

JOHN AND PETER BECOME DISCIPLES OF JESUS

John 1:29-42

One day a great crowd of people had gathered for a preaching service. They were not in a church, but on the steep bank of a winding river, the Jordan. The minister did not wear a black coat as your minister does. He wore a loose



garment made of the skins of wild animals. He told the people of a wonderful Saviour, who was to be sent by the Father in heaven to

teach them how to live; he said that if they trusted and believed this Saviour, they should live in the heavenly home with him some day.

As they stood beside the river that day, John the Baptist (for that was his name) suddenly pointed to a Man that was coming and said, "Behold the Lamb of God." He spoke with such joy and love in his voice and face that the friends to whom he was talking knew that the Man was the Saviour.

Andrew and John, two of those who heard John the Baptist, walked along behind Jesus, and by and by he turned and began to talk with them. They stayed with Jesus that day, and went home with him. Wise men, called the prophets, had thousands of years before told about this Saviour who was to come, and you can imagine how John and Andrew felt when they knew that they were really seeing

and hearing this holy One. It was the most wonderful thing that had ever happened to them.

Andrew hurried away to tell his brother Simon Peter. (I think when they were little boys they must have been the

kind that always shared their good things and their good times, don't you?) Simon Peter came back with Andrew, and he and his brother and John decided to stay with Jesus and be his helpers, or disciples. So after that day they went with him, doing whatever he told them to do.

about the preaching and teaching of Jesus, we find over and over the names of Peter and John.

Jesus had to have helpers or he could not have done the work that the heavenly Father had sent him to do. These helpers taught other people the things that he taught them. To-day Jesus needs us to tell others about him.



Mark 1: 14-20



Galilee and after a few days they left Jesus and went back to their work. We may be sure that, just so far as they could, they gathered their friends together and told them all the things that Jesus had told them.

Even to-day the fishermen are very important people in that country, for many depend upon the fish for food. Peter and John knew just how to let down the great net into the water, and how to draw it carefully out when at last it was full of fish. They had to be very patient, for the Bible tells us that sometimes they fished all night and did not catch anything.

After Peter and Andrew and John went home, Jesus did some very wonderful things, and more and more each day he needed helpers. There were no trains in those days to carry letters, so his three friends did not know that day by day in his preaching and teaching he was coming nearer to them, until one day as Andrew and Peter sat in their boat

they heard Some Oie calling them from the shore. And there stood Jesus himself, calling to

them, "Follow me and I will make

you fishers of men."

They understood very well what Jesus meant. He wanted them to help him to bring the world into the Kingdom of heaven just as they had been taking fish in their nets. They loved Jesus, so they went with him.

On along the shore they walked until

they saw out in the sea another boat where John and his brother James were mending their nets. Jesus called to them as he had called to Andrew and Peter.

These four became Jesus' helpers, or disciples, and soon more came until there were

twelve. Day by day they brought people to Jesus. And that is still the way we bring people to him—just by telling them about him.

doctors could not cure, but Jesus could, and did, heal him.



Surely that was not the time to have company! But Jesus was not the kind who ever added to anyone's troubles. He always took away the trouble instead. So in Peter's house he quietly walked into the room where the sick woman lay and took her by the hand. Then quite suddenly she was well. Jesus

had healed her! Everyone must have been very happy, and soon she was busy helping to serve the dinner.

As soon as the sun went down, the people who had heard what Jesus did in the synagogue began bringing all their sick friends to him to be cured. Jesus gladly healed them all. Perhaps it was very late at night when the last people went away, and all of the people in Peter's house must have been very tired; but surely they were very happy, too, for what a beautiful day it had been! In the morning there had been sickness and trouble, and then Jesus came and brought health and happiness.

Early the next morning Jesus went away to a quiet place

where he could pray to the heavenly Father. Iesus often talked with our heavenly Father, and he always went to God's house on the Sabbath Day: These are two ways in which every boy and girl can be like Jesus. Let us





Day after day he taught them,

telling the stories that we read in the Bible to-day, and showing them how to be loving and kind and ready for a home in heaven when this life was over. One day he fed a great crowd of people by blessing some little flat cakes of bread and some tiny, dried fish—you know the story—until that very small lunch grew into enough food for all the people. They were so excited that they wanted to make him their king. He did not want this, so he told his disciples to go over to the other side of the Sea of Galilee and that he would meet them there. Then he himself slipped away from the crowd and went off alone to pray.

The disciples did not want to leave Jesus, but they obeyed him and rowed away in their boat across the quiet water. Night came on, and there was a dreadful storm. They were far away from the shore, and there was no one to help them.

Suddenly some one in the boat cried out in new fright, for there, coming toward them across the great, dashing waves, was something white. We know that there is no such thing as a ghost, but in that country at that time the people believed that there were ghosts, so they were more afraid of that strange white something than they were of the storm. But a voice they knew called, "It is I; be not afraid." And they saw then that it was Jesus.

Peter asked Jesus to let him walk out on the water to meet

him. Jesus said, "Come," and Peter started bravely. But the wind frightened him and he began to sink, and if Jesus had not been near and had not caught him by the hand, he would have gone down into the sea.

When they stepped back into the little boat the storm stopped. Jesus had made the dashing waves quiet just as he had made sickness and trouble go away. He was not an earthly king, but he was the great heavenly King, with power to rule over every-

thing in all the world.

Away out there on the dark and stormy sea Jesus had seen his friends and had come to help them. And always, wherever we are, he will see us.



Jeremiah 35:1-8, 12-14a, 18, 19

Teremiah was a prophet, one through whom God sent messages for the people. Jeremiah was a great and wise man-greater even than the king, in

many ways. One day God told him that he was to call together all the people of the tribe called the Rechabites. Two hundred years before, when this great tribe had not been a great tribe at all but only a family, the father, Jonadab, had made his sons promise that they would never drink any wine —they nor their children. So year after year, as the children grew up and had children of their own, they were told about the promise.

You can imagine how astonished the Rechabites were when one day the prophet Jeremiah sent for them to come to one of the great rooms of the beautiful Temple, and set before them bowls of wine, and commanded them to drink. This was the message that God had sent to Jeremiah. Surely the Rechabite men must have be en greatly puzzled! They wanted to obey the prophet, but they had promised never to drink any wine. They said so very firmly and positively.

God and Jeremiah we're not angry. No, indeed. It had only been God's test to prove just how brave and strong and true they were. And because they dared to keep their promise he commanded that forever the Rechabites should have a place of honor in his service.

PETER'S GREAT CONFESSION

Matthew 16: 13-24



After that stormy night when Jsus came walking over the terrible waves to the frail little oat where Peter and John and the other disciples were, many wonderful things had happened. All over the country cople were talking of Jesus and telling of the things which he had done.

Jesus knew that the disciples heard these things, so one day he asked them about what the people were saying. Then he asked, "But whom say ye that I am?" It was Peter who quickly answered for himself and the rest, "Thou art the Christ, the Son of the living Gd." No matter what others might say, they knew who he ws.

Peter and John and the othr disciples were not the only people who were perfectly sureabout Jesus. In the city of Capernaum lived a rich nobleran whose little boy was very, very ill with a fever such as mny in that country still have. Word had come that Jesus was in the city of Cana, not many miles away, and the nobleman hurried off to beg him to come and heal his boy.

When at last the nobleman found Jesus he told him about the sick boy and said, "Sir, come down ere my child die."

Jesus answered, "Go thy way; thy son liveth." I think most men would have said: "How do you know my son lives? You do not know what is happening away off there in Capernaum." But the nobleman did not say that. He knew that whatever Jesus said was true, and he hurried away.

Long before the nobleman reached home his servants came to meet him with the joyful news that the fever was gone and the boy getting well. "Yesterday at the seventh hour the

fever left him," they said. And that was the very hour when Jesus had said, "Thy son liveth."

WITNESSES OF CHRIST'S GLORY

Luke 9:28-36

Jesus often went away from the crowds of people who followed him, in order to pray in a quiet place. Sometimes he sent even the disciples away, but to-day's lesson tells us about a time when he took Peter, James, and John with him. They went up to the top of the highest mountain in all that

country, so that they might be alone. The disciples were strong men, but the Bible tells us that they were so tired after their long climb that it was very hard for them to keep awake.

Jesus knew that hard days were coming for him and for them, and that they needed help from our heavenly Father, just as you and I need his help when we are going to do something hard.

Jesus prayed, and as he talked, a strange and wonderful light shone all about him—a light more beautiful and wonderful than anything we can imagine. Beside Jesus in the shining light stood two men. Although the disciples had never seen these men, who had lived many,

many years before, they knew that they were Moses and Elijah. Moses and Elijah had come from heaven and were talking to Jesus about what was going to happen to him. He was soon to go back to the heavenly home.

Peter did not think about the wicked people and the sick people in the world. He thought only how pleasant it would be to stay on the mountain with the heavenly ones. He asked Jesus if they could not stay there. But the answer came from God, himself. Softly a great, shining cloud settled upon the mountain top, and the disciples fell down on their faces and dared not look. Out of the cloud came a voice saying, "This is my beloved Son: hear him."

Soon Jesus touched the disciples and told them not to fear. When they looked up, Moses and Elijah and the cloud were gone. Jesus had given them work to do in the world. God had said, "Hear him"; so Peter and James and John went back down the mountain to "shine for Jesus" in the world.



JESUS CORRECTS JOHN'S NARROWNESS

Mark 9:33-42; 10:13-16; Luke 9: 46-56



Jesus was going to Jerusalem, and he knew that there he was to give up his life. His disciples were sad and troubled about it, but they were going with him; and as they went they were preaching and teaching and healing. Their way led through Samaria, and on the day of our story, James and John had gone on ahead to the next town to have food and a stopping place ready for Jesus and the other

disciples when they should come. But for years and years the Jews and the Samaritans had been unfriendly, so the people of this town said that since Jesus and his friends were Jews they could not stop there.

Oh, how grieved and angry James and John were! To think that the Samaritans would treat Jesus like that when he was going there only to heal their sick people and to tell them about the love of our heavenly Father!

"Shall we pray to God to send down a storm of fire and destroy that wicked town?" James and John asked. But Jesus had a very different plan of showing the Samaritans how Christians should act. He was sorry that he must go away without helping and blessing them, but he explained to

his disciples that he had not come to earth to take away men's lives. He had come to save lives. He had come to show love and kindness even to those who were unkind to him. So they all went quietly away to the next place, where the people were glad to have them. And I like to think that perhaps some of those Samaritan people followed Jesus to the next town when they saw how patient and good he was.

Wherever Jesus went the crowds pressed about him all day long, but he was always patient and kind and loving,

no matter how tired he was.

One day the disciples saw among the crowd some mothers who had brought their children for Jesus to bless. There were sick people to be healed; there were wise men with important questions to ask; surely Jesus ought not to be bothered with little children! So the disciples were sending the mothers away when Jesus heard and called them back, saying the words of this verse that children all over the world now love: "Suffer little children to come unto me, and forbid them not."



And Jesus took the children in his arms and blessed them.

JESUS TEACHES PETER TRUE GREATNESS

John 13:1-16, 36-38

The journey to Jerusalem was over at last, and now Jesus and his disciples were in that wonderful old city. They were in a large room where they had eaten supper together. Jesus had kept telling the disciples that the end of his life was very near, but they could not believe it. They had seen the



wonderful things that he did in every town and village, and they knew that Jesus was truly the wonderful Saviour for whom the world had been looking.

Perhaps the disciples were thinking of this very

thing when Jesus quietly stood up and took a long towel and a basin and a pitcher of water and began to wash their feet. In that country, where the people wore sandals instead of shoes, a servant usually washed the feet of each person who came in, so when Jesus came to Peter and knelt down to wash his feet, Peter would not allow it at all. The holy Saviour should not be his servant.

But in his own quiet way Jesus told them that he had a reason for doing just what he did, so Peter and all the others allowed him to wash their feet. Then Jesus sat down and talked to them. He was going away to heaven very soon, and they must carry on his work in the world. To be his

true followers they must be willing to do anything and everything for one another, even though sometimes it was the work of the very lowest slave. If the holiest, best, and highest Man that had ever lived was so ready to do the little things

for others, surely they ought to be.

Margaret was given a part in the Sunday-school entertainment, but she whispered to Bessie: "I don't want that. It isn't nearly so nice as Helen's part." Bobby had no part at all, but he stood in front and sang so well that the singing was the very nicest thing about the whole evening. And Jesus and Bobby's teacher were the only ones that knew he was trying to be like Jesus.

PETER AND JOHN ASLEEP IN GETHSEMANE

After the Supper that Jesus and his disciples ate together in Jerusalem when he took the place of a servant and washed their feet, they walked out into the quiet moonlight. Through the city streets they went, on out to a beautiful garden on



the side of the mountain, called the Garden of Gethsemane. Jesus took Peter, James, and John with him into this Garden to pray.

Jesus left the disciples and walked on a little way to pray alone. The next day was to be the saddest and most terrible of all his life. He needed strength from the heavenly Father. When his prayer was ended he went

back to his three friends—but they were asleep. When you are ill, and mother stays up all night with you, she does not go to sleep, because you need her and she loves you; and it seems as if Peter, James, and John should have been like that.

Jesus was disappointed and sorry, but he excused the disciples, for he knew how tired they were. Twice again Jesus went away to pray, and each time when he came back the disciples were asleep. They did not see the angel that came to Jesus to comfort and strengthen him. When Jesus came back for the third time he told them that they might sleep on, now. He did not need them any longer, for, coming from

the city with their shields and spears and flaming torches were the soldiers, to take him away.

Peter had been so sure that he would be willing to give his life for Jesus. He had said so only a few hours ago, but now he and the other disciples were so afraid that they ran away in the darkness and left Jesus alone with the rough soldiers.

"Watch ye and pray" was what Jesus had said to his dis-

ciples in the Garden, for he knew how much they would need courage. But they had not been watching with him and had not been praying.

I wonder if Jesus ever chooses us for any work of love that we neglect or forget? Let us have the eyes of our minds very wide open to-day to see the places in Sunday school that Jesus needs our help. When we go home we shall need to be wide-awake, too, or we may miss some of the ways to help mother or father.

John 18:15-27; 19:25-27




When the soldiers took Jesus away from the quiet Garden of Gethsemane to the palace of the high priest, Peter and John followed them. What happened there seems like some dreadful dream, for the soldiers were very cruel to the gentle Lord Jesus. Peter had been very sure that nothing could make him untrue to Jesus, yet in that palace with the rough soldiers near,

he three times said that he did not know Jesus. Then Peter heard the crowing of a cock (because morning was coming) and he remembered that Jesus had said, "Before the cock crow, thou shalt deny me thrice." He went outside the palace and "wept bitterly," and from that minute Peter became one of the bravest, noblest friends of Jesus that ever lived.

At last Jesus was taken out and nailed to a tall, wooden cross to die. It was a sad, sad day for Peter and John and the other friends who sorrowfully followed and stood watching. Jesus' mother stood beside John, and when Jesus looked down from his cross and saw her there he asked John to be her son in his place, and from that time John loved her and cared for her as if she had been his own mother.

So the kind. loving Iesus died, and the poor, hurt body was taken down



Early on Easter morning. Mary Magdelene went to the tomb, but the great stone was rolled away, and the grave was empty. In great trouble she hurried to tell Peter and John, and they both ran as quickly as they could to the tomb. But one

when Mary looked into the tomb again she saw two shining angels, and, a little later, she saw Jesus himself.

Jesus had risen from the dead, and for forty days he went about among his disciples and friends. Then Jesus went back to heaven, and although Peter and John missed him they were not sad, for they knew that he was living with the Father.

And not one of them had father or mother living, for they were little Armenian children; and because people in Canada had sent money to save them they had been brought to a home called an orphanage. Before the terrible war times, many of the children had had beautiful homes and dainty clothing; but for many months they had wandered about, ragged and hungry, sleeping in the street or by the roadside. How wonderful the orphanage seemed, where they could have a real bath, and some clean clothes and some bread and rice. Do you think that is a

poor Christmas dinner? If you were starving, it would seem the most wonderful dinner in the world.

In the orphanage the children heard again the Christmas story of the baby Jesus who was born in the stable at Bethlehem, because in the crowded town there was no other room for his mother Mary, and Joseph, her husband. They heard how the angels sang, "On earth peace, good will toward men," and how the shepherds found the baby King. They heard about the Wise Men who followed a wonderful star, and brought costly gifts to the little Christ-child.

When the angel told Joseph what the baby's name was to be, he said, "He shall save his people," and those who love Jesus are "his people," whether they live in Armenia or in Canada.

Would there be any Christmas in the orphanage? Only such a little money to feed and clothe so many! Some one with a great deal of love in his heart had sent a little gift for every child, and oh, how surprised and delighted those children were! How they thanked the heavenly Father for the orphanage, and what loving thoughts they sent to Canada.

But the orphanages cannot care for the boys and girls unless the money is sent. So let us each worship our King to-day by giving as our gift to Jesus our promise to help his children in Armenia.

Think of Peter and John going to a town in Samaria to find a place for Jesus to stay that night. Tell how Jesus taught them a lesson in being patient.


Think of Jesus the King, the Holy Saviour, washing his disciples' feet. Why did he do it?

When Jesus went up to heaven after being with his friends for forty days, what work did he leave for his disciples?







THE PAPER CHRISTMAS STOCKINGS

Betty had been looking over mother's missionary magazines and there she had seen some pictures of such poor, sad, ragged little children. "What is the matter with them?" she asked.

Then mother explained that they were Armenian children who had once been dainty and clean and sweet as Betty was. But the Turkish soldiers, whose heathen religion made them think that they were doing right, had killed the fathers and mothers and burned the homes of many, many little children. People in Canada sent money to help, and it bought food and clothes. 
