CAN FIRE 1,500 SHOTS A MINUTE

New York—The New York Sun says: Satisfactory test was made yesterday afternoon on a machine gun capable of firing 1,500 shots a minute and so easily handled that a little girl can manipulate it. The test was made for the benefit of representatives of the British and French governments, for whom the new deathdealer is intended. The gun is of a new pattern, manufactured by the Marlin Arms Company, of New Haven, Conn., Edgar Park, vice president of the concern explained to inquiries that his plant is capable of turning out such weapons at the rate of 200 a day. The gun is fed from a long tape to which cartridges are attached passing through the weapon from side to side while the gun is in action. The cartridge used is of .762 millimetres diameter. The weapon has a range of 3,000 yards, and is said to be particularly well adapted for use on aeroplanes, for its weight is only about that of the average rifle.

The Bank of Commerce, in its commercial letter for November, has the following timely and most opportune cautions:

The enormous purchases made by the Allies from our manufacturers have entailed the payment of high wages to industrial workers and thus, from the very necessities of the Empire, the latter find themselves possessed of a greater purchasing power than at any previous time. This power can be used either for selfish gratification or for to win the war. If the former—the selfish—course is followed it is practically frittering away the resources of the Empire. On the other hand, the thoughtful patriot will save every cent to lend to his country. Those with the habit of spending freely are apt to look with aversion upon those with a disposition to save but for the time being those who save are the ones who forget the "silver bullets" that are the "silver bullets" that now more than ever necessary.



NEWS OF BATTLE

The disquieting news from the battlefronts and temporary internal troubles in Britain, France and Greece of the last week or more has given place to days of more hopefulness. Under the new Premier it is bespiced the war much more than formerly.

Mondays news of the great French victory at Verdun with the capture of nine thousand and German prisoners, eighty guns with eleven square miles territory, including fifteen important villages, farms and other points of vantage was a welcome thrust for the allies.

Even more unexpected was the news of the advance of General Maude's columns in Mesopotamia against the Turks, right up to the very gates of Kut-el-Amara. Reports from Cairo say this advance continues with great success, with heavy captures of Turk troops, guns and materials.

Athens despatches corroborate the report that Constantine's government has completely acquiesced in the demands of the allies' latest ultimatum.

Another "diplomatic" victory, more local to Britain, is the possibility of the settlement of the Irish question as developed in the debate in the house of commons in its latest session. On the whole it is a much merrier Christmas that is in prospect than appeared last week.

THE EGG EXHIBIT AT THE FAIR

One of the most interesting and attractive displays at the Poultry Show consists of the egg exhibit of the Live Stock Branch of the Dominion Department of Agriculture, Ottawa.

The exhibit proper is particularly interesting. It consists of two large scenic illustrations, the one representing an improved, and the other an antiquated method as followed in the production and marketing of eggs. These illustrations, together with their accompanying views of the interior of candling rooms in the wholesale warehouses where the eggs are classified into their respective grades, the percentage being indicated in each case, present to the producer and the first receivers of eggs a rather remarkable object lesson, and one which, were the principles applied in everyday practice, would result in a tremendous improvement in the quality of eggs marketed.

Close at hand the Department has also erected a candling booth in which continuous demonstrations are given, and this combined with the egg exhibit presented by the Live Stock Branch constitutes one of the distinctly educational features of the fair; and consumers, especially in these days of increasing prices, as well as producers and other interested in the egg trade, should not fail to pay it a visit.

This exhibit is presented under the direction of the Dominion Live Stock Commissioner, Mr. John Bright, and is in charge of Mr. J. Russell Fee, assisted by Mr. A. Logan, and under the immediate supervision of Mr. W. A. Brown, chief of the Poultry Division.

To Utilize our Opportunities and Resources

Wolfville, Dec. 1.—Wolfville absorbs ideas, digests them and gives them new forms of expression. The latest illustration of this is the P. P. C. This being interpreted is the People's Planting Club.

The cost of living is continuously rising and there seems to be a growing scarcity of the commodities of life, at the same time as the war continues the demand upon our purses become more frequent and imperious. How can we turn deaf ears to the appeal? The Wolfville way of meeting the conditions is the People's Planting Club.

The idea is to secure plots of unoccupied and uncultivated land within the community limits to prepare this for seeding, to sow or plant staple crops. The work to be done by the voluntary labor of the citizens of Wolfville, who agree to spend as many hours in planting, cultivating and harvesting as may be necessary.

At the end of the season the crops are disposed of at current prices, the initial expenses are paid and the balance devoted to patriotic purposes.
