The Supplementary Estimates Presented to Legislature.

Of this the civil govern ment takes \$11,350, legislation \$2,500, administration of justice \$3,096, education \$3,846, colonization and immigration \$5,000, agriculture \$6,100, public buildings \$35,811, public works \$6,811 97, colonization roads \$8,800, and crown lands charges \$38,750. London Normal School receives \$2,000 for purchase of land, while for the London Asylum there is \$11,000 balance due for the Trebilcock farm and \$150 for wire fencing. He had known cases where graduates of five or more years' standing were allowed to keep their

The petty squabbles which had occurred in the institution had done much to injure it in the eyes of the people. It was the duty of the Government first to discover what was wrong in the internal affairs of the university, and

second, to provide a remedy. Mr. Whitney repeated the statement made by him on Wednesday, that the Government would take immediate steps to discover the causes militating Government would take against the success and prestige of th university.



## A TYPHOID CURE

Long-Sought Discovery.

Baltimore, May 19. - Dr. William Royal Stokes and Dr. John S. Fulton, of the state board of health, have, after nearly four years of investigation, discovered what they believe to be a curative serum for typhoid fever.

The need of such a serum has for a leng time been fatally emphasized, the world have with varying success endeavored to make such a serum. Dr. Stokes and Dr. Fulton have tested the serum they have made in 23 human cases of typhoid. There were two deaths, and among 21 cases ending in recovery, there were 15 in which they considered that the favorable result was due to the influence of the serum.

The two deaths were due to complications apart from the original disease. In both of these cases the injection of the serum caused an appreciable drop in the temperature. Six cases out of the 23 showed no response at all to the serum.

The conclusion reached it that by the use of this serum the febrile period may be shortened, and the daily variation may be favorably modified.


