufacturers, the Free Press called upon Col. Culver, the esteemed representa tive of the U.S. Government in this city, with a request for information on the point. He expressed himself as being in doubt regarding it, but said he had neither received notice that the soft coal duty had been reimposed by the Washington Government, nor had he seen any such notice in the press.-London Free

admitting raw materials from the United States free of duty, as they are needed in our manufactures. Soft coal is the raw material of every line of manufacture which is dependent on steam for power. Yet our contemporary casts coal out of the category of the manufacturer's raw material, and favors the coal duty because the Nova Scotia miner, who will not send a pound of his output to Ontario even in time of deepest need, and who can send all of his output to New England, needs "ad-

Here we are up against the old problem of classifying raw materials. Soft coal is a raw material for the manufacturer who uses steam as a motive power. But soft coal is the finished product of the miner and he demands a measure of protection, like other industries. The Free Press assumes that the home market is not necessary to the Nova Scotia miner, "who can send all his output to New England." Unfortunately this is not the case. The United States' duty of 67 cents per long ton, is a heavy handicap on the Canadian miners. The sales of Nova Scotia coal in 1902 (vide the Canadian Annual Review for 1902, page 277),




