Pekin, August 28. - The Imperial edict forbidding the importation of arms and munitions of war is not satisfactory to the foreign Ministers, A meeting of the Ministers has been called to discuss the edict. J., this afternoon, her port boiler exploded, killing seven persons and injuring over a score of others. Four passengers are missing, but as many sustained slight injuries, it is thought that the missing may be among those who did not find if neces-

sary to go to the hospital. The dead are: J. D. Chew, assistant engineer; Miss Elizabeth Green, Philadelphia; two firemen, names unknown; one deck hand, name unknown; two passengers, names, un-

The London Daily Express just to and contains a very remarkable article on Canada which it is to be hoped will have due effect in Great Britain. It is written by one whoknows Canada and her resources and he is a believer in the principles more than once laid down in these columns, as those which ought to be followed by the people of the mother country, in their dealings with the "possessions beyond the sea," and more especially with Canada. It has always appeared extraordinary that the British people should expend enormous sums of money in investments in South America and 'elsewhere and not attempt to benefit their own kith and kin and empire. This is duly noted in the article referred to and referring more especially to Canada the writer attributes its apparently slow progress as compared with the United States to the apathy of the mother country. There is, of course, no reason why the progress of the Dominion should not be quite as greatlas that of the United States, and it is not unworthy of notice that in the early stages of the career of the country, when it was more directly under the fostering caret of the Imperial authorities, its progress was relatively as great, if It is only reasonable to ask, why the imperial government does nothing to promote emigration to Canada. The common interest of the country ought to encourage such a course. We have a granary and as has been facetiously said, a "pantry" for Britain sufficient to supply all the imported food stuffs she needs if we only possessed the rural population necessary to produce the quantity. More than that such a pantry would tend to create a shield and buckler for British interests which in the hours of trial would be a great strength. What has lately been seen on a small scale would, had we twenty-five or thirty millions, be seen on a very large one. And the Express writer reasonably asks why it is that "British capital does not seek investment in civilized, law-abiding Canada instead of going to semi-savage South American Republics, in which they held annual revolutions instead of annual elections?" FELL FROM A BRIDGE

John Waddell, of the firm of J. B. Stringer & Co., gives The Planet the following grain gossip:

Wheat-Offers slowly yet, for time of year. However, supplemented by rail receipts millers are getting all they want. Market is steady at 68c standard, a price shippers cannot handle at for the present, they say.

Oats and barley, of the new crop, are offering moderately at 32c for former and 85 to 87c for latter, when choice samples. Market for both these stuffs is hardly holding steady, particularly for the oats, as shippers say they can only get 33c for No. 2 white oats, in carloads.

Corn-Receipts are large for time of year, beating those at this period for years past, and prices hold away up around 50c a bushel, due to high market on the other side. The tendency is a lower market from now on

dency is a lower market from new and less demand.

Beans—Of the old crop are now about gone from both farmers and shippers hands, and grand prices have been realized in the past four to six weeks, for them, making all concerned very happy, as this pleasant outcome came somewhat as a surprise, but has been none the less enjoyed. has been none the less enjoyed. No receipts worth noting for a week past, and market is nominal at \$1.50 for a good sample. New crop will start to move to a limited extent in the next month, and fair prices are expected to rule, of course much above those of a year ago, as crop is not likely to be more than, half an average one. Demand in October is usually

very brisk. The following are the prices: Wheat, 68c. Mixed Oats, 30.to 3ic. White oats, 32 to 33c. Barley, 80 to 85c. Corn, shelled, 50 to 52c.

It also strengthens the probability of gold imports, for Europe is comparatively bare of American stocks and cannot return them in considerable quantities.





LIVES LOST IN COLUMBIA

Thousands Slain in Revolt Movements and Slaughter Going on.

Frontiers of Ecuador are Lined With Armed men Ready tor Bloodshed.

New York, Aug. 28 .- A revolutionary force of 2,000 men has pushed its way over the border from Colombia into Venezuela, says the Colon correspondent of the Herald. This force is to aid in the overthrow of President Castro. When his downfall is accomplished a similar course will be fol-

lowed in Nicaragua. Trouble is imminent on both eastern and the southern boundaries of Col-

ombia Troops have been rushed in both directions and the frontiers of Venezuela and of Ecuador are lined with armed men, ready to advance at a

moment's notice. No secret is made of the threatening attitude of the Colombian authorities. They assert that the revolution there has been enabled to continue only by the aid of the liberal governments of the neighboring republics and that to insure peace at home it has become necessary to inaugurate a war of foreign conquest.

THOUSANDS OF LIVES SACRI-FICED.

It is assumed that Ecuador would join with Venezuela in any moment against Colombia—the two liberal governments standing united against the Conservative element in control here, and making counter charges of interference with their affairs and of

ostering revolutions.

There seems little doubt that the charges on both sides are well found-ed. The Liberals of one republic have lent a helping hand to their strug-gling brethren in adjacent territory, and the Conservatives have retaliat ed in kind.

Colombia has, however, been chief sufferer, as her revolution has already lasted nearly two years. It is estimated that from 25,000 to lives have already been sacri

The end is not yet, as the smoldering embers of revolt are coming into flame in a dozen sections simultane-ously and the Liberals do not hesitate

ously and the Liberals do not hesitate to announce that they are preparing to deal a final blow.

The Conservatives retaliate by declaring that they have vanquished every army that has been collected and that there remain only a few bushwhackers, who carry on a spasmodic guerrilla warfare, attacking corporal's guards, fleeing from larger bodies, robbing exposed stores and ranches and pillaging wayfarers.

"BANDS OF VAGABONDS."

New York, Aug, 28.—The ex-gov-ernor of the department of Panama, Facundo Mutes Duran, now in New York, discussing the situation in Colombia, said that the rebels ar lot of vagabonds and that he was certain the government would subdue the

He said that when he left Panama few days ago nothing unusual was of the whereabouts of Gen. Uribe-As for foreign warships, he said they would have a moral effect, but there would be no necessity for landing marines.
Of Colombia's relations with Ven-

exuela and her other liberal neighbors,

Duran said:
"I do not believe Venezuela will go to war with Colombia. Castro has enough trouble at home. That Ven-ezuela, Ecuador and Nicaragua have aided the rebels in Colombia there is no doubt. Naturally, if the three countries should unite in a war against Colombia, it would be serious for us, but this will hardly happen."

ONE INSURRECTION BLIGHTED. New York, Aug. 28 .- Arms belonging to Gen. Rivera, a Venezuelan refugee in Curacao, have been found in Coro by the Venezuelan authorities, says the Port of Spain correspondent of the Herald. This seizure, the correspondent adds, frustrates the hopes of an incurrent in that district of an insurrection in that district. A DISTRICT THAT IS PEACEFUL

Port of Spain, Aug. 28.—The Ger-man cruiser Vineta will sail to-day for Carupano. The Orinoco district is peaceful.

SULTAN ATTEMPTED HIS OLD GAME.

Constantinople, August 26-The folowing was the position of affairs immediately preceding the departure of the French ambassador, M. Constans The Turkish government was showing a disposition to regard the French demands as settled by the irade relatdemands as settled by the irade relating to the quays and the Albanian land seizures. The French embassy, in order to prevent a misunderstanding, wrote to Tewfik Pasha, the minister of Foreign Affairs, yesterday that France in addition, expected the settlement of two other claims included in the demands made August 11, and that unless they were conceded before that unless they were conceded before noon to-day, M. Constans would leave and Munir Bey, the Turkish ambassador to France, would receive his passports. The porte instead of yield-ing asked for twenty-four hours' delay and made alternative propositions which were so unacceptable that M. Constans did not reply to them.

THE ANDOVER ELECTION. London, Aug. 27.—The parliamentary election held yesterday to fill the seat in the House of Commons for the Andover. division of Hampshire, made vacant by the death of William W. B. Beach (father of the House of Commons), resulted in the return of Edmund Beckett. Conservative, who rea mund Beckett, Conservative, who re-ceived 3,696 votes, to 3,473 cast for his Liberal opponent, George Judd.

Trust Officals Reiterate That the Strik ers Must Surrender.

Pittsburg, August 28.—Shaffer was averse to talking on the subject of peace this morning. Finally he said that while reports of a new peace move may be true, he had no knowledge of it. He did not see how a edge of it. He did not see how a settlement could be effected without the Amalgamated association, and while some may hope for such good luck, yet in the face of gains made the strikers, he would not back

down from his original position.

The steel officials reiterated that no overtures for peace had come from the strikers and that the strike could only be settled by the return of the men to

their places.
It was rumored last night that Shaffer had sent out letters to all members of the executive committee of the Amalgamated association invit ing their approval of a peace plan agreed on last Saturday by the repre-sentatives of the National Civic federation and the Amalgamated association headquarters officers. The plan

proposes:
First-That the New York offer of First—That the New York offer of July 27, made by Messrs. Schwab and Morgan, be accepted. This provided that the tinplate mills resume under the scale signed for the year beginning July 1; that the Hoop company sign for all mills signed for last year, and that the Sheet Steel Co. sign for and that the Sheet Steel Co. sign for all mills signed for last year, except Old Meadow and Saltsburg.
Second—That a provisional scale be

arranged, but not signed, for Painters, Lindsay and McCutcheon, and the Clark mill, leaving recognition of the Third-that the United States Steel Corporation formally declare its atti-tude toward organized labor, this de-claration to take such form as will

have a reassuring effect upon the men in the mills.
