QUAKE elections took place on Wednesday. Full returns have not yet been made. So far as heard from the Joly Government has been returned by about seven of a majority.

The Paris Exposition was opened on the 1st inst. with great splendor. Several hundred thousand visitors were present to witness the grand procession and opening ceremonies.

Church, to be conducted by members of the Conference. The pulpits of the Congregational, Canada Methodist and Knox Churches will also be occupied on Sabbath evenings by some of the visiting divines.

The reckless manner in which prominent members of the Opposition have been slandered lately by the more servile part of the Government, and the being partial to a certain extent. Suits for libel have been instituted against these newspapers, and unless a retraction is made, some other libel cases are likely to be served with similar notices.

THE EASTERN QUESTION.

Latest Intelligence.

Negotiations between Admiral Horby and the Russian headquarters for a simultaneous withdrawal, are reported to be at a standstill. General Tollyben having brought fresh instructions, it is thought they will be resumed. So far as the general situation is concerned, there is nothing in the despatches to prove that it is either better or worse. Eighty thousand have joined the British army, and the Russian army is reported to be at a standstill. The English Government has chartered 100 fast cruisers, whose commanders are ordered to treat all Russian privateers as pirates.

Extraordinary enthusiasm exists throughout India in anticipation of the breaking out of hostilities between England and Russia. Whole regiments of natives are volunteering in India for active service.

A Constantinople telegram says an attack is being made by Russian and Turkish soldiers near Daud Pasha barracks, about two miles beyond the fortifications. Eighty men were wounded. The Sebastopol has consequently prohibited the Russians crossing the line of demarcation.

Considerable stir has been caused by the arrival of the steamer *Cimbric*, one of the Hamburg-New York line, chartered by the Russians, at South West Harbor, Me. The crew consisted of 100 men, and a regular organized ship's company of sixty officers and six hundred seamen of the Russian Imperial navy, together with a large number of Russian soldiers. Her present intentions are unknown, but it seems probable her passengers are intended to land in the event of the outbreak of hostilities between England and Russia. She is reported to have arms and ammunition on board. Her cargo is said to consist of 100,000 lbs. of gunpowder, and a long despatch, in cipher, was sent to St. Petersburg.
