

"Besler's hill was well fortified and provided with good guns. At nine o'clock' the British opened fire, the Boers replying with spirit but bad aim. The British quickly sent a 42-pound shell into the camp inflicting terrible loss and spreading panic among the enemy. Our cavalry then stormed the position, the Boers fleeing precipi-tately, leaving many wounded, as well as the whole camp and equipment in the hands of the British. This success will upset the plans of the Orange Free State commanders and, possibly will prevent them giving the British further trouble from the west. A SANGUINARY BATTLE.

Thie Times publishes a despatch from Pietermaritzburg. Natal, dated Nov. 3, which says: "The British resi-dents have received news of a sang-uinary battle fought yesterday (Thurs-day) probably between Ladysmith and Colenso. A large number of the Boers were killed, many being relatives of the Dutch residing in this place. This likely refers to the foregoing. WHY THEY ARE WAITING.

London, Nov. 6.—The general belief in London is that the Boers are now waiting for more guns from Pretoria before attacking Ladysmith. The fact that Sir Redvers Buller appears to have ordered a retirement from Stormberg, Colenso and other places relieves to some extent the public mind, which otherwise would have been farther alarmed.

A TOMAHAWK BUT NOT TECUM SEH'S.

Sarah L. Russel, who lives with her daughter, Mrs. E. H. Betts, at 1413 East Sixteenth street, Kansas City, thinks she has the tomahawk carried by Technisch when he was killed at the

battle of the Thames in October, 1813. Col. William Russel, the founder of Russelville, Ky., who commanded the Kentucky contingent in the famous battle, was permitted by Gen. Harrison, so it is claimed, to remove the tomahawk from the dead body of Tecumseh and retain it and it has been in the possesssion of the Russel family ever since.

"Remove the tomakawk" is a nice way of putting it, but if it was "removed" it is tolerably certain it was not Tecumsen's. Reminiscences of men who were on the scene tell us that after the flight of General Proctor and the defeat of the Indians at Moraviantown it is said the Kentucky horse found the body of a big Indian on the field. From its size they assumed it was that of Tecumseh. They skinned the body and when then they went back home they boasted that their whiplashes were made of the great chieftain's hide. Is it to be presumed that General Harrison was also asked for permission to skin the body as well as rob the corpse.

We know, however, from settlers around here at the time and not long dead, that Tecumseh's body was carried off by his braves and secretly buried and to this day no white man has ever learned its resting place, and probably

THE MAN OF THE HOUR.

It was on March 28, 1879, after the retreat from Isandlana, that Redvers Buller gained the Victoria Cross, says the Westminster Gazette. He had been making one of his intrepid reconnaissances, when his men were suddenly surprised by the approach of a large number of Zulus. It was necessary to retire. But never for a moment did Buller lose his coolness and calmness. The Zulus came down the hill in hot pursuit. Man after man fell before their assegais, or was buried Buller rescued him from his assailants, placed him on the back of his horse, trooper, whose doom seemed assured, the enemy was within a hundred yards of their prostrate victim. For this almost superhuman feat he now hears the coveted bronze badge.

Sir Redvers Buller comes of an old it he might have lived the life of a cided otherwise, and was wearing the Queen's uniform at nineteen: "Eagles do not catch flies" is the proud moito speaking of Buller's achievements in the Zulu war, says :-

"Here was a man with some six thousand a year, a beautiful house in fair Devon waiting for his occupation; a seat in Parliament all but secured, and yet for the patriotic love of leading thatistrange medley of reckless adventurers he was living squalidly in the South African veldt, sleeping in the open for three nights out of the six with a single blanket thrown over his body; his hands so disfigured by cattle sores, the curse of the veldt that I never saw them not bandaged up. With his intrepid heroism he had saved the lives of so many of his men that in talking to them, it almost seemed that he had saved all their lives. A strange, stern, strong-tempered man, whose pride it seemed to be to repress all his own emotion and to smother its display in others, he would order a man peremptorily back to his duty who came into his tent to ask him to read a letter in which a mother thanked him for saving the life of her



A very amusing story is told about the Shah of Persia. It appears that during the winter months the little colony of 60 or 70 English people at Teheran organize concerts for one another's amusement; there is a dance now and then at the legation, and on Christmas hight every Englishman in the place is a guest of Sir Morti-mer and Lady Durand. When the weather is cold of course there is skating. Skating is the greatest marvel of all to the Persians. A few years ago the late Shah, Nasr-i-Din, saw 20 skaters twirling and curling and spinning gracefully on the ice. He was amused; he thought it wonderful. The next day he sent to the legation and borrowed a dozen pairs of skates. These he made his Ministers put on and then attempt to skate on the lake in the palace grounds. The poor Ministers were terribly discomfited, but it was twice as much s their heads were worth to refuse. His Majesty was more amused than ever, and he nearly had an apoplectic fit from llaughing.

Fendalism in Hungary.

Inconceivable as the anachronism may seem to the western mind, the agrarian system of Hungary has not yet issued from the feudal form. The Hungarian farmer of to-day is virtually a serf, bound to his master, the hereditary owner of the soil which the peasant tills, by the tangible tie of personal liability. The Hungarian feudal lord of to-day is entitled to 50 days' labor from the male adult who dwells on his land. The seignlor is at liberty to demand this feudal contribution at whatever time may seem best to him, with the frequent result that the tenant farmer is employed in gathering his master's harvests while his own crops are rotting after a rainfall or are being consumed by an early frost or suffer damage from one or more of the many possible causes which render destructive the slightest delay on the part of the harvester in gathering the fruits of a year's labor.—S. Ivan Tonjoroff, in Arena

City to Feed the Babies.

In his annual report, presented to the common council of Milwaukee, Health Commissioner Schulz recomcipal dairy, where mothers can get pure milk for their babies. He would have the city own its own farm and mends the establishment of a munihave the city own its own farm and several head of cattle, which he would have scientifically fumigated three times a week. He would have the city establish several milk depots, where the milk would be sold in nursing bottles to mothers at two cents per pint. At each of these de-pots he would have in attendance a professional nurse to give advice to mothers about the general care of their children and to periodically examine the youngsters to detect the first trace of any disease.

Easily Cured.

A correspondent thus tells how man addicted to the spitting labit was cured: "The captain of an Atlantic steamship was at a loss how to induce a passenger to desist from the filthy habit of spitting on deck. ORCHARD AND GARDEN.

Plowing under a crop of clover is good way of manuring the orchard. A dead limb is a source of disease. It shows also a lack of vitality in the tree. In pruning make all cuts slanting and mooth, so that they will not hold water. A tree with an open head is not so likely to be attacked by mildew as one that

Arrange in good season to save all the fruit either by marketing, canning or -vaporating. An orchard cannot be kept constantly

under the plow. It is better to seed to clover than any kind of grass. Pruning when the sap is active and the tree growing rapidly promotes forming of

fruit buds. Pruning when dormant promotes growth of wood. In nearly all cases it is best to thin fruit on all thickly loaded pear trees. The pears left will then grow to large size

and will be worth more than if all were left on the tree. In fruitful years vigorous fruit trees are inclined to overbear, and, when so loaded, much of the fruit will be small and inferior in quality and size, besides injuring the tree.





WRITES A REMARKABLE LETTER TO CAPTAIN DREYFUS.

The Great Norwegian Writer Evidently Gave His Pen Free Swing When He Wrote the Epistle Translated From a Recent Issue of the Vienna Neue

Freie Presse.

Bjornstjerne Bjornson, the great Norwegian writer, addressed an open letter in the German language to The remarkable document, published in a recent issue of The Neue Freie Presse in Vienna, is intranslation-

"I am one of those perhaps few who said to himself and others from the first moment, that is, when I read of your degradation: Thus acts a man who is strong in his in-nocence. For this reason I waited and waited that your case should come up again. I never saw a French uniform but that it was darkened by your misfortune. I suffered with you in wakeful nights; I worked for you in my surroundings; I formed a small Dreyfus congregation while I waited. Since Lazare's first book I have followed all movements and changes in your case. I read everything that brought light. First the entire Zola trial; then everything that led to revision, the proceedings before the court of cassation, the proceedings the new court-martial - all

this I followed in extenso. "I know all the acting persons. I believe I can see which witnesses against you became perjurers, which are blind fanatics and which carry a blockhead under their hat. But the most miserable aspect is furnished by those braves who have been misled

by scoundrels. The French conceit which Tacitus found extraordinary and which beyond doubt has contributed most to the misfortune of France is also the principal cause of your misfortune, my dear Captain Dreyfus. It appears most glaring in uniform.

"Not to speak of it that it is entirely precluded that French generals nay make a mistake-no, to what does the word of an emperor and a king amount against the word of French officers! Or, more correctly, only they can speak the truth; or, still more correctly, only the Frenchnen have the right to speak. others have to keep silent and have to listen to what the Frenchmen say. If we dare, despite this, to open our mouths, because we knew the connec-tion of things, then it is called interfering with France affairs-the greatest lese-majeste which was ever witnessed. For this the characteristic example: The official documents- and declarations of other nations become air compared with what the French have filched from the stairways, from domestics, in the stove, the waste

basket, or the closet. "What the other world thinks and says is immaterial for the reason that it is not read. They do not un-derstand the languages. The French language is the only one possessing clearness and beauty-what good ar the others! If a Frenchman perchance knows another language it is sufficient to make him appear suspicious The possibility of being a traitor is reat in that case. Dreyfus Picquart, Freystaetter and others are examples in this respect. Henry understood French only, and this is, so to speak, the principal proof of his honesty. If a Frenchman reads other newspapers beside his own and forms divergent opinion, as, for instance, concerning the Dreyfus trial, an opinion which corresponds with the views of those who are in possession of the documents and the evidence, then he belongs to a syndicate which was formed for the ruin of France, or he has been bribed by such a syndicate. For all foreigners are enemies of France who have nothing else in mind than the ruin of France! Enemies of France are furthermore all Protestants and Jews, even those

who live in France. Therefore, cast them out, out to the other enemies. "Only one single exception is made: of our money! Our money may come to France. Our faith, our sense of justice, our witnesses may not come -but our money

"You, my dear Captain Dreyfus, belong to the enemies, and here is the explanation why everything bad is believed of you and why you can be treated as they please. Aye, the honor of the generals demands it thus. There is, as is known, an hon-or which is closely connected with cruelty. It is not necessary to go back to the triumphs of the ancients, with the shackled prisoners at the triumphal chariots. We have only to think of you, of you in chains and behind stockades.

"The delight with which General Roget tortured you now before the court, you unfortunate who had not suffered enough, shines over the world as an example of French culture and Christianity. How must the Catholic Christianity. How must the Catholic Church, and particularly the Jesuits, be thanked because with their sanctimonious mien and words they have preserved Gallian cruelty so well. Let them keep on, and their best pupils, the French generals, always at the

"No, and a hundred thousand fold no! replies the whole civilized world.

This bleaching does not injure the horse any more than it does the average girl, but the chemically tinted coat seldom looks well when closely examined, the dark roots of the hair showing on eareful inspection. How Nature Manages these Splen did Spectacular Exhibitions

An Eminent Scientist Gives Many In teresting Facts Concerning These Lovely Apparitions of Nature's Brush.

I asked an eminent scientist how no ture manages those splendid spectacular exhibitions which are called sunsets.

"That's simple enough," he said. "When the air is moist, it absorbs the blue rays of light and lets the red rays pass. Therefore the sun is sometimes red. Then when the sun drops below the horizon we are able to see only the vertical rays, which often strike masses of vapor which we call clouds, and are reflected. "Rays of light are composed of wave

or vibrations of different sizes, speed and intensity. The short waves are blue, the long ones are red, and the intermediate waves represent the different primary

"When a blue and a red wave get mix ed, they form a purple wave, and other colors are made by different combina-tions, just as a painter mixes his paints on his pallet. As waves of light strike the clouds together they produce some rare tints, some glorious combinations, which artists have never been able to imitate, and if the banks of vapor floating on the horizon are of irregular shape they produce the fantastic effects we adso much.

"Is the display assisted by refraction from the meteoric dust in the atmos-

"Perhaps so, but usually not to any appreciable extent. There isn't enough to take into consideration. The the atmosphere that surrounds the earth is equal to more than 200,000,000 cubic miles, a quantity so vast that the human mind can scarcely comprehend it, and hence, if 1,000,000 meteors were to fall at once, they would not be any more no ticeable than a puff of dust.

"There have been phenomena," contin-ued the scientist, "which have added to the beauty of sunset displays. In August, 1883, on the little island of Krakatoa, in the strait of Sunda, between Su matra and Java, there was a terrific volcanic eruption — the greatest cataclysm that has occurred within the memory of man. Some 30,000 lives were lost. eruption was followed by extraordinary atmospheric phenomena, visible over th greater portion of the globe.

"It was attributed to volcanic dust which was projected in stupendous quantities for miles into the air and carried around the world by the currents that are constantly moving in the upper atmosphere. It made the sunsets of that year remarkable and unprecedented for their

One learns from the piquant pages of his latest biographer all that is to be known about one of the greatest men of all time; and the scenes and customs of the ancient world are revived by many a graphic touch. Thus, the splendors of the court of Darius are

brought before us in these two brief paragraphs: The court of the king was main tained with extraordinary dignity and splendor. The person of royalty was surrounded with everything capable of giving it elevation, dignity and charm in the eyes of the masses. Surrounded by a vast body of attendants, body-guards, servants, eunuchs and court officials, the king was removed as far as possible from the vulgar eye. He gave audience seated on a golden throne, over which was stretched a baldachin of purple, supported on four golden pil-lars glittering with precious stones. In his presence his courtiers prostrated themselves in the dust. ever stood in his presence to address him hid his hands in the sleeves of his mantle, as token of his abnegation of will to restrain or harm. He was never seen on foot. He some-times appeared on horseback, more often in a chariot. Guards and scourgers went before his car to open the way. There followed the chariots of Mithra, and Magi carry-ing the sacred fire. Around him and behind him were the staff-bearers and his body-guard. 

THE BISHOP'S SERMON. THE BISHOP'S SERMON.

Last evening Bishop McEvay, assisted by Rev. Father Solanus, Rev. Father de Paul, Rev. Father Herman and Rev. Father Baubet, officiated at Vespers in St. Joseph's church. Bishop McEvay preached the sermon, taking as his subject the Holy Land. He said that we learn in the Old Testament when Moses was tending his flock along side the Mount of Olives he saw a burning bush. He also noticed that while the bush was on fire it was not consumed, and he said to himself, "I will go and see why that bush is not consumed." When he drew near, however, God spoke to him and said, "Come veer, God spoke to him and said, "Come ever, God spoke to him and said, "Come not hither. Take off your shoes for this is holy ground." That small piece of ground was precious because God had been on it. How much more precious, then, is the land in which Jesus lived for thirty years. The pilgrim to that land at the first view is filled as Moses was when the Lord spoke to him—filled with reverence and prayer. He sees before him that land filled with the Holy Ghost. He sees the land where patriarchs preached, where David grew, where Solomon resided in all his glory. He sees the land of the apostles. He sees the land where Christ was born King of Kings, the land that reared Him, supported Him and from which He rose, and it ever, God spoke to him and said, "Come the land that reared Him, supported Him and from which He rose, and it is to this land that He will come again to judge the Jew and the Gentile, the Christian and the sinner.

Jonah went abroadd in his ship from this port. The cedars of Lebanon for the temple were landed here. Here also is the stone hut of Simon the tanner, where Jesus visited, and it is still existing. In Joppa the Franciscan fathers have a place where Franciscan fathers have a place where travellers may stay. This is only one of many which the Franciscan fathers have throughout the Holy Land, where travellers may stay and receive protec-tion. No charge is made but they are maintained by the generosity of the

Jerusale:s, however, is the objective point of all travellers to the Holy Land. Here the Turkish flag is found floating over the walls and a Turkish soldier guards the gate. You are taught of the many great things which a Christian government can accomplish but to-day the Christian cannot enter Jerusalem where the Saviour died without doing homage to the Turkish government and paying fees to the Turkish soldiers. Of sourse, despite all this, the heart of the Christian rejoices when he reaches that place. How our I ord suffered and worked to save the people here and even weit for them. 'The tomb where he was laid to rest is still here. It is built in two parts. the outer tomb is called the angels' apartment. The in-ner tomb is smaller and you have to stoop to enter. I was there during holy week and had the privilege of saying mess in the tomb of our Lord. There are many other points of interest.
On the Mount of Olives is the place where our Saviour stood for the last time and left the imprint of his feet in the solid rock. One fact-print is plain even now but the other has been chiseled away by the Mahommedans. It is to this land the Lord has promised to return. Let us pray that when he does come we may each of us hear him say, Well come thou good and fairhful servant, enter theu into the joy of thy

Man has no power to reform the church. Such a reformation must come from has no power to reform the Such a reformation must come from God. The Joctrines of the Catholic church agree with the doctrines of God and it is the church that God established. Every visible society has a visible head. As the Pope at Rome is the visible head of the Roman Catholic church, so God is the head of every visible society, just as He is the invisible head of the Catholic church. God always spoke of Peter, the first Pope of Rome, as first amongst the apostles, and Peter; was the only apostle that Christ prayed for. Every visible army, boat or train has a visible head, so every church must have a visible head. The Pope is that visible head of the Roman Catholic church. The church of Rome is the church of God, promised in the 16th verse of St. Matthew.
