Valuable Hints for the Housewise.

Jelly Care—Two eggs, one cup sugar, half cup sweet cream, one cup flour, half teaspoon sods, one teaspoon cream tartar.

Lemon Jelly Care—One cup sugar, two eggs, beaten together, one-fourth cup of cold water, one teaspoonful baking powder in one and a half cups of flour.

Hasty Pudding—Place three prints of sweet milk in a kettle over a brisk fire; thoroughly beat three eggs, and ong half pith of milk, two tablespoonfuls of defin, one-half teaspoonful of salt. Stir, and four into the boiling milk. Stir until thoroughly cooked. Serve hot; eat with sugar and cream.

Suff Pudding—One cup of suet chopped fine, one cup of raisins, one cup molasses, half a cup of sweet milk, one tablespoonful of soda, one teaspoonful of cinnamon, three cups of flour; cloves and nutnegs to suit your taste. Steam three hours; serve with sauce.

Add one nutmeg, a pinch of salt, and sugar to taste. When cool enough add three eggs well beaten. Serve with butter, and bake it two hours before you serve it. This you will find to be good.

Sover's Millicatawany Sour—Cut up a knuckle of veal, put into a stewpan with a piece of butter, half pound lean ham (not smoked), carrot, turnip, three onions and six apples; add half pint of water; set the stew pan over a sharp lire, moving the meat round occasionally let remain until the bottom of the stew pan is covered with a brownish glaze; add three tablespoonfuls of curry powder, half a pound of curry paste and half a pound of flour, stir well in; add a gallon of water, a spoonful of salt and half one of sugar. When boiling place at the corner of the stove, simmer two hours and a half, skimming off all the fat as it rises; then strain into a turee.

The Doctrine of the Resurrection Explained by Beecher, Tal-mage, and Frothingham,

A Servey and the Company of the Comp

The subject of Mr. O. B. Frothingham's discourse in Masonic Temple was "The Resurrection." He said that the meaning of the word Easter is resurrection; and it is, therefore, a word of universal interest. The Christian doctrine of the resurrection of Christ is a fundamental article of Christian faith. It belongs to the upper sphere of the mind, not to the grosser matter of the body; and it centres round a tradition of the early Christian Church. As a fact, the doctrine of the resurrection of Christ is not open to discussion, nor can it be made the subject of argument. It was once strong enough to stand in evidence in any Christian court of law; but now no educated lawyer would risk his reputation on the case. The tradition is accepted as a narrative of the past, but it is not proved. All that we know is that as a tradition if was current among the Christians of the first century—nothing more. Supposing it were proved to be true it would only go to show that Christ was a supernatural man, and it would not prove that any other man could raise again from the dead. The exception in this case proves the rule of mortality, not of immortality; for you cannot argue from isolated instances to general experience. It is a question-outside of humanity; for Christ was an abnormal man, born not of flesh and blood, but of the Hall of the late o

theory of spiritualism goes to show that human nature lives again; that there is a principle of life which carries the spirit of man beyond the vapours of the grave. But the Christian narrative makes at out that none save those living in Christ shall share with Him the resurrection. The doctrine of the Christian Church is not that of immortality; it only lays down that the Christian who lives in Jesus shall never die. Let us understand that unless we are Christians we must be materialists.
